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

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YACHT CLUB GROWS AND THRIVES

Sailboats started reappearing at the beach in 1963 after an absence of 20 years. The following year the organizational meeting of the Victoria Beach Yacht Club was held. Eight sailors formed the club to facilitate and encourage small boat sailing at the Beach. The first Board of Governors were: Dr. Sam McMorris—Commodore, Dick Quinton—Vice-Commodore and Ron Williams—Treasurer.

The first years the boats were buoyed in Airforce Bay, however in 1965 the Club erected a small "gear shed and a compound". The interest in sailing has slowly revived and this year there are over twenty boats in the Club. The classes sailed are: Enterprise—13 feet long and the Lazy E—15 feet long. It is hoped that this summer a number of "Snipe" class boats will join the club. These boats are being purchased by summer residents from the Pan-American Games.

The club holds a race every Sunday at 11 a.m. and the many boats can be seen sailing along the beaches and across the Bay. The Sprague Memorial Trophy, is competed for at the Annual Regatta on the August long-weekend.

The first race of 1967 season was held last Sunday and due to gusty cross winds many boats tipped and were unable to finish the race. The winning boat was helmed by Ron Williams and crewed by Gloria Little and John Lewington.

Junior Sailing is again scheduled for the Beach in 1967 and parents are urged to enroll their children in the course. All members of the Club will supply information.

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WHO PAYS FOR YOUR PAPER?

Every once in a while somebody who ought to know better comes up with the dream of a newspaper without advertising.

The Pictou Advocate recalls in a recent editorial that once the most sophisticated city in North America, New York, had this dream come true. In 1939 Ralph Ingersoll brought out a tabloid paper, PM, that had not a line of advertising in it. It cost a little more, but it was worth every penny of it and some of the best writers in America wrote for it. Realizing that public do look to newspapers for information to help them shop, PM ran an excellent column for consumers such as would have delighted the hearts of Consumers Associations everywhere. It ferreted out bargains, pin pointed value, and gave a yardstick against which to shop, it had a faithful, enchanted following and it failed, despite heavy subsidization to get it on its feet.

That was in 1939. Today, to give the public a paper without advertising would cost, on a conservative estimate, 50 cents to a dollar a copy. Advertising, and advertising alone brings the public the news of the community at a price that the public can pay.

And there is more to it than that. People have papers not only to read the news, they buy it to read the advertisements. They have a paper because it is a permanent record, in black and white, or more recently, gorgeous technicolor. Radio may mention an item, television may show you one, but the impression is fleeting and in the final analysis it is only what you remember you saw that is left with you, and memory is fallible. The paper remembers for you in detail and specifics. It is a source that can be referred to time and time again at your convenience.

Newspapers and advertising are and always will be partners in bringing the public the history of its times. The advertisements are often as much history as the news, and historians can often learn as much, if not more about the life of a period by studying what the people bought, how much they paid for it and how advertising was planned to attract their attention.

It's No Crime To Be A Teenager

You resentful, hurt teenagers who feel misunderstood, criticized and hounded by oldsters for showing signs of spunk, take heart.

You're not the first young generation to be condemned. William Pitt, the Earl of Chatham, one of England's greatest statesmen, was called on in 1741 to defend himself against "the atrocious crime of being young."

You parents and teachers who bewail the wilfulness of today's youth, the resentment of authority, the odd-ball antics, remember that from the dawn of history youth has been going to the dogs. It was in the fifth century B.C. that the Athenian statesman Themistocles observed that "the wildest colts make the best horses".

What really irks many parents and teachers who rail against youths with long hair, against apparently sloppy dress and weird tastes, is that the young people aren't like them.

But God help this country if teenagers were like their elders in thought, word and deed. In order to advance our society, each generation must light its own way, behave experimentally and challenge standards, values and customs.

If today's adolescents are more rebellious than formerly, it's partly because there is more to rebel against: an increased uniformity in living, moral bases upset by adult conduct and technology, more dollar-chasing without idealism. And they are more restless because the pace of change has accelerated so much that even adults are disturbed by it.

At the same time, parents and schools are demanding more of the teenager. While father sits idly in front of the TV set after a fairly easy eight-hour day, the son or daughter is expected to put in three slogging hours at homework. And the school curriculum is fuller, more exacting than it was 20 years ago; the youngster is required to know more than his parents did at his age.

It's not a crime to be a teenager. The offence is the adult one of hurling that epithet "teenager" around to deride a whole age group because of a few bad actors.

They're generally a good lot, long hair and all.

It's healthier for a young person to upset applectarts than to be an apple-polisher for complacent elders.

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
