Your Municipal Information Card will be delivered July 4. Treasure it. It directs you to the fire alarm, tells you who are the wardens, reminds you of correct Motor Vehicle Laws. Dogs must be leashed, cats must be belled, garbage must be covered, horses and cattle are not allowed at large. Bicycle riding on footpaths is forbidden. Walk on footpaths as much as possible. This leaves the road for cyclists and vehicles. Report lost and found articles to the Police Officer. These will be posted on the board.

Last and most important: "Children should not be allowed to enter the lake when waves are high. Stormy days are dangerous!"

Victoria Beach is on Daylight Saving Time. The C.N.R., a national service, must stay on Standard Time.
