#### Mouth-To-Mouth Method of Resuscitation



1. **Tilt head back.** This keeps the breathing tubes open.
2. **Thumb between teeth, pull lower jaw up.** This prevents tongue blocking throat.
3. **Pinch nose with other hand.**
4. **Take a deep breath, cover mouth completely. Blow strongly for adults. Repeat 12-15 times per minute. Watch for chest expansion, listen for air to rush out of victim. If air is not getting in, check mouth to remove obstruction. It may be necessary to hit victim on back to dislodge and remove throat obstruction.**

#### For Infants:

1. Cover both mouth and nose with your mouth.
2. Blow gently—20 times per minute.

#### A Hundred-Mile Journey To Repair 'Phones

Maintenance for the telephone facilities in this area are taken care of from Lac du Bonnet. Any interruption in service requires their Districtman to make a 100-mile round trip to restore the facilities again to high standard service-able condition.

If there is any more misuse, or even the slightest sign of vandalism, at the new Victoria Beach telephone booths, the Manitoba Telephone System will have no choice but to remove them! They have no staff here to police them.

Long distance operators have complained about being harried by groups of little children at the booths here. We earnestly request parents to teach their children the value of these 'phones to our residents. Think how long we have waited

for them. Think what a boon they are to the aged and those not well enough to walk a distance!

Five additional brightly painted, wooden telephone booths were placed in service here on June 14, 1960. There are several windows in each, for daytime brightness, and they are wired for electricity for illumination at night. They are equipped with both Winnipeg and provincial telephone directories. Previous service, in this area was handled by two 'phones, one inside and one outside of Hugh Stewart's store.

All calls from these booths are handled by the callers contacting the operator at Beauséjour and giving her the number they wish to call.

Two of these booths are on direct lines to Beauséjour. The one is located on the verandah outside Stewart's store. The other is on the S.E. corner of Eighth Avenue and Arthur Road, near the parking lot. The other booths are on a shared line basis and are at the following locations:

- S.E. corner Sixth Avenue and Patricia Road.
- S.E. corner Fourth Avenue and Patricia Road.
- S.W. corner Third Avenue and Alexander Road.
- N.E. corner 6th Avenue and King Edward Road and one inside Hugh Stewart's store.

Will resorters who live near these booths, especially those at a distance from the village, please call any misuse of this property to the attention of the authorities?
