LDB Youth working to publish newspaper

Lac du Bonnet Youth Centre Coordinator Cheryl Larson has lobbied to lend a voice to the younger generation and now she might have a newspaper podium as the centre is close to publishing its own monthly news magazine.

Although the project is still in the financing stages, Larson says her youth group is optimistic they will get the grants necessary to launch a monthly newspaper, geared for the younger crowd.

"We have found ourselves in a position to reapply to be put on the list for any government funding, but this project is sure to get attention," Larson said this week. "The kids would like to have a voice in the community and I'm sure the community would like to read what the kids have to say."

So far Larson reports the centre's applications to move forward on the newspaper project have been met with great interest from both the community and the Community Mobilization Program, which she hopes, will help fund the project.

"We've already received a great deal on printing costs here in Lac du Bonnet and we are currently working on some long term funding and startup costs," she reported.

Larson says the youth centre has been without government funding over the last four years and has had to rely on local organizations, as well as

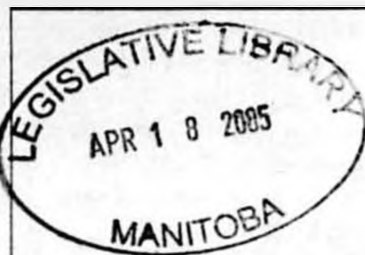
its own fund-raising endeavours to keep the doors open. In 2003, the youth centre formed its own board and incorporated, and is in the process of acquiring non-profit organization status. Once status is approved, the board will be eligible to receive annual funding, which would help sustain the monthly newspaper. In the meantime the youth centre newspaper is very close to a publication date, possibly later this spring.

"The kids are looking forward to learning everything about the newspaper business and learning about the computer software needed for the project," Larson continued. "We'll have our own editorial board and reporters and we'll go after stories that interest the younger generation."

Besides the obvious educational values, Larson points out that the project will help keep the public informed about the day to day activities and what activities the kids might be planning at the centre.

"Naturally its a win-win situation when the kids can learn skills that might help them later in life," she explained. "But there is also a lot of enthusiasm surrounding this group effort, where the kids can have a real voice in the community and offer their opinions and concerns on community matters."

Larson also notes that the project will offer disadvantaged youths a chance to be

part of an effective team, whether it will be in design and production, or even the editorial side of the newspaper.

"What some disadvantaged kids need is a sense of purpose and belonging, and that could mean the difference between moving forward with a positive outlook on education or being left behind," she said. "It's just a matter of seeing the end result of your efforts and feeling pride in that."

So far Larson isn't able to commit to an exact publishing date, but with a little community involvement, she is optimistic the first issue could hit the shelves in a matter of weeks.

Flood update for Southern Manitoba Wells and flood water advisory

Manitoba Water Stewardship reports the Red River in the Winnipeg area is expected to remain at 18.5 feet for the next two days and then fall. The Red River Floodway continues to operate. Levels of the lower Assiniboine River are rising slowly but flooding is no longer expected as ice jams are dissipating. Operation of the Portage Diversion will continue for a few weeks.

Red River

Levels of the Red River continue to rise from Emerson to the floodway inlet but increases in the 24-hour period ending this morning were generally less than half a foot.

Crests are expected between Saturday and Monday (this weekend) depending on location. Further rises will range from 0.5 to one foot. Levels from Winnipeg to Breezy point are stable or falling.

Operation of the Red River Floodway continues and has resulted in levels in the city of Winnipeg remaining near 18.5 feet in the past 24 hours. The gates may rise slightly tonight or early tomorrow depending on flow conditions and water levels. Little change in city levels is expected over the weekend.

Assiniboine River

An ice run occurred on the Assiniboine River from Lido Plage to Headingley last evening and some additional ice is expected to move in this vicinity today. It appears that little ice remains elsewhere. Levels of the river have risen less than 1.5 feet in this portion of the river since yesterday. This is less than previously anticipated due to increased flows being offset by moving ice. Additional rises of one to two feet are expected after the middle of next week when diversions at Portage la Prairie are reduced. However, care will be taken to ensure that no flooding occurs.

Levels of the Assiniboine River from Miniota to Brandon continue to increase and are now close to crests observed in 2001. Additional rises of one to two feet are expected with crest dates ranging from April 9 at Miniota

to April 13 in Brandon. Extensive flooding of agricultural lands within the valley is underway and will continue for several weeks.

Other Rivers

Most smaller streams in southern Manitoba have crested with the exception of the Little Saskatchewan River which is expected to crest in Minnedosa early next week. indications are the crest at Minnedosa will be somewhat lower than that of 2001 when flooding in Minnedosa was narrowly avoided.

Weather conditions continue to be favourable with little rain expected for the next five days.

Well Water and Flooding

As a precautionary measure, the Chief Medical Officer of Health for Manitoba advises that all people using water from wells or other sources that may have been affected by flooding should boil their water before using it or find alternative

supplies of drinking water until flooding subsides.

Water from flood-affected wells that may be swallowed or consumed should be brought to a rolling boil for one minute prior to use for:

- * drinking and ice making;
- * beverage preparation, such as infant formula;
- * preparing food; and
- * brushing teeth.

It is not necessary to boil tap water used for other household purposes, such as showering, laundry, bathing or washing dishes. Adults, teens and older children can wash, bathe or shower but should avoid swallowing the water. Toddlers and infants should be sponge bathed.

If boiling is not feasible, an alternate and safe supply of water should be used.

Well-water sampling should occur after flooding has subsided. Precautions should remain in place until test results confirm the bacterial safety of the water.

Well-water users not affected by flooding are reminded that annual testing of well water is recommended for all ground water sources.

Recreation weekend begins with baby steps

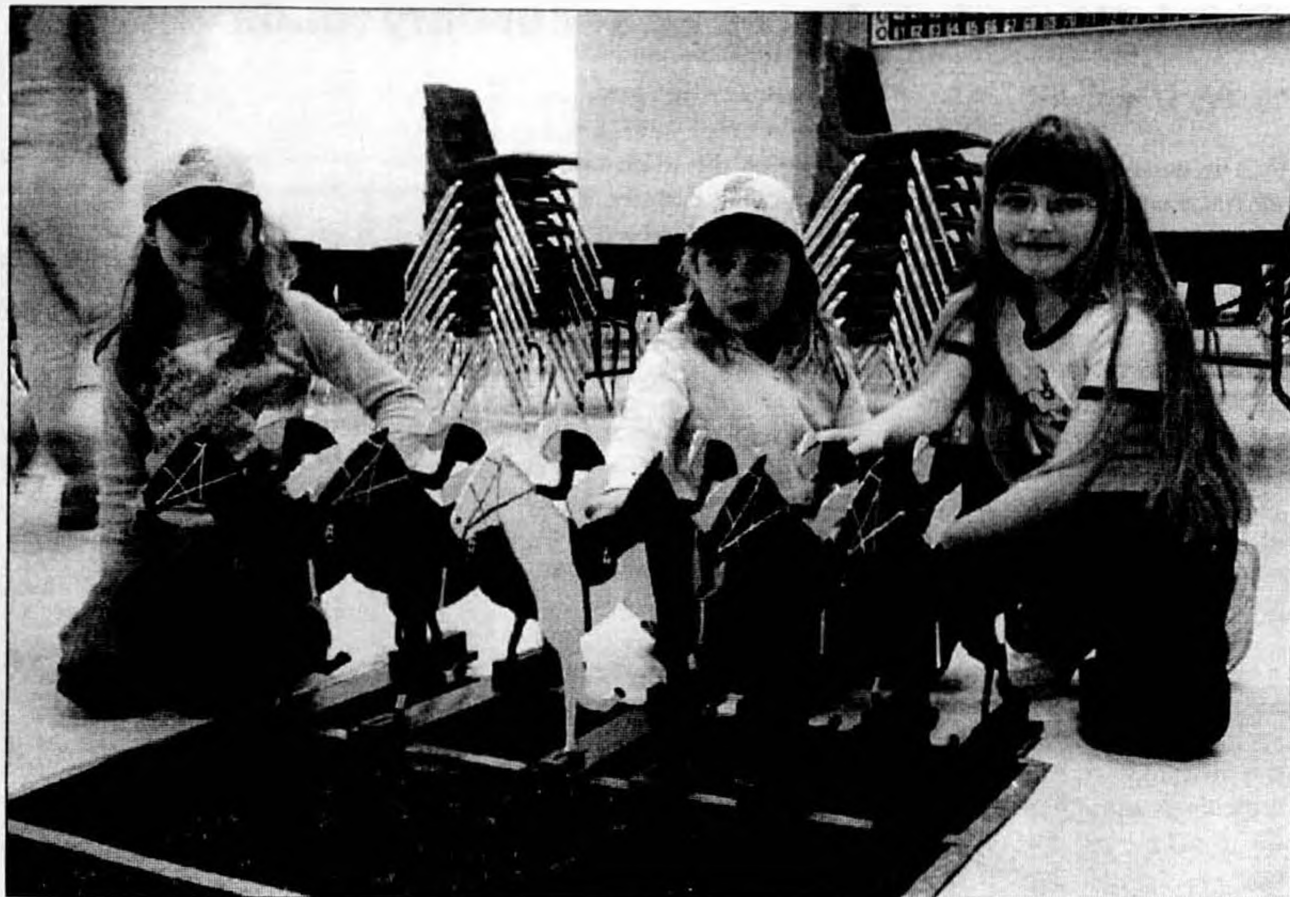

It wasn't all it could be but organizers of the first-ever Spring Fling in Lac du Bonnet say they are happy with the turnout over the weekend.

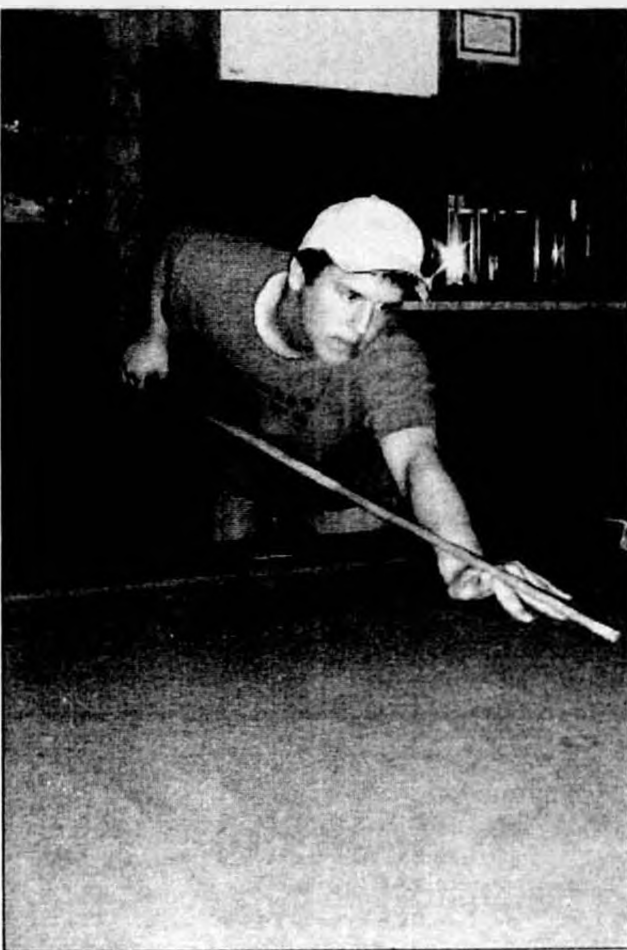

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The roads less travelled

Quick thaw plays havoc on secondary roads

The unusually wet autumn of last year could mean trouble for secondary roads and the motorists that use them, as deep frost levels are expected to play havoc with municipal road surfaces this spring.

Heavy precipitation prior to freeze-up is always a problem come springtime, but the saturated soil levels of last year are expected to create soft road surfaces, similar to those in spring of 2001.

Already municipal crews were seen scrambling last week to repair a washed out section of Riverland Road in the RM of Lac du Bonnet, which was a problem that had the road closed for several hours.

"It was a pretty big mess but the whole problem could've been avoided if the RM had acted earlier to clear a culvert," nearby resident Peter Humble said last week.

According to Humble, RM workers had visited the flood area three weeks earlier, after Humble made a call to the RM office with a warning that a flood was pending. At that time

the Riverland resident had noticed that creek levels were climbing on the south side of the municipal roadway, likely due to a plugged culvert. As it turned out, the quick spring thaw pushed the water level above the road, causing some major damage to the road surface.

"The RM was notified in plenty of time but they didn't react soon enough," Humble said. "By the time they did react the road was basically impassible."

Humble said Municipal workers and equipment did arrive in late afternoon of March 31 which resulted in the road closure while workers laid new culvert over the existing road bed before dumping new gravel to restore a temporary road link for the residents living on the southside of the Winnipeg River.

"We have only the one road in and out of this area and it was closed for three or four hours and I say that is unacceptable," Humble stated. "If there was any sort of medical or fire emergency, there would have been no way vehicles could respond."

To their credit, Humble reported that crews did work overtime to rectify the problem but he says he was frustrated that the RM didn't heed his warning.

"There was plenty of time to clear the culvert some weeks ago and this all could have been avoided. A lot of us over on this side of the river were keeping an eye on the ris-

ing water and wondering when the work would be done and when the mild weather hit, it was already too late."

The repaired road area, located in a creek crossing directly in front of the Heather Game and Fish property, has been reduced to a single lane following the flood, which could lead to a dangerous situation for unsuspecting motorists.

"The gully is kind of a blind area for drivers to begin with," Humble warned. "Now that it is down to a single lane, it could present a problem if vehicles meet at unsafe speeds."

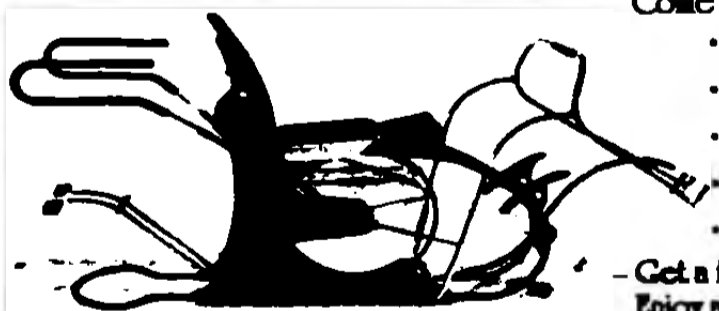
Motorists are always advised to use extra caution on secondary roadways, especially in the springtime when frost boils can create uneven road surfaces.

In this highly computerized world, more and more people of all ages are experiencing aches and pains that come from sitting at a computer for long periods of time. These aches and pains are felt in the neck, shoulder, upper and lower back, wrist and elbow joints. In some cases, the nerves to the hand become compressed, causing weakness and/or tingling in the fingers. These symptoms can occur in the onset of Repetitive Strain Injury (RSI), which may include damage to tendons, muscles, nerves and other soft tissues from repeated physical movements over time.

There are a number of factors that contribute to the onset of RSI, including;

Posture— is the most critical component. Slouching at the keyboard puts your spine and limbs in positions that contribute to increased strain and tension, as well as increasing the risk of eye strain;

Office set-up — a poorly designed workstation, or one that does not fit you well, can contribute to the onset of RSI (i.e. reaching for the mouse or

keyboard too high or low, wrists extended during keyboarding);

Worker technique — pounding the keyboard, using your wrists to move the mouse, or gripping the mouse tightly increases the demands on the hand and wrist and can trigger or aggravate symptoms of RSI; and

Work habits — sitting for extended periods of time without changing position is hard on your whole body and is a factor in developing RSI.

Don't ignore the early warning signs, such as weakness of your grip, numbness, and discomfort or pain in the arms, hands, wrists or shoulders. Early diagnosis and treatment are vital to ensure recovery from the symptoms of RSI.

Here are some guidelines for computer use that you and your family can follow at home.

Stretch — Include regular stretching into your work routine. Every 20 to 60 minutes, do three or four stretches — for hands, shoulders, neck and trunk. The key is to move your joints through their normal range of motion. Inquire about computer software that is set

to interrupt work at chosen intervals with appropriate stretches, or set your onscreen timer to remind you to take "micro breaks" as needed to momentarily change your arm position or to shift your weight. You can find some great 'Exercise Breaks' at www.computerfit.com.

Move — Get up from your workstation for a short stretch or walk around to promote blood flow to fatigued muscles every hour. No one has ever become more fit by sitting at a desk. Get regular daily exercise, away from the computer. It could be as simple as a walk around the office or getting off the elevator one floor early and taking the stairs. Move out of the pattern that the work is creating (i.e. stretch the opposite motion). Ensure you are not putting pressure on the carpal tunnel; slow key strokes to allow the median nerve to move off the tendons.

Add it up — Add variety to your tasks. Take every break as an opportunity to go for a short walk and stretch. Keep track of activity and build up to 30 minutes of stretching and exercise every day. Vary your tasks (keyboarding, filing, telephone, reading documents, etc.).

Reduce strain — Make

sure you are sitting correctly with your back supported:

Adjust your chair, as below, to support your back and minimize awkward postures that can lead to muscle tension, fatigue and soreness. Avoid slouching;

Sit with your buttocks right back in the chair and your feet flat on the floor, or on a footrest or phone book. Your knees should be bent at a 90-degree angle, at the same level or slightly above your hips. Keep your shoulders relaxed; arms close to your body or resting comfortably on the armrests, which should be positioned close to your sides; elbows bent at approximately 90 degrees; forearms parallel to the floor; and wrists straight, which may involve adjusting the angle of the keyboard;

Keep your eyes level within range of the top third of the screen. Don't squint to see the screen (check for glare or enlarge the font);

Keep your work, keyboard and mouse centered in front of the monitor and close to you, to avoid arching your neck or twisting your body;

Use a good quality mouse that requires minimal pressure to click, and be sure to position it on the same level and as close to the keyboard as possible. Keep your wrist straight and move the mouse with whole arm movements.

Use ergonomic computer accessories, such as document holders to encourage neutral neck postures, and head sets to avoid awkward neck postures (often seen as holding the phone in the crook of the neck) while interfacing with the computer and telephone;

A wrist pad on the keyboard allows your to rest your wrists on the pad and reduced stress on the wrist; and

If you're working on a computer all day at work, you may want to limit your computer-time at home. Choose activities for leisure and recreation that will not continue to stress the same muscles/tendons (i.e. if you're keyboarding on the computer all day, hanging out on the internet at night, or knitting/crocheting throughout the evening, this is not providing proper rest for the muscles and tendons that worked all day).

Talk to a physiotherapist — RSI can be prevented, but if symptoms do occur, early intervention is the best form of treatment. If you are experiencing regular or increasing discomfort while sitting at your computer, take early corrective action. A physiotherapist will listen to your symptoms and assess you to help provide appropriate treatment, including information about correct posture and positioning at your workstation. They will also work towards an earlier return to your daily lifestyle as well as provide guidance on how to prevent recurrence of injury.

Physiotherapists are university educated healthcare professionals who assist people of all ages and lifestyles to gain and maintain their desired level of active living and physical functioning. With their applied knowledge and understanding of the human body in action, physiotherapists are able to help you to increase mobility, relieve pain, build strength, and improve balance and cardiovascular function.

With proper precautions, correct posture and balance of computer work and active lifestyle, you will be able to avoid many of the aches and pains often associated with extended computer work.

You are going places

It was another dreary and gloomy day. I had come home from school, changed my clothes and got ready for work. I work at a local restaurant in town as a cashier, seater and busser.

I went to work feeling down and out. And to make matters worse I was bussing that evening. It's the same thing over and over again. Dealing with customers who complain and whine about their food, where they are sat and how the piece of pie that they are served is too big or too small. Understanding how an interest rate increase can

impact your portfolio.

Bonds

Traditionally, the relationship between interest rates and the prices of most government bonds is negative. That is, when interest rates rise, bond prices fall and when interest rates decline, bond prices benefit. The relationship, however, is not perfect and the extent of the price change depends on the characteristics of the bond, including its term to maturity and coupon rate.

Not all bonds are typified by this negative relationship with interest rates. Real return bonds, for instance, tend to be less sensitive to the effects of changing interest rates. These bonds provide a hedge against inflation. And as such, changes in inflation rather than interest rates have a greater influence on their price.

Similarly, corporate bonds, especially high yield bonds, demonstrate less sensitivity to interest rate changes. These bonds generally pay a higher coupon rate to compensate for their higher credit risk. As a result, the prices of these higher coupon bonds are affected more by the economic activity and the corporate performance of the issuer, than by interest rate changes.

Just like equity investing, the fundamental differences between bond types can help you reduce risk and potentially enhance returns by diversifying your bond investments.

Equities

The effect of interest rate changes on stock prices is neither direct nor consistent. Interest rate changes can impact corporate profits by influencing a company's ability to borrow. A declining interest rate decreases the cost of borrowing, which helps to increase profit margins, and subsequently, share prices.

When interest rates decline,

people tend to spend more and save less, which results in an increased demand for products and services. This usually translates into higher stock prices for the companies that supply those products and services. Generally, increasing interest rates will slow consumer spending, as consumers are enticed to save, while declining rates encourage spending.

Potential changes in current interest rates should not affect your long-term investment strategy. The key to a successful financial plan is to stay the course. This information is general in nature. 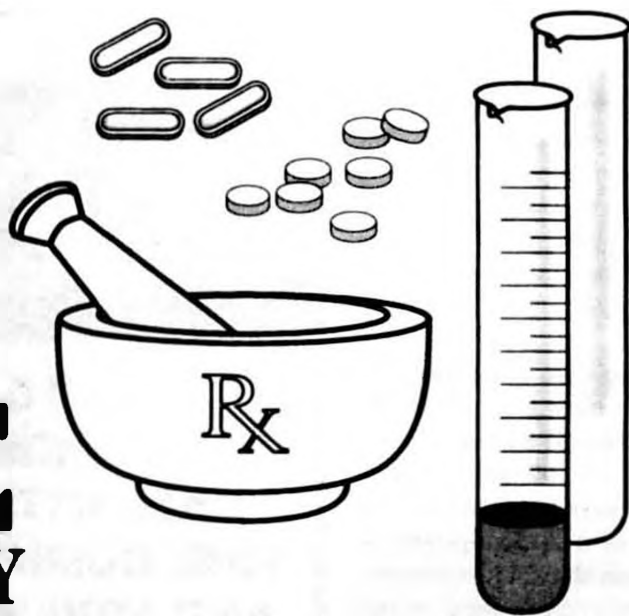

Burning Fields in the Spring
 Now that the snow is disappearing we are reminded of the work that needs to be done before seeding can start. There are a lot of fields that weren't harvested, had straw left in swaths or have a lot of residue that needs to be taken care of. Ruts have to be filled in and in some cases the straw will interfere with that operation. If you decide that a match is the best solution then please be reminded of some rules for burning. Fortunately the regulations are a bit more flexible for burning in the spring than in the fall. Daytime burning is allowed in most municipalities between sunrise and sunset. Check with your R.M. for any special by-laws. This includes the City of Winnipeg. There are several things that apply at any time of the year. The fire must be supervised at all times and the area needs an adequate fireguard to prevent spread of the fire. Smoke must not create an unreasonable hazard to people's health or highway safety. Before you light up make sure you know

which way the wind is blowing and that the fire will be out before sunset. For those of you that burn the ditches, native pastures or waste land you are restricted to daytime burning as well. If you have any questions phone 1-800-265-1233.

Martin Invokes "O.J. Defence"

As shocking new testimony is being heard in Montreal by Justice Gomery concerning key Liberals and friends of the Liberal Party, Prime Minister Paul Martin continues to change his public relations strategy in an attempt to save his floundering minority government. His most recent tactic has been to invoke what some have called "the O.J. Simpson Defence" - that somehow it is the Liberal party that has been the victim of this scandal.

Conservative Leader Stephen Harper put Paul Martin's ridiculous claim in its proper context, stating that the Liberal government should at least have the decency to admit that the only victim is the Canadian taxpayer whose money was stolen. As the independent Auditor General Sheila Fraser revealed last year, \$250 million of taxpayer's money was mismanaged and in some cases used for fraudulent purposes through the fed-

eral Sponsorship Program.

In full damage control mode, the Liberals have now decided to call in the RCMP to investigate the involvement of certain members of the Liberal Party in these fraudulent activities related to the program. Just like Paul Martin's attempt to paint himself and his party as the "real victim", the request to have the RCMP investigate is also not credible. In her report, the Auditor General pointed out that the RCMP itself was not only the recipient of sponsorship funds, but was involved in the establishment of an illegal bank account used to hold sponsorship money. It is clear that in order to preserve the integrity of the RCMP, the government must call in a police force that is independent of the federal government to investigate these matters.

Public Works Minister Scott Brison has added to this spectacle, with bizarre accusations that the Con-

servatives are working with the Bloc Québécois to discredit the federalist cause in Quebec. Clearly, Brison hopes Canadians will forget that money from the Sponsorship Program was misused by the Liberal Party to try to buy Quebecers' loyalty. But Canadians and the Conservative Party will not tolerate corruption hidden behind the cause of federalism. As Conservative Leader Stephen Harper said recently in Montreal, "We will never come here to Quebec to attempt to buy elections with dirty money and call it 'national unity.' Canada is not a sponsorship and Quebec is not an advertising contract."

Although Martin and Brison are in the unenviable position of having to daily defend the actions of their government in the House of Commons while a snap Spring election that the Bloc Québécois has threatened to provoke as a result of the shocking new Gomery testimony hangs over their heads, their shuffling of blame and responsibility for the abuse of taxpayers' money is a strategy that Ca-

nadians will see through.
