

BISHOP ANDERSON'S SERMON

The Right Rev. J. O. Anderson, Bishop of Red River, conducted the opening church service at the Club House.

His story to the children was of a boy who found \$5.00 on the ground. The rest of his life was spent collecting things he found. He wound up with a lot of junk in his back yard and missed out on the things that were worthwhile in life. The love of God, friends, and the worthwhile things others do.

The scripture passage was taken from James I. His sermon was about changing approaches to religion for a changing world, applying the unchanged love of God. With reference to a number of things that happen in life he said that people resisted changes but after adapting themselves to it they found things the better for it. He said Christianity blossomed after the great reformation. Even Peter and Paul had quite a controversy over receiving the Gentiles. There cannot be resistance to change and growth in the church. People cannot go through life only knowing and using the prayers of their childhood. A Christian is a student of life and cannot remain in kindergarten.

In the likeness of Jesus Christ (that is "Christ" and not a Christ of one's own liking) we must have patience and give service to others.

Report of Parks and Recreation Committee — R.M.V.B.

VILLAGE GREEN:

1. The tentative name is Victoria Beach Centennial Memorial Park.
2. The gardener is Mr. Ron Monkman of Victoria Beach.
3. Donations of trees or money may be made to Doreen Benningen, 304-5th or to Mrs. M. Zolna, 320 Toronto General Trusts Bldg.
4. Footpaths — Bicycles are allowed on the foot paths this season, but as always, pedestrians have the right of way. Please dismount and walk bicycles when conditions warrant. Next year there will be separate bicycle paths across the Green.
5. Flower Beds — Plants were purchased this season by the Municipality in order to plant them at the proper time. Some might like to make a cash donation to this project.
6. Trees and Shrubs—Almey Crab is the Centennial tree and is well suited for our area. Other suggestions include Birch, Mountain Ash, Chinese Elm, Silver Dogwood, Shubert Chokecherry, Golden Elder, Amur Maple, Highbush Cranberry, Sweet Berry Honeysuckle, Golden Ninebark, Globe Caragana. If you wish to plant any of these on the Green, Mr. Monkman will do so for you for a small fee.
7. Litter Cans will be placed in the park area. Please use the park but help us keep it clean by placing all refuse, bottles, cans and waste paper in the cans.
8. Playground equipment may be added next year if there is a popular demand.

SANDY BEACH

As an experiment this year we have cut a path through to Sandy Beach for the convenience of hikers and to protect the rights of private property owners. The route is marked by Municipal signs and is the only route that is authorized.

Route: enter path at the Pump House on 8th and Sunset, follow path to the junction of Private Property, bear right for about 250 yards on the newly cleared path until the road on the right-of-way is reached,

Warning: Wear stout shoes and socks as there is POISON IVY enroute and swampy area to cross. Place all litter in the can provided.

BEACH CLEAN-UP

Prior to July 1st, Club House, Arthur, Patricia, Alexandra, King Edward Beaches were cleared of fallen trees by Public Works. As of July 1st these beaches were thoroughly raked and checked for debris by Beach Boys hired by Parks and Recreation. These boys are paid \$5.00 a week and are responsible for a daily morning inspection of their assigned area. They bury dead fish, pick up litter and water carefully for glass bottles, old cans and dangerous debris. No one can say these boys are overpaid at the rate of the debris they remove from their area.
