Editorial**Looking Backwards**

Recently I was reading some old copies of the Victoria Beach Herald of the 1940s. Beach life doesn't seem to have changed very much in the last twenty years. In those days there was the Garden Contest, the Fishing Derby, the Sports Day and the Water Sports Day, the Masquerade and the Dog Show. In addition the children organized and held an annual circus of sideshows and stunts to raise money for war charities and the adults at the Labour Day weekend held a Monster Midnight Frolic which began at 12:01 a.m. on the Monday. Wonder how enthusiastically such a frolic would be today?

There were many other interesting little facets of life at the Beach in the forties. Looking at the advertisements I saw:

"A Cruise on the Lake — Enjoy the cool breezes of the Lake by a sail on the 'Valtannis'. Arrangements for visits to Black River, Pine Falls, Elk Island and Grand Beach. — Walter Thomas in charge."

The Victoria Beach Inn must have been a great attraction with its cool, shady lawns, colourful chairs, the dainty dresses of the ladies and brilliant flowers. It is advertised as a thirty-four roomed resort, a single cottage costing \$20 a week, a double room \$18. Meals were offered at Breakfast and Lunch 50c, Dinner 75c or \$1.00. Mrs. A. W. Bouttell was the manageress. I believe the Bouttells still have their cottage at Bayview. The tennis courts were charging a weekly membership of \$1.00 or \$5.00 the season. The golf course was offering a book of twenty tickets for \$4.50. Milk delivered to the cottage was 12c a quart.

There seems to have been a variety of stores; Lou's Grocery with a dry-cleaning agency, Cox's Bakery, Kilpatrick's Meat, Downie's Real Estate, Jenkinson's Barber Shop, Hugh and Violet Stewart's "The New Store", J. H. Fall's Grocery and the Moonlight Inn.

In the forties too, there was a great variety of activities. A Badminton tournament was held at 113 Sunset; a Flower Show and a Photography display were on view in the Clubhouse. The V-B-Hes and the Merrymakers put on Concerts. A community Bonfire and Sing-Song was held on the Clubhouse Beach. However, no movies or Sunday Free Films were advertised.

Nevertheless the Beach People had their problems and their worries in those days. Perhaps the most sig-

nificant for us today is the recurring warnings in the Herald of those years, of polio, the symptoms were described and notices from the Medical Officers assured cottagers there were no cases yet at the Beach. The traffic regulations came up before the Manitoba Courts in a test case. Frequently there were complaints of horses and cattle roaming at large through the beach, one cow eating a lady's prize lilies. There were appeals to clear the beaches of willows and destroy poison ivy on lots. Campaigns were held urging all cottagers to plant trees and an expert came down to give advice on tree diseases. Probably we owe our beautiful trees today to those people of the forties. Many articles were devoted to the price of railway fares to the Beach under such headings as: "THE NEW FARE IS NOT FAIR," and complaints about cancelled trains. Many issues are devoted to the collapsing Government Dock, the promises of a new dock and the tenders and building of it. There were regular articles on Water Safety, news of heroic rescues and complaints about skunks and dogs on the beaches.

Finally there were some interesting little tidbits. In 1949 Stan Butterfield broke the previous record of 28 by scoring 27 in an exciting golf game. Three little girls fell asleep in their "secret castle" among the bushes on Patricia, and the cottagers scoured the area from 7:30 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. when they were found. In another article of 1949 headed "Twenty Three Years Ago", I read:

"Lake Cruiser Strikes Reef Close to Victoria Beach. 'Gem' makes Dock at Victoria Beach but Sinks at Moorings."

How I wish I could discover some editions of the thirties. I do not even know the date of the first Herald.

Conservation

Old timers can recall the days when Lady Slippers were plentiful around the Beach. Now they are hard to find and their location known to a few. Perhaps, therefore, at the beginning of the season it is in order to make a few observations on conservation. Wild flowers that are picked wantonly, wholesale and at random fail to reproduce. With the rarer species it may be the death for their kind at the Beach. From a clump of the rarer wild flowers, only one should be picked; and the rest left to seed and spread. This is one of the principles of conservation that nature-loving parents teach their children.

COVER REST HONEY**Walks**

Our family likes walking. Sooner or later most visitors to our cottage are taken to the "Hidden Lake". At the bottom of Eighth Avenue, near the pump-house, there is a path which resembles a green tunnel. This tunnel seems to be a mile long, and must be taken at a fast jog-trot because, from its steamy murky sides rise hordes of giant mosquitoes near starvation. Puffing, panting, scratching and swatting, after many long minutes, you suddenly burst into a clearing and there, in splendid isolation, are four or five cottages. I always stop to admire the rugged individuality of their owners who stoutly refused to be part of the Beach proper. Such non-conformists are always deserving of respect. However a problem arises. To get to Sandy Beach, one can hardly trespass through these cottage lots, and yet there appears to be no clearly defined detour to the Beach.

Then comes the long walk along Sandy Beach, searching for shells, diamond-willow, drift-wood, gulls' feathers and frogs. Towards the point, a scramble over the sand-dunes on the right will suddenly reveal a perfect little lake in a lovely setting of trees, quivering with all wonderful kinds of pond life and the shyer birds. Hidden Lake!

To continue past the sand-spit to Elk Island brings to your children the delight of a veritable jungle of a willow swamp where every yard reveals exciting discoveries.

We also enjoy, however, the exploring walk. One drizzly day last August, the family set off on an expedition to encircle the golf course, outside its boundaries. We started along the path, west of the golf course. My theory was that if we continually bore to the right, we would eventually come out east of the golf course. The walk was extremely interesting, especially the rotting fungoid growths to be found on the damp dead leaves and festering tree-trunks. About forty minutes later we came to an assortment of branching paths. I insisted on the path to the extreme right. My husband insisted that I had got turned around and if we went to the right we would reach the North Road. The children sided with my husband. We all drew maps with sticks in the sandy soil but we went to the left and discovered the gravel pits. We were delighted! We had never been there before. Continuing left, after another forty minutes of drizzle, mosquitoes and sore feet we arrived

WEST of the golf-course. I am still determined to make that circuit some day.

There are some marvellous walks at Victoria Beach; I have only had time for two. Perhaps other readers could describe their favourite walk for the benefit of all.


