Swimming tests were held on Friday, July 30th, 1971. This was the first time in three years that we have been able to have the tests on the originally scheduled date. Previously, storms have forced us to postpone the tests at least a couple of days. Thanks to Mrs. McCloy and Mrs. Carmichael, our examiners; Mrs. Wainwright and Mrs. Hughes, who provided us with a great lunch and to all those swimmers and parents who waited for their turn to come. The water was extremely cold and therefore anyone who passed, doubly deserved it for staying in the cold water throughout the whole procedure. The results were tremendous—out of 134 swimmers tested, 114 passed—giving us an 85% pass rate. Special recognition goes to Allison Knox for being the youngest person to pass her Seniors at Victoria Beach. Allison is eight years old! Congratulations Allison. Here are the results:



TO THE EDITOR

Dear Madam Editor:

You have published two letters on how the shores of Lake Winnipeg may be affected by Manitoba Hydro receiving a permit from the provincial government to construct diversion channels and control works, which will make it possible to control the level of the lake between 711 and 715 feet above sea level, as a reservoir for hydro electric power. Your July 30 issue included one from Mr. E. G. Mills, Public Relations Manager of Manitoba Hydro.

Your readers may be interested to learn what attitude has been taken on this important matter by the Council of Victoria Beach Municipality, what steps have been taken and what plans there are for future action.

Council realizes that the erosion and flooding we have experienced the past few years are due to natural causes—Lake Winnipeg drains a vast area, its principal tributaries being the Saskatchewan and Winnipeg Rivers and, to a lesser extent, the Red River. Its only outlet is a shallow entrance to the Nelson River System. Abnormally high inflows from tributaries create higher than normal levels.

Council is in favour of the level of Lake Winnipeg being regulated, but it is opposed the granting of the permit to Manitoba Hydro, without public hearings. The development of hydro power is important, but so is the maintenance of Lake Winnipeg, particularly the southern part of it, as a recreational area—not as playgrounds for a privileged class, but as health restoring lakeside resorts for masses of city dwellers.

Numerous fresh air camps are located alongside the lake, and affected by high water levels. Two of these are at Victoria Beach. One for French Canadian boys and girls is at Albert Beach. It has been severely flooded in recent years and has been protected so far this year by sand bag dikes. The other is at the extreme north end of this peninsula—Faith Bible Camp—which can accommodate 120 boys, girls and young adults, many from underprivileged homes. It has very little protection from high water and waves.

Lakeside cottagers, many of them of average incomes, or below, have seen their front yards swallowed up by the lake. Bayview, here, is an example. Sandy Hook, Boundary Park and Gimli, across the lake, are even worse. Many other lakeside properties are threatened. A great deal of money, private and municipal, has gone into protective measures—and good protection is very expensive, almost prohibitive.

Mr. Mills states that Hydro's lake level control plan is a carefully engineered flood control program that will bring inestimable benefits to lakeside property owners. If Manitoba Hydro can get the power it needs from Lake Winnipeg and at the same time control flooding and bank erosion, it will be a blessing indeed. However, your Council has no information yet that these two results can be achieved if Hydro takes full advantage of its license.

Mr. Mills states that the actual operating pattern of Hydro controls will be determined by the Manitoba Water Commission, after public hearings have been held and submissions from interested parties considered. Actually, the Manitoba Water Commission determines no policy. It is only an advisory body, as explained to members of your Council by its Chairman.

It is hoped that the Manitoba Hydro operating pattern will be influenced by submissions made to the Manitoba Water Commission, who will be holding hearings this fall. This will be the first opportunity for those interested in the ecology of Lake Winnipeg to present briefs before a government sponsored commission.

Your Council is associated with the Lake Winnipeg Ratepayers Association, who will present a brief on behalf of property owners and municipalities from Riverton around the south shores of Lake Winnipeg to Victoria Beach. There are engineers who do not agree that the announced plans of Hydro are beneficial to the recreational development of Lake Winnipeg. The LWRA is in touch with some of these and has engaged a lawyer to advise in preparation of a brief, and to present it.

Councillor Jim Whalley is Vice-President of LWRA; Councillor Doreen Benninger is a member of its petition committee and I am a member of the policy committee. Jim and Doreen have been active in securing names for a petition, the signers of which are encouraged to donate \$1.00 towards expenses of LWRA—and more signatures and more dollars are needed.

Your Council is providing rocks and gravel, in an effort to repair and protect the bad places along our shores. It will continue to do whatever it can, within its limited budget, to carry out protective works.

It will act through LWRA to endeavour to influence regulations that will benefit Victoria Beach and other resorts around Lake Winnipeg. The attendance of ratepayers from this beach at hearings of the Public Utilities Committee, of the legislature, and at meetings of LWRA, has been good. The evident concern of ratepayers has been an important factor in the considerable opposition

to the granting of a license to Manitoba Hydro without a public hearing—in the news media and the legislature. Victoria Beach people will be notified about future LWRA meetings and the Water Commission hearings, so that they may continue and increase their support.

I am writing this during the afternoon of Civic Holiday, one of the few very nice days we have had since June. Victoria Beach is beautiful, the sandy shores are delightful, the Village Green is well groomed and attractive, and all we need is warm weather. Here's hoping we get it during August!

To the Editor:

I'm surprised that some of the cynicism of Mr. Gartrell's letter of June 15 seems to have escaped Mr. Goodwin, in his reply of July 16. Nowhere in Mr. Gartrell's letter can I find a complaint about a control project which can lower the level of the lake during high-level periods, either naturally, or unnaturally caused. The inference which I got from the letter was that Manitoba Hydro wants to maintain the lake at a maximum level which can continue to do damage to the shores, including those of Victoria Beach.

It is now very obvious that a control project at the North end of the lake is a vital necessity, for two reasons. One—the dumping of reserve water from the Saskatchewan River system during the winter months in order to efficiently operate the Grand Rapids project has caused Lake Winnipeg to rise during these winter months, whereas formerly it used to drop in level. Two—the Province of Saskatchewan is considering diverting some of the Churchill River water into the Saskatchewan River, which will further aggravate the situation. Under these most unnatural conditions, Hydro must proceed with the control project, but it is up to us, to our Councillors, and to other interested municipalities, to ensure that maximum controlled levels will not cause further damage, and will even be sufficiently low to eventually restore our lovely beaches to their former state.

Generation of adequate hydro power is vital to Manitoba's continued economic development. As a Manitoban I feel we must have it, but not at the cost of sacrificing the entire recreational area on the South end of Lake Winnipeg.

While Mr. Goodwin is very sure our Councillors have taken an active interest, he follows this statement with one asking what they've done. So he is not really so sure after all. Let's hear from them directly, in this publication. I'm sure they can speak for themselves.

Sorry, Mr. Goodwin—I don't share your enthusiasm for wading in to Victoria Beach.

Our homes fields and woods abound with potential killers, attractively clad, sweet smelling and poisonous. Don't underestimate them just because they are familiar and seem harmless. Children are their most common victims. The best thing to do, of course, is to teach your children never to eat anything unfamiliar. These plants are found throughout Canada. Were you aware of their danger?

NARCISSUS—Bulbs—Nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea. May be fatal.

POINSETTIA—Leaves—Fatal. One leaf can kill a child.

LILY-OF-THE-VALLEY—Leaves, flowers—Irregular heart-beat and pulse, often accompanied by digestive upset and mental confusion.

RHUBARB—Leaf—Fatal. Large amounts of raw or cooked leaves can cause convulsions, coma and death.

WILD AND CULTIVATED CHERRIES—Twigs and foliage—Fatal. Contains a compound that releases cyanide when eaten. Gasping, excitement and prostration are common, often appearing within minutes.

MISTLETOE—Berries—Fatal. Both children and adults have died from eating the berries.

FOXGLOVE—Leaves—One of the sources of the drug digitalis, used to stimulate the heart. In large amounts, may be fatal.
