#### ANNUAL WATER SPORTS DAY

An event that has been a leading activity over the years, the Annual Regatta and Water Sports Day, will be held this year on Saturday, August 1 at Government Pier.

In the past there has been keen competition in all events, especially those events contributing points for competitors towards the coveted Grand Aggregate Trophy which was donated by the Victoria Beach Company many years ago and has been competed for annually.

In Distance Swims, which for this season will again be half mile, the men compete for the Orchid Trophy while the ladies compete for the Rumford Trophy. These distance swims will be held at 10:30 a.m.

Canoe events will be climaxed by the men's war canoe race for the McKinney Trophy.

The regatta is open to every one visiting Victoria Beach. It is urged that competitors take advantage of the time to practice and train for events in which they intend to compete next Saturday.

#### Sunday Evening Entertainment

Sunday evening get-togethers in the clubhouse have long been an attractive feature of Beach life. They are sponsored by your Community Club. When the 8:30 train left for the city, in past years, young and old moved in a body to the clubhouse, where concerts were provided by cottagers and permanent residents. Evening trains do not operate any more, so we go in groups, from our cottages, taking longer to assemble. The job of getting eight or nine programs together was rather onerous. Now we have films, and there are many excellent ones!

For some years films have been provided, courtesy of Manitoba University's Audio-Visual Department, though they may come, originally from other sources. Some of this year's pictures belong to the Winnipeg Library. But it is our University friends who advise us on programs of suitable length and variety. They also arrange for films to be brought out and taken back to their owners.

The program begins at 8:30 and lasts an hour or more. It consists, usually, of four items. There may be three or five but for the most part four provide a well-rounded selection. We offer, through the season, travelogues, sporting and other skills, fairy tales, puppets, cartoons, comedy, and a number of documentary films. We risk appearing immodest when we say this summer's offerings will be of the same high standard as those of other years.

Travelogues have already taken us to the Klondike gold rush days. We are to see it again as a modern holiday land in our last program of the summer. Gaspe and Paris are also on our itinerary. We have learned about fishing in Bermuda and Arkansas and about fish conservation in British Columbia. A film in August takes us to Peru in search of the man-eating piranha fish. Water skiing was featured on our first program. Later programs will concern skiing in the Laurentians and ski skills generally. An added sporting feature will take us to Prince Edward Island to see the harness racing for which that province is noted.

We are very conscious of the need for water safety at the Beach and that will be dealt with. We will learn about finding our way in the woods with map and compass. Nature lovers enjoyed the "Miracle of a Bulb" and the "Goldfinch Family". Next week they will hear the story of fossils. We have already had puppets and fairy tales. The future holds more comedies and cartoons. There will also be two films on the work of UNICEF among the children of other lands.

The Canadian scene has been illustrated by the story of the life of the fur trapper in the north. In mid-August we will see a film on the husky dogs. Another will tell

about the oil fields of Alberta. The story of transportation in Canada will be told this week-end. And since this is the year of the Royal Visit we will see the Queen twice. On one occasion she opens Parliament in Ottawa in 1957, something most of us saw on television as it happened. In the other picture Her Majesty takes the salute at the famous ceremony of the Trooping of the Color.

All in all, we think we have an interesting series of programs lined up. We hope you like them too. There is no charge. Bring your flashlight as evenings shorten!


