## Know Your Neighbours

Gustav Nemes, who has summered here for 15 years, was winner of a 1939 National Sabre event. Earlier, he won three provincial honors. Fencing, his native Hungarian national sport, was part of his military training there.

Graduated from the Royal Military Academy, Nemes served as a First World War Captain. He was wounded and imprisoned in Italy on Armistice Day. He later became a Royal Guard and personal attendant of Admiral Horthy, Regent of Hungary.

Mr. Nemes came to Canada in 1925. He worked as office boy, for "Canadian Hungarian News" in Winnipeg. He became editor, and remained by Canadian Government appointment, during World War II. Later he bought the paper. This bi-weekly, written in Hungarian, is Canadian in character. It is read around the world. Gives world news, articles of progress, and facts for Canadians.

Aside from cultural and advisory work, Mr. Nemes has published a condensed Canadian History in Hungarian. "It is not important who comes from what part of the

Mr. and Mrs. Nemes own "Hungaria" on Third Avenue, and the cottage once called "Rose" on Fourth.

#### Sunday Night Films

#### BIRD WATCHERS' HAVEN

"Victoria Beach has long been one of the favorite spots for naturalists, says Angus Short." It is a strategic gathering spot for spring and fall migrants. Its rich and varied habitat ranges from sandy jackpine to spruce and tamarac bogs, cedar swamps, and willow-clustered sand dunes. Here the birds find food and nesting sights.

The redstart is an attractive summer resident and nests in the birch and spruce woods that surround the cottages. The male is resplendent in glossy black with touches of red orange on his wings and tail and breast. Females are grey-brown and yellow. Their nest is usually in the upright fork of a tree from 5 to 25 feet up and well made of fibres lined with grass. It is not easy to find.

The hermit thrush inhabits the deep spruce woods. It has a melodious song but is seldom seen, ringing flute-like tones, heard in early morning or at twilight. The liquid notes of one can be heard, then another joins, until a dozen can be heard. Rich notes of this songster have earned it the name of Cathedral bird. When heard in the still evening, in the afterglow, and the tall conifers stand in silhouette, the name is well chosen.

The whippoorwill, named from its clear call-tones, in rapid succession, and repeated, sometimes 100 times without pause. H. M. Whimster who has spent many years at his cottage, said this bird often carries on from dusk until the "wee sma" hours, and if the singer is nearby sleep becomes a problem.

The nighthawk is among nature's most perfectly camouflaged birds. Mottled and spotted in many shaded


