Last Sunday's Church Service

Rev. James D. Marnoch of St. John's Presbyterian church was guest preacher at the Civic Service last Sunday morning to which he welcomed the Mayor and Aldermen of Victoria Beach.

In his message to the children Rev. Marnoch pointed out that of all the living things he created, God gave only to children the right to decide how their lives will be lived. He told the story of Ida Scudder who was separated from her missionary parents in her childhood and vowed she would never go to India; yet when the call came she became the great Doctor Ida Scudder, who opened up the first Women's Medical College in Valore, India.

Rev. Marnoch based his sermon on Gen. 14, Verses 22 and 23. "Abram said to the King of Sodom I have lifted up my hand unto the Lord—the most High God, the possessor of heaven and earth. That I will not take from a thread even to a shoelatchet and that I will not take anything that is mine, lest thou shouldst say—I have made Abram rich."

Abram had made a vow to God that victory over the enemy would be his only reward and refused material reward from the King of Sodom. Rev. Marnoch pointed out the dangers of material recognition, and even if the individual surrenders self to God, the love of things can undermine our lives and our relation to God.

If one becomes too enmeshed by material rewards for services performed he is in danger of losing the right of free fellowship with others, the right of recreation of his own soul; the Christian right of free witness to God, who has given to man an inheritance—undefiled pure—and made men the trustees of the beauty, the richness and the hope of the world. The beautiful solo, rendered by Mr. Robert McPee, was the hymn "One Church, One Faith, One Lord". The lovely flowers were from Mayor and Mrs. H. E. Gibson in loving memory of their son, Terry.
