## To Promote a Study of Nature

ONE of the interesting features of Summer days at Victoria Beach is a ramble through the woods which cover the island of Victoria Beach for a distance of two miles. Children call these outings "hikes". This resort is noted for its beautiful trees, its birches and evergreens chiefly, but besides there are poplar, elms, and ash, in clusters bright green.

There are innumerable paths, but groups should be posted on the best routes to take, so that nothing of pleasant variety is passed by. There is a natural lake in the interior which is a novelty, but everyone should at one time and another take the shore line for from there the sights are inspiring. At one point one can look far to the south and see where the Winnipeg river enters Traverse Bay to finally submerge into Lake Winnipeg, and form a part of the source of the Nelson River which tumbles and tosses its way into Hudson Bay.

It is well to have with the hikers someone who has gone over the paths before. Woodland trails are confusing at times.

A book on Manitoba birds should also be carried along, for these walks should be educational as well as healthy outdoor jaunts. There are many beautiful birds native to this district and many a rare bird, all the way from Mexico and even South America, may be seen flying from rock to rock. Once a youthful resident learns the class and name of these feathered friends, they retain it in their memory. Its a part of a boy's better life to get close to nature and learn its deeper meaning.

The Victoria Beach Club is taking a lead in promoting these hikes through leafy bowers. A move was made at a recent club meeting to form a strong woman's committee from the membership to take hold in a vigorous and practical way of organizing the children and the young people to encourage a better acquaintance with the beautiful spots around the resort. The name of Miss Kay Porter was suggested and an effort will be made to give the clubs complete support to a plan which will promote the greatest good to the greatest number. Children should be given every opportunity, it was decided, in directing their attention to the natural beauties that surround Victoria Beach and any suggestions from parents, and from authorities on bird life and plant life will be gladly accepted and considered.

The Natural History Society of Manitoba has a centre at this Beach which should be made use of more than it is, and the club should invite the society to visit the Beach and make a report on what one can learn here, in a practical way, of Nature's hidden but fascinating life as seen here. Two residents

of Victoria Beach are on the executive of the society, Mr. Shirley Brooks and Miss M. Pratt; the latter being the society's secretary and Mr. Brooks one of its most valued members, and an authority on insect, moth and butterfly life. That should help to increase the interest in Victoria Beach.

While nature studies forms a part of all public school instruction, its value might be put to a practical test right here and increase the knowledge of the children in a most beneficial way.

The Victoria Beach Club's plan of adding to knowledge should be good for the mind as well as for the physical body.

### CALLING ATTENTION TO THE DOCK

Some vigorous action will be taken to bring the dire state of the government dock to the right authority. The severe weather of last autumn made its condition more untenable and it is now unsafe. The Victoria Beach Club at its executive meeting on Wednesday, suggested a plan to members of the council. That is to form a committee to bring to the attention of the member for Springfield the urgency that something be done. The Municipal council should take the lead. The government relies on such authority for a better guidance. But it was felt that all organizations should be placed behind the demand. A committee of two from the municipality, the club and the Beach Company was selected to write to the member without delay, calling attention in no uncertain way the deplorable state of the pier. The members of the committee are: J. W. Beech, J. T. Irving, representing the council; George P. Macleod, president, and William Pope, representing the club; and Dr. R. K. McClung, president, and C. Laurence Kennedy, representing the Company.

### MR. PERCY TAKES OVER THE INN

Mr. Albert B. Percy will have charge of Victoria Beach Inn and the new lessee, a man of wide experience and training in the catering line, was down late in April looking over the premises and was down again on May 6, paying careful attention to interior facilities for the large business expected at the Inn this season. The Inn will open on June 1st. The Beach is fortunate in securing Mr. Percy to manage the Inn as men of his type and qualifications are extremely difficult to secure during a critical period of the war. Many applications have already been received for accommodation, including leading citizens of Winnipeg and other parts of the west. The Inn came through the winter in excellent condition. The attractive grounds will also receive close attention. Mrs. Percy will assist her husband as hostess at the Inn.

Mr. Pennefather was born at Beech House, Tottenham, England, the second son of the late Col. John Pyne Pennefather, of County Tipperary, and Mary Fitzgerald Pennefather, County Limerick, Ireland. In 1880 he came to Canada with his parents and three brothers, Dr. Gerald, Desmond J., and Col. P. W. Pennefather.

In 1928 he retired from the C.P.R. as master mechanic of the Manitoba district, after 40 years with the railway.

Surviving is a son, T. R. Pennefather, Montreal, and Mrs. Hemmeon. He was the last surviving brother of Mrs. A. J. Hemmeon, owner and occupier with her husband of a cottage on Sixth Avenue, at this Beach.

Funeral services were held Tuesday in All Saints' Anglican Church with burial in the family plot in St. John's cemetery.

A severe storm late in September did damage to the pipeline at the municipal pumping station and it cost \$400 to

make the necessary repairs. Engineer Cooke is down for the season and will have some of the deep wells ready for use at the Arbor Day week-end, but he is handicapped by a shortage of labor; work in Winnipeg's war plants attracting many men away from the Beach area.

## FIGHTS FOR LIFE OF FREEDOM

S/Sgt. J. F. Withrow, of Winnipeg, who spent his younger years at Victoria Beach in the summer time, has been awarded second prize in the essay contest entitled "Why Do You Fight," sponsored by the Canadian Press News, weekly newspaper for Canadian servicemen overseas.

S/Sgt. Withrow was born in Calgary and came to Winnipeg in 1920. He attended Earl Grey and Kelvin Schools and later went east to Newmarket, Ont., to become editor of a weekly newspaper there. His wife and son live at 1039 Dorchester Ave., Winnipeg and he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Withrow who have a cottage on Third Avenue. He is stationed at an ordnance depot in Britain.

This is what S/Sgt. Withrow wrote:

"I'm fighting for my life. Or, more specifically, I'm fighting for the kind of life that Canada has given me; the kind of life which Canada will give my son. It's the only life worth living. It's a life worth dying for. It's a life of freedom.

"For much as self-interest may blind us at times, in Canada the key to sane and healthful government rests in

the hands of the people. Given that condition, we in Canada may hope to follow the road which leads to eventual perfection of freedom. Canada must continue to be free. That's why I'm fighting.

"Then too, I want to worship in my own way. In Canada, although we may feel a lack of the beauty which age has given the churches of older lands, we know our churches shelter a beautiful religion . . . a religion that scorns to shoulder a new belief, so that each may walk to his own church and feel no mockery from his neighbor. I'm fighting for my belief in God.

I want, in my groping way, to do my own thinking and to say what I think. If my thinking is muddled, I know that in a country that makes knowledge available to all, my son will have the chance to do a better job than his dad. I'm fighting for my son and for the opportunity a free Canada will give him.

"I want 'freedom for.' I'm not so worried about the 'freedom from.' For in Canada I know the willing need fear no want; the honest no injustice.

"In short, if, as has been said, the key to happiness is freedom, and the key to freedom lies in a brave heart, then I'm fighting for all the brave of heart could desire."

## THE GREEDY SQUIRREL

(By Sir William Beach Thomas in the London Spectator)

A pleasant, well-treed, well-bushed garden within about 25 miles of London, has been supplying daily evidence of the omnivorous habits of the grey squirrel. (Victoria Beach is also a sufferer from the ravages of this little animal). They have bred and multiplied inordinately and became so bold that they threaten to enter the house. The owner has been content to do without a single nut or walnut, but is less pleased to see the apple crop devoured wholesale or knocked to the ground. Moreover, there is a certain presumption that the nests of small birds have suffered only less than the apples, though this charge has not been brought home. Neighboring corn-crops also have been pillaged. A great many creatures when numerous become pernicious, among them that otherwise most beneficent bird, the rook. It is generally supposed that this squirrel was enlarged by the Duke of Bedford (who repented of his deed) and Lord Lilford in southern and midland England, but it appears that colonies were also planted in Yorkshire and the north. However, it is still the case that the aliens have become multitudinous only in southern England; and there their diminution is almost a necessary duty, if the balance of nature is to be maintained.

### DESTRUCTION OF WEEDS ON ROAD ALLOWANCES

There are in Manitoba a total of 91,233 miles of road allowances, or an average of over 700 miles per municipality. The task of keeping this extensive area reasonably free of weeds is no small one. Even though the last two summers have been most difficult from a help standpoint, a very real effort has been made in the majority of municipalities to cope with weeds found on road allowances.

Proper attention to this problem of weeds on the "King's Highway" is encouraging to Municipal officials and others, for many reasons, some of which are the following:

1. Observance of the provisions of the "Noxious Weeds Act."
2. Removal of "snow trap" hazard.
3. Improvement in appearance of roads.
4. Protection of those "allergic" to the pollen of weeds.

The Noxious Weeds Act (1941-1942 Session), Section 7, states:

"... it shall be the duty of such occupant, owner, agent or agents to cut down or otherwise destroy all noxious weeds on every road or highway immediately adjoining such land to a distance or extent of one-half the width of the road or highway nearest to the land as often as may be necessary to prevent the ripening and scattering of the seeds..."

Where a person residing in a rural municipality fails to comply with the above section, the municipality is empowered to have the weeds cut or otherwise destroyed, and the costs placed upon the collector's roll to be charged as taxes.

While the amended Act clears up the matter of responsibility for destroying weeds on roadways, municipalities will not be expected to do extensive mowing. It is hoped that farmers (owners and tenants) will appreciate the necessity of clearing roads of troublesome weeds. The best time to mow weeds is just before they come into flower and certainly before seed has formed. —Advt.

## Owners of Roving Animals Must Obey New By-law

Cottage residents and other property owners are happy in the knowledge that the council of the municipality of Victoria Beach is fully aware of the responsibility in seeing that British justice with the maintenance of law and order is the first principle in governing public affairs at Victoria Beach; and that all residents within the jurisdiction of authority should be made fully acquainted with the meaning of our laws and that not one is to be regarded as a sham and a by-word.

There is probably not one other municipality in the province of Manitoba where at least one of the by-laws of the municipality has been so flagrantly defied, where the abuse has been carried on so deliberately and without regard to the rights or feelings of others.

There have been a few at Victoria Beach who have not been considering the rights of cottage owners. Somehow a number have got it into their heads that they were at this beach before the cottage owners were lot owners and that cottage residents are encroaching on settlers rights.

Last fall cattle and horses were allowed to run at will through the cottage area. From the Bow and Arrow cottage on the lake front to Arthur Road there was not a fence dividing properties that was not trampled down by these roving animals, eager to get at the grass on cottage lawns. The writer had both dividing line fences destroyed; a new fence had to be put up on each side and many others will have to be built. Owners of cattle fail to realize that Victoria Beach is no place to raise small herds of cattle; there is not the extent of pasture land available.

Once more the council of the municipality of Victoria Beach has made an attempt to deal with this problem. The new by-law appears in this issue. It has teeth in it. Those whom it may affect should realize that several cottage residents were property owners since 1916 and have their rights.

The municipality now has a pound, a pound-keeper, the Mounted Police and a resident magistrate, to look into all violations of the by-law; and the municipality has the power and the willingness to enforce it.

So let all of us do our best to live up to the British law which governs the public affairs of Victoria Beach.

With an ample water supply, pure and fresh; with traffic on the streets and avenues well controlled; and with adequate medical care available,

no one has any complaints outside the roving animals and this now appears to be well in hand.

So let's make it a happy season for everyone.

Right here it might be mentioned that the stores of Victoria Beach have experienced management and stocks will be ample throughout the summer.

In speaking of the council the "Herald" would like to point out the loyal support members always receive from Mr. John Anderson, who represents the permanent residents on the council, and who speaks out for what he thinks is the wishes of those he represents with no uncertain voice, but his level-headed manner of taking a long view of each situation always wins the favor of the council. Victoria Beach home folks are well represented on the municipal council.

### CHURCH SERVICE

There will be a Community Church Service in the Club House, Sunday, June 25, at 11 a.m., if someone can be secured to take the service. Watch for notices around the beach next week-end. Rev. Mr. Kerr, who has been conducting services the past winter at the Beach, will hold a mid-week service at the Legion Hall, Wednesday evening, June 21.

### GOLDEN CHANCE TO OBTAIN SITE FOR SUMMER HOME

Great numbers of Manitoba residents will make their summer home at Victoria Beach this season. Everyone should see to it that the most delightful recollections are carried away by these visitors. The council of the municipality has worked through a difficult winter and early spring period to see that no duty left to them has been neglected. The responsibility of caring for many thousands who will be here at one or another part of vacation days is a heavy one and the people feel a sense of pride that the business men who serve this municipality do so intelligently and with a willingness far beyond what ordinary duties calls on man to perform.

Victoria Beach occupies higher level ground than the ordinary run of Lake Winnipeg beaches. It is covered with beautiful groves of trees and its beaches are unsurpassed. It is a children's happy playground with its shallow waters of wide expanse and bordered with a spread of pure, fine sand, which the younger ones find just to their liking. The council must continue to see that dogs are not allowed to mar the pleasure of those who recline for hours on the sunny, sandy shore.

Many will see this summer the desirability of securing a site for a future cottage. As Winnipeg grows into an even greater city, so will Victoria Beach and the demand for cottages at this favored by nature resort will become greater.
