Kerr won the Orchid Trophy for the best and most beautiful garden and grounds. The George P. MacLeod Cup for the best small garden was won by Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Spinks for their well-landscaped flower-beds and grounds around "Gates Ajar". Mrs. Alex Johnson was awarded the Hurkisdale cup for the best rock garden. The John W. Beech cup for the greatest improvement in grounds was won by Mr. and Mrs. S. Milne. Mrs. Alex. W. Anderson took the C.N.R. trophy for the best vegetable garden.

Jackie Darwin and Peggy Sprague were the second prize winners for the large garden. E. Misener's garden was put into the Small Garden Class this year. He came second. Mr. Albert Hunt was given second prize in the Improved Garden Class. Mrs. Edward J. Freeman's rock garden came second. Dr. T. H. Williams won the second prize for the vegetable gardens.

Mr. John A. Ormiston judged the gardens again this year and was pleased with the improvement made in several of the grounds inspected. Another highly successful festival in this competition's nineteen-year history.

Mrs. J. J. Smith of "Birch Haven", Seventh Ave. near Arthur Road, again convened the festival. She says the pleasure in visiting the gardens justifies the work. "When the gardener is sharing the results of his work with others," she says, "he is at his happiest!"

Last Sunday's Church Service

The story Rev. William Conly related to the boys and girls last Sunday morning was ideally suited to this Nature Sanctuary of Victoria Beach when the wonderful works of God are seen in the beauty of the Beach — the varied and colorful birds of all sizes and colors; each with its own skills of nest-making, food hunting, eating habits and all filling the woods with song. He cares for the birds and boys and girls and for every creature he has made.

The Sermon text was St. Mathew, Chap. 16, Verse 13. "And I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven and whatsoever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatsoever thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven." Rev. Conly pointed out this great power was not limited to Ministers of the Gospel. All Christians have power and authority to bring forgiveness and the love of God to all mankind.

Livingstone and Schweitzer carried the keys to Africa and loosed the Spirit of Christ in this dark continent. William Booth used bands and drums for his keys in the slums of London. John Wesley went into the villages and byways of England and with his keys of sermon and song won the people from the binding force of cold formality. No gift is too small — no person barred. Nurses, doctors, Sunday school teachers, ordinary men and women, even former derelicts, all are given opportunity by word and deed and example to use their keys. It is a privilege, a solemn duty and a responsibility to make forgiveness vital, real and possible for others to get into the kingdom by showing the way and opening the door.
