## OUR DEEP FIRM ROOTS

### Community Club 38 Years Old

Victoria Beach Community Club was formed in 1921. Memberships were charged, some giving large amounts in advance, to start the building fund for present clubhouse. Meetings were held at the homes of the different cottage owners. The list of officers at this forming election were: President, Judge Patterson; Vice-President, Dr. Wood; Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Winifred Burnett (Now Mrs. John Mahood). The first committee was: Miss Evelyn Bevis, Mr. Paget, Messrs. Gordon Russell, James Lynch, and W. B. Low. Work on the clearing for the Golf Course, on the property where the old school house had once stood, was begun. When the men cut down the brush, the ladies made tea. The above information is given by Mrs. Mahood, as she remembers it.

When funds were raised, the clubhouse was built by Oscar Paulson (who also built Moonlight Inn and many artistic log buildings here). The clubhouse was opened by Sir James Aikens, whose portrait still hangs there.

### Club's First Tennis

Celling and walls of the flying-boat hangars were removed when the Forestry Air Base was moved from Memorial Park. They left the strong straight floors, flat as a billiard table! In no time the Community Club had three excellent tennis courts. Every one played in 1932!

### The Third Founder

We hear folks say "Messrs. Kennedy and Vokes were two of the founders of this resort, but there was a third. I cannot remember his name." Now we know it was W. E. Macara, the then Provincial Registrar General, whose portrait still hangs in the Manitoba Legislative Buildings. These three men bought most of this peninsula, then called Little Elk Island, for a shooting lodge. You could get here only by boat. They found it large. The idea of clearing the avenues and forming a resort grew in their minds. Hence Victoria Beach Company and, later, Victoria Beach resort as we know it.

Mrs. Sidney Wise, nee Mary Hemmion, was Mr. Macara's god-child! He was a great friend of Mary's maternal grandfather, who was a doctor. Her parents, Arthur and Lily Hemmion, built their charming cottage on Sixth near Arthur Road and spent many happy years here. Being lovers of the home cottage, their tea-kettle was always on the boil. Every one was welcome. How greatly they are

missed! The family cottage is still enjoyed by Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Wise and daughter, Kerry.

### Families of Past Reeves

Several Reeves have served since this area became a municipality (sometimes called Mayors). Some of those who have chaired our affairs are still ably represented here, by their sons and daughters. They have now become persons in their own right. Having been exposed, during all their beach life, to municipal business, at first hand, they can watch Council's proceedings, in this mushrooming resort, with growing interest! Those who come to mind are: Jacque Darwin, Peggy Sprague, Tammas Scott, David Grant, John Beech Jr. and the son of the most recent past Reeve, Douglas Irving.

#### BELAIR CAMP

In a beautifully wooded area, a few hundred yards from Mile 59, on Victoria Beach Railway line, stand the attractively painted buildings of Belair Camp. It is on the old road to the Beach. The buildings face a wide stretch of sandy beach, completely free of stones, where swimming is excellent!

The camp, owned and operated by the Winnipeg Presbytery, of United Church of Canada, whose members seek to give training and leadership and practical experience in Christian living, to groups of young people. There is at present accommodation for 60 campers, plus camp director, leaders, nurse, lifeguard, camp manager, and cooks. All, except the cooks, help on a voluntary basis.

Four girls camps and three boys camps are being held during July and August this year in age-groups 10 and 11 as well as 12 to 15. The program includes worship, Bible study, crafts, recreation, camp fires, hikes, cook outs. Large baseball and volley ball fields have been cleared.

Building began three years ago, when the Main Lodge, a very large building, with high arched roof, was constructed. This building also contains a fine kitchen, modern in all respects, including a large walk-in electric refrigerator. Campers slept in tents the first summer. But by a year last Spring three fine dormitories, and cottages for cooks and manager, were completed. Each dormitory contains two large rooms, each of which accommodates ten campers, between these two a smaller dormitory houses four leaders and staff.

All labour was voluntary. Early Spring and Summer Saturdays found groups of men from the A.O.T.S., organization, official mens groups of the United Church, hard at work. Pouring cement, building, roofing, painting! While Mondays and Tuesdays found groups of ministers at the job. This year all buildings were painted, modern toilet facilities added, and a propane gas heating system

When we first had the railway in 1915, reports Jacques Darwin, We had an influx of by-the-day visitors. They expected a popular beach, like Grand or Winnipeg Beach. A place had to be found for them away from resorters gardens. Bathhouses, etc., were built, for men and women, on the little beach by the clubhouse. There was a stove, big pots for water, wood to heat it! There were big covered picnic tables, against the sun and rain, and long benches. Bathing suits and towels could be rented. The board that held the keys to the private bathhouse cubicles was at the Lumber Yard for years afterwards. Only adults and tots came, mainly. It died out, for lack of patronage. One-day visitors seemed to want a more relaxing time than they could find here.

#### HISTORICAL BAYVIEW

The Bottell summer home at Bayview was once a House Boat, a floating pleasure boat, it is said. Built in Winnipeg, during the first war, by a wealthy English Army Colonel, she was to take pleasure to remote places, where there was no road and no railroad! The Colonel first lived aboard, on the Red River. Then with his strong steam boat he towed her the length and breadth of vast Lake Winnipeg. She had her own tanks and water system.

The Colonel brought his lovely floating ball-room to Victoria Harbour, at our pier, where life here was centred. Most of this peninsula was still wooded. There was a good orchestra. Folks flocked down to dance. But storm-waves in the bay proved too much for the boat. She was washed partly ashore, one night, at Bayview. Donkey engines were brought out. She was pulled up and faced to the road where she still stands, her prow lattice-fenced, a landlubber's summer home!

She still bears her mooring rings, her original timbers underneath are sound. But her deck is gone. She is ship-shape, back and front. The huge natural timbers around which she is built are still lovely. Her floor timbers are one and a half inches thick. Charming mitted ships-windows! Besides a big living room, she contains a dining-room, four bedrooms, kitchen, bathroom and storage room.

When the Colonel was recalled to England the house-boat was rented to Commanding Officer Stevenson and his wife of the Forestry Service Air Base here. (Airmen and ground crew were stationed in Donalds close by). The Stevensons furnished the boat-house in good taste. They were gracious hosts. Then the Air Base was moved.

Mrs. H. Bottell and her late husband, who managed Victoria Beach Inn for Victoria Beach Company, bought the houseboat. It housed the large overflow of guests who could find no room in the hotel. Guests arriving late at night were housed there. Four generations of the Bottell family still summer in this lovely old boat!

You will be pleased to learn A. K. Gee (Bill), is here again, with his wife, Bruce, Nancy and Susan. Bill bought the two-story pioneer cottage owned by Mrs. E. H. Briggs, at 305 Second. Mr. Gee Senior's garden was his chief delight. He grew prize dahlias. (We are glad it is now owned by garden lovers). You may remember F. M. Gee as the man who brought the first Celebrity Artist to Winnipeg in 1911. He died in 1947. We wish Bill's son and daughters as happy and healthful a life here as he himself had as a boy!
