



Trade School feasibility study underway

A regional trade school is getting closer to reality

Proposed by Black River First Nation and the Winnipeg River Regional Round Table last year, a regional trade school was seen as having a significant impact on local economic development and a major impact on job opportunities in the area.

The eight-week field research program for the feasibility study is in its third week. It will be completed August 5. Three aboriginal students are undertaking the fieldwork - Steven Johnston and Melodie Abraham from Sagkeeng and Trevor Bird from Black River. They have completed interviews with students and other community members, and will be beginning interviews with local industries and businesses. Melodie Abraham said that she has found that the major need in her community is for carpenters, plumbers and electricians.

In a press release the Winnipeg River Regional Round Table said; "The impacts of a Regional Trade School will be tremendous. The economic benefits are obvious for some of our small, marginalized forest communities. Income generation will be increased and there will be a decrease in the reliance on support systems. It will create a variety of opportunities in the region but most

important will be the access to local employment. The success of a Regional Trade School requires the creation of partnerships with regional organizations. The Winnipeg River Regional Round Table has brought those major stakeholders to the table to work toward a common goal.

This is an exciting time to be involved in history making for our region. The Committee looks forward to working with the First Nations Forestry Program in our new partnership of cooperation.

In addition to the usual trades the school could be actively involved in training em-

ployees for our larger regional employers such as the North Eastman Regional Health Authority, MB Hydro, Tembec and others.

Funding for the feasibility study has come from the First Nations Forestry Program, (\$10,000) and from the Manitoba Model Forest, (\$5,000).

Notice of Public Hearing and Pre-Hearing Conference

Applicant: The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation

APPLICANT:

The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation (the Corporation) has applied to The Public Utilities Board (the Board) for approval of the Corporation's 2006 base rates and premiums charged for compulsory driver and vehicle insurance. The application is being filed pursuant to *The Crown Corporations Public Review and Accountability Act* and *The Public Utilities Board Act*.

RATE IMPACT:

The Corporation is requesting approval for basic Autopac rates effective March 1, 2006, which will leave overall premium revenue unchanged. However, the changes proposed for 2006/2007 will affect average base premiums for each major vehicle use category as listed below.

These changes will affect the major vehicle classes as follows:

Major Use	Number Of Vehicles	Increase/Decrease
Private Passenger	650,722	-0.5%
Commercial	41,941	9.2%
Public	9,536	7%
Motorcycles	9,211	12.7%
Trailers	107,844	-4.9%
Off-Road	32,645	-20.0%
Overall	851,899	0.0%

The impact of rate adjustments on the total vehicle population will be distributed as follows:

- 490,303, or 57.6% of vehicles will receive a rate decrease. Most decreases will be less than \$50.
- 36,512, or 4.2% of vehicles will receive no change in rate.
- 174,310, or 20.4% of vehicles will receive a rate increase of up to \$20.
- 108,805, or 12.8% of vehicles will receive an increase between \$20 and \$50.
- 21,745, or 2.6% of vehicles will receive an increase between \$50 and \$100 and.
- 20,224, or 2.4% of vehicles will receive an increase greater than \$100.

Actual changes to an individual's premium will vary depending on the owner's claim experience, driving record, insurance use, territory and vehicle rate group. The cumulative effect of these variations on individual rates will all fall within the dollar amounts described above.

No changes are proposed to fleet rebates and surcharges, existing driver's licence premiums or accident surcharges, other existing time payment fees or other existing service and transaction fees.

PARTICULARS OF THE APPLICATION:

The Corporation proposes the following rate adjustments for policies issued between March 1, 2006 and February 28, 2007:

- Experience-based rate increases and decreases to individual classes ranging from +15% to -15%, with the exception of a 20% increase on average for mopeds, or an average of \$13 per moped and decreases of up to 20% for trailers and off-road vehicles.
- For all vehicles other than motorcycles, trailers and off-road vehicles, classification offsets ranging from -5.2% to +11.08%, to achieve revenue neutrality from rate group adjustments.
- For motorcycles, no classification offsets from rate group adjustments, resulting in rate changes up to 20% in addition to experience adjustments.
- For motorcycles, the creation of a Pleasure Use category.
- Combination of all rate changes capped at 20%.

OTHER RELATED MATTERS:

MPI Immobilizer Incentive Program

The Corporation is announcing a three-pronged strategy to significantly and permanently reduce auto theft in Manitoba. The program consists of the following:

- 1) Establishment of \$40 million Immobilizer Incentive Fund (IIF) from basic Autopac retained earnings. This fund will be used to provide every Manitoban who installs an after-market immobilizer that meets the national standard with a contribution of \$140 towards the cost of the device and its installation. The total cost of the device, installation and taxes is expected to be no more than \$280.

- ii) Interest-free financing and waiving of the standard \$4 financing fee for every Manitoban who installs an after-market immobilizer that meets the national standard and chooses to finance the residual cost of the device and its installation. In addition, repayment of the \$140 loan can be arranged for up to five years and would not commence until the next renewal date.
- iii) Application to PUB for continuation of the annual \$40 insurance discount for vehicles with approved after-market immobilizers.

RATE VARIATION

Rates for services by The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation shall be reviewed by The Public Utilities Board under *The Public Utilities Board Act* and no change in rates for services shall be made and no new rates for services shall be introduced without the approval of The Public Utilities Board. Rates for services means in the case of The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation, rate bases and premiums charged for compulsory driver and vehicle insurance provided by that Corporation. Upon any application to it, the Board may make an Order granting the whole or part only of the application or may grant such further or other relief in addition to or in substitution for that applied for, as fully and in all respects as if the application had been for such partial, further or other relief.

HEARING

The Board will hold a public hearing at the Public Utilities Board Hearing Room, 4th Floor, 330 Portage Avenue, Winnipeg, Manitoba, commencing at 9:00 a.m. October 3, 2005.

RURAL MEETINGS

Based on the public's response to this notice and other notices, the Board is prepared to convene meetings in Brandon or such other locations as are warranted by the response. People who intend to appear are to write the Board's Secretary confirming the location where they wish to appear. Notice of intention should be mailed to the Board by August 5, 2005.

Confirmation of these meetings will appear in future notices. Interested parties may also contact the Board office for details.

PROCEDURE

The Board's Draft Rules of Practice and Procedure will apply to the conduct of the General Rate Hearing. Copies of this document are available upon request to the Board by writing to the Secretary or by calling 945-2638 or 1-866-854-3658 (toll free).

PRE HEARING CONFERENCE

All persons, firms or corporations wishing to intervene in respect of this application and to participate in the examination of witnesses, to provide evidence or to make submission and final arguments are required to attend or send a representative to a Pre-Hearing Conference (PHC), to be convened by the Board in its Hearing Room, 4th Floor, 330 Portage Avenue, Winnipeg, Manitoba on Tuesday, July 5, 2005 at 9:00 a.m.

The objectives of the PHC are:

- i) to identify the intervenors, their reasons for intervention and to avoid duplication of content,
- ii) to establish status of certain applicant intervenors and
- iii) to establish a timetable for the orderly exchange of evidence and information.

Persons wishing to address the public hearing in French are required to notify the Board's Secretary prior to June 28, 2005 and if possible at the PHC.

PARTICIPATION

Intervenor shall be persons, firms or corporations wishing to examine witnesses, or to provide evidence, or to make submissions and final argument. Intervenor should notify the Board of their intention to do so by applying to the Secretary of the Board immediately.

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Rural Manitoba communities benefit from VLT revenue

The Rural Economic Development Initiative provides support to businesses and organizations helping our province grow. The program is funded by revenue from Video Lottery Terminals. Manitoba Lotteries is pleased to pay tribute to some Manitobans who are making a difference.

"Lottery money does good work in the communities - whether it's seen as economic development, recreation or infrastructure - they're all good things to help grow communities," says Joe Masi, Association of Manitoba Municipalities executive director.

Manitoba Lotteries Corporation - with a net income of \$235.4 million in 2003/04 - donated 10 per cent of VLT revenue directly to Manitoba municipalities. That amounted to \$13.4 million. What's more, an additional 25 per cent of VLT revenue is committed to community economic development projects. This amounted to \$35.6 million, and tremendous positive spin-off benefits.

"Clearly it's a revenue stream that (municipalities) get to build their communities and that's exactly what it's used for," says Masi.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT
Manitoba Lotteries Corporation supports rural communities through the Province's Rural Economic Development Initiative (REDI), which is funded by Manitoba Lotteries VLT revenue. Hometown Manitoba is a new program that is part of the REDI initiative and provides financial support for rural and northern community projects initiated by local communities, organizations and businesses looking to renovate and beautify community gathering areas, exterior public places and green spaces.

After receiving a Hometown Manitoba grant last year, Beautification put Binscarth on the map. Part of their community beautification was a new park, a project so stunning that Binscarth won the national Communities in Bloom award for communities with less than 500 residents.

Peggy Bradshaw, a town councillor and member of the Binscarth Bloomers says the award was a tribute to "unbelievable community involvement."

Another major facet of the REDI program is supporting small business owners and farmers with their business ventures. And by keeping commerce in Manitoba, the benefits trickle down to all of rural Manitoba.

When they purchased Manitoba Starch Producers in 2002, brothers Earl and Derek McLaren developed a business expansion plan with funding from the REDI program. Their business, in contract with all the major potato processors, involves the removal of starch products from water used in processing.

Business is booming. In only three years, this Corbarr family business expanded rapidly to supply markets throughout North America. Now they're giving back to the provincial economy.

"We are pretty proud to be right here, able to work in our own hometown and keep some jobs here," says Manitoba Starch Products president and CEO, Earl McLaren.

JOB CREATION
Again, when it comes to creating jobs, Manitoba Hotel Association president and CEO Jim Baker says VLT revenues support rural communities by highlighting the level of confidence for hotel services expansion. And Manitoba tourism profits when the hotel industry is prosperous.

"Because their operations have been assisted by VLT earnings, (hotels) are able to expand, to build new properties and to significantly remodel the properties they have," says Baker.

So whether it's the Hometown Manitoba programs that keep our towns beautiful or the economic confidence boost for rural businesses, VLT revenue supports our communities.

Yet he was able to take his less than mediocre life, and through perseverance, he would funnel his own experiences into his famous Charlie Brown cartoon strip with great success, as it turned out.

"It takes great perseverance to achieve great accomplishments," she told the gathering

of fifty well wishers, honoring the students last week. "Today we honor the great perseverance in these students."

On a special note, MLA Gerald Hawranik was on hand to offer the MLA Citizen Award to grad Andrew Toews, an Elma resident who travelled to Lac du Bonnet regularly to take courses.

Following the Lac du Bonnet graduations, ceremonies moved to Manitou Lodge in Pine Falls, where Empower Education Centre saluted the 2005 graduating class of eleven

students. Once again MLA Gerald Hawranik was on hand, this time offering advice to the adult students as they move on with their new High School diplomas.

"In life, people can take away wealth and possessions," he surmised. "But no one can take away your education. What you have achieved here today, belongs exclusively to you."

The Tuesday one-hour afternoon ceremony wound up with a luncheon for students, teachers and guests.

LAKE WINNIPEG WATER LEVEL INFORMATION

June 2005

The following information is provided by Water Stewardship, Province of Manitoba, and published by Manitoba Hydro as a courtesy to those interested in the outlook for water levels on the lake.

Lake Winnipeg Level Forecast

On June 15, the wind eliminated level of Lake Winnipeg was 715.4 feet and rising slowly. The chart below shows the water levels on Lake Winnipeg for the past two years, the monthly extremes that have occurred since 1913, and a range of future water levels for the next three months. The forecast shown "BEST ESTIMATE" will occur if present inflow trends continue. The remaining two forecasts show the range of possible levels given extreme wet or dry conditions. The lake's level is expected to peak in mid-July and then decline during the following month. Of course, the lake's level may go up or down, depending on the precipitation.

Special Notice

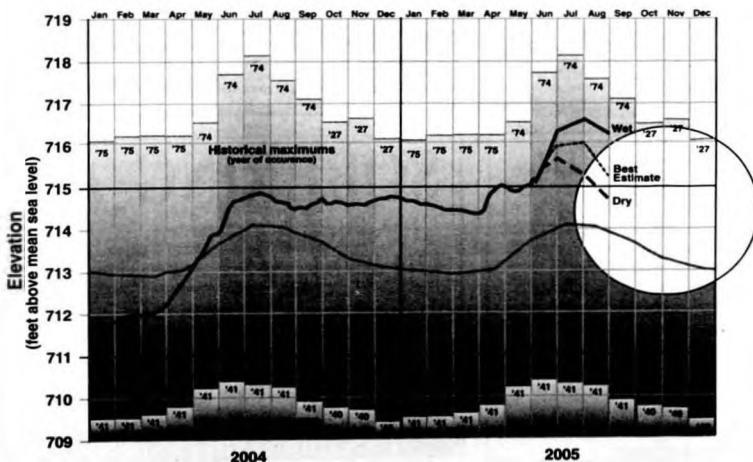
The current conditions on Lake Winnipeg are the result of large amounts of precipitation in the Lake Winnipeg Drainage Basin. Inflows from the Winnipeg River, Red River, Saskatchewan River and local tributaries are well-above average. Lakeside residents and cottagers may want to take whatever steps necessary to protect docks or other facilities that may be affected by high water.

Manitoba Hydro has been operating its Jenpeg Generating Station and Control Structure at maximum outflow since January 2005 and will continue to operate in this mode until water levels recede below 715 feet.

Lake Winnipeg Regulation

The outflow of Lake Winnipeg is regulated by Manitoba Hydro by a control structure at Jenpeg Generating Station on the Nelson River near the outlet of the lake. While the wind eliminated level of Lake Winnipeg is between 711 and 715 feet, Manitoba Hydro regulates the outflows from the lake as required for power production purposes. During periods when the wind eliminated water level is above 715 feet, Manitoba Hydro must operate the control structure at Jenpeg in such a manner to effect maximum outflow possible under the circumstances then prevailing until the water level of Lake Winnipeg recedes to 715 feet. During periods when the water level is below 711 feet, Manitoba Hydro must operate the control structure at Jenpeg as ordered by the Minister of Conservation. In addition to the control structure at Jenpeg, the Lake Winnipeg Regulation project included the removal of restrictions in existing channels and the excavation of new channels to improve outflow capacity from the lake. This work increased the maximum outflow capacity of the lake by up to 50 per cent, meaning that in high water periods or high electricity demand periods, more water can be passed out of the lake more quickly than prior to Lake Winnipeg Regulation. Therefore, extended high water periods and flooding around the lake are significantly reduced.

'Power Couple' receive Wildlife Habitat Forest Stewardship Award

Ottawa, June 13, 2005 - Partners Stu Jansson and Cherry White of the Manitoba Trappers Association have been granted awards under Wildlife Habitat Canada's Forest Stewardship Recognition Program.

Jean Cinq-Mars, President of Wildlife Habitat Canada, presented the awards during the Fur Institute of Canada's Conservation Workshop at its Annual General Meeting in Gatineau, Quebec on June 4, 2005. The Forest Stewardship Recognition Program recognizes outstanding stewardship and conservation efforts in Canada's forests and has honoured more than 100 individuals and organizations since its inception in 1998.

Dean Berezanski, Provincial Furbearer Manager for Manitoba Conservation, described Stu and Cherry as "the eastern Manitoba trapping profession's 'power couple'." "They both have impressive resumes involving stewardship activities in the forest ecosystem," said Berezanski. "Their contribution is made even more significant by the fact that much of their time is volunteered."

Stu has had a registered trapline in the Lac du Bonnet area for many years and is on the board of directors of both the Manitoba Trappers Association (MTA) and the Manitoba Model Forest and serves on many committees and projects. He also runs the non-profit MTA Trap Sales, where he provides considerable advice on trap technology to ensure that furbearer use is humane, sustainable, and maintains biodiversity. Stu participates on advisory committees for forestry companies Tembec and Louisiana Pacific, and is treasurer of the Canadian National Trappers Alliance (CNTA). He was elected to the FIC Board of Directors on June 4th and invited to sit on the Communications and Conservation Committees.

As MTA's Office Manager, Cherry coordinates her organization's input on many issues, especially use of other forest resources as they pertain to furbearers, and ensures that the principles of resource stewardship are met. She is also very active with the CNTA.

Cherry and Stu were both involved with the East Side Planning Initiative (ESPI), a high profile and broad-scale land use process for the huge stretch of boreal forest between Lake Winnipeg and the Manitoba-Ontario border. Trapping is a guiding force behind much of this land use planning, as the traplines have been used to mark out the traditional territory of the remote

communities on the East Side. Cherry's unique role with the MTA qualified her for appointment to the Round Table for ESPI and she represented trappers on one of its working groups. Stu sat on two working groups, representing MTA.

Mr. Cinq-Mars presented Cherry and Stu with limited edition prints of New Morning, a beautiful painting by British Columbia artist Don Li-Leger.

"The Manitoba Trappers Association has been a long-time strong supporter of the Fur Institute of Canada," said Chairman Bruce Williams. "Both Stu and Cherry have always been ready to share their

considerable knowledge and experience and to assist in so many ways. Public knowledge of the wide range of trappers' contributions continues to grow. These Stewards of the Land ensure that wildlife will con-

tinue to occupy their rightful places in Canada's ecosystems, and it is good to see their important work recognized. "Congratulations, Stu and Cherry, on receiving these well deserved awards."

Pro Tips

Custom fitting is one of the most important aspects of an individual playing golf with any hope of success. But what exactly is custom fitting?

Custom fitting is the practice of ensuring that a club or set of clubs is actually suited to the individual who will be using them. Factors that are

considered when custom fitting are:

Club length. If the club length is not correct, it will greatly affect the quality of contact made with the golf ball, and the ball flight and direction of the shot. The most common example of this is women using clubs that are too short for them. Women's golf clubs are made one inch shorter than men's clubs, but why would a woman who is 5'4" use clubs that are shorter than

a man who is the same height? Every person is built differently, with long limbs or short limbs, a long or short torso, etc. But a club that is too short for someone will cause them to slouch over at the address position, which will make them pick the club up instead of swinging it away. This will result most often in a shot that does not go very far, and goes off to the right (a slice) for right-handed golfers. This is if the individual even makes solid contact. A short club can also be the reason for "topping" the ball. If you only catch the top part of a 1-1/4 inch ball and your clubs are one inch shorter than they should be, what do you think a longer club will help with?

Grip size. We have been told that a grip has to fit our individual hand size, but we must first analyze the ball flight before doing so. A grip that is too big can reduce the speed in which our hands react. An example is if you hook a golf

ball, a larger grip will help minimize this problem. A smaller grip will help reduce a slice by a golfer by promoting his or her hands to react faster through the impact zone. But simply fitting a grip to the size of one's hands is not taking into consideration other swing faults that are determining the ball flight. A correct custom fit can take into consideration all elements involved with determining grip size.

Shaft flex. Everyone swings at different speeds depending upon their coordination and strength. Also to be determined is the manner in which someone swings a club. While ideally a club should be swung at a consistent tempo, we all know that most times we are trying to swing as hard as we can from the top of our backswing through the ball. If a shaft is too flexible for an individual, they will have a difficult time keeping the ball flying straight. A consistent paced fast swing will result in a hook


with a flexible shaft, while an inconsistent paced fast swing may "banana slice" a ball with a shaft that is too flexible. The height and distance a ball flies is also affected by shaft flex. A flexible shaft will hit a ball higher and farther, but not as accurate. A stiffer shaft will hit a ball lower and straighter, but not as far.

Lie angle. This is one of the most important factors to club fitting, but sadly the least utilized factor by most golfers. The lie angle of a golf club at impact will determine the direction a ball starts to fly in. If it is the correct lie angle, the ball will start flying straight, but if the club is not at the correct lie angle at impact, the ball will start out crooked, and usually remain flying that way. Most people believe that the lie angle of a club at the address position is the way to fit a club, but the club is not at that position at impact.

Club head design. The shape of a club and its characteristics are often very different than most other club heads. Some club heads can hit a ball higher, some are designed for maximum forgiveness, and some are designed for playability, which may only appeal to a better golfer who does not need forgiveness. Most tour players do not miss a shot, so they use clubs that are not forgiving enough for us mere mortals.


Being custom fitted by a qualified individual will combine all of these factors to produce the best set of clubs suited to you. While most people buy clubs "off the rack", this practice will not maximize your potential. The Pine Falls Golf Club sells both name brand and component equipment, but all clubs can be fitted to you.

Lac du Bonnet RCMP Report

enter police located a female who had taken an overdose of pills. She was transported to local hospital for treatment.

PINE FALLS - a female was arrested and a warrant of arrest executed. The woman had violated parole conditions and was returned to a correctional facility.

June 25:
FORTALEXANDER - police attended a residence to remove an unwanted female. Upon arrival the woman had left the residence. No further police action was required.

- police were called to a residence when a male attempted to smash a window. The man was not located investigation continues.

- a female was assaulted by an ex spouse. Police finally were able to apprehend the man and charged him accordingly. The male was wanted previously for assault involving the same female. Investigation continues.

under investigation.

BEACONIA - investigation continues into a complaint of harassment.
