MORE RECIPES FOR THE SAND WITCHES

Here are two more meat dishes which can be left in the oven to cook themselves while you are enjoying the beach.

PORC AU CONNAUGHT

Pork spareribs (1 lb. per serving)
 salt & pepper
 ½ cup water

Place spareribs in a baking dish so that they lie flat. Sprinkle with salt and pepper to taste, add water. Place a sheet of aluminum foil over the dish and tuck the ends and sides under so that the dish is airtight. Cook in 200 degree oven for 3 hours.

If you wish, place apples (cored and stuffed with raisins) around the meat before covering with foil; otherwise, open a can of applesauce at serving time.

BOEUF D'ARTHUR

Round steak
 a little flour
 1 can Cream of Mushroom soup, undiluted
 1 can drained mushrooms if desired

Dredge the steak with the flour; beat it with a wooden spoon to make tender (if you place a piece of paper over the meat while beating it there will be less mess); do this on both sides of the meat.

Place meat in a roasting dish so that it can lie flat; cover with Cream of Mushroom soup (undiluted, please!) to which mushrooms have been added. Cover dish with aluminum foil tucked in at ends and sides. Cook in 200 degree oven for 3 hours.

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Letter to our Fish Expert

27 July, 1962

Mr. George Heffelfinger,
c/o Victoria Beach Herald.

Dear Sir:

re: the first paragraph of your Article IV, in a recent Herald: "Rumors persist of a 400 pound sturgeon . . . from the Rousseau River . . ."

This "rumor", with picture, was written up in the Manitoba weekly, The Carillon News, in considerable detail in an issue with a special section on Dominion City some six to ten years ago. I am certain the Editor, Mr. E. Derksen, Carillon News, Steinbach, Manitoba, could produce a back copy of the issue. My own vague recollection of the story follows:

The fish was discovered by a young boy in a shallow bend of the river in a place on their farm where their cows went to drink. He called his father and the father killed the monster with an axe. Both father and son are named in the article. The picture shows the fish in an old farm cart, with most of the fish resting in the cart but the tail dragging on the ground. The fish measured 14 to 16 feet and weighed about 450 pounds. The incident occurred around 1905 and was written up in newspapers all over the world.

These are the facts of the article as I remember them (you will know how a fish story can change with time, and I may well have distorted some of the facts). I thought you might be interested.

MANITOBA'S NOISIEST FISH THE SILVER BASS

If you have ever stood on Government Pier at Victoria Beach when the commercial fishermen came in, you have perhaps noticed that a large portion of the catch has been a rather flat silver fish, sometimes running to considerable size. Although you may not have realized it at the time, you were looking at one of the world's "talking" fish, locally known as the Silver Bass.

The Silver Bass belongs to Drum, a family that are principally marine, and many species will be found in temperate and tropical oceans of the world and many are important food fishes. The Silver Bass is the only fresh water member of the family in North America. Because the species is so widely distributed in the lakes and rivers of the U.S.A. and Canada, it has picked up many names; to mention a few: sheepshead, drum, sunfish, grunter, white perch, silver bass and to the scientist, *Aplodinatus grunniens*.

The idea that a fish can talk is of course ridiculous but the fact remains that this interesting fish has been known to make peculiar grunting sounds. None of the authorities I have consulted on the subject are sure just what makes this possible. Dr. Samuel Eddy suggests that it "is supposed to be made by forcing air from

the main portion of the air bladder into one of its smaller divisions — this noise is usually made in the evening, and coming from the water without any apparent source as it does, it is somewhat "weird."

As to size, the Silver Bass appears to grow to quite a considerable size, a large proportion of the individuals brought in by our local commercial fishermen would hit an average of about 4 pounds. Regrettably I have never actually weighed in any of the larger ones but they look to me as though they would run well over 10 pounds. David Hinks in his book *The Fishes of Manitoba* states that they reach a maximum of 50 pounds. Hubbs and Lagler state that "The size of the pharyngeal (throat) bones and molar teeth that are found in the campsites of Indians indicate that in premarial times sizes of about 200 pounds were obtained."

The freshwater Drum, like the sturgeon, is a bottom feeder, subsisting on insect larvae, crustaceans and molluscs. Like certain other fishes, they have heavy bony plates in the throat — the pharyngeal bones referred to above — which are used to crush the shells of their molluscan forage. The shell of the snail or clam is rejected and the soft pulp swallowed by the fish. There is a strange relationship here referred to by Dr. Eddy who tells that the free-swimming young of several species of molluscs spend part of their youth attached in parasite fashion to the gills of the Silver Bass.

The Silver Bass shows a preference to silty turbid water. It appears to be of more importance in Lake Winnipeg and the Mississippi River than say Lake of the Woods. It is commonly taken in the Red River below Lockport. Although little is known of its breeding habits, it is a fact that the fish is a spring spawner.

Locally, the species is not an important food fish. It is generally rated along with the carps and suckers and therefore utilized primarily as mink food.


