BIRDS — or Why I Am on Relief

Some time ago an enterprising sales advertising Executive coined the slogan "Clothes Lines Are For The Birds." He of course, was attempting to promote the sale of mechanical clothes dryers.

Being an ardent exponent of the "other side of the story," it was born upon our spirit of fair play, to hear what the "Birds" had to say about it. Plus the fact that our, then young, resident family were enjoying moderate success in tempting chickadees, nuthatches, etc. to feed at close range.

As regulars at Victoria Beach, we felt a modest expenditure of time and labour in building a few feeding stations might bring us to close grips with this controversial subject.

Therein we created a monster! Oh the feeder stations were relatively simple—a few boards, a post and two bits worth of seed and we were in business—we thought—not giving any consideration to what we had let ourselves into.

First we had overlooked the four footed marauders and bandits, such as chipmunks, squirrels, etc. who felt they were part of the party. Modifications had to be effected to include them out.

Secondly, word got around, that besides all the rest of the people in Victoria Beach, who were making contributions to the Birdland "CARE" programme, our place was established as a central supply depot. At one specific time we found we were hosts to 30 Canada Blue Jays, 15 Cow Birds, a dozen Purple Finches and numerous Chickadees and Nuthatches, too swift and energetic to be counted. If you feel your wife's relatives can pack away a lot of groceries during a visit, just try keeping this aerial group in food! They make the locusts of Egypt look like second class citizens.

Kidding aside, Victoria Beach is a natural home for so many species of Birds that patience and a little bribery in the way of seed makes it easy and interesting to observe them at close range. A good bird book is an invaluable help, especially one containing color pictures.

Watched over a period of time one realizes that their family life is akin to human family life.

When Jenny Wren is preparing for her family she is a giant of energy, even though the size of a minute. She berates dear old Dad, forcing him to work until she is satisfied with the nest, then he has to provide the meals while she does the "knitting and sitting."

Unfortunately their active lives start about 4:30 a.m. and if one is a light sleeper this can be most disconcerting, especially if you have built a wren house and hung it just outside the bedroom window for what was felt would be relaxed observation.

In the winter months the Chickadees and Nuthatches overcome their fears quickly as the blanket of snow leaves them on short rations, and a handful of sunflower seed held at arms length soon produces a number who will sit on the head or hand and eat to the delight of the little people.

We are not suggesting that Bird watching will ever replace Bikini watching. But it can provide many entertaining moments and Victoria Beach is well endowed with the subject matter.
