# Lake Winnipeg water rising

Reeve says province must do more to avert major damage

Record high water levels and the certainty of autumn rainfall has communities along the south basin of Lake Winnipeg nervous. Already the communities of Gimli and Winnipeg Beach have put out the call for volunteers to help sandbag this week before the dreaded north winds of autumn begin to blow, which in turn creates high swells and a tidal effect where the south basin water level rises even further. And because the unusually high water level isn't something that is expected to go away soon, local officials are looking for a longterm solution from the province rather than the sandbag band-aids that are being put in place now.

Last week Premier Gary Doer visited Gimli and announced an \$8 million dollar emergency aid package for the region, but according to RM of Alexander Reeve, George Harbottle, more needs to be done.

"I don't think these high water levels are going to recede anytime soon and we'll likely be faced with the same problem again next year," Harbottle said earlier this week. "If you

look at the Gimli situation, they're going to need something like a million sandbags and this is a lot of work and a lot of expense. What we have to do is focus on upgrading the dyke system"

Harbottle points out that most of the beach population are Winnipeg residents who own cottages. Once they close up the cabins for the season and return to the city, all that is left is a spotty population of residents made up mostly of senior citizens.

"We just don't have the volunteers to get the job done," he said. "We have to watch Belair, Grand Beach and Traverse Bay and that's a big area to cover."

Currently there are dykes in place to protect vulnerable areas along the south basin of Lake Winnipeg, but because of new development and a lack of maintenance, portions of the dykes need immediate repair and Harbottle says the region just doesn't have the resources to complete the work in time.

"The province really isn't concerned about bank erosion because it's a natural process,"

Harbottle noted. "Right now we have 42 buildings in peril due to erosion and we have to act quickly."

Harbottle says that flooding and bank erosion causes serious property damage each year but this year is developing in a

such a way, it could be especially devastating.

"We're already at record water levels and you can bet

we'll see more rain and north winds this fall," Harbottle surmised. "It's shaping up to be a pretty bad year all around."

## Volunteers needed to make sandbags

Call 1-866-Manitoba to Volunteer

Volunteers are asked to call 1-866-Manitoba (1-866-626-4862) to register and offer their assistance with sandbagging efforts in beach communities around Lake Winnipeg. Volunteers are needed to begin filling sandbags.

Affected municipalities will contact registered volunteers as needed. Sandbagging will protect against potential wind storms that could push high lake levels even higher. Severe wind storms that can

cause significant waves usually occur in October and November. The province has committed \$8 million to other flood-proofing efforts around the lake including construction of earthen dikes.

Residents along the southern basin of Lake Winnipeg will be contacted by their local municipality if there is a need to take any steps to protect their property. Residents with questions about how water levels may affect their area should contact their municipality directly



## Outdoor Marihuana grow operation uncovered

RCMP RELEASE

The Winnipeg River RCMP along with members of the Department of Natural Resources, seized a quantity of marihuana from an outdoor grow along the east shore of Lake Winnipeg.

On Thursday morning September 8, 2005 at about 10:00am as a result of an ongoing investigation, RCMP investigators attend to a remote shoreline approximately 5 miles north of Black River First nation. An area known as Poplar Point (not the town). Upon arrival, a 48 year old Hillside Beach man was

located at the grow and taken into custody.

Investigators harvested and seized approximately 250 mature marihuana plants. Also seized was a plastic tub containing freshly harvested marihuana.

The seized marihuana was then transported by boat back to the docks at Black River and then to the RCMP Detachment at Power-view-Pine Falls.

The suspect was released on a Promise to Appear for a later court date on a charge of Cultivation under the Controlled Drgus and Substances Act.

# Terry Fox Run coming to a school near you

## Charity foundation still growing after quarter of a century

He is arguably the greatest Canadian hero and easily the most recognized Canadian name world-wide. No, he wasn't a professional hockey player or a clumsy comedic Canadian actor. Simply put, Terrance Stanley Fox is an international icon in the ongoing fight to find a cure for cancer, and he is as famous in Seoul Korea and Singapore as he is in his native Winnipeg suburb of Transcona where he lived before moving with his parents to Port Coquitlam BC as a youth.

Terry Fox began his Marathon of Hope in St. John's Newfoundland on April 12, 1980, amid much skepticism and little fanfare. After all it isn't every day that an amputee takes up the challenge to run across Canada on one good leg and a prostheses. But over the next four months Terry Fox soon turned heads and his fund-raising efforts soon turned enormous profits, and as his marathon began to unfold, major television networks would feature daily news reports, updating his progress of 42 kms per day through the

eastern provinces while building excitement in the towns and cities in his path. The skepticism soon turned into overwhelming support.

His goal, he said at the time, was to collect one dollar for every resident living in Canada - roughly 24 million in 1980. Unfortunately he didn't realize that goal while out on the road as the Marathon of Hope was cut short on September 1 1980 just eighteen miles west of Thunder Bay, after his doctors detected that his cancer had spread to his lungs. The marathon might have been cut short but the monetary contributions certainly continued. Suddenly people were paying attention. In fact, the outpouring of sympathy and donation support grew by leaps and bounds over the following weeks as he lay in the cancer ward of the Royal Columbian Hospital in New Westminster British Columbia, and it wasn't long before his 24 million dollar dream was realized. And exceeded, as it turned out.

Over the last 25 years the Terry Fox Foundation has raised more than 360 million

dollars in aid of cancer research and the money just keeps coming. During the next week of September the Terry Fox Run will take place in most communities across Canada, the United States, and much of the world as more than 50 countries take part in the annual fund-raiser.

Here in the Eastman region, the Terry Fox Run will be held in Lac du Bonnet on Friday September 16, beginning at 11:00am on the Centennial School grounds. Normally the public runs take place on Sunday September 18, but holding

# West Nile Virus Update Terry Fox Run coming to town soon

Since last week's update, nine more Manitobans have tested positive for West Nile virus. This brings the total number of Manitobans who have tested positive for West Nile virus this year to 42.

Following investigations by public health officials, 32 human cases have been classified at this time.

\* Nine are probable cases of West Nile neurological syndrome. Seven of these individuals were admitted to hospital and two remain in hospital.

\* Twenty are classified as probable cases of West Nile non-neurological syndrome. These individuals did not require hospitalization.

\* Three are confirmed as asymptomatic cases of West

Nile virus. These cases were identified by Canadian Blood Services. The individuals did not show symptoms.

The remaining 10 cases are currently under investigation to determine their status.

The first human death related to West Nile virus infection in Manitoba this year was reported on Aug. 31. The role West Nile virus played in this death is still under investigation.

The 32 classified cases reside within the boundaries of seven regional health authorities in southern Manitoba:

\* Winnipeg Regional Health Authority - 10;

\* Assiniboine Regional Health Authority - nine;

\* Central Regional Health Authority - seven;

\* Interlake Regional Health Authority - two;

\* South Eastman Regional Health Authority - two;

\* Brandon Regional Health Authority - one; and

\* North Eastman Regional Health Authority - one.

Further information on human cases will be posted on the website when it becomes available. Most of these human cases reflect exposures to West Nile virus infected mosquitoes during July and the first half of August. So far this

year, 1,730 people have been tested for WNV in Manitoba.

Current mosquito surveillance in southern Manitoba indicates the activity of *Culex tarsalis*, the main mosquito species that carries West Nile virus in Manitoba, was low in all regional health authorities during the week of Aug. 28 to Sept. 3.

Two West Nile virus positive mosquito samples were identified during the week of Aug. 28 to Sept. 3 in the Winnipeg and South Eastman regional health authorities.

Routine trapping for adult mosquitoes will end this week in most communities. As weather conditions are favourable, monitoring of adult mosquitoes will continue in some communities in southern Manitoba.

While the risk of exposure to infected mosquitoes is decreasing, mosquito surveillance shows there are still small numbers of infected mosquitoes in southern Manitoba. During early September, the importance of taking personal protective precautions when mosquitoes are active continues.

As daytime and evening temperatures become cooler, *Culex tarsalis* mosquitoes and other mosquitoes may become more active during the day as well as between dusk and dawn.

Manitobans can reduce the risk of mosquito bites by:

\* checking that door and window screens fit tightly and are free of holes;

\* reducing the amount of time spent outdoors whenever mosquitoes are active;

\* wearing light-coloured, loose-fitting clothing; and

\* using appropriate mosquito repellent.

## Child Support Recalculation Service

Revise your child support payments to reflect income changes

If you would like to have your child support recalculated based on new income information, contact Manitoba Justice concerning their Child Support Recalculation Service.

To take advantage of this service:

- Both parents must live in Manitoba
- One of the parents must get a court order authorizing the recalculation
- In most cases, the child support order must be based on the actual income of the parent paying child support
- The order must contain an amount based on the *Child Support Guidelines* tables

The service only applies to the recalculation of child support orders made under Manitoba's *Family Maintenance Act*. Recalculations of orders under the federal *Divorce Act* are currently being discussed with the federal government.

## What you need to know about

### virus

Human cases of West Nile virus have been detected in Manitoba. Most people who are bitten by an infected mosquito do not become ill, and for those who do, the symptoms are usually mild. In some cases, serious illness and death can occur.

### Reduce your risk

Manitobans are at greatest risk of being bitten by a West Nile virus-infected mosquito in July, August and September. You can reduce your risk of being bitten by:

- reducing the time you spend outdoors between dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active;
- wearing light-coloured, loose fitting, long-sleeved shirts and long pants when you are outside;
- applying an appropriate insect repellent; and
- checking that your door and window screens fit tightly and are free of holes.

### Reduce standing water – reduce mosquitoes

The fewer *Culex* mosquitoes that hatch, the lower the risk of West Nile virus. *Culex* mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water. Mosquito eggs left in standing water, even small amounts allowed to stand for a week, can develop into adult mosquitoes.

To reduce the places around your home where *Culex* mosquitoes may lay their eggs, eliminate unnecessary standing water by:

- regularly cleaning and emptying your eavestroughs, pool covers etc.;
- cleaning and emptying your bird baths weekly;
- ensuring that openings in rain barrels are covered with mosquito screening or tightly sealed around the downspout; and
- making sure your yard is clear of children's toys, pet bowls, old tires or other debris that collect water.

## Whiteshell wild rice harvest

Manitoba Conservation has announced the opening date for the 2005 wild rice harvest in Whiteshell Provincial Park is Sept. 5.

High water levels during the spring and early summer throughout the Whiteshell have resulted in a poor crop on all lakes.

Only hand picking will be allowed at Little Whiteshell Lake for the first 10 days of the season. It will then open to mechanical harvesting. This change was approved by First Nations representatives in 2004.

The following lakes in the Whiteshell are divided into two

categories for harvesting purposes:

- Lone Island, Mallard, Crowduck and Brant lakes as well as the portion of the Whiteshell River from Jessica to Mallard lakes are set aside for hand harvesting only.

- Mechanical equipment may be used on Heart, Echo, Little Echo, South Cross, Jessica, Betula and White lakes.

Details on producing lakes and general regulations including fees are available for rice harvesters from Manitoba Conservation offices at Lac du Bonnet, Rennie, Seven Sisters and West Hawk Lake.

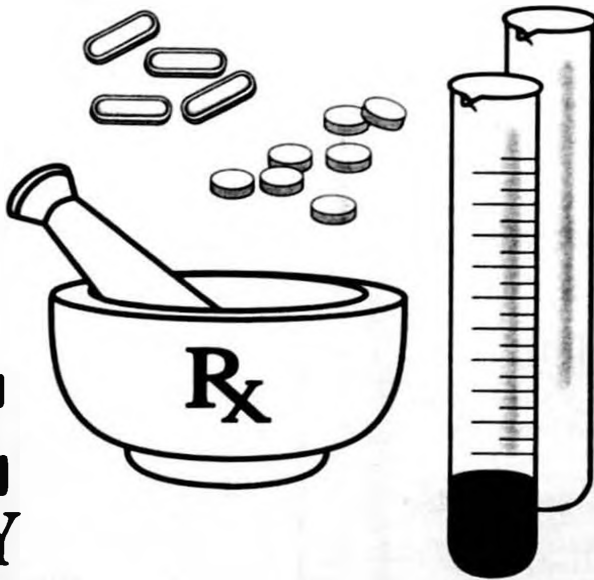

# Getting kids to help around the house

The following article has been reprinted with permission from the Canadian Association of Family Resource programs.

Parents usually expect their children to share household chores. But how much help should you expect from children? When they are small isn't it faster and less frustrating to do the chores yourself?

### An investment in the future

Most parents don't look to three- and four-year-olds for any real help around the house. But they realize that the time and effort that goes into teaching young children to contribute to the family workload is an important investment in building a spirit of co-operation and responsibility. They sometimes discover, however, that dealing with their own impatience is the toughest part.

### Start when they are young

At what age should kids pick up their toys, make their beds, or wash the dishes? It varies with age, ability and interest. Find small, uncomplicated jobs for young children. Even

three-year-olds can do something to help. Usually they not only are delighted to do their part but feel left out if everyone has a job except them. If a task seems too complex or difficult try breaking it into smaller steps and celebrate the completion of each step. As he or she finishes on part of the task, it becomes easier to do the next.

### Reasonable expectations

Very young children cannot straighten up their own rooms, but you can teach them to pick up toys and help make the bed. Be consistent in reminding kids to put away their belongings.

Don't expect young children to do things independently. When a child can do a task without help, parents often assume he or she can be responsible for doing it alone. But the child may not be ready because she hasn't yet developed the habit. And that usually takes much longer than developing the skill.

### Age, ability and preferences

Switch jobs around occasionally so children can expand

their skills. Share unattractive and tedious chores and rotate the hard or unpleasant jobs. Some children prefer to change jobs while others like to repeat the same activity again and again. Offer choices where possible, but tasks should not fit traditional sex stereotypes. Everyone physically able to do so should help with dishwashing, setting and clearing the table, raking, etc.

### Offer praise

Children learn better from encouragement than from criticism. The simplest form of encouragement is praise. Be specific in your praise. "Wow, you picked up your toys all by yourself," or "You carried that heavy package all the way home!" is preferable to "That's a good boy," because it gives the child a clearer idea of what he did well. Don't wait to give praise; offer it promptly. You can even praise the effort a child is making before the job is completed. For example, "I like how you put the storybook away before I even asked."

### Offering reinforcers

Most people, whether adults

or children, need help beginning new habits or learning new skills. Offering a suitable reward can be an effective inducement. It may be something tangible or it may be extra time with you spent reading a favorite story or playing a game.

A visual progress chart is fun and helps children remember to do their chores. Create your own and every time your child cleans his room or performs some other task, he can colour in one square. When all squares are filled in, he gets a treat.

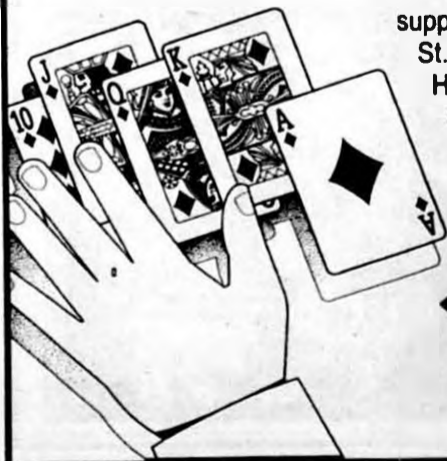

# ECHOES FROM THE Heart

## A Mountain of Laundry

My husband and I became foster parents after we had been married for two years. Our first placement was two little boys, brothers, who we adopted after they were with us for eighteen months. When our boys were two and three, we were asked to take one and three-year-old sisters into our home. For the following two years we had our own little in-house, full-time daycare.

After the girls had been with us for about six months, I attempted to get involved in a Bible study group at our church. One thing or another always seemed to prevent me from attending. I was feeling a little discouraged, but I'd purchased devotional tapes and a study guide and thought I could keep up with the Bible study by myself at home.

One afternoon, after I'd put the children down for their naps, I tackled a mountain of laundry that had piled up on the sofa and needed folding. As I was folding, I began discussing my plight with the Lord. "You know, Lord, I've started attending this Bible study and I'm trying to find time for You and everything I need to do, but I just can't seem to find any

time. I've tried getting up before daylight, but one of the kids always hears me and gets up wanting my attention and by bedtime I'm exhausted. I guess I could do them during naptime, but that's the only time I have to get caught up with the housework...mainly the laundry. I seem to be able to keep up with most everything but this laundry! Well, I guess You know all about it. You gave me all of these little kids to care for and You know they need clean clothes to wear. You know how much work this takes and I know You understand."

The following Sunday my husband and I were sitting in Sunday School class waiting for the teacher to begin, when our family's adopted grandmother, Betty, came and sat down beside me. Betty is a widow who has raised five children. She's a wonderful woman who's always helping someone, and had personally blessed our family on many occasions, but I was totally unprepared for what she had to say on that particular day!

She leaned toward me and said, "I have a proposition for you." My curiosity was aroused. "O.K., what is it?" I answered back. She sweetly and softly replied, "I really think this is the Lord, but would you let me do your laundry?" As I sat gaping at her with my mouth hanging open, my mind

was racing trying to think who could I have told about my laundry situation. I knew I hadn't mentioned it to anyone, not even my husband, Rodney. "Do you know how much laundry I have?" I whispered back as my eyes started to fill. "Honey, I've raised five children and I know how much laundry you have," was her response. Then she continued, "You know, what you and your husband are doing raising these little children is wonderful, but I know it's hard work. I'm an old woman and I don't watch other people's children anymore, but I can do your laundry. You just have Rodney drop it off on his way to work, and pick it up on his way home. I'll wash it, dry it, iron it, fold it; whatever is needed."

Shame on me, because the whole time she was speaking, I was thinking, "Oh, Lord, not the underwear! I can't send our underwear to someone else to do!"

Betty was still talking, "Last week I noticed you up on the platform during praise and worship and you looked very tired. I was thinking about you all week and then I felt the Lord

telling me to, 'Ask Ronni if she'll let you do her laundry,'" then she finished with, "Now, don't you rob me of this blessing!"

At the time I didn't know how to respond. Not wanting to hurt Betty's feelings, I let her know I would think about her offer. Even though I had poured out my heart about how difficult it was to keep up and how I missed my devotional time with Him, I was unprepared for God to actually do something about it. He had given me the task of caring for these little ones and I was a little put out that He'd taken me seriously when I said I was having trouble keeping up. So I thought, "If I just get a little more organized, I can take care of this myself."

As I walked in and surveyed the laundry room a couple of weeks later, I sagged against the washer. The mountain of laundry hadn't diminished a bit with my efforts to take care of things myself. As a matter of fact, it was now bigger than ever. "Well, Lord," I said, "I guess I could send everything but the underwear."

Very clearly, I heard that still

small voice say, "When I ask you for your dirty laundry, I want all of it, even the underwear."

That's when I broke. That mountain of laundry now represented the mountain of pride in my life. Who was I to look disdainfully on a gift offered in love? As I picked up the phone my eyes were filling with tears and when I heard sweet little Betty's voice on the other end, my own voice shook as I said, "Betty, do you still want to help me with my laundry?" My tears quickly turned to laughter at her ready response of, "Bring it on over, Honey, bring it on over!"

Our clothes were never cleaner, brighter, or less wrinkled than during the almost two years that Betty faithfully and lovingly did our laundry. Then when our little foster daughters were placed in their "forever home" through adoption, we both knew it was time for me to resume the task, and although she no longer does our laundry, our friendship remains strong. She laughed one day when I told her I wanted to be just like her when I grew up. I still do.
