RCMP searching for missing fisherman

On Saturday, the 14th of May, 2005 at 7:10 p.m., Lac du Bonnet RCMP were advised that an adult male had gone fishing via boat in the Nutimik Lake area of the Whiteshell Provincial Park on this date, and had not returned at 4:30 p.m. when he was scheduled to return.

Investigation revealed that the subject in question was Kevin Howie, 28 years, of Winnipeg, and it was determined that his boat had been located in the vicinity of Scott Rapids on Numau Lake, which is part of the Winnipeg River in the Whiteshell Provincial Park. The boat in question was found out of gas, and nosed into the shore, with the ignition on, throttle in the full-open position, and the tiller handle was broken off. It appeared that the

boat may have hit something, which threw Mr. Howie into the water.

A search of the water ways was conducted on Saturday evening, and all day Sunday, but with no results. The search on Sunday included aerial resources.

The search for Mr. Howie continues to this date, Monday the 16th of May, and includes RCMP Personnel, Natural Resources, and volunteers, many of whom are family and friends or relatives. This includes members of the RCMP Hasty Team for a search of the shoreline, in the event Mr. Howie may have reached shore, and also includes an aircraft.

Fishing Season opens in Manitoba

Popular Sport Attracts Over 200,000 Annually.

Manitoba's 2005 angling season opens this Saturday, May 14, in the southern region of the province and a week later on May 21 in the north-west and north central divisions.

Fishing licences are available at over 700 vendors throughout the province including sporting goods stores, local

retailers, service stations and any Manitoba Water Stewardship or Manitoba Conservation district office.

Licence fees for the 2005 angling season are: Resident, conservation licence: \$11, resident, regular licence: \$17, Canadian resident, conservation licence: \$20, Canadian resident, regular licence: \$40, non-resident, conservation licence: \$30, non-resident,

regular licence: \$55, senior resident, conservation: free.

Catch limits for individual species and changes to Manitoba angling regulations for 2005 can be found in the Manitoba Anglers' Guide, available where licences are purchased.

Over 200,000 Manitobans and visitors enjoy the province's world-class fisheries each year. Enthusiasts may choose from a variety of fish

species including channel catfish, goldeye, northern pike, walleye, white bass, lake trout and yellow perch. Recreational fishing activities allowed in Manitoba include angling, spear fishing, bow fishing, dip netting, seining and minnow trapping.

The annual Free Family Fishing Weekend, which provides an opportunity for Manitobans and visitors to

experience some of the province's spectacular fishing locations, is scheduled for June 11 and 12. As part of this special promotion, angling licences are not required and admission to provincial parks is free.

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Back to the ball diamond

Slo-pitch season begins with tournament weekend in Lac du Bonnet

There's a good chance the bases will be loaded this weekend in Lac du Bonnet, when sixteen teams are expected to take the diamonds in Huskie Park for the annual Slo-Pitch Nationals, beginning Saturday morning.

This event, which brings in teams from all parts of the region, was first organized eight years ago by the Cats Meow Ladies baseball team. As always, teams are welcome to come and camp over the weekend at the ball diamonds, which is one reason the event is so popular with visiting teams.

"We play a couple of days of baseball and then everyone makes it over to the Blues social Sunday night," organizer Connie Dancyt reports. "It's sort of a fun way to start the slo-pitch season and teams look forward to coming back each year."

Of course the Lac du Bonnet Blues have a lot to celebrate this after the season after winning the South Interlake League Championship, beating the defending champs, Ashern Hornets, three games to one.

Meanwhile back at the ball diamond, Dancyt says there is still some room for more teams

in the long weekend tournament, but the rosters must be set no later than Thursday.

"We always get teams coming in from the city but we'd like to give some local clubs a chance to fill up the schedule as well," she says. "There are some good teams that come out from the Pine Falls area and we always look forward to renewing some old rivalries."

Dancyt says limiting the tournament to 16 teams makes for a perfect two-day schedule, with the finals being played

Sunday afternoon. As always the diamonds will offer the traditional barbecue and brew throughout the tournament and camping is free.

As mentioned, the tournament kicks off the local slo-pitch season, which Dancyt says, will begin next Tuesday following the holiday Monday. The local leagues, which run through the summer holidays and windup prior to the Labor Day long weekend, carries a strong base of eight teams each year. This year, however,

the league is looking to grow as the slo-pitch game gains popularity across the province. League games are regularly played every Tuesday and Thursday, with teams playing double headers.

Farmer's market returns to Lac du Bonnet, kicking off the garden season

If there was ever a sign that summer is just around the corner, a person needs to look no further than the arena grounds in Lac du Bonnet this Saturday, when the vegetable vendors return to the Farmer's Market Square to display their wares.

And although it is a little early in the season to expect fresh garden vegetables, the Farmer's Market does offer a variety of plants and shrubs to help spruce up the backyard for the coming summer season.

"Over the last five years we've opened an early bird market on the May long weekend as a promotion of sorts for our summer Farmer's

Market season and the idea took off from there," Market President Angela Arthur said this week. "It's a chance for customers to pick up a variety of products to help get the growing season started."

Among the numerous vendors, Arthur says the public can expect to find anything from homemade patio furniture, to garden beautification plants, such as shrubs and wild flowers. And with the local garden season upon us, Arthur says the vendors are looking forward to some brisk business, come this Saturday morning.

"The May long weekend has turned out to be quite successful for the market," she said. "Most

cottagers return to the area on this long weekend and they account for fifty percent of our business."

And while the May long weekend market does well to attract the public, there is an added browsing bonus nearby as both the Lac du Bonnet Legion and the local Community centre are staging indoor markets of their own.

"It works like a giant yard sale," Arthur remarked. "It's very worthwhile for people to come down and browse around and it works great for everyone, including the town."

The Farmer's Market has been a Lac du Bonnet weekend summer institution for 15 years and

so far Arthur reports that 25 vendors have signed on for the summer season, which is up from last year.

"I know other towns have tried to host outdoor markets in the past but they never did very well," Arthur explained. "Lac du Bonnet's market has grown each year, gaining quite a reputation and we are getting new vendors from all over because of this."

The Farmer's Market opens this Saturday at 10:00am and runs through to 1:00 in the afternoon. And although weather does play a big part in customer draw, Arthur reports that the vendors will be out in force in any weather conditions, short of a typhoon, of course.

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Toews camp ready to campaign

Tories take aim at toppling government as early as Thursday

If you were to ask Federal MP Vic Toews the election question this week, he would tell you there is no question about it, we are heading to the polls in June. At least that is what his camp is considering as the Tories take aim to topple the Liberal Government later this week.

As you would expect, Toews is in Ottawa this week, staying close to the conservative camp in the event of a surprise vote in the House of Commons. Meanwhile, Toews assistant, Jack Haasbeek, continues to prepare for an election call in his Steinbach office, should Thursday's announced non-confidence vote lead to an election.

"They are all within ten minutes of the Hill," Jack Haasbeek said, referring to the conservative MPs in Ottawa.

"Every single vote counts in the House of Parliament and no party wants to be caught short."

Haasbeek says the Conservative camp is fairly confident the Liberal Government is on its way out, but the vote is expected to be close, nonetheless.

"It pretty much hinges on what (independent MP) Chad Kilger decides," Haasbeek confided. "We are confident Chuck Cadman will vote against the government, so it is going to be that close."

But while the conservatives are confident they will win and retain the Provencher riding

with ease, Haasbeek says he is not surprised the Liberals haven't started drumming up a named candidate to oppose Toews in this riding.

"Right now the Liberals are focussing on ridings they might win, therefore they are not too optimistic they can win in Provencher," Haasbeek explained. "I think right now there attention is more focussed on swing ridings."

In last year's election, Peter Epp of Oakbank stepped up as the Liberal candidate, with little impact as it turned out. Now as anticipation rises that an election might be around the corner, Haasbeek notes that the Liberals are uncharacteristically quiet, even resigned that they have little chance in southeast Manitoba.

"As far as we know, Peter Epp hasn't even filed an election return yet," Haasbeek said. "Normally we are the first to know when someone (a potential candidate) makes a move but so far everything is quiet."

As for the chances of the conservative party forming the next government, Haasbeek reports that the outlook is favorable west of central Ontario, while the polls are indecisive in southern Ontario and Quebec.

"Voter opinion is changing almost daily in the east," Haasbeek observed. "We know that voters west of Thunder Bay are tired of the sponsorship scandal, but the mood in the east is changeable to say the least."

According to a new poll released on Monday of this week, Haasbeek says the Liberals enjoy 43 percent of the popular vote in Ontario, as compared to 31 percent cred-

ited to the conservatives. And although polls are not 100 percent accurate, Haasbeek knows the party still has a lot of work to do in order to win favor in the vote-rich region of Canada.

"It's an uphill battle when the Liberals are running around the country, promising the provinces billions in funding," Haasbeek noted. "These promises are easy to make and then they become someone else's problem if the Liberals lose the election."

"It all sounds grandios but there is a lot of accounting to do no matter who forms the next government."

If the non-confidence vote, scheduled on Thursday of this week, is successful in toppling the Liberals, voters can expect to go to the polls on June 27 or shortly after.

Provencher MP Vic Toews first won the riding for the conservatives in November of 2000, when he defeated Liberal incumbent and Lac du Bonnet resident David Iftody.

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Sagkeeng Junior High School news

On Thursday, May 5, 2005 the Canadian Cancer Society hosted an event, the first of its kind, entitled: *Researchers of Tomorrow Meet Researchers of Today*. Aryton Spence, a Grade 5 student from the Sagkeeng Jr. High School, was cordially invited to this event along with her parents and teacher. The Canadian Cancer Society, Manitoba Division, had participated in a number of school science fairs across Manitoba and awarded science projects that related to healthy living, cancer prevention and cancer research. The Canadian Cancer Society recognized three science fair projects at The Manitoba First Nation Education Resource Centre's (MFNERC) Annual Science Fair on March 9th and 10th. At that time Aryton

Spence received an honorable mention for her science fair project and she also received some prizes from the Canadian Cancer Society.

Researchers of Tomorrow Meet Researchers of Today was an event organized to recognize and present awards to the recipients of new research grants funded by the Canadian Cancer Society, as well as to the Manitoba recipients of the Division's Researchers of Tomorrow Science Fair awards. The Canadian Cancer Society raises funds to do research on cancer. It was stated that 46 million was raised across Canada, and that 82 new research grants were awarded, including 5 grants in Manitoba. Projects are submitted, judged, and then grants are awarded.

One of this year's Manitoba's recipients of the new research grants was Dr. Sabina Myes. Dr. Myes' lab was used for the afternoon tour. This event provided a unique opportunity for the Researchers of Tomorrow to meet the Researchers of Today. Although the Canadian Cancer Society recognized science projects in past years, this was the first time they had organized such an event that allowed the youth to meet the scientists and to explore their labs. The itinerary for the day included: Set-up of science projects at 9am followed by Awards presentations & Media event at 11am. At 12 noon lunch was served and then at 1:30 there was a Tour of the Genome Lab at Cancer Care. The morning's events took place at the Norwood Hotel and the afternoon's event was at the Cancer Care facility at the Health Sciences Centre.

The Honorable Peter Bjornson, Minister of Education, was also present for the Award ceremony. He stated that 5 800 new cases of cancer will be diagnosed in Manitoba in 2005. He encouraged the youth to consider a research career. He congratulated the students on their wonderful projects and added that, "Our future is in bright hands!"

The Canadian Cancer Society works with communities to help prevent cancer and to

offer support to families. It is estimated that 1 out of 3 people will be diagnosed with cancer in their life time. A more startling statistic is that it is estimated that 1 out of 2 people will be diagnosed with cancer in the next ten years. George Wurtak, Director of Aboriginal Initiatives, was one of the judges who picked Aryton's project at the MFNERC Science Fair. He pointed out that the Cancer society is making a real effort to offer support and help for First Nations people living with cancer. There are many people in Sagkeeng whom have died from some form of cancer, and there are many more others who have been diagnosed with some form of cancer. There is a Cancer Support Group that meets weekly at the Sagkeeng Wellness Centre.

When we first got there we set up our science projects and then we sat down. We made mad scientists and a keychain. One by one we got called up to tell all about our projects. My science project was called Tobacco Taboo and the purpose of my project was to show that tobacco is dangerous for your health and that tobacco should be used in a sacred way. After the awards we ate lunch. Later, we went to the Genome Lab at the Cancer Care. We looked at chromosomes and white blood cells through microscopes. We got to take a picture of the cells and change the color. We looked at different kinds of microscopes and learned about what they can do. I learned that Science and Research are very important. I liked it! It was very interesting and it was something that I will never forget!

What Makes For A Good Day?

We all have used the expression; "Have a great day" as a way of saying good-bye for now. I have sometimes wondered what do we really mean when we say that? Do we mean that you should have a day with no problems? Do we mean that you should be in a good mood all day? Or do we mean that our day should consist of fun and laughter all day long?

Let me ask you, "How often do you have a great day?" Once in a while, often or very seldom? What makes a day great? Most people want to have a great day, but how many people know how to have a good day in spite of your circumstances. I would have had a great day but..... If only so and so would have kept their mouth shut. If only I would have..... We could all fill in the blanks. The list is endless as to the reasons (excuses) we give for not having a good day. Scott M. Peck in his book *The Road Less Travelled* says "Most people do not fully see this truth that life is difficult. Instead they moan more or less incessantly..... about the enormity of their problems, their burdens and their difficulties as if life were generally easy, as if life should be easy."

When we believe life should be easy and our experience

tells us that life has many challenges, we often see ourselves as a failure. This only opens the door for failure to take up permanent residence in our life. I believe there are many things you can do to prepare for a good day. Here are 3 things that go a long way to having a great day:

1. Good preparation

Everybody is preparing for something. The old story of the grasshopper and the ant. The ant gathered food all summer long and when winter came it retired to its home and enjoyed life. I like a quote from Dr. John Maxwell; "The only adequate preparation for tomorrow is the right use of today." Without good preparation a good day is but a daydream that often turns into a nightmare. Good preparation is necessary to make a great day.

2. Discipline

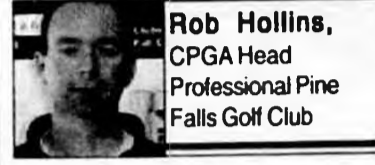

Balance is the key to any good golfer's success, whether it is Tiger Woods or the 6-year old that makes you jealous because he or she hits it farther than you.

Many a time we marvel at how easy some people make it look, they swing without effort and yet it goes so far. You then go to the course and decide to hit it as hard as you can, and it does not even make it to the creek on the first hole. Why is it always like that?

Balance. Say it with me. Balance.

An easy swing (I will explain what exactly an easy swing is in a moment) allows you to not lose your balance. We all have perfect swings whether we believe it or not. We do these perfect swings at least once, if not twice, before we actually hit the ball poorly. They are called practice swings, and we do them without thinking whatsoever.

There is no ball in front of us, so therefore we do not try to beat the hell out of anything. We do not think about keeping our head down, or keeping our left arm straight, or bending our knees. It is like a baseball swing. No thought, just instinct. And at the end of this perfect practice swing, we have the perfect finishing position. We are facing our target, just like Tiger.

But then a ball is put in front of us and we focus on hitting

that little white object as far as is humanly possible. STRIKE ONE!

It still sits there, missed completely by the wild uncontrolled slash we attempted to make while hurting ourselves in the process. This is why the stretching routine from last week is so helpful.

Making an easy swing is like closing your eyes and trying to hit a ball. Try it, under a controlled condition (driving range) with your eyes closed. You know you are going to miss it if you attempt to kill it, so you take an easy swing.

Whack! Now, how is it possible that you can even make contact with the ball without seeing it? Balance. The steady pace of the swing that you just made kept you from falling out of balance. It also allowed you to transfer your weight, keep your head down, follow through, rotate your hands, etc. All of this happens because you kept your balance.

Without balance, there is no way to improve in the game of golf, because balance gives us the key to consistency. Any golf lessons that do not address balance, do not improve your golf game.

A pocketful of promises

After a number of serious admissions of corruption, extortion, and fraud by senior Liberal Party Members at the Gomery Commission, Paul Martin's Liberals are having difficulty in maintaining their authority to govern. In an attempt to save his government from an Opposition motion of non-confidence, Paul Martin and the NDP recently reached a deal that involves NDP support of the government on confidence measures in exchange for changes to the budget. Martin claims this deal is worth \$4.6 billion dollars of taxpayers' money.

Even if one agrees with the initiatives identified in this new spending spree, unfortunately everyone that was left out of the budget in the first place - farmers and fishermen, seniors and softwood lumber producers - remain left out in this new deal. The businesses that create jobs and the hardworking

Canadians who drive our economy have once again been ignored.

Gone is any pretence of caution that the Finance Minister claimed to be exercising in early April when he rejected any serious attempts by the Conservatives to change the budget. At that time, he claimed that "you can't go on stripping away piece by piece by piece of the budget...you can't after the fact, begin to cherry pick...that's not the way to maintain a coherent fiscal framework. If you engage in that exercise it is an absolute sure formula for the creation of a deficit." Now the Finance Minister is helping the NDP pick the cherry orchard clean and he's sending the bill to Canadian taxpayers.

Paul Martin said he wanted Parliament to work, but in developing this new deal with the NDP he chose not to consult with the Conservative Party

about making a better budget that would speak to the real priorities of Canadians. Matters like meaningful tax reduction for Canadian families and businesses and ensuring that spending initiatives follow a clear and careful plan are painfully absent from this hastily constructed deal. Martin might have gotten 99 Conservative votes instead of the votes of 19 New Democrats intent on emptying the public treasury. And perhaps instead of costing taxpayers another \$4.6 billion, it might have actually saved taxpayers some money.

But not all of the Liberal initiatives actually involve spending any additional money. In fact, in some cases it simply

involves making promises to do so while simply accessing money already committed to other social programs. In recent days, even the government's NDP partners have become aware of the "smoke and mirror" tactics of the Liberals. Winnipeg NDP MP Pat Martin has admitted that the deal that Jack Layton reached with Paul Martin to prop up the Liberal government is not what he thought it was: "The government intends to pay for its commitments to the NDP with money that they had already committed to First Nations," Pat Martin said in the *Globe and Mail*, on May 4th. "If that's the case, it's even sleazier than I had ever imagined."

Since 1996, government spending has gone up by 50% and spending on the cost of the

bureaucracy has gone up by 77%. The billions of dollars in spending announcements made by the government in this recent spending spree will only increase these soaring costs. And in the end, it is Canadians who are left standing with a pocketful of promises and empty wallets. After all, someone has to pay for this government's desperate efforts to stay in power.

Forced unionization plan

The floodway expansion project is one of Manitoba's significant projects to date. It will ensure the security of thousands of homes in the Red River Valley, and it will also create hundreds of excellent employment opportunities throughout the Province. Lac du Bonnet Constituency will not benefit to any great extent by the flood protection that the floodway expansion will offer, but the Constituency will most certainly benefit from employment opportunities. We have quality earth moving contractors, truckers, cement companies, and contractors who will most certainly contribute

their time and their expertise to the project for the benefit of all Manitobans.

Unfortunately, the Manitoba government has imposed a Project Labour Agreement on the project that will result in the forced unionization of many of the floodway workers. Currently 95% of construction workers in the Province are non-unionized. Under the terms of the Agreement, non-unionized workers will be forced to pay union dues. For every hour that a non-unionized worker puts in on the floodway expansion project, under the Project Labour Agreement he or she will be forced to pay \$3.00 to the union. For a 40-hour week, \$120.00 will be deducted from their paycheck to the unions. The agreement will unfairly pressure non-unionized workers to join a union because in order for that worker to obtain

any benefit whatsoever from that \$3.00 per hour payment to the union, the worker must join the union. In addition, under the Project Labour Agreement, employers will be forced to disclose the name and addresses of their non-unionized employees to the Floodway Authority and the Trades Council Union.

I am not at all against unions. What I am against is forced unionization of a group of workers who are not unionized and don't want to be unionized.

ported that a cottage on Wassahow had a broken window and door open and that another cottage had an unlocked door.

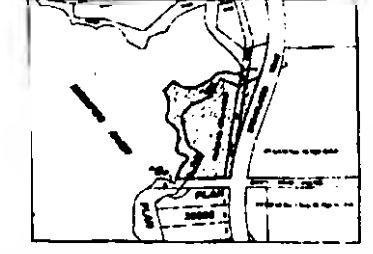
