HIGH WATER and LOW

The writer, who drove to the Beach on Friday, July 9, saw proof of the entries in the old fur-traders diaries.

As my car followed the curving highway from Albert Beach to the municipal road, the water in the ditch to our left blended with the water in the marsh and seemed to extend in a miniature lake joining the bay to the west.

On my right, to the east, I got the impression that the old railroad embankment was the only thing that stopped the water in Traverse Bay from flooding the highway.

This confirms the diarized entries of the fur traders, written one hundred and fifty years ago, when Victoria Beach was known as Little Elk Island, as opposed to Big Elk Island, in those days.

High water in the early summer sometimes allowed the southern boat brigades to save considerable time by paddling across the very area mentioned above. Certainly, if the water was low, the voyageurs would sweat out nine miles or more paddling, even if they were lucky enough to negotiate the strait between the islands, which could not be certain in a dry year.

Remember that the southern brigades were bound for the forts at the junction of the Red and Assiniboine, and the big canoes were heavily laden with trade goods from Montreal to supply the forts at the forks on the Assiniboine.

Therefore the prospect of a portage across the marshy strait that then existed between the southern end of Little Elk Island (V.B.) and the mainland, would vary (depending on water levels) between a fairly reasonable operation and a complete pain in the neck.

It certainly was done, though, and on several occasions, despite slimy mud, and mosquitoes.

However, let us be sure that the voyageurs' chansons would ring out with considerably more gusto when the water was really high, and a nice short-cut could be taken.
