### USE THE BUS — OR LOSE IT!

It was predicted, by those against a public road to Victoria Beach, that once the railroad tracks came up, this resort would again become an isolated frontier, (the penalty for there being so few of us), especially during the off-season. This catastrophe now confronts us! If Canadian taxpayers had not subsidized the railway, we would have been cut off a long time ago. We are also lucky to be neighbored by Pine Falls, whose people can support a bus. In consequence we have had a bus company giving us good and comfortable service direct from the city all summer. They struggle to improve service. But how in the world can they keep bringing us a bus we won't use?

If we lose the bus service, it will be hard to get it again. It is easy, now, to beg rides from friends, if you do not drive, but will you feel the same about it, if you are obliged to depend on others? Years creep on, one grows older, does not want to drive. How will you get to your cottage? Have you any idea what a private trip from Winnipeg costs? Ask a local taximan.

Service has improved greatly since Mr. Thiessen bought this line. Those who take the bus are satisfied. You ride here, from the city Bus Depot, in less than two hours, at \$2.50 one way, or \$4.50 return. Just hail the bus anywhere on the highway. To alert the driver, and make sure, call the depot, mention where you want to be picked up. You can bring 150 pounds of luggage on your ticket.

The courteous drivers are experts! Car owners are beginning to prefer the bus. They come from every

avenue on the resort. A friend of mine says her husband arrives Friday nights, refreshed. He lites nothing but his raincoat, like a seasoned commuter, and walks to the cottage. Hasn't the driver taken the traffic brunt for him? He says if folks want a chat passengers are friendly — like old train days.

### THE OWNER OF THE LINE MAKES A BARGAIN

Once our own bus service ends, (from Sept. 3rd on), we must depend upon the Pine Falls bus. It stops where the Pine Falls and Victoria Beach Highways join. The bus just cannot be brought to this beach, off-season, and go away empty any longer. Who is to pay this extra mileage? The main complaint here has been the taxi fare to the Pine Falls bus, and then the bus fare on top of that. Now, here is the proposition: Mr. Thiessen will pay the taxi fare from here to Pine Falls Road corner, if there are at least five passengers. But there must be at least five! Then, if at least five passengers return, the bus will be driven right back in to Victoria Beach, at no extra fare, and pick them up.

Come now, it is up to you — talk to your friends. Could you get a group for Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays, — or any day? If they all travel on the same days a group can be drawn together. Folks must keep their word or pay their taxi fare. (Some arrangement like this could be made.) Perhaps passengers could mention their plans to go to a reputable central citizen, say, like Walter Thomas, who has driven these roads many years. Let's ask Walter. Do tell folks — everywhere. It is a thoughtful offer. An early bus for a good long day in town might be suggested. But folks must stir themselves. If we become a lazy frontier with no public conveyance out of here, we have surely asked for it, and probably deserve the isolation. But of course, we'll buck up, organize, and TAKE THE BUS.

#### TRAINOR SOLVES THE STARTING PROBLEM

A new and ingenious starting platform was designed and built by Bert Trainor for use in our Annual Regatta of Aug. 3rd.

To cope with our heavy participation in all classes, Bert's new creation supports more swimmers, is more stable, and will probably last longer.

It is about 20 ft. long and 4 ft. wide, strongly made, and anchored to the pier at one end. The other end is supported by two heavy hollow metal pipes, screwed into broad metal plates, to allow it to sit firmly on the sand of the lake bottom. A built-in metal ladder allows swimmers to climb quickly to their starting positions. This well thought out piece of equipment can be stored out of season, and should last for some years. It came through its first performance with flying colors. Thanks Bert.


