

Involvement

In the last issue of the *Herald* there appeared notice of nomination for candidates to the office of Reeve and Council.

It is to be hoped that the retiring members of council will seek re-election. It is also hoped that other candidates will be nominated, thereby giving the electorate an opportunity to express their wishes.

Election by acclamation must bring mixed feelings to the mind of the successful candidate, firstly, as to whether his success came about by reason of diligent and faithful fulfillment of his duties in office, or secondly, by reason of apathy of the electorate, who shy away from direct involvement in municipal government by adopting the attitude that this being their holiday resort, let someone else take care of the chores of government.

Might it be pointed out that while Victoria Beach is a beautiful and well run holiday resort, it did not happen by accident, but because many dedicated and willing persons became involved in municipal government and freely gave their time and talents to achieve this end.

Summer residents must become more interested in municipal affairs, either by direct involvement or finding suitable candidates.

In the past years taxes have been increasing, your council have kept the controllable portion of the tax bill within reasonable bounds comparable with the general increase in municipal operations.

In the uncontrollable area school costs have increased to 50% of the tax bill. Of this increase the council have no say.

Cottage owners may complain about double taxation for schools, however, we must accept the situation or dispose of our summer homes.

One very pertinent fact becomes obvious. That, of the total tax revenue of the municipality, approximately 90% is contributed by the summer residents, the remaining 10% being the permanent residents' share.

In view of this, is it not logical to assume that the proportion of permanent and summer members on council bear some relation to this inequality?

And that's my comment.

PROFILE CANADA

LAKE WINNIPEG—Courtesy Manitoba Hydro

Shallow and unpredictable Lake Winnipeg is the largest remaining evidence of ancient glacial Lake Agassiz that once covered practically all of what is now Manitoba.

Third largest lake contained entirely in Canada (thirteenth largest in the world) it is the great natural reservoir of the mid-continent. Emptying into the 9,398 square mile lake are: the Saskatchewan River draining a large part of the prairies; the Red River carrying the runoff from southern Manitoba and portions of Minnesota and the Dakotas; the Winnipeg River draining northwestern Ontario; and Lakes Manitoba and Winnipegosis. From Lake Winnipeg the water channels some 410 miles down the turbulent Nelson River into Hudson Bay.

This great system of waterways formed a natural transportation route. Before the era of the railroad, for more than two centuries it was used by the fur traders, explorers, missionaries, and settlers who opened up the northwest. Trade and commerce in the mid-continent flourished as freight canoes and yoke boats and then lake and river steamers plied the choppy waters of Lake Winnipeg and along its tributaries.

Settlement of the shoreline areas began in the late 1800's when a few hundred Icelanders settled on Hecla Island and along the flat, western shores of the lake. Farming and fishing have since developed as the economic backbone of the area. The east side of the lake is dominated by spruce forests and swamp, supporting only a few scattered settlements. The southern tip of the lake is renowned for summer resorts.

Navigable throughout its entire length, Lake Winnipeg today still plays a vital role in the marine transportation of such commodities as lumber and fish products. Its fishing industry is of major commercial importance. The annual catch is worth several million dollars.
