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Funding approved for new fire hall

A new fire hall on Fey Road in Ward 1 of the R.M. of Alexander has been approved. Capital cost will be \$1.2 million which will be split three ways - \$ 400,000 from the provincial government \$4,00,000 from the R. M. of St. Clements, and \$400,000 from the R. M. of Alexander. The average cost to RM of Alexander taxpayers will be approximately \$6.00 per year.

The fire Hall will be built on Fey Road near Highway 11. It will include an ambulance, fire trucks and pumpers and facilities for a water rescue team.

Establishing an Ambulance at Fey Road will dramatically reduce response times to areas South of the Belair Road. Currently, an ambulance for Lester Beach, Grand Beach etcetera, is sent from Selkirk.

Alexander Reeve George Harbottle said that the contract with Victoria Beach for fire protection will continue as it is now. He also said there would

be a public works garage built on land recently obtained from the provincial government. (It has taken seven years to arrange for the land transfer.). In the public works garage will be space for a grader, a mower, and a fire pumper. The proposed East Beaches Wellness Centre will also be

built on the same parcel of land.

The Wellness Centre is proving to be a major focus of the community, with a volunteer base of more than sixty very active people. It will cost about \$8 million and will include an indoor swimming pool and a variety of fitness equipment

and facilities. Offices for a doctor, physiotherapist and other health professionals will probably be included. There may also be a pharmacy within the complex and the Beaches library will also be housed in the complex.

Beach conditions

Recreational water quality was excellent at all beaches monitored by Manitoba Water Stewardship including beaches on Lake Winnipeg, Lake Manitoba, in the Whiteshell and Birds Hill areas, and others.

Beach Safety

One of the most important things to think about when enjoying Manitoba's beaches is safety. When taking a group to the beach, establish a location for children to meet in an emergency and ensure children know this location.

Lake Winnipeg Facts

One kilogram of phosphorus can stimulate the growth of as much as 500 kilograms of algae in a water body. On average, prior to waste-water treatment, each person generates about one kilogram of phosphorus per year.

Protect The Beach, Protect Yourself

The following beach hygiene tips will help keep our beaches clean:

Please don't feed the shore birds. Gulls can quickly become accustomed to eating and residing on the beach.

- Don't litter or discard food on the beach. Dispose of trash in proper receptacles.

- Clean up after your pets. Pets are not allowed on provincial park beaches and on most beaches in rural municipalities.

- Change diapered children frequently and away from the water's edge.

- Never bury waste in the sand.

- Most swimmers will not become ill when E. coli bacteria levels are elevated above the recreational water quality guideline. However, the possibility of illness increases with rising levels of bacteria.

- Manitobans can safely enjoy the province's plentiful beaches and are advised to keep a few things in mind when at the beach:

- avoid swimming with an open cut or wound, or if you're experiencing illness;

- stay away from the water if you are experiencing digestive or intestinal problems;

- avoid swallowing lake water when playing or swimming;

- wash your hands before handling food.

New Website to Help Former Tenants: Selinger

Manitoba tenants and former tenants who may have funds owed to them could benefit from a new website launched today, Finance Minister Greg Selinger has announced.

"After a tenant moves out, monies such as rent overpayments or security deposits may be owed to them," said Selinger. "Landlords have a legal obligation to return these funds to the tenant, or if that is not possible, to forward them to the province to safekeeping."

Under the Residential Tenancies Act, landlords are required to forward security deposits or rent overpayments to the province if they are unable to return them directly to the tenant. Tenants may then apply to the prov-

ince for their money.

"The new website information will help tenants with the recovery of funds they may be owed from previous tenancies," said Selinger. "We want to ensure former tenants receive all monies due in these circumstances."

Former tenants will be able to check on the website for information about unreturned security deposits and rent overpayments held by the province.



Individual pension plans and the family business

With the 2003 changes to pension limits and the

ability to include an Individual Pension Plan (IPP) in a succession plan, IPPs have become the RRSP alternative for many business owners.

Normally on the death of the second spouse, registered assets create a tax liability in the estate. An IPP for a family business can be an effective way of transferring registered assets to the second generation on a tax-deferred basis.

WHAT IS AN INDIVIDUAL PENSION PLAN?

An Individual Pension Plan (IPP) is a defined benefit pension plan. If you are a business owner, an IPP offers both maximum tax relief and a maximum retirement pension. The result?

You won't have to rely solely on your Reg-

istered Retirement Savings Plans (RRSP's) performance to provide a long and happy retirement. That's because IPPs also offer guaranteed lifetime income and any surplus in the plan belongs to you.

WHY ARE IPPS SO POPULAR?

In the 2003 Federal budget, the Government of Canada increased the maximum pension limits to \$2,000 per year of service. As well, this \$2,000 limit will be subject to increases based on the Industrial Average Wage beginning in 2006.

At age 50, the annual maximum contribution is \$6,000 higher than the maximum contribution to an RRSP. As you get closer to retirement the cost to provide the

benefit increases.

You can also include service back to 1991. This is optional but if you decide to include extra years, it will significantly increase the amount that can be deposited into the plan.

OPPORTUNITIES

The family business Normally on the death of the second spouse, registered assets create a tax liability in the estate. An IPP is an ideal way to keep the assets in a tax-deferred vehicle when involving a family business.

If the business is continuing after the parent retires, the family member (usually a son or daughter) taking over the business can be added as a member of the existing plan. By leaving the plan intact, any assets not used to provide benefits to the retired parent will remain and can be transferred to the second generation without triggering tax.

Sale of a business Most small businesses

are sold to family members or partners. The proceeds from these types of asset sales are treated as taxable income. By setting up an IPP now using terminal funding, a deduction can be created against this income.

Early retirement

Legislation requires funding projections to be based on a retirement age of 65.

However, anytime after attaining age 60, a member of an IPP can retire and supplement the benefits provided in the plan by adding unreduced early retirement benefits, cost of living increases and bridging benefits. These early retirement benefits can provide a significant additional tax deduc-

tion for the company.

Long weekend disaster

Most of those I spoke to about the tornado that ripped through Gull Lake, the Tall Timber Lodge area and the Pointe du Bois area were in disbelief. How could this happen? What was the extent of the damage? Why weren't we warned? These were all questions that kept coming up time and again. One didn't need to witness the horror first hand because of the newspaper accounts and pictures, and the coverage on the news. The devastation that was apparent made those areas touched by the tornado look like a war zone, and the shock, horror and disappointment in the faces of those directly impacted by the damage caused all of us to feel the pain.

I heard about the tornado within a couple of hours of the tornado touching down, and by that time our emergency personnel, our police, and ambulance crews were on the scene to coordinate rescue efforts and to ensure that those who were injured were treated. I am proud of the efforts of our response teams and I com-

mend our Municipalities for implementing their Emergency Response plans efficiently and effectively - I thank them all for their efforts. The next day my family attended church as always, and our prayers had special meaning that day. Later, I toured some of the area to witness first hand the destruction that had taken place. I was thankful for the extraordinary efforts of our Manitoba Hydro crews, many of whom worked around the clock in order to restore service and to alleviate the danger of broken power lines.

After witnessing the destruction, I was thankful that more people were not injured or killed. My best wishes go out to those who were injured and my condolences to the family who lost a loved one. My sympathy goes out to those who lost their possessions.

What more can be done? Manitoba does not have a province-wide public warning system in place to warn of an impending natural disaster. By comparison, in Alberta, officials have the authority to briefly

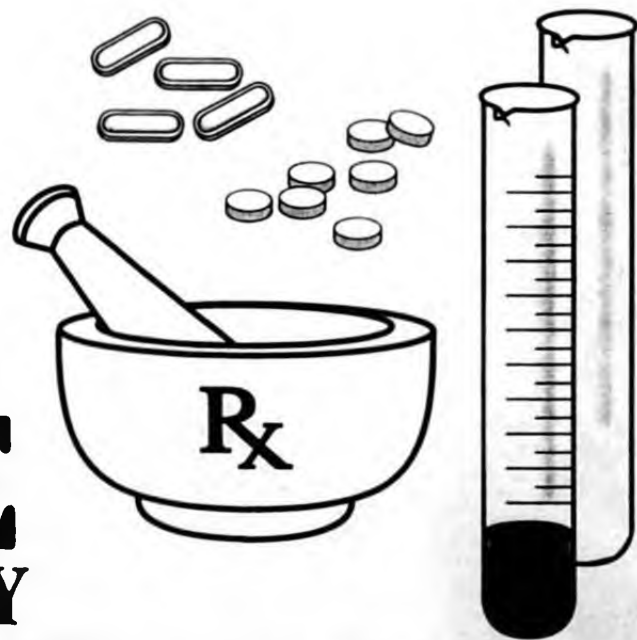
take over the electronic media to provide a warning. It's difficult to say whether an Alberta-like warning system would have made a difference last weekend, but clearly more can be done to ensure that the public is warned as early as possible and more can be done to educate Manitobans about what severe weather looks like and what should be done if a severe storm is coming.

The Province can also assist in the cost of the clean up, and compensate for damage that is not covered by insurance because it is an uninsurable risk. It can also reimburse Municipalities for damage to infrastructure. The Province must step up to the plate first, and not wait for other levels of government. Assistance is needed now! In a disaster, there should be immediate assistance.

Ask the Neighbourhood Mechanic

Hybrid cars are all the rage. You know those gas/electric wonders that are going to save the planet. Everybody agrees that saving fuel is a good thing. However; saving fuel in a vehicle that doesn't use that much in the first place is really not that efficient. Saving fuel in vehicle that consumes vast amounts more sense. Long distant truckers are buying over 9000 dollars worth of "motion lotion" every month. That's what a trucker buys on average. Now imagine if you could save 10-12 percent. That would certainly help the bottom line.

I'm a trucker. I have fifteen diesel trucks in my fleet and fifty one other pieces of equipment that run on diesel. Have you heard about hydrogen injection in diesel engines and what can you tell me about it?

Interesting stuff. There are several companies that are in the field of Hydrogen Injection. As in any new field one company takes the lead. Dynamic Fuel Systems is an Ontario based firm that manufactures a hydrogen generator designed for diesel truck use. The computerized unit injects hydrogen into the diesel's intake system. According to Tom Fairfull (CEO), hydrogen injection has the effect of reducing pollution and dramatically increasing fuel economy. The unit is reasonably priced and should pay for itself in fuel savings in approximately one year's operation at current fuel prices. The company is currently testing units designed to work in gasoline powered vehicles. For more info :

I have a 1997 Honda CRV. Having a problem for some time now. When I try to brake,

the vehicle doesn't stop right away. It makes a vibrating sound and the brakes feel funny. For this reason, I hit another vehicle.

Can you tell me what the problem is? I have a second question if I may. The temperature gauge of my car goes high when the car runs slowly or is stopped. But it stays in the middle when running on the highway. Can you give me a suggestion?

You have several problems that are not related. The braking issue should be dealt with immediately. I would suggest there is a failure with the Master Cylinder and the ABS system. Don't put this off, it's serious....

As far as the engine's running hot. The vehicle is equipped with electronically controlled cooling fans. Have the car's computer scanned for codes and failures and proceed from there.

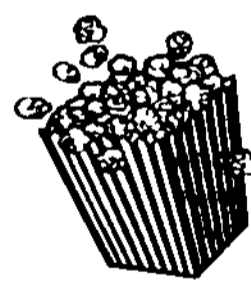

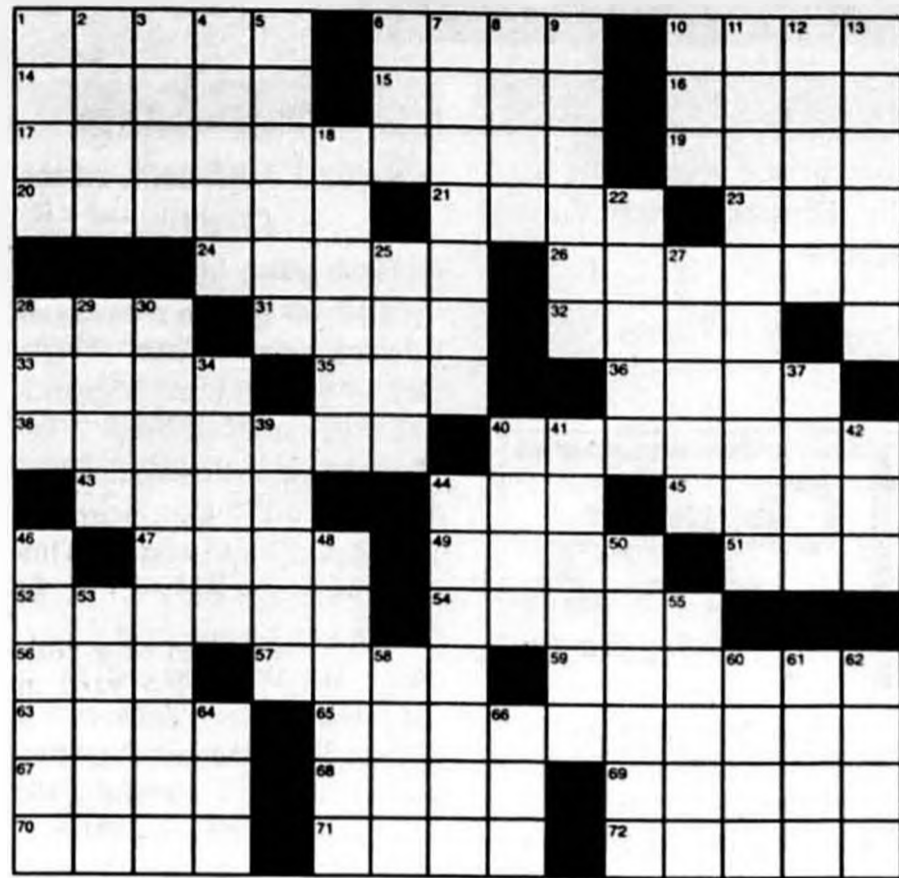

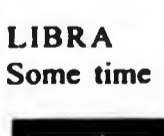
