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Hawranik wins with increased Majority Provincial Elections results

PC candidate Gerald Hawranik bucked the trend towards the NDP in last Tuesday's provincial election by tripling his majority over NDP candidate Mike Hameluck.

Official results will be posted at provincial returning offices tomorrow. (Tuesday, June 10) but Elections Manitoba's website reports Hawranik getting 4,380 votes (51% of total votes cast), Hameluck, 3,875, and Liberal candidate a distant third at 290 votes. A total of 8,562 ballots were cast, 15 were rejected and 2 were declined. Hawranik's majority was 505. Voter turnout was 62.44%. Province-wide the turnout was only 55%.

In an interview with *The Echo* Gerald Hawranik said he would like to thank everybody for their support. He was encouraged by the fact that

support was more widespread this year with more support coming from all areas of the constituency. He said he had worked hard for the last year and would continue to do so for the next four years. Hawranik, who has made a special effort towards the improvement of Highway 304 south of Powerview, said he was encouraged by the fact that there would be an open house in the Pine Falls School Thursday to allow for public input into three alternative preliminary designs for the highway. He said the next phase would be the preparation of a detailed engineering design and he would be pushing for that to happen next year.

He said he would be working with the RM and town of Lac du Bonnet to ensure assistance for the establishment of an industrial park. "There are many industrial development

opportunities in the area." He said. He noted the dramatic improvement in jobs Beause-

jour after an industrial park had been made available. Hawranik will also be work-

ing for an all-weather highway on the East Side of Lake Winnipeg. "It is extremely important for that area." He said.

Hameluck ponders political future

It was a somber evening at NDP headquarters in Beausejour last Tuesday as Mike Hameluck's supporters watched another election slip away. Only two hours after the polls closed, it was apparent that Hameluck would lose another close race to Conservative MIA Gerald Hawranik, this time by a wider margin than in the by-election of last year.

"We can't hang our heads on a night when the NDP wins

a second consecutive term in government," Hameluck told his supporters following the defeat. "The voters have spoken and I accept their decision and I wish Gerald Hawranik all the best over the next four years."

Obviously disappointed, Hameluck strolled through the crowd, thanking friends and volunteers while fielding questions about his political future as an NDP representative for the Lac du Bonnet constituency.

"All I know is I'll wake up tomorrow and be with my family and go back to my normal life," he told reporters. "Beyond that I don't know if I'll run again in four years."

Hameluck did say he will remain active with the NDP Association in the region and he would continue to bring regional issues to the attention of the provincial government.

"I do expect to keep in touch with the premier and I'll work with the NDP Association in some capacity, but it's too early to tell at this time," he said.

Highway 304 Open house

The provincial government has announced that there will be an open house on Thursday June 12 from 3:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. at the Pine Falls School to allow for public input into three alternative designs for improvements into the highway.

The 15 km of highway south of Highway 11 is particularly treacherous, especially in icy conditions. The death toll has averaged one per year for the last eight years. In the last two weeks of last year, twelve vehicles skidded off icy bends into ditches along the highway. During the same period icy conditions caused a head-on collision in which a young woman was killed.

Powerview's Off-Road Vehicles

Once again, the office of the Village of Powerview has received complaints regarding the use of "off-road/all terrain vehicles" within the boundaries of the Village of Powerview. Residents have complained about the high speed at which these vehicles are travelling, the noise at night, the damage of private property caused by these vehicles and the interference with legal traffic. We are

especially concerned with the use of driveways as jumps.

By-Law No. 258/01 clearly states that No person shall, at any time of the year, operate an off-road vehicle upon any land within the territorial limits of, or owned or leased by, The Village of Powerview except on private property with the express consent of the owner or the other person having lawful possession or control of the property.



The definition of "off-road vehicle" including a four-wheel drive motor vehicle, motorcycle or a snow vehicle that is registered under The Highways and Traffic Act and operated other than upon the roadway or shoulder, but does not include any of those vehicles registered under The Highway Traffic Act and operated upon a roadway or shoulder.

Any person who contravenes, or refuses or neglects to obey any provisions of this By-Law is guilty of an offence and liable, on summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollar in the case of an individual, or Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars in the case of a corporation, or, in the case of an individual, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six (6) months or to both such a fine and such an imprisonment.

We request that any future complaints be forwarded to our local RCMP Detachment either in person or by phone. By doing so, you can expect response to this matter.

Hameluck ponders political future

Hameluck had held the position of president of the association in the region but stepped down when he declared his candidacy earlier this spring. Despite losing the election by more than 400 votes last week, he still believes the NDP has strong support in the Lac du Bonnet riding.

"I don't know if its the low voter turnout or whether the voters don't think I'd make a good MLA," Hameluck questioned. "There was no question that the Doer government would win a second term and you'd think it would make good sense to elect an MLA to work within the sitting government to improve the constituency."

Hameluck spent most of the four weeks leading up to the

election visiting all corners of the Lac du Bonnet riding, while accompanying Premier Doer in the area on two separate occasions. He said he was optimistic about his chances going into election day, especially since in his view, his opponent Gerald Hawranik spent most of the campaign in the Beausejour area.

"I was still out campaigning between Pine Falls and Pinawa right up until the polls closed," Hawranik said. "The feedback was good and I honestly thought we would win this riding."

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Interest low on nightly patrol

Lac du Bonnet citizen's patrol lacking citizens

Night time vandalism might be down somewhat around Lac du Bonnet but so is the interest in a neighborhood watch program that has helped deter the local vandals.

Ches Carver of Citizens on Patrol (COP) says he is frustrated at the lack of volunteers stepping up to help monitor the overnight activity on Lac du Bonnet streets. The retired police officer took over as patrol coordinator last year, when the COP program was in danger of dissolving altogether. Since stepping up to oversee the patrol program, Carver has acquired much needed equipment and has brought some much needed experience to the position. But despite his

efforts, the program still lacks a fundamental component. A longtime volunteer with the program agrees with Carver and says that the crime watch group is well funded by local business. But despite the much needed donations by local business, an anonymous patrol member says volunteers are needed to lighten the workload of the ten members currently with the program.

"We have the equipment and we have the money in place for helping with the expenses incurred by the volunteers," one group member said, asking that his name not be published. "All we need now are some volunteers."

The anonymous patrol member noted that local business is stepping with

funds to help the COP program, but the work overload is seeing volunteer numbers decline.

"Right now we have about 10 members in place but ideally we need 30 or 40 members to make the program work," he said. "That would mean each member would have to patrol just once per month and I believe that is manageable for any concerned citizen."

The patrol volunteer also noted that the volunteers patrol residential areas extensively around the Lac du Bonnet area, as well as the business district. He believes there is a misconception that the group only patrols the downtown area, and that might be the reason for the lack of interest.

"On Sunday night we

patrolled the residential areas from the Winnipeg River Bridge, right through to Hill 60 on the south end of town," he continued. "We cover the back lanes and keep a close eye on residential yards throughout town and people should be made aware of that."

Although the lack of volunteer support has led to a reduced schedule, the remaining volunteers say they are determined to patrol as often as possible, which makes for a stressful situation for their everyday lives.

"Most of the patrol members still have to get up and go to work in the morning, which speaks volumes for their dedication," the patrol member said. "These people need help as soon as possible or lose the program altogether."

Patrol members report that acts of vandalism

and crime is on the increase, and although a curfew by-law imposed by the Town of Lac du Bonnet has helped marginally, the patrol members say the worst is yet to come.

"We did see a decline in vandalism last summer following the new curfew by-law, but vandals are finding that the by-law is hard to enforce if nobody is out there to monitor the situation," one patrol

member said. "The perpetrators basically stick to the old adage 'it's not a crime unless you get caught,' and we'd like to change that with more help from the public."

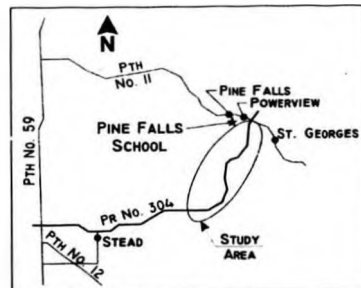

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Sagkeeng Junior High School News

On June 6th Sagkeeng Jr. High School joined the Fort Alexander Health Centre to partake in the annual Diabetes Walk. The walk took place at the Sand Hills Trail and the Health Centre provided snacks for those who participated. The Nursery & Kindergarten students attended the Annual Children's Festival in Winnipeg on June 6th. The students will be writing Final Exams this week from Monday, June 9th - Wednesday, June 11th. Good luck to all the students! On Thursday, June 12th the Sagkeeng Jr. High will be having our Track and Field Day. The Aboriginal Athletics Qualifier is also coming up on Saturday, June 14th, which will also be held at the Sagkeeng Jr. High School.

Principal Allan Courchene shares the last Montessori Day of the school year, which was held on May 30th. "The Sagkeeng Junior High students attended an activity, in partnership with the Manitoba conservation, tagging sturgeon in the Whiteshell region. The Montessori started with meeting our guide for the day - Farrah Leah Anderson. The

Conservation officer escorted the group to our first destination, which was the tagging of the sturgeon at the Nutimik Lake. The students were introduced to the gentlemen at the Lake whom were Jim Bayet, Norman Guimond, and Blaine Johnson. The students then proceeded to begin the process of tagging the sturgeon. It began with the carrying of a large twelve pound monstrous fish to the table, and then proceeded with the needle piercing and a cutting of the fin. The first sturgeon was carried by two of the men and the students had the opportunity to lift and hold the live "Jurassic" fish. The tagging process continued until all the students got an opportunity to touch or hold the large fish that was presented to them. Upon completion of tagging a number of the large Jurassic fish the guide then proceeded to take the large group to the museum at Nutimik Lake. Thanks to the hospitality of the Manitoba Conservation the students and staff had home made smokies and a beverage. The students, while eating, sat and listened to two elders from the community talk about sturgeon. The elders

talked about how they used the sturgeon and the different processes of cooking and smoking of the large fish. The group boarded the bus to the next destination which was the fish hatchery at Caddy Lake. The group was met by two fish experts from the Caddy Lake, Ray Shewfelt and Dana Moore. The two individuals provided the students with the process of taking eggs from a fish and explained how the eggs are then moved to the hatchery. The trip was an informative session for the students, as they gained vast knowledge in the process of tagging and the hatching of fish. At the hatchery the students also got to see large lake trout that were seven to eight pounds. These fish were the donors for the eggs that were used in the hatching process. A local fisher person was tossing a fly fishing rod in the pond located just on the side of the hatchery and the fish were continually caught and released. The person had said it was too easy for her to catch all the fish she was catching. The creek was probably three to four feet deep and you could actually see the fish at the bottom of the water. Caddy Lake is an excellent site to visit and learn or catch fish."

Explore the Outdoors Safely

Whether you are inside city limits or at a favorite campsite, cottage or farm, summer is a wonderful time for exploring the great outdoors. But before you send the kids out to enjoy their surroundings, take a few minutes to review safety rules with them.

Teach them to stay clear of overhead powerlines. Let them know that they should climb only those trees that are far from overhead powerlines. A good climber could easily climb high enough to be within reach of a power line. Additionally, keep in mind that it's against the law to climb a utility pole because there's the danger of coming into contact with high voltage electrical equipment. And advise children planning on flying a kite or model airplane to pick a wide-open field with no powerlines nearby.

Carefully explain to your children that fenced-in electrical stations are not playgrounds. These enclosures house equipment that carries a great deal of power. Tell them to pay attention to signs warning everyone to stay out and beware of danger. And if a ball or toy accidentally lands inside, call Manitoba Hydro for help.

Never attempt to retrieve the item.

When it's time for an evening bonfire, pick a spot that's away from a powerline. If the flames are high enough, they could damage a powerline and cause a power outage. There's also the remote possibility that electricity could flash over to the ground through thick smoke and hot air.

In areas where powerlines are buried, a pad mount transformer is installed above ground to reduce the electricity and distribute it to homes in the area. If you notice any damage to the transformer, stay away and call Manitoba Hydro immediately.

Survivor's Hope Crisis Centre Manitoba Youth Job Centre article

What is Sexual Assault?

Survivor's Hope Crisis Centre Inc. is a non-profit organization offering support to survivors of sexual assault through the SARAH (Sexual Assault Recovery and Healing) program. Our office is located in the Pinawa Hospital and is open Monday to Friday from 9:00 to 4:30. SARAH workers will provide emergency crisis support 24/7 for survivors as of the end of June at the Pinawa Hospital. You are welcome to attend our Grand Opening/Open House June 23, 1:00-5:00, at the Pinawa Hospital. Our office is located in the old labour room. The

SARAH program will be operating out of the Pine Falls and Beausejour Hospitals by the fall. SARAH is one member of the Sexual Assault Response Team for North Eastman. This article is the first in a series dealing with the trauma of sexual assault.

What is sexual assault? Sexual assault is any unwanted act of a sexual nature imposed by one or more persons on another person of any age and any sex. The experience of sexual assault has different manifestations for each person. It is a severe emotional and physical violation. Following

such an experience it is natural to feel a whole range of emotions: fear, numbness, anger, revenge, shame/self-blame, guilt, embarrassment, helplessness, anxiety, powerlessness, humiliation, lack of trust, hatred, sadness, depression dissociation, withdrawal, isolation, confusion, distraction. These emotions are a part of the trauma experienced by the survivor of sexual assault.

The survivor may experience one, a combination, or all of these emotions at the same time. These emotions may come and go over time or the survivor may totally deny the painful memories. The initial response to the survivor and the manner in which they are attended to, will do much to restore some of the survivor's emotional balance. Recognize that these are normal responses to an extraordinary experience. The sexual assault is never the fault of the survivor - the assailant is 100% responsible. In our second article we will look at the decisions to be made following an assault.

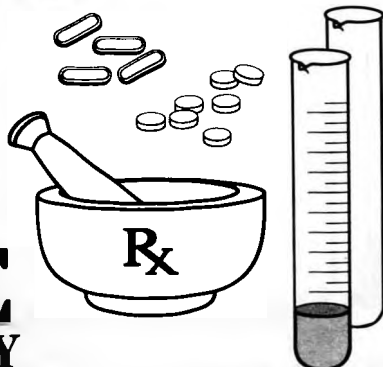

June 17 milestone day for Wellness Centre

Friday, June 17 is an important day in the progress towards an east Beaches Wellness Centre.

The land proposed for the Centre is west of Highway 59 at the intersection with Highway 11. It is currently owned by the provincial government but the RM of Alexander is negotiating for the transfer of the land to RM jurisdiction. The RM has agreed to make land available to the centre after the transfer. The RM also plans a Public Works yard and garage in the same area.

The Provincial Government

Lands Branch has notified seventeen government departments of the intention to transfer the land to the municipality. If none of them contest the transfer the Lands Branch is free to go ahead with negotiations with the RM.

A questionnaire has been circulated to residents in the area asking for input into the facilities to be incorporated into the centre. In addition to standard exercise machines and indoor track, badminton courts, swimming pool, a four-sheet curling rink and other facilities have been proposed.

Local groups to receive additional support from the Whiteshell Community Adjustment Fund

The Whiteshell Campus of the Deep River Science Academy and the La Vérendrye Trail Tourism Association will receive additional funding under the Whiteshell Community Adjustment Fund.

The Deep River Science Academy has been awarded \$34,033 over two years to implement an additional 2 years of their strategic marketing initiative. The La Vérendrye Trail will receive \$16,159 to complete a number of existing marketing initiatives and to develop a comprehensive proposal for its future role in the implementation of the regional tourism strategy.

The announcement was made today by the Honourable Stephen Owen, Secre-

tary of State (Western Economic Diversification) (Indian Affairs and Northern Development) and Lorne Kiely, Chairperson of Winnipeg River Brokenhead Community Futures Development Corporation (CFDC).

"The Government of Canada is proud of the progress of these two projects," said Secretary of State Owen. "Developing sustainable economic activity at the community level is a top priority for Western Economic Diversification Canada, and we are pleased to help support these important initiatives." "To date, the marketing activities of the Deep River Science Academy has had a positive impact on the establishment and maintenance of both financial and research partnerships," said Mr. Kiely. "Growth and sustainability of the program now rests with student recruitment, and the adjustments to the marketing

strategy proposed by the Academy will ensure that success."

The Deep River Science Academy plans to focus their marketing efforts on student recruitment and activities that will promote the program to educators, students and parents in Western Canada and Northwestern Ontario, including attendance at career fairs, school visits the development of marketing materials. Since the beginning of the program in 1993, the Whiteshell Campus of the Deep River Science Academy has injected almost \$1.25 million into the local economy.

"With the support of the Whiteshell Community Adjustment Fund, the La Vérendrye Trail Association has been able to successfully implement three years of an aggressive and proactive marketing strategy that has promoted the North Eastman region as a tourist destination,"

said Kiely. "As a regional tourism organization with extensive experience and ties to the communities and the tourism sector, La Vérendrye

Trail can play an important and valuable role in assisting municipalities to implement some of the components of the regional tourism development strategy."

The Association has been working closely with the Regional Tourism Steering Committee that is preparing the regional strategy for tourism development. The strategy, expected to be completed by September, will outline approaches and action plans for the development of tourism as an economic activity for the region.

The funding received will allow La Vérendrye Trail to complete some previously committed marketing initiatives and to develop a long-term comprehensive proposal and program plan for the role

of the organization in implementing the regional strategy for tourism development.

Winnipeg River Brokenhead Community Futures Development Corporation administers the Community Adjustment Fund on behalf of Western Economic Diversification Canada. The program is intended to assist the economic development initiatives of communities affected by the closure of AECL's operations at Whiteshell Laboratories.

A Legacy Of Debt

The Fraser Institute recently released its analysis of Canadian government debt. The news is not good. While it is true that the federal government has been able to eliminate its annual budgetary deficit since the mid-1990's, that is small comfort for those who are worried about the continuing rate of government spending and public debt. The report points out how serious the issue of government debt remains in Canada.

The Fraser Institute study reveals that the net direct debt of all three levels of government in Canada fell from \$851 billion to \$797 billion between 1997 and 2001. However, this is a small drop when compared to the overall increase in the debt over the last decade: it was only \$533 billion in 1991. In other words, the Canadian debt has increased \$264 billion over the last decade.

Even the modest success that governments have had since 1996 in eliminating annual deficits and beginning to pay down the mountain of public debt is more than offset by increases in other government liabilities, which grew significantly from 1996 to 2001. While the total government debt may have decreased by \$54 billion since 1996, the total liabilities under programs such as the Canada and Quebec Pension Plans, the Old Age Security, and the Medicare system have increased by \$279 billion during the same period of time.

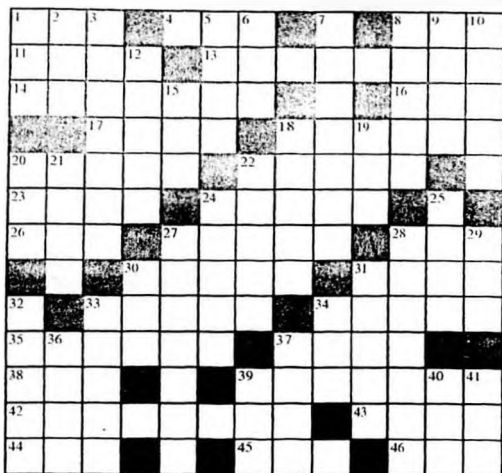
The Fraser study points out that the largest portion of the total program debt is made up of "un-funded liabilities." An un-funded liability arises because the estimated future revenues required to support a program fall short of the expected future payouts of benefits under those programs. The funding assumptions that these programs were based on at their inception have proven false.

There is little comfort in examining Canada's direct debt burden relative to the rest of the countries in the world. Canada ranks 63rd overall among 126 jurisdictions. More important, however, are the relative rankings generated by comparisons with other high-income nations. Canada has one of the highest debt burdens among high-income countries, ranking 17th out of 19. Only Italy and Belgium rank lower.

Un-funded liabilities that are not addressed will translate into more debt. In the words of the Fraser study we can only address this problem if Canadian governments do not assume new and larger obligations and if we focus our attention on the long-term problems built into the existing programs. This is not a time for any politician to create a political legacy by implementing new programs.

If we put off considering all the alternatives for achieving the goals of our important social programs, the crushing economic reality that is generated by government debt - our collective debt - will eliminate many of those alternatives for us. Better to make the hard choices now.

When is food done

Recipe directions often say to cook a food until "done". What is "done"? While we worry about a food being done enough for safety, we also should be concerned about a food being too done for quality. You can assure 100 percent safety if food is overcooked until it tastes and looks like cardboard, a piece of shoe leather or a hockey puck - no one will eat it!

Here are some general guidelines for determining when meat is safely "done".

Ground Meat: A 1/2-inch thick ground beef patty is more likely to cook thoroughly in the middle without being overdone on the outside that one that is too thick. You get approximately four patties measuring approximately 1/2" by 4" (before cooking) from a pound of beef.

Pork: For safety and taste, cook pork to 160 F. At this temperature, the center of pork roasts may be somewhat pink and pork chops may have just a trace of pink color. Using a thermometer is the only way to know if the center has reached 160 F.

Poultry: Cook whole poultry, thighs and wings to 180 F; poultry breasts and roasts to 170 F. Cook ground poultry to 165 F. When poultry is pierced with a fork, the juices should be clear, not pink.

Tips for Using a Food Thermometer

1. **Use a clean thermometer.** To prevent cross-contamination, wash the thermometer probe (the part inserted into the food) with hot water and soap after each use. In addition to using a clean thermometer, don't put cooked food back on the plate that you used for raw food.

2. **Cook food completely at one time.** Do NOT partially cook food and then finish it later. Harmful bacteria will grow between the time you start and finish cooking, even if you refrigerate the food in between.

3. **Follow thermometer style usage guidelines.** The two types most commonly used in the kitchen are Instant-Read and Oven-Proof thermometers.

4. **Place thermometer correctly.** As a general rule, insert the thermometer into the center of the thickest portion of the food. If a food is irregularly shaped, you may need to check the temperature in several places.
