OSB decision months away

A recent comment in the *Selkirk Journal* concerning the choice of a site for Ainsworth's proposed OSB mill in the Interlake appears to be the result of a misunderstanding.

The mill will be a joint venture between Ainsworth and the First Nations Forestry Limited Partnership, (FNFLP), which consists of thirteen First Nations located on either side

of Lake Winnipeg. The mill will manufacture Oriented Stranboard from aspen, which is abundant in the area. It is understood that two First Nations not participating in the FNFLP, Black River and Hollow Water, will also be partners in the venture.

Speaking to the *Selkirk Journal*, FNFLP President, Albert Sutherland, said the mill would be located within 50 km

LdB teen dies after car crash

On June 5th, 1006 at approximately 7:20 p.m. 16 year old Daniel James Epp of Lac du Bonnet was travelling eastbound on Smith Road in the R.M. of Lac du Bonnet when he lost control of the pickup he was driving and went off into a ditch.

Epp was transported to the Pinawa Hospital and then onto the Health Sciences Centre in Winnipeg where he succumbed to his injuries. Epp was a Grade 11 student at Lac du Bonnet Senior School. The Sunrise School Division Crisis Team is currently on scene at the school.

Cambrian is back on the job

Cambrian Construction is back in Pine Falls continuing the installation of the town's storm sewer system.

Before being interrupted by winter conditions the storm sewer along Maple from Balsam to the mill had been completed and was operational. Some other work had begun but had not been completed to a point where it could be put in use. Powerview/Pine Falls Public Works Supervisor, Larry Stinson, said he hopes the work will be completed and fully operational in six weeks

or so.

Stinson said there would need to be some remedial work done on boulevards in the construction area. He said he is hoping that roads will have settled sufficiently to allow repaving in the late summer of 2007.

The primary purpose of the storm sewer system is to prevent basement flooding in the spring or during heavy rain. Before Pine Falls merged with Powerview storm water, mixed with sanitary sewage, flowed through a pumping station in the mill yard and was pumped to the lagoon. In a storm the

pumping station overflowed to the river - taking with it a small amount of sanitary sewage. After the merger the town of Powerview/Pine Falls was told that this had to be changed so that no sanitary sewage flowed to the river. That has been accomplished in the new system by installing a completely separate storm water system and bypassing the pumping station. Much larger pipe has also been installed so that high flows can be accommodated without causing sewer backups. Storm water is also drained to natural drainage areas around Pine Falls.

of Selkirk. (Ainsworth have actually said it will be within 50 to 100km of Selkirk).

Paul Chief, a Brokenhead Ojibway First Nation Councilor, presumably using the 50 km figure, told the Journal Reporter that it would be located in the Interlake.

People in the Pine Falls region who have been working for nearly fifteen years to attract

an OSB mill to their area were somewhat alarmed when they read the *Journal* story, but it turns out to have been a misunderstanding. David Walker, an Ainsworth spokesman, said the decision is at least three or four months away. He said the location will depend on an analysis of the cost of getting the raw material to the mill, and that that process had barely begun. He said the company of-

officials will be visiting the region over the next five to six weeks and will be meeting with the St. George Community Development Corporation and with representatives of First Nations involved in the project partnership.

The OSB mill is expected to cost about \$250 million and employ up to 600 people, about 350 in the mill, and 250 in logging and transportation.

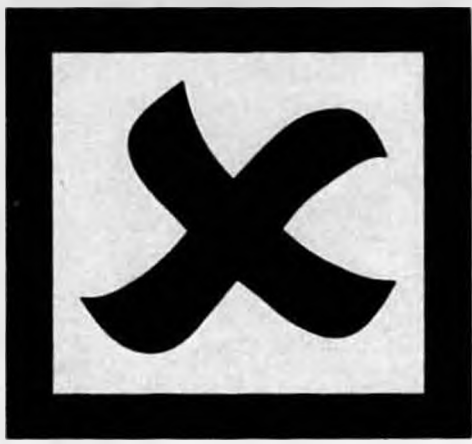

Community Volunteers in Action!

The Town of Powerview-Pine Falls put out a call to the community in February 2006 for volunteers to provide guidance and input regarding upgrading and maintaining the Boat Launch in the rock area.

The dock area was an item of concern that was discussed and negotiated with Tembec during the merger process. It was recognized by all as an important tourist attraction and as such, of great value to the entire region. Tembec has agreed to allow the community to continue using this site until they require the area for future expansion purposes.

A dedicated group of people came forward, and along with council representation formed a committee that have been meeting on a monthly basis since March. This committee is comprised of Willy Davidson, Ray Fawcett, Don Powell, Grant Cyr, Rene Dubé, Bob Stokes, Gerald Kraynk, Bev Dubé, Jack Shwaluk, Paul Pelland and Mayor Henry Ostrowski.

The committee established a Seasonal Pass Sticker with an annual fee \$20.00 as a way to fund the much needed repairs and these stickers are now available in eight locations in the community, Papertown Motel, Manitou Lodge, Papineau Motors, Chicken Chef, Clarks Corner, Broadlands Mall, Pine Falls Service Center and the Town Office.

Signage for the upper parking area and for the kiosk has been ordered and will be in

In Canada, it costs on average \$95 826.37 to imprison a young person for 1 year. If that money was made available to recreation practitioners, it could be used to offer that young person an opportunity to:

- 1 basketball
- 1 badminton racket

Finally we could provide the young person with transportation to and from the recreation activities by purchasing a bus pass, bicycle and bicycle helmet.

We would return to you approximately \$93 902.12 and a much happier healthier individual!

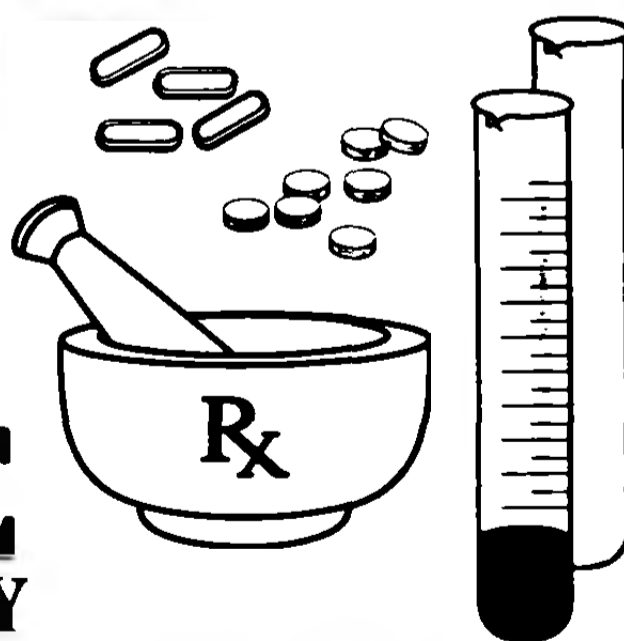

Nuclear energy is an important part of the energy mix that fuels our economy and this investment signals that Canada is prepared to deal with the environmental concerns raised by the utilization of nuclear energy.

Our new government has made a firm commitment to responsible development. It is a critical duty of any government to ensure a clean and healthy environment for the future. That's why, in addition to the funding announced, our overall strategy will contain a concrete action plan to clean up contaminated lands and nuclear waste, and to decommission outdated infrastruc-

ture. The public will be consulted to help develop the longer-term strategy as well.

I'm looking forward to working with Minister Lunn, and my provincial and municipal counterparts, to make sure that this funding translates into real benefits for the people of Pinawa, Lac du Bonnet and all Manitobans. I've already been in contact with Pinawa Mayor Len Simpson, and he too has expressed his pleasure at the commitment the federal government has made.

Canadians can have faith that our plan to deliver clean air, land, water and energy will address the challenges of the future. Our new government is prepared to deal with nuclear waste issues ignored by the previous government. The sad truth is that the previous government simply did not take the leadership role necessary to begin making progress at Whiteshell.

Health Care Administration

It was revealed that the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority has increased its administrative bureaucracy by 34% in the last 2 years alone. During the 1999 election campaign, the NDP promised to reduce health care administrative costs, promising to take money out of the board rooms and into the emergency rooms.

The Winnipeg Regional Health Authority's bureaucracy has expanded from 6 floors to 7 at 155 Carlton Street in Winnipeg. The administrative staff has grown from 244 in 2003 to 328 at the end of 2005, a 34% increase. How can the Province justify this administrative growth when we don't have enough doctors to cover shifts in our emergency rooms?

Resources are being taken from direct patient care and being placed into administra-

tion. While the administrative bureaucracy is ballooning, doctor shortages throughout Manitoba's emergency rooms continue to put patient safety at risk.

In addition, the salaries of the top eight administrative staff at the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority total \$1.6 Million. This money should not be spent on huge salaries, but it should be used to reduce wait times and to ensure patient safety.

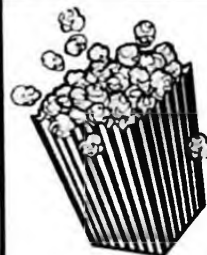

How Is Your Character?

Every one of us is a character. Every one of us has or lacks character. What is your character like? Is it consistent? Is it trustworthy? Abraham Lincoln once said, "Fame is a vapor - popularity is an accident - riches take wings. There is only one thing that endures and that is good character." Character is what we are when nobody is looking. It is that inner quality that does not change with circumstances. For example:

26 years ago we had a new house built and we signed a contract for the type of house the contractor would build for us. After we had signed the contract, we decided we wanted the family room in the basement finished as well. Rather than writing up a new contract we shook hands with the contractor for the price of \$2500. From the time that we had signed the contract to when the house was finished, building costs had gone up considerably, so much that the contractor lost money on the deal. Yet he finished the family room for the agreed price. This man had character. He was willing to keep his word rather than blemish his character with a

broken promise. His character was more important to him than money. His faith in Christ was demonstrated by keeping his word.

Character is usually developed in the "dark room" of life just like in photography. Joseph was sold into slavery by his own brothers. Later on he was thrown into prison on a false rape charge. (Read Genesis chapters 37-50) For 13 years God kept him in the "dark room" of life, not to destroy him but to develop character. We see the proof of Joseph's character when his brothers that had mistreated Joseph very badly, stand before Joseph when he is prime minister of Egypt. He could have exacted revenge on his brothers by casting them into prison or even worse he could have had them killed. Joseph had forgiven his brothers because he allowed God to develop his character in the furnace of affliction. "In this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. These have come so that your faith - of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire may be proved genuine. My friend allow God to develop good character in you through the difficult circumstances, and your life will be a blessing to others as well as to God.

Ask the Neighbourhood Mechanic

Fewer people are selling their cars privately these days. Selling a car yourself is a lot like selling your house. You've got to advertise and be available to meet buyers. Not everyone is comfortable with strangers coming to your home. You have to prepare the car for sale, keeping it clean and tuned. Conversely, if you are buying from a registered dealership, you avoid this hassle and are the recipient of years of consumer legislation. If you're trading-in, you receive a tax credit for the agreed value of the trade. So... when it's time for a new set of wheels it makes sense to deal with professionals.

I have a 2004 Honda Civic S4 with 58,950 kilometers. When I apply the brakes, I

would hear and feel an intermittent click coming from the brake pedal. This noise would come from the inside of the car. I took the car to the dealer. The Assistant Manager told me that the noise is the brake switch. It's an indication that the brakes need lubrication, readjustment or replacement. The pads are still 3/4 thick. I've asked if this was on all Honda vehicles, he said it's on all vehicles. I've had 2 domestic cars and this is the first time I've come across this. Please help.

Unfortunately I haven't heard the noise that you are describing so it's hard to be accurate. However, I don't buy what he manager is telling you. The thickness of the pads should not make a difference in the height of the brake pedal unless the brakes are seized. I would be looking at the linkage at the master-cyl and checking my adjustments inside the car. Better still go back ask for a second opinion.

Possibly, the service manager. He's usually the best tech in the shop. Just in case this problem rears it's ugly head after the warranty has expired, I would write the dealership. Send a copy along to the zone describing your situation. Honda is a great company and prides itself on customer service.

My focus wagon has a long lasting problem for more than six months. There is a strange sound from the left-rear wheel. It is spinning related in terms of frequency, and sounds like d.f.d. just like a stones hitting. Any idea where it is exactly from?

As the Focus is a front wheel drive the only things back there that rotate are the wheel bearings and various brake components. If the noise changes, when you apply the brakes, that's where I would focus (sorry) my attention. Look for a dragging pad or shoe. Rust build up could also be an issue. Car repairs=Rocket science

Lac du Bonnet RCMP Report

Report period from June 5th to June 12th, 2006



On the 5th of June, a report was rec'd that a cottage at Flanders Lake in Nopiming Prov. Park had been broken into since the 1st of April, with a quantity of liquor and a .22 rifle stolen.

On the 5th of June, a report was rec'd from an under-age female that she had been sexually assaulted at a residence in the Town of Lac du Bonnet on the 2nd of June. Police initiated an investigation of this matter, however, the complainant subsequently advised that there had been no criminal offence and that the activities had been consensual.

On the 5th of June, a report was rec'd that an intoxicated adult male was riding a bicycle in the Town of Lac du Bonnet. Police patrolled for the subject, however, did not locate him.

On the 5th of June, a report was rec'd of a single-vehicle Motor Vehicle Accident on Smith Road in the R.M. of Lac du Bonnet. Investigation revealed that the vehicle had gone into the ditch, and the under-age male driver had been thrown from the vehicle.

He was transported via ambulance to Winnipeg, where he succumbed to his injuries.

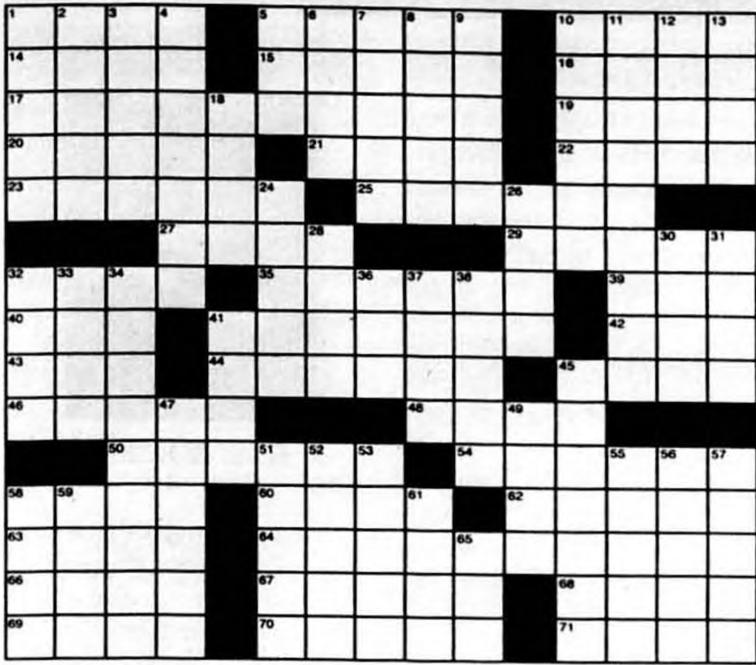

West Nile Virus update

Preliminary analysis from adult mosquito traps for the week of June 4 has identified the presence of *Culex tarsalis* mosquitoes in Manitoba.

Beginning next week, weekly average trap counts of *Culex tarsalis* by regional health authority will be available on the province's West Nile virus website at <http://www.gov.mb.ca/health/wnv>.

At this time of year, the risk of being bitten by a mosquito carrying West Nile virus is very low. *Culex tarsalis* mosquitoes are the mosquitoes most likely

to carry the West Nile virus.

Updated information on the risk of West Nile virus will be provided to the public throughout the summer. Manitobans can check the West Nile virus website regularly for up-to-date data and information.

Manitobans are advised to prepare for mosquito season by reducing standing water around their homes. This includes:

- regularly cleaning and emptying eavestroughs, bird baths and other items that might collect water;

- ensuring rain barrels are covered with mosquito screening or are tightly sealed around the downspout;

- making sure yards are clear of old tires or other debris that collect water; and

- making sure your door and window screens fit tightly and are free of holes.

Landscape Safely Around Manitoba Hydro Equipment

Has your thumb turned green yet? It's gardening time! Here are some tips from Manitoba Hydro to help make your landscaping experience safe.

It's possible that you have a green rectangular box called a padmount electrical transformer on your property. While it may look awkward at first, incorporating it into your landscaping plan without compromising safety or function is definitely possible. Simply follow Manitoba Hydro's guidelines for using ornamental shrubs and specific planting arrangements:

Keep the padlock side free of plantings.

Be sure that the soil is 20 cm (8 in.) below the top of the pad.

Do not plant between the

transformer and the MTS pedestal.

If you plan to excavate on your property in order to plant trees or build a fence, remember to call Manitoba Hydro before you dig. Striking buried electrical or natural gas equipment can result in serious or deadly injury, environmental pollution, equipment damage, product loss, and service interruptions. You may also be held liable for damages. By calling before you dig you can prevent these things from happening and keep yourself and others safe.

Simply phone 480-1212 in Winnipeg, or your local Manitoba Hydro district office if you live in rural Manitoba. Hydro will arrange to have trained personnel visit your property

and mark the locations of underground electrical and natural gas lines as well as vaults containing transformers or electrical switchgear.

You should also be aware of any overhead powerlines in your yard if you will be working with oversized equipment. Contact with overhead powerlines can cause serious or deadly injury. And when you plant trees or shrubs, consider where you do so. Avoid planting anything directly underneath an overhead powerline as there is potential for the tree or shrub to grow into the powerline.


