Dear Madam,

I read with some dismay the letter of July 23rd. by "a concerned adult" with regard to rowdiness at the Beach.

As another concerned adult, whose family was kept awake until 2:00 a.m., earlier in the season, by a group of kids who had rented a cottage for the weekend, and whose numbers were swelled by residents' youngsters, both boys and girls, I endorse the actions of the local authorities. A non-stop blaring record player, drunken yells, crashing bottles and obscene language certainly made their conduct disorderly and disturbed the peace. I understand there were other such disturbances around the Beach.

I certainly am grateful that our law enforcement authorities, instead of putting these young people in jail, as they certainly were breaking the law. Adults would not have been treated so gently. By controlling entrance to the Beach, such occurrences were prevented at later weekends. I would also like to add, that when parents fail to control their young people, the public authorities have to do their best to replace parental deficiencies and neglect, pro bono publico.

My thanks to our police and their helpers.

On August 5th an anonymous letter was published in the Victoria Beach Herald signed "A Concerned Adult" which makes serious accusations against the police force and the administration. It is regrettable the letter was published in this form, and in the true spirit of what has made and kept Victoria Beach the fine area it is, I would ask the complainant to personally come forward and communicate with the writer, so that the charges made can be properly investigated.

Apart from the above noted letter, permit me to discuss the policing of Victoria Beach in a general way. The Municipality of Victoria Beach has a summer population in excess of 5,000 (2,000 of which are under 25 years of age). Property replacement value is conservatively estimated at five million dollars — the trees and beauty of our island is inestimable. The Municipality has two full-time policemen during the summer months.

On the weekend of July 9th, our area was virtually mob invaded by a group of hoodlums. They arrived at

11:30 at night by the carload. Our police force was never intended or designed to deal with a situation of such magnitude. Havoc was created particularly on Saturday night, July 9th, and additional men had to be called out.

Following that weekend the indignation of cottagers and concern of parents was strong to say the least, and their demands were met by the tightest policing this area has ever known. The results have spoken for themselves in the quietness we have enjoyed since that weekend. Doubtful itinerants have been turned around at the gates, and youths who have broken the law have been dealt with quickly. A new local magistrate was sworn in on July 11th to handle beach cases with dispatch. It is only necessary to cite the number of resort areas in Manitoba that are having more trouble, more break-ins, with much larger police forces, to appreciate how really well off we are at Victoria Beach.

Throughout the nation today, one hears a rising cry of "police brutality". The outcry goes far beyond genuine cases of police misbehavior. All too frequently it is automatically attached to any physical action by police however justified. These accusations seem to fall into the following major patterns.

1. Offenders who fake charges against police to evade the law.
2. Protesters who set up the police as hate targets.
3. Families involved in conduct matters who find police easier to blame than themselves.

Permit me to quote an excerpt from a speech made by R.C.M.P. Commissioner G. B. McClellan: "There has hardly been a time when police have been subjected to more criticism, more abuse or more frustration than at

present. The trend, if unchecked, could immobilize our police forces. The policeman is doing a tough, thankless, and frequently dangerous job, for you and all you hold dear.

He continues — "The police know what they are up against and they are not encouraged when they find they, rather than the criminal, are regarded in some quarters as the enemy of society. There has never been a time in the history of law enforcement in the Western world when those who have retained to protect you were more in the need of the backing and support of the courts, the legal profession, the teaching profession and, above all, the general public."

Our police force I believe is the best Victoria Beach has ever had. It's regrettable they will not be with us next year. Personally however, with the assistance of Council, I will continue the policies of policing established this year. I must remind you that in these days of increased hooliganism and street crime the community rightly expects the police to assume risks but in turn it owes them reasonable support. Policemen forced to produce instantaneous decisions under trying circumstances should not be fair game for anonymous snipers. Anyone who has ever called for help in the time of danger knows what it can mean to have police officers who do not hesitate to respond instantly and forcefully.

Victoria Beach is still the best summer residential beach in Canada and it will only remain that way as long as you and I work together to protect its future.

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at Victoria Beach on July 18th. At that meeting the actions of the council and of the police in handling the recent outbreak of hooliganism, and the steps taken to prevent a recurrence were discussed. Delegations were called for on several occasions in order that latecomers might have their say. Representatives of the Herald, and indeed of summer residents as a whole were conspicuous by their absence. It appeared that the actions taken by the council met with the approval of the electorate by virtue of the fact that no "concerned adults" presented themselves to voice their disapproval.

In reply to the statements and views published in the "Herald", I would state that in my opinion, it is not the responsibility of the council or its law enforcement officers to undertake the re-education of anti-social or disturbed youths. To the contrary, their duties lie in protecting the rights and properties of the majority of persons, young and old, who desire to enjoy the benefits of Victoria Beach unmolested, and unassailed by foul mouthed youths, and who expect some assurance that our property will not be subjected to acts of vandalism.

There are some who demand as their privilege the right to commit acts of civil disobedience, and I for one commend the council and the police for their policy of removing them from our community. There is no place for them here. In this sir, I feel that the council and the police have succeeded admirably. If it happens that a few "Cop Haters" feel that they have been unjustly deprived of sufficient time to attain maturity before meet-

Sir:

In fairness, I am obliged to take exception to the viewpoint expressed by an unknown correspondent in the last issue of the Herald, constituting a personal attack on our police chief and his constable. I concede that there is a principle involved — whether or not special constables should have the authority to enforce discipline at the beach. The difficulty is that your unknown correspondent presents an ineffective argument and also ignores the fact that, to invite police attention, a youth will be doing more than simply engaging in boyish hi-jinks.

What is worse, your correspondent fails to distinguish between the special constables and the regular police

force, and thus implies a criticism of the police chief. Such criticism, in my opinion, is invalid and unfair. It is particularly unfair since your correspondent does not have the courage to let his or her name be known. (One assumes that this parent's own children were involved with the police. Has this parent examined the facts of the case, or is he simply springing illogically to the defence of his own child?)

Whatever his personal motives may be, this much can be readily recognized by Victoria Beach residents. Early in July, vandals and hoodlums threatened to destroy the pleasure of our summer season. Young toughs, many without beach residences, and some in possession of illegal liquor, appeared to have the beach by the throat. Prompt measures were needed to stop these young rascals.

From my personal knowledge of the situation, the Mayor and Councillors of Victoria Beach deserve to be commended for the effective and efficient measures which they invoked to restore law and order. Chief
