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## Sharpe wins tune-up in Winnipeg

It was barely enough time to work up a sweat but Larry (Razor) Sharpe of Pine Falls was happy to get some fight time nonetheless, after knocking Winnipegger Darren Kenny around the boxing ring at the Winnipeg Convention Centre on Friday night.  
The convention centre boxing card, dubbed 'Season's Beatings,' unfortunately lived up to it's billing for the out-classed Kenny, who took multiple body shots from Sharpe for two rounds before falling to the canvas and ending the bout in the second round.  
"In the second round he started to raise his hands, so I went to the body and he didn't like the body shots," Sharpe told

the media following the match.  
No doubt Kenny seemed to agree after he first hit the canvas early in the second round, primarily due to those shots to the ribs. Looking a little dazed, Kenny was able to find his legs and stand long enough to take a few more blows to belly before calling it a night midway through the second round.  
"I was hoping to get a little more work," Sharpe conceded after the referee ended the bout. "My last two fights went ten rounds and I was hoping this would go the full six."  
Sharpe says he went into Friday's match with the same training and the same mind set he would have taken into to any fight, including a ten-round title match. As it turned out, his conditioning and training was too much for Darren Kenny.  
Sharpe's record now stands at 14-2-0, while his dazed opponent falls to a 5-25-2 record.  
This latest bout over the weekend was not a title match, but rather a tune-up for bigger things to come for Sharpe. The current Canadian Middle-weight Champion says he has plans to be in Montreal this

## Maskwa Snowmobile Club is getting out of the grooming business

After one General Meeting and one Executive meeting it was a unanimous vote by the Club to discontinue grooming the 170 km's of trail.  
Last season we had an operating cost of \$24,000, this included a new transmission for the tractor, fuel and some cat work. This fall we sent the tractor back to the shop hoping they could find the problem we have been having with

the steering. Once the shop did the inspection they came back to us with the bad news that the rear end needed some major work and all the fluids and pumps would need to be changed because they were contaminated from the rear end filings. The final bill for this work came to \$16,000. We received only \$13,000 from the Snofund from last years Snopass sales, which is about average that the Maskwa re-

ceives each year, using the formula, the number of passes sold & km of trail. So once we paid the bill of \$16,000 that leaves our bank balance at a big fat \$0. We operate on an annual budget of \$7,000, hoping we have no breakdowns or surprises. So you can see why the decision had to be made to idle the groomer.  
So now we have contacted

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# Fishing Derby Put On Ice

Lac du Bonnet Ice Fishing Challenge cancelled until further notice

It was the jewel of the long Lac du Bonnet winter, where hundreds of anglers would spill open their wallets and party till hell froze over. Hell just froze over.

At least that's way it seems as organizers of the Lac du Bonnet Ice Fishing Challenge announced last week that they are not coming back. Ever.

The Winnipeg organizers, owners of Ernie's Bait and Tackle, blamed declining attendance combined with new regulations brought in by Manitoba Conservation, where anglers would have to immediately through back Pickerel with a length of eleven inches or less. Also the new rules stipulate that drilled holes cannot be located over water with a depth of 25 feet or more. In deeper water, when fish are pulled to the surface, damage can occur to the air sack through rapid expansion which could prove fatal.

Attendance figures are also a concern, where the number of entries have declined over the last few years. Last year's event was pegged at 1,750, down 100 entries from the year before. The number was also drastically down from the 3,700 hundred anglers that entered the event in 1999.

Despite the decline, it's safe to say the March event regularly brought up to two-thousand thirsty anglers to Lac du Bonnet for a weekend of hee-

hoo, and somewhere along the way, they would find time to fish and perhaps win the \$20,000 dollar first place prize. The loss for Lac du Bonnet businesses, which translates into tens of thousands of dollars, is a definite blow to the local business community. Besides the obvious hotel room revenues and bar receipts, the absence of a few thousand anglers will be felt all the way from the local high school, right down to the local gas bar and convenience store. The Lac du Bonnet Lions Club, which worked every year in preparation of the event, regularly enlisted the graduating class at the local senior school to help drill the three or four thousand fishing holes needed to stage the event. In return the Lions would donate a sizable sum of money to grad committee.

The local community centre will also feel the pinch. Although the centre is offered free of rent for the awards portion of the event, the centre would retain all bar revenues, which is always an impressive figure when 500 or more anglers show up for refreshments.

"There is just so much government red tape being thrown around," community centre board member Gene Obirek said after hearing of the cancelled derby. "I know people are upset because anytime you have 1,700 people come into your community, most busi-

nesses will benefit."

Obirek is also confused at the new regulations brought in by Conservation, where it is mandatory to toss back Pickerel eleven inches or less.

"If you look on your 2005 fishing licence, it clearly states that you're allowed to keep any Pickerel sixteen inches or less," Obirek pointed out. "So why can't they keep the eleven inch Pickerel to weigh-in if you can keep them when you're fishing any other time?"

So far local organizations are quietly discussing the possibility to host the event on a smaller scale but nothing definite has been made public. The Lac du Bonnet event draws anglers from Ontario and the bordering States and has a wide reputation throughout the province of Manitoba. Obirek agrees that it could still function as a money-maker for local concerns but says the volunteers who have worked to host the event in the past are

running out of energy.

"It's always the same people who are out there working to prepare for the derby and quite frankly, these people are getting tired," Obirek noted. "These things take a lot of planning and it would take a community effort to make it work."

Meanwhile the Kaplen family of Ernie's Bait and Tackle will be looking to move ahead with smaller derby events this winter, likely to be held on the Red River, north of Winnipeg

summer, training for bigger fights with bigger prize purses. One option handed to Sharpe earlier this year was a commonwealth match in England, which was to be held sometime this month. The overseas bout was cancelled, however, when his opponent suffered a training injury, but according to Sharpe, that might have worked out for the better.

"Right now my plate is pretty full, with working and coaching at school," Sharpe said. "And I've got two kids at home and another on the way, so it was better for me in the long run that it was postponed." Ideally, Sharpe says, the fight might fit better into his

schedule if it was held later next spring or summer. He says he plans to take some parental leave from his school position to help out at home, and in the meantime, he might be able to lend a little more time to train for the world-class fight in England.

"It's definitely an option (the commonwealth fight) and obviously it would be a greater advantage if I could train over

the spring and summer months before I get back into the ring, so timing could be the deciding factor whether I take the fight," Sharpe said.

Meanwhile Sharpe will work to stay razor sharp over the winter months, and if nothing else, he can still look forward to another bout in Winnipeg - likely in April - to help keep him focussed on the fight game.

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# Blues keep streak alive

Perfect start to the season extended with win over Gimli

Can anyone stop the Blues? That's the buzz around the South Interlake Senior League this season as the Lac du Bonnet squad continues to steam-roll opponents. This past Saturday it was Gimli who got greased at the Lac du Bonnet Arena, where the Blues produced another offensive gem while beating the Wolves 7-3 in front of another enthusiastic home crowd.

As it happened, the Blues fell behind early in the first period, but that would have no actual bearing on the game itself as Lac du Bonnet quickly went to work and shelved four consecutive goals to take a 4-2 lead into the second intermission. The line of Reggie Goodfellow, Jamie Hickes and Jay Seymour opened the scoring for the Blues midway into the first period, and then added another before the end of the first frame. Justin Edwards and Gord McLeod picked up singles to round out the 4-2 second period lead. But while it was Lac du Bon-

net who dominated the scoresheet, the Blues' headcoach says the game was a lot closer than the score indicated.

"That was the first real competition we've had so far this season, where both teams made some great plays," Blues' coach, Jeff Seifried said after the game. "Jason (Leroy) played super for us in net, and I think that made the difference."

The third period was all Blues again, starting with an unassisted effort by Cam Sokoloski, followed closely by another Blues goal by Aaron Wold, lifting the hometown team to a commanding 6-2 lead.

And seeing as how the Goodfellow line opened the floodgates in the first period, it was only fitting that Jay Seymour round out the scoring for the

Blues with assists going to Hickes and Goodfellow. In fact line mate Reggie Goodfellow led all team mates with a four-point evening on the strength of two goals and two assists, while Hickes and Seymour picked up three points each in the 7-3 win.

Gimli has improved over the last few weeks, according to the Lac du Bonnet coaching staff. Gimli has picked up some big talent since the Arborg Avalanche folded prior to the start of the hockey season. And while Seifried is still working different line combinations, when one line combines for ten points, something has to be going right.

"There was good pressure from both sides and our guys responded with a good game," Seifried

said. Leading the Blues with the four-point effort, Goodfellow now sits on top of the SIHL scoring race, tied with Dwayne Paul of Lake Manitoba Eagles with 24 points after this past weekend's action.

Not surprisingly, the Blues have five players sitting in the top ten positions in league scoring and this most recent win over Gimli further solidifies the Blues as the top team in the league with five consecutive wins to start the season. Over the five game winning streak, the Blues have scored 55 goals and have allowed

just 22, giving them an impressive scoring average of 11 goals per game.

The Blues are back in action again this weekend, when they travel to Beausejour on Saturday night, before making the trip over to Stonewall for the Sunday night tilt. The coaching staff say that the schedule over the next month isn't very kind to the Lac du Bonnet team, where the Blues will play six out of their next seven games on the road, but coach Seifried says the road stretch will be a good test to find out how good his team really is.

"This weekend will be a challenge for sure, be-

cause we'll be down to three lines for the first time this season," Seifried explained.

Also a concern, Seifried concedes, is the recent drop in attendance at the Lac du Bonnet Arena. Now that the team is away for most games over the next five weeks, Seifried says the team could use a packed house on December 17, when the Blues host the Lundar Falcons at the arena.


"Yes, we could sure use the revenue," Seifried chuckled. "Just look at all the bus trips we have to pay for over the next six weeks."



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# The Sounds of Cape Breton comes to Lac du Bonnet

John Gracie plays to a sparse crowd in Christmas special concert

Award-winning singer/songwriter John Gracie was in Lac du Bonnet this past weekend, but fewer than 200 paid to see the renowned Maritime singing star. The rare visit was part of the Christmas In November dinner offered by the centre, known previously as the "one-hundred club." Besides the dinner and performance, the community centre offered cash draws throughout the evening, where a lucky ticket holder could win anywhere from \$25 dollars, through to \$500 dollars for attending.

Despite the sparse crowd, community centre chairperson, Lois Byron, says that the show was phenomenal - even surprising to many in attendance. "It was a very good performance, and no doubt a lot of people who attended might

not have been familiar with John Gracie," Byron noted. "He has an awesome voice and anyone who attended knows exactly who John Gracie is now."

Gracie, a native Nova Scotian, has produced eight albums over the past ten years and has garnered several music awards, including the EMCA Artist of the Year on three separate occasions. National honours soon followed, where he received a Juno nomination in 2001 and the Best of Texas International Award for songwriter of the year.

The concert turnout was a bit of a disappointment to the community centre volunteers who gave up most of Friday and Saturday to decorate and prepare for the event. Events staged by the centre seem to

be attracting less public attention of late and that has the community centre board worried, considering recent events. Two weeks ago, the organizers of the Ice Fishing Challenge, held in Lac du Bonnet in March, said they were pulling the pin and moving the derby to Selkirk. The main reason cited was declining attendance and some new government red tape, where Pickrel 11 inches or under had to be thrown back immediately, without the benefit of being weighed-in.

After that announced cancellation, the Ski Club Bingo played its last game at the community centre last week as that organization is set to fold.

"It's pretty rough to lose the ski club bingo," Byron said this week. "That was a weekly

booking for the main hall and they also would donate proceeds back to help with our deficit, so they were a big supporter."

The ice-fishing derby also generated some decent revenue, even though the event came around just once a year.

"Our canteen sales were huge whenever the centre hosted the event," Byron reported. "It might seem funny but the canteen always did better than the bar during the awards, but together they always did well and we're going to miss hosting the derby."

Byron believes that the smoking ban played some part in declining attendance at the Laker's Ski Club Bingo. While all bingo events in Lac du Bonnet have suffered a decline, the First Nation's Bingo haven't

suffered at all. Some have even shown growth over the last year, and a regional casino on Brokenhead First Nations reports a flurry of business since it opened its door last year.

Meanwhile the local community centre is continuing its efforts to keep the doors open this winter. With rising propane costs and declining attendance to the staged events, the board says it needs continuing support, like a weekly bingo, if the facility is to remain viable.

"The next big event on the calendar is New Year's but I don't think we'll see any local New Year's Eve Ball this year," Byron conceded. "There's a shortage of volunteers and a shortage of paying customers, and we see that every time we stage a big event and no one shows up."

the neighboring clubs to take over the grooming of the trails, and they in return would receive monies from this year's Snopass sales for doing so, costing the Maskwa Club nothing. The Maskwa would still sell Snopasses, sign and brush trails. The Club would still exist. We would still maintain our shelters and Clubhouse for members and snowmobilers.

At press time we have an out of province club interested in purchasing the groomer. At this time the Club has no intention of buying another groomer, it just does not make good business sense to do so. Average cost for a used groomer is \$110,000; our club uses 30 hours a week for 12 weeks of the year, which is very costly.

Most of the trails will be groomed by other clubs, because all of our trails with the exception of the O'Vincent Trail (24 Rd) are destination trails that link to other towns and are part of the Trans Canada Snowmobile Trail. The Eastern Region could ill afford

not to have these trails on their network.

If anyone has any questions, or would like to talk about this, please give me a call at home or stop me on the street. I would be happy to discuss it with you, I wish I had a crystal ball, but a little birdy told me there are going to be some major changes in the future to how the Snofund is administered and allocated, that would be more beneficial to the average Snopass purchaser. A little hint, check what Saskatchewan is doing with \$500,000 a year compared to Manitoba's \$1,000,000: for the same

amount of groomed trail.

**REMEMBER IT IS STILL IMPORTANT TO PURCHASE A SNOPASS AND ASSIGN IT TO THE MASKWA CLUB,** the Maskwa will still be getting funding even though we are not grooming, we won't get \$13,000, but we may get \$1,000 to keep up the signing and brushing, etc. So purchase your Snopass this week for \$70.00 because after December 1<sup>st</sup> it is \$100. 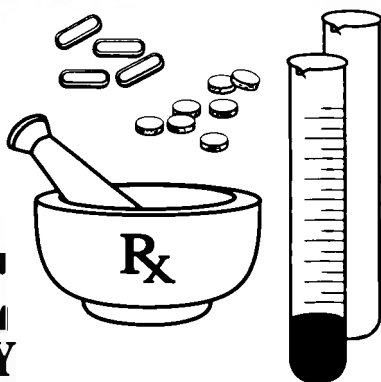

## Are You Still Growing?

Novelist Leo Tolstoy once said, "Everyone thinks of changing the world, but no one thinks of changing themselves." Most of us resist change but change is inevitable. If we don't change, we don't grow. If we don't grow we are merely existing and not really living. An old Irish proverb says, "You've got to do your own growing, no matter how tall your grandfather is." I have found from my own experience that if I don't have a plan in place to grow mentally, socially and spiritually, I'll remain the same. Actually I find myself in a rut and life becomes quite ho-hum. The road to reaching ones potential is always up hill and it take effort to keep growing. Let me share with you three things that have helped me to keep growing as a person:

## Laws Fail To Protect Children Against Predators

The need for tougher laws for those who prey on children was once again highlighted last week by a slap-on-the-wrist sentence handed down in an Ottawa court to a 32-year-old pornographer, Dale Beckham from Texas.

Mr. Beckham had met a 14-year-old boy over the Internet, and arranged to meet the boy at a hotel in Ottawa. The two had sex, and the boy also consented to Beckham taking pictures of him in the nude.

However, ten of eleven charges against the Texan man were dropped and he was sentenced to time served plus one day, largely because the age of sexual consent in Canada is 14 years of age. Ironically, this sexual predator will face tougher charges and penalties in Texas now that he has been deported.

This case is just one of many that demonstrate how Canada has become a destination for sex tourists who prey

on our children by exploiting weak Liberal laws.

Even though it is quite evident that raising the age of sexual consent would provide better protection for our children against sexual exploitation, the Liberal government continues to oppose raising the age of consent to at least sixteen.

In a recent memo to the Liberal caucus before a vote on the matter, the Minister of Justice, Irwin Cotler, made the preposterous claim that raising the age of consent would "criminalize kissing" between consenting teen-agers.

Mr. Cotler is either fear-mongering, or trivializing genuine concerns about the safety of our children. He was unable to list a single case of teenagers ever being charged for "consensual kissing" under our current age of consent laws – and raising the age of consent from 14 to 16 years of age would not change that reality

in any way.

The Conservative Party has consistently supported a close-in-age exemption that would ensure that sexual activities between consenting youth are not made illegal. We believe that the issue of consenting teenage sexuality is a social or family issue.

Most western democracies, including England, Australia, and New Zealand, have set the age of consent at 16 or higher without any suggestion that this would criminalize consensual behaviour between children or youth.

However the issue of sexual exploitation of youth by adults is quite another matter. The Minister of Justice should be listening to the men and women in law enforcement who actually deal with these criminals who prey on children. Police, children's advocacy groups, and provincial attorneys-general are all saying that we need to raise the age of consent to effectively prosecute these criminals.

It is time that the Minister takes this threat to our children seriously rather than trivializing the concerns of parents who want to see their children protected.

## Ambulance costs

Over the last couple of years I have had numerous complaints about the cost of Ambulance services. We live in a rural area, and therefore generally the distance travelled from our home to the hospital is much greater than it is in Winnipeg, and therefore the cost becomes greater. No one has complained to me about this cost, but I often receive complaints from Constituents who are required to take the ambulance from a local hospital into Winnipeg to receive service. It's these interfacility services that are contentious. Why should we pay for ambulance services from our own local hospital to another hospital if our local hospital does not have the service and it is medically necessary to take the ambulance? I believe these services should be covered by the general Health department budget – either cover these costs, or provide the service in our local hospitals! In rural Manitoba we are treated very differently than those in Northern Manitoba. If you are trans-

ported to Winnipeg by air ambulance (airplane or helicopter) to receive medical treatment you don't pay for the cost of the air ambulance – it's absolutely free! I'm not suggesting that the air ambulance be paid for by the user, but why should we in rural Manitoba pay for ambulance costs to be transported into Winnipeg when our own hospital does not provide the service?

A recent example of this occurred in Brandon when a Brandon mother received a \$808.00 ambulance bill to transport her 7 year old daughter to Winnipeg for emergency surgery in Winnipeg because no surgeon was available in Brandon. She refused to pay the bill on the grounds that the emergency surgery that her daughter needed ought to have been available in Brandon!

Those who live outside Winnipeg should not be treated like second class citizens!

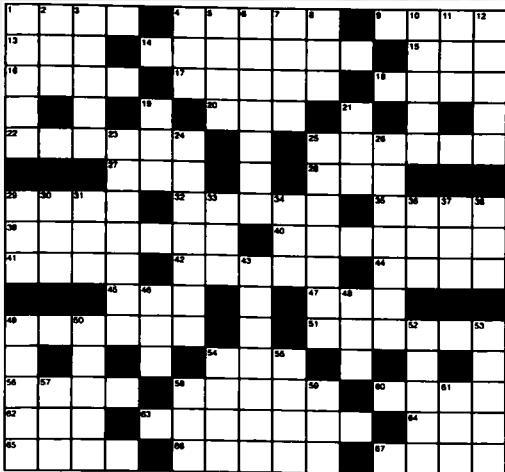

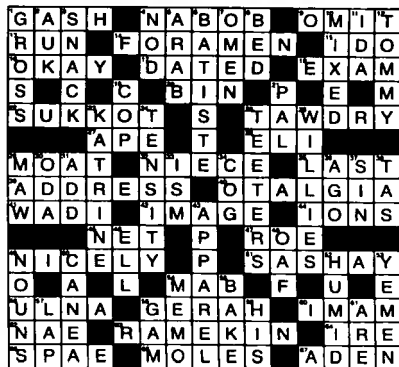

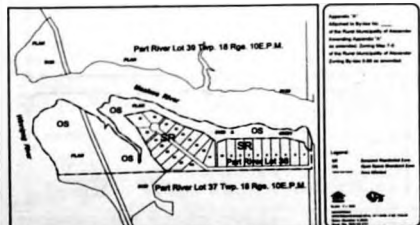

as more specifically described and shown outlined by a heavy broken line on Appendix "A", attached hereto, currently designated "A80" General Agricultural Zone, be hereby re-zoned to partially "SR" Seasonal Residential Zone and partially "OS" Open Space Shoreland Zone.
