Valuable Stones On Our Beaches

The resorters who requested we have all the stone removed from our shoreline did not realize its value. Without stone we could have no sandy beach. During the half century since this resort was started the thousands of visitors who have admired the silvery sand skirting our shoreline have drawn attention to it all over the continent. This sand is

the gift of Lake Winnipeg's waves. Wind drives it onto the waves which carry it ashore. There the stones trap, retain and accumulate it. When the wind drives it further up on the land our beaches are formed. With no stone the sand would be carried back to the water, leaving the shoreline to build into clayish weeded mud.

Owners of luxurious resorts have had to spend millions moving stone to where they had to trap sand for beaches. Way back, 20 years ago, thousands were spent on our Eastern shoreline, on but one fresh air camp. They had to create an artificial sandy beach! Nature has endowed Victoria Beach with two strong points of land jutting out in Lake Winnipeg, and it is there that our stone stands guard.

The late Fred De'Coursey Davies, who spent most of the season at his place on Sunset Blvd., taught us the value of our stone. A Lake Winnipeg engineer for 25 years, he had built artificial beaches. One he designed like ours, with stone. Changed a mud shoreline! When the government strengthened our pier Mr. Davies, the then consulting engineer, forbade workmen to weaken our beaches by taking away shoreline stone. It would have been cheaper and easier. But stone was brought from a distance. Enjoy the beauty of our beaches! Bask in the summer warmth of our artistic stone!

MY, HOW IT GROWS!

Victoria Beach School No 1811 had its beginning in February of 1916. At that time it was a one-roomed school serving eight grades. The majority of the pupils were children of three old beach families namely: Mr. Ateah, John Rupert and Jim Olafson. It was supervised by A. G. Burton. Many of these scholars made their homes and raised their families here. By 1927-28 enrolment had dwindled to eleven. However, two additions to the building have been necessary since then. In 1939 a second room was added to accommodate an enrolment of over fifty. This served until 1953 when a third room was added, with appropriate heating and facilities to fill a growing need for high school training. The school now employs three teachers and serves an enrolment of seventy. Grades One to Eleven inclusive.

Due to the present new school division plan in Manitoba, within a year, high school students will be transported to a new divisional high school. However, if the present increase in enrolment continues, Victoria Beach School will ring with the voices of many children for some years to come. The beginner's class this fall numbers ten. The school at present supervised by Mr. J. C. Baines of Lac du Bonnet, Man.

Fresh Air Camp On Big Elk Island

To build a fresh air camp for children whose parents have no cottage has long been the dream of a group of Christian folk who live in Winnipeg, Selkirk, and in our own near lake towns. They dreamed of a place at the massive, virgin and lovely Elk Island just north of Victoria Beach. Gerald Thomas of Selkirk had been inspired by Shantymen, who minister to men in remote Northern work camps. He began to study the way to go about a Children's Camp, and gathered strong volunteers around him. That was five years ago. Now the woods are cleared, buildings are up, and an average of 85 children 8 to 16 years enjoy a 10 to 12 day holiday.

The manager, directors, registered nurse, cooks, all give free labour. Thanks to public donations and many pantry showers at the outset, cost to each child is nominal. They are brought to the rebuilt Olafson's Pier on Little Elk Island (now Victoria Beach), by bus, from Winnipeg. It is a short half-hour barge trip in calm weather over shallow water, to the camp. The barge will take a car. Either of their motor boats can be used for smaller parties. Fresh bread, milk and meat go over daily. Three hefty meals a day and a before-bed snack!

They've plywood buildings, painted white, yellow, pink green! They've their own electric plant. Children can be seated together at the dozen dining tables. Stoves, shelves, modern gadgets, in the kitchen at the end of this largest building. Assembly is in the Auditorium where hobby groups are encouraged. Ornaments are designed from natural products. Other rainy-day fun!

Hewn from the virgin forests are baseball and volley ball fields, a life guard during swim sessions. They've row boats. Campfires and picnics are planned. Cabins have double-decker bunks, some eight, some 12. Two beds in the hospital cabin, a cook's cabin and one for staff men. At first there was only clean straw to sleep on. Now

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they can buy army mattresses. Mr. Herbert Bayne, of Victoria Beach, has been a real benefactor, when it comes to bedding. He has given bed-springs, mattresses, quilts! Young people, who go later, enjoy the surf-board and water skis. Meals can be had, at nominal prices on Saturdays, which is the only visiting day for parents. Crowds are not catered to. It disrupts the program. Visiting plenikers are welcome. Children are not permitted to leave camp grounds. The barge leaves the pier around noon. There is no fare. Profanity, smoking, vulgarity or other unbecoming behaviour is not tolerated. The Christian brethren who have given so much in labour, time, and money, have built on faith. Their dream is fulfilled. The camp is called Faith Bible Camp!

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PINE ROAD AT EIGHTH VICTORIA BEACH

STRONG LINKS WITH THE FUTURE
(In Retrospect)

Thirty happy, carefree, relaxing summers at our cherished Victoria Beach brings back memories of many interesting events and focuses attention on the great changes that have taken place.

Third and fourth generations of summer residents enjoy its advantages and newcomers are attracted by the white sandy beaches and the shady avenues under the silver birches. Safe and some holidays for all ages without the hazy haze of commercialized amusements has always been the policy of our unique and envied family resort.

Over twenty new cottages have been erected this year bringing the total to about 700 which is double that of a few years ago. This has increased Municipal revenues threefold and a corresponding increase in operating expenditures as modern conveniences are demanded.

The forty foot water tower makes running water always available throughout the subdivision. This has been supplemented by several new deep wells. Water tests are made periodically by the Department of Health and insures a safe, pure water supply. There are some seven miles of water pipes in the subdivision.

The recurring trouble of washed out roads along the lake shore to Albert Beach has been relieved by the construction of the new paved government road to the parking lot where cars are left during summer months thus leaving the streets safe for the children. There are often five hundred cars on the parking lot on a week-end.

The Government pier has been reinforced and rebuilt and is utilized by the S. S. Kenora, lake tugs, fishing boats and pleasure craft. It is a favorite spot for the cottage fishermen and the annual water sports. Water skiing has also become very popular.

The long mooted electrification of the Beach has finally materialized. It is largely patronized and the old oil lamps are being discarded.

After long negotiations title was obtained to the old Air Force base on the understanding that the property will be used as a Memorial and Recreational Park. This brings to mind that there are over 300 names on the Honor Roll in the Clubhouse of our boys and girls who served in the forces during the war. Mention must also be made of the wonderful work of the Ladies' Committees in raising fund for war services.

Who can forget the V-Bites — 12 boys and 12 girls who provided so many jolly concerts. Incidentally many of them later married and are raising their families at the Beach.

Remember "The Valtannis," the boat which provided many pleasant lake trips to Black River, Pine Falls, etc.

Week-end trains often carried 1500 passengers and one misses the cheery greetings and chats with friends enroute since the motor cars now bring most people, also the throngs on the station platform when wives and children meet the "Daddies Special" on Friday evenings.

Times change our habits somewhat, but let us hope

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that it doesn't change the attractiveness of our enchanting Beach. The main regret is that there are not more long week-ends to enjoy it.


