Safety Life Line (King Edward Beach)

Over the years there have been many near drownings and unfortunately deaths from accidental drownings at Victoria Beach. A large percentage of these accidents have occurred at King Edward Beach where the shoreline forms a corner of the Victoria Beach Isthmus. For years there has been a large sign warning bathers not to enter the water when it is rough. Nevertheless bathers have found themselves in difficulty and would be rescuers have exhausted themselves battling with the undertow when a combination of circumstances have contrived to make this beach unsafe. These circumstances usually begin with a prevailing North or Northwest wind which, playing on the surface of 400 miles of water stretching to the north, raises the level of the lake at this southern location. Elk Island breaks the wind and protects the channel which separates it from Victoria Beach and provides an escape for the build-up of water and a current running north-east is created flowing out into the mouth of Traverse Bay. This current is fed by an undertow which swirls around the King Edward corner. The Safety Life Line is placed on the point to provide a means of coping with this current for those who venture in despite warnings on these exceptional days. Children should be taught not to tamper with the Nylon Safety Line.

A group of Christian Business Men in Winnipeg, together with offerings from churches and individuals have sponsored the Interdenominational Sand Services held here for 15 years. The 90 minute daily program appeals to boys and girls aged four through 12. It is held daily for the last two weeks in July. Those attending sing action songs and memorize bible verses. The leaders, trained in children's work, have a year-round ministry in teaching, at Sunday Schools, Junior Services and clubs for boys and girls.

This year's services were held at 403 Fifth instead of Patricia Beach, as in the past. Stories were told, with the visual aid of the Flannel Board, which held the children's attention as it unfolded. Stories from "Pilgrim's Progress" and Old Testament people delighted the children. As many as 103 have attended, when services were not competed with by Swimming Lessons. Fifty to 75 boys and girls attended this year, however. There is no offering taken!



Manitoba — The Unknown

No Canadian province is less known to travellers than Manitoba, so misrepresented — even by its own people! They dub it "The prairie province". Writes a prominent Canadian historian: "That billiard table that is Manitoba!" Any opportunity to travel and Manitobans go straight South, West or East—straight out of Manitoba. How seldom they explore their own province.

Manitoba covers 246,500 square miles. It is larger than any of the United States except Texas. Only some 30,000 square miles are open flats or plains in the area south of the tundra. Water, hill-slope, forests or the tundra cover three-quarters of Manitoba. We've water in the grand valleys, on the hilly land, in the rocks, and all the talking waters that tumble between. A placid restful beauty of forest, hills and valley, to be enjoyed as far as the eye can see. Manitoba's land does not stand on end and dominate the view as do the sky-reaching mountains of Alberta!

Manitoba's great lakes are on the old Lake Agassiz floor, Lake Winnipeg is 260 miles from north to south and covers 9,398 square miles—topped in size only by 12 other lakes in the whole world. Lakes Manitoba and Winnipegosis are also among the world's largest. Winnipeg City is also built on the floor of Lake Agassiz, referred to as "Red River Flats".

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
