**SCOTT PARK — A NUISANCE GROUND**

A delightful walk, a marvelous view. This is how we have described Scott Park and Observation Point to friends for years. But, had you made a visit to this area recently, you might more aptly have said, a fearful hike and an obscured view. The park is now so deep in undergrowth that it is a mosquito haven "Par Excellence". Those who love the area would no doubt plough through the growth and put up with the mosquitos to share the magnificent view, but alas, there is little view left. Our council appears to have selected this park area as a convenient dumping ground, piled 4 to 6 ft. in places with rough brush, assorted boxes, papers, cans, bottles, you might say everything but perishable garbage. The viewing area is a disgrace in every way. It is also noted that parts of Sunset Boulevard, obviously used as a thoroughfare to the new nuisance ground have deep ruts and are now devoid of the beauty of a natural foot path.

According to Motor Vehicle By-law 592, Section 11, which reads "Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, motor vehicles shall not be operated at any time on Sunset Blvd. or any portion thereof." Such hauling therefore is actually illegal.

Is it that our present council, who have served us well in the past, have become complacent and are just indifferent to these things? As cottagers themselves, they know we expect adequate service, during the two months we spend at the lake. Surely, during the other ten months, plans can be made and completed before that time. Why should it be left till July to haul brush, or repair the foggers, and the many other details that are important to a two month stay?

Letters to the editor would be welcomed on this and other related subjects. If there are things that can be improved, let's hear them, and get them corrected, if at all feasible.

## A NORTHERN PIONEER THE WHITEFISH

Here is a sixty-four dollar word for you. Most books refer to the whitefish as being "anandromous". This simply means running up the river from the sea to spawn. It is obvious that this does not apply to our fresh water whitefish, but a few closely related Old World species do live in the sea, and like the salmon go up a fresh water river at spawning time.

Probably no fish has done so much to open up the commercial fishing industry in northern areas as the whitefish which is found in suitable waters across the northern parts of Eurasia and North America. While the Lake Winnipeg Goldeye has brought far more notoriety to the province than the whitefish, in pure economic fact, the whitefish today brings much more revenue to fishermen and processors. In the season 1960-61, fishermen harvested over 6 million pounds of whitefish with a market value of 1½ million dollars, while the crop of Goldeye amounted to only 61,000 pounds with a value of \$20,000.00.

Like the tulibee described in my previous article, the whitefish spawns with the advance of cool water in the fall of the year. The adult fish school-up and migrate to shallower water where the eggs are broadcast freely on the shoal over a period of several days. The eggs remain on the bottom until the water begins to warm up in the early spring. Hinks reports that throughout the winter "the eggs are exposed to the attacks of predators, chief amongst them being the whitefish themselves".

The young feed chiefly on plankton (minute floating organisms) in the first year of life, and subsequently become bottom feeders living mainly on fresh water shrimp, mollusks, occasionally minnows and insect larvae, principally the larvae of the mayfly.

In size, the whitefish today seldom exceeds three or four pounds. Surber and Eddy report that large individuals from Lake Superior where the species is found in depths of up to several hundred feet, have weighed up to 20 lbs. Apparently commercial fishing has reduced the very large sized fish. Hinks in 1943 gave the following to say, "As recently as 1923, fish weighing 20 and 24 lbs. were reported, but with the extension of the fishing industry, such large fish have been practically eliminated. At the present time the average weight of whitefish in commercial catches in Manitoba, is approximately 2½ to 3½ lbs. and the bulk of the fish so caught are 6 to 8 years old."

Because of its feeding habits, the whitefish is not sought after by the sports angler. In other parts of the continent, however, such is not the case. In Minnesota, whitefish are taken by the angler in certain lakes during the summer, using a deep line and a small perch for bait. Scott reports that there exists a very active winter sports fishery in Lake Simcoe, using minnows or jigs for bait. Here is something for the enthusiastic cottager to try at Victoria Beach next winter! Br-r-r!

Regrettably, the status of the Lake Winnipeg whitefishery appears to be declining. In 1941-42, 85 per cent of the harvest from the province, or over 3½ million pounds of whitefish came from Lake Winnipeg. In the season 1960-61, Lake Winnipeg produced just over a million pounds which is 18 per cent of the total provincial harvest. The balance of the crop today comes principally from smaller lakes in the northern part of the province. Whitefish still enjoys the No. 2 spot as far as economic importance to Manitoba is concerned, just behind pickerel, but has fallen to third place in Lake Winnipeg, behind pickerel and sauger.

Just a word or two on the enjoyment of whitefish as a table delicacy. First, don't let your fish market pawn off tulibee on you as whitefish. They can be easily distinguished. The whitefish has an overhanging snout with the mouth below, while in the case of the tulibee, the jaw is underslung and the mouth opening faces forward. Secondly, one of the best ways to eat whitefish is smoked. My business takes me to Minneapolis frequently, and without fail I have for lunch cold smoked whitefish and potato salad which is always on the menu of a certain not-very-good restaurant that I regularly patronize. Chances are I am eating Canadian whitefish, maybe even a fish spawned in Lake Winnipeg. If smoked whitefish can be bought in the City of Winnipeg, I have not yet found out where!


