# Public path or private property

Sean Kemball has closed his section of the public path that runs alongside his residence at 5 Balsam street in Pine Falls.

Some people are not amused and are asking town council to correct this problem.

Last Tuesday Kemball told the Powerview/Pine Falls Council that his reasons were the safety of his family and property. He told of numerous incidents of vandalism, trespassing, profane language, arson attempts and indecent acts occurring on the path adjacent to his house. He also said he was not prepared to re-open the path.

The council met with Mr. Orvel Currie, Municipal Solicitor to discuss the Towns options. The town office has no records to indicate that the path is not his property. The path is not shown on the site plan for 5 Balsam street or any other house along the community pathway.

Other residents along the pathway have varied opinions, "The path is a great thing, but to live along side of it is not so great. The vandalism and mischief is a big problem" said one resident. He also added that he might not have taken measures to close the path, but he was not so upset that the path was closed.

Another Pine Falls resident Lori Pachkowsky stated she

uses the path with her young children and it would be a shame not to have its access any longer. She also suggested that if the problems occur at night perhaps they should put up gates at each end after 10 pm.

Alain Majeau who owns the next section of pathway said,

"It would be a shame to have it close. A lot of people use this path and have for many years. I have tolerated many minor incidents over the years, it's just something that comes with living here."

Pine Falls resident Don Hills, who is opposed to the closure of the path, said there

is a provision in common law that a pathway is a public right-of-way if it has been used as such for more than twenty years. Hills told *The Echo* that he was told at last Tuesday's Council meeting that if the municipality decided to take the issue to court, that the town would probably win but that it

"would cost the town a lot of money".

Council has decided to hold a public meeting to "gauge the feeling of the community and to let the community know of available options". The time and place of the meeting will probably be advertised in next week's issue of *The Echo*

member and I am frustrated by what has transpired recently.

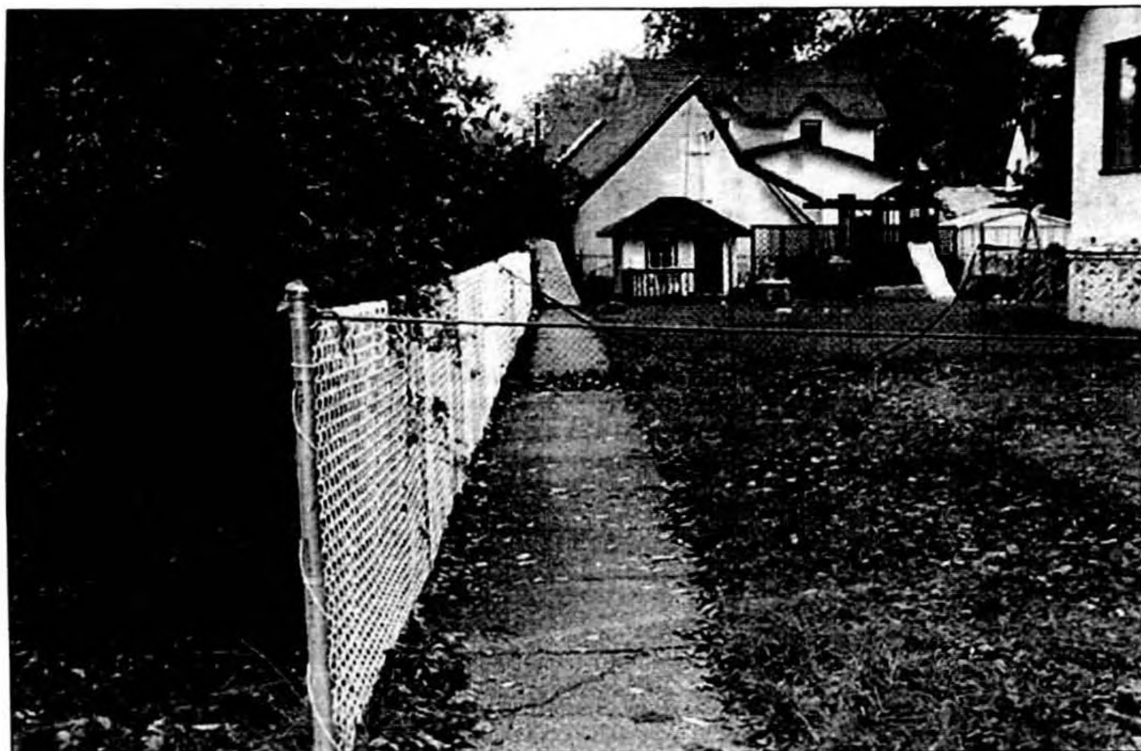

# Bradley Louis wins Billy Roy Memorial

Pachowsky and Tyler Kemball. The 13 & 14 year old flight had the overall winner Bradley Louis in first place, followed by runner up Eddie Damen and Joel Miyazawa. The 15 and older flight was won by Graham Carello who shot 41 followed by his brother Alex with Jeff Dupont placing third.

The putting competition was won by the following juniors in their respective age groups:

10 and under: Wyatt Kemball, 11 & 12 years: Robert Dupont, 13 & 14 years: Joel Miyazawa, 15 and over: Hayden Tardiff.

In the closest to the pin competition, 9 year old Wyatt Kemball bested all competitors with a tee shot 6 feet from the pin followed closely by 10 year old Cole Pluchinski and 12 year old Robert Dupont who placed third.

In the long drive competition, the 10 and under age group was won by

# Rent guideline set for 2007

Finance Minister Greg Selinger today announced the 2007 rent guideline has been set at 2.5 per cent effective Jan. 1.

The guideline is reviewed and set each year, and takes into account cost increases including utilities, property taxes, maintenance and other expenses in the operation of a residential complex.

"The new rent guideline recognizes the expenses that landlords incur, including repair and maintenance made to rental properties, while keeping rents affordable for Manitoba families," said Selinger.

Landlords can apply to the Residential Tenancies Branch

for rent increases above the guideline if they can show it will not cover cost increases they have incurred. If tenants have concerns or objections to any increase in rent, whether it is at, below or above the guideline, they can write to the branch at least 60 days before the date of the rent increase.

The guideline applies to rented residential apartments, houses, duplexes and single rooms. It does not apply to:

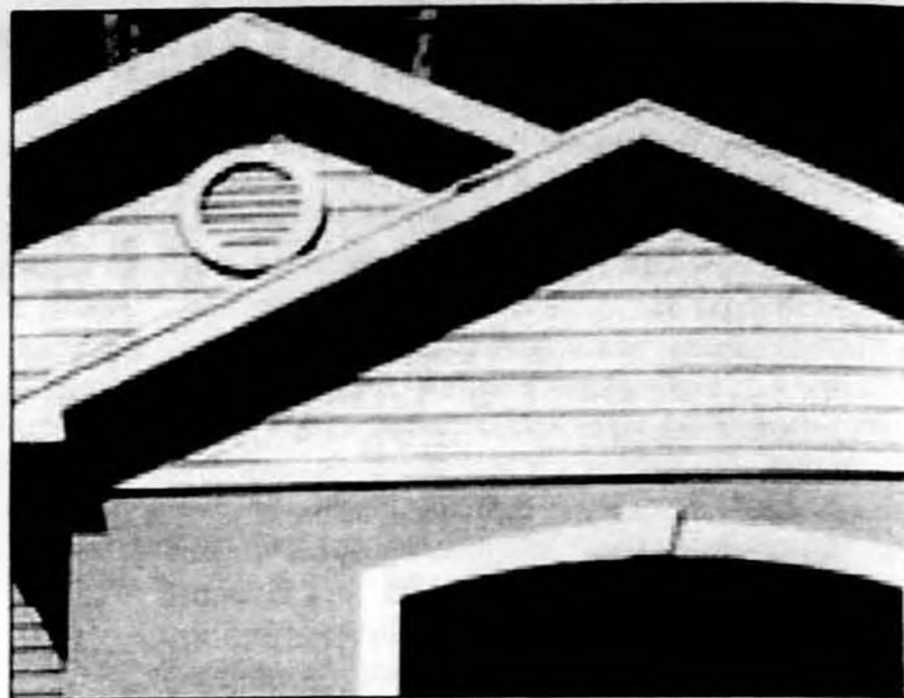
- rental units renting for \$1,050 or more effective Dec. 31, 2006, an increase of \$25 over the previous exempt rent level;
- personal care homes;
- non-profit housing with

subsidized rent;

- approved rehabilitated rental units;

- new buildings that are less than 15 years old where an occupancy permit was first issued or a unit first occupied after April 9, 2001, or are less than 20 years old where an occupancy permit was first issued or a unit first occupied after March 7, 2005.

Rents cannot increase, even by the guideline amount, unless the tenant has been given proper notice of at least three months before the increase takes effect. With few exceptions, rent can only be increased once a year. For example, for a rent increase to



take effect Jan. 1, 2007, tenants must receive notice by Sept. 30, 2006.

Selinger noted that recently, there has been a significant increase in new rental construction in Winnipeg. In the past four and a half years (2002 to July 2006) there have been 1,714 new starts of various forms of rental housing in Winnipeg. This is more than the number (1,244) of rental starts that occurred in Winnipeg over the entire previous 10 years (1992 to 2001).

Selinger also noted that a new website has recently been

launched to help tenants and former tenants recover any rent overpayments or security deposits that may be owed to them. For more information visit the website at <http://www.residentialtenancies.mb.ca> under the What's New heading.

## Cost Effective Bulbs

An average house has 30 light bulbs in it. Annually, these 30 bulbs use about \$200 worth of electricity. So how can you have light in your house, and yet cut back this cost?

Consider investing in energy-efficient lighting, or compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs). CFLs deliver the same light output but use 75 per cent less energy and last up to 10 times longer than regular incandescent light bulbs. And as consumers become more aware of the importance of energy efficiency, the choice in bulb shapes, sizes and brightness continues to grow. Fixtures for these lights are being designed so that almost any effect can be created - shadow free lighting in the kitchen, flattering lighting in bathrooms, soft

chandelier glows for the dining room, mood and accent lighting for family rooms, and security lighting for outdoors - the options are almost endless.

Optimal places or situations to use CFL lighting are:

Where a light is on for more than three hours a day

Where a light is in a hard-to-reach place

Where exterior lights are on for most of the night (in this situation, be sure that the CFL is labelled for outdoor use)

If you switch to using CFL lighting, not only are you saving yourself money, but you are also helping the environment. If every household in Canada replaced just one regular incandescent bulb with a CFL, Canada would save over \$73 million in energy costs every year! And reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 397,000 tonnes of carbon dioxide, which is the same as taking 66,000 cars off the road for one year.

"Sometime ago a traffic officer gave a citation to a woman in Brooklyn. And when the officer handed it through the window to her, she snapped it out of his hands and said, "You can go straight to hell!" So the officer took her to court. A few days later they appeared before a judge, and he dismissed the officer's complaint about the woman's language, because he said, and I quote, "It wasn't a command, or a wish, but a statement of fact, for going to hell is a possibility."

Who is a reliable authority on heaven and hell? If heaven exists so does hell. Either they are both fictional or they are both real places. The Bible has much to say about both places. Heaven is mentioned 570 times and hell is 54 times in God's Word. The Bible tells us that Jesus Christ suffered the awful agony of hell for us. When Jesus cried out while hanging on the cross, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" He did time in the penalty box of eternity which the Bible calls hell.

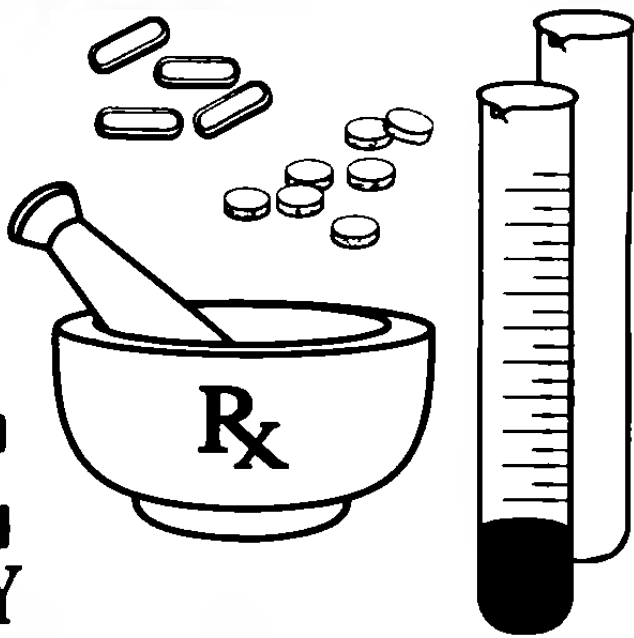

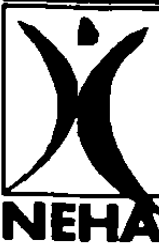

## Get a Grip on Stress

### What can ongoing stress do to my body?

If your back hurts, your head aches, your heart races, and you can't sleep; it might just be your body's way of shouting at you: "Hey, you're under too much stress!" Just as the red light on your vehicle dashboard alerts you to a mechanical problem, our bodies have built-in early warning systems alerting us to the presence of too much stress. Signs of chronic (or constant) stress can present themselves physically - as mentioned above, or psychologically - with symptoms such as depression, anxiety, irritability or mood swings.

### Why do we experience stress?

Stress can arise for a variety of reasons, ranging from traumatic events, to illness, to the stress associated with daily life. The interesting thing about stress is that no two people respond exactly the same to a given situation. In fact, some people seem equipped to handle far more stress than others.

When symptoms of chronic stress do occur, it is important to recognize and deal with them before they do serious damage to your body (and your life). While it is impossible to live completely free of stress, it is possible to reduce and manage its impact on you, and your family.

How do I find out more about stress and how to manage it?

To help find out more, NEHA - along with several community partners - is offering two *Get a Grip* Stress Management programs in the region this fall. Both of these evening programs require pre-registration.

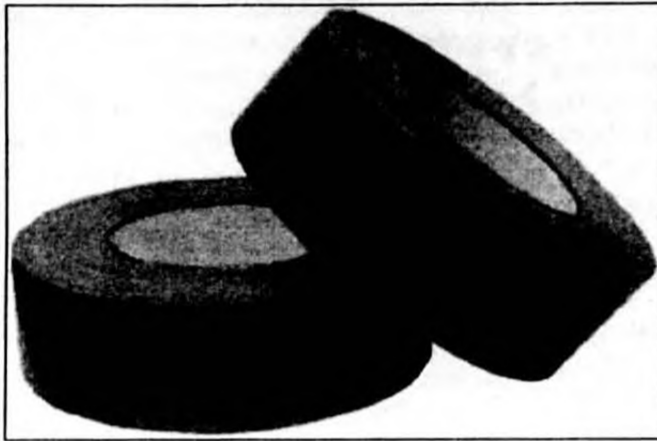

## Taking the First Steps on Senate Reform

Last week on Parliament Hill, Prime Minister Stephen Harper made an unprecedented appearance before a Senate committee to discuss the Conservative government's plans to reform the Senate. The Prime Minister's personal involvement in this file underscores just how seriously the government takes it, and shows that we intend to follow through on our commitments.

I've written before about the bill the new government has already tabled to deliver fundamental change to the Senate. Bill S-4, an Act to amend the Constitution Act, 1867 (Senate Tenure) was introduced in the Senate on May 30, 2006. It proposes to limit senate terms to eight years for new Senators.

When he appeared before the committee last week, I was impressed by the Prime Minister's resolve on this important

bill. He urged Senators to be part of the change that Canadians have been demanding for so long, by passing Bill S-4 and taking the first important step to making the Senate more democratic and a better reflection of the modern needs of Canada's regions.

But the Prime Minister also outlined what the second step in the process would be. He committed to introducing a bill this autumn to create a process to choose elected Senators. "This bill will further demonstrate how seriously the Government takes the issue of Senate reform," said the Prime Minister. "And to Canadians, it will further signal that the Senate is changing."

Conservatives have been consistently advocating change to the Senate for decades. Now, in government, we're moving forward. And as the Prime Minister said last week,

"Canadians will be watching to see whether the current Senate will make itself part of that process of change."

Previous Liberal governments have had a few kind words to say about Senate reform when they were in office, but those words and promises were quickly put on the shelf, falling to the bottom of the agenda, with nothing ever getting done. Even making progress in small steps was deemed impractical, and reform was put off until some magical day in the future when wholesale reform could take place.

Our new government is moving forward with concrete action - actual legislation - to begin the process of Senate reform. It was a commitment we made in the election campaign, and as we have done with so many other election commitments, we are following through. Prime Minister Harper said last week that we are not looking for another report on Senate reform, and that years of delay must come to an end. Our government knows that to Canadians, the status quo on the Senate is no longer acceptable.

# Report from Legislature

## The Finances of the Province

Last week we received the final numbers for the last fiscal year. The Minister of Finance once again over spent the budget approved by the Legislature. He over spent the budget by a whopping \$220 Million. Normally this would have meant a deficit for the Province, or the Finance Minister would have raided the Rainy Day Fund to cover the shortfall. However, luckily for the Minister of Finance, Ottawa gave a handout to Manitoba in the amount of an extra \$118 Million and other revenues to the Province were higher than expected from our high personal income taxes, sales tax rates, taxes earned from tobacco and alcohol use and gambling taxes. All of these increases saved embarrassment for the Finance Minister because without these increases, the Province would have created another deficit financial year or he would have needed to raid the Rainy Day Fund once again, just to balance the books.

What did this extra \$220 Million of spending buy us? Not a penny went into our

roads. Our roads are still crumbling before our eyes. Crime is running rampant in Manitoba. Not a week goes by without finding out that more grow-ops are being discovered. After all the political double talk by this government, our cattle slaughter capacity has not increased and as a result our cattle farmers are still vulnerable to the effect of BSE. Our universities and schools remain underfunded. Our health care system was rated last in Canada by The Conference Board of Canada. The Province's debt has skyrocketed to over \$20 Billion, and as a result, Manitobans currently pay more than \$3.5 Million every day in interest costs.

This is not a record to be proud of. We need a government that will produce and demand results for increased spending. We now don't have one!

**Ask the Neighbourhood Mechanic**

Mechanics have car problems too. For years I have lived with the fear that my wife's car will break down. Money was tight when we started off and we drove old cars. Heaven help me if that sucker ever let her down. I would never hear the end of it. Funny thing, I noticed early in my career, how break downs are always the mechanics fault. I didn't design it, build it or sell it. It was me, who didn't have the time to service it, and it wasn't me, that broke the thing in the first place. Cars do wear out. So, how's that my fault? One more thing "Why do most customers ask for a discount". I tried asking for a discount at a local big box store, they threw me

out! By the way I bought the wife a new car. Now she has the dealer to blame.

My 1995 Jeep Grand Cherokee has a tendency to stall out and sputter. I shut it off and wait for twenty minutes and then it's OK. I have 365,000 kms now and drive mostly in the city shopping and work. My husband "the mechanic" was supposed to fix this!

The fact that everything is OK after twenty mins leads me to suspect the fuel system. I would think that the fuel filter is plugged or that the gas tank has water / dirt in it. Foreign material will clog the fuel pump strainer. Don't blame hubby too much. We actually need more information on this one...

When I stop at a red light with the transmission in drive

and my foot on the brake, the car vibrates and shakes. There are times when the engine stalls. I recently had a "tune-up" to see if it would help. The car does run better but it did not help with this problem mentioned above. There are times when it vibrates only slightly but most of the time, it vibrates quite a bit, enough to see the hood shaking. Do you know what the problem is and what is causing it?

It sounds as if the engine is not running on all cylinders. The problem could be as simple as a plug that is fouled or more serious such as a sticking valve. Have a dynamic compression test performed. This test cuts out individual cylinders and measures the load they are sharing. The results will lead you to the next step.

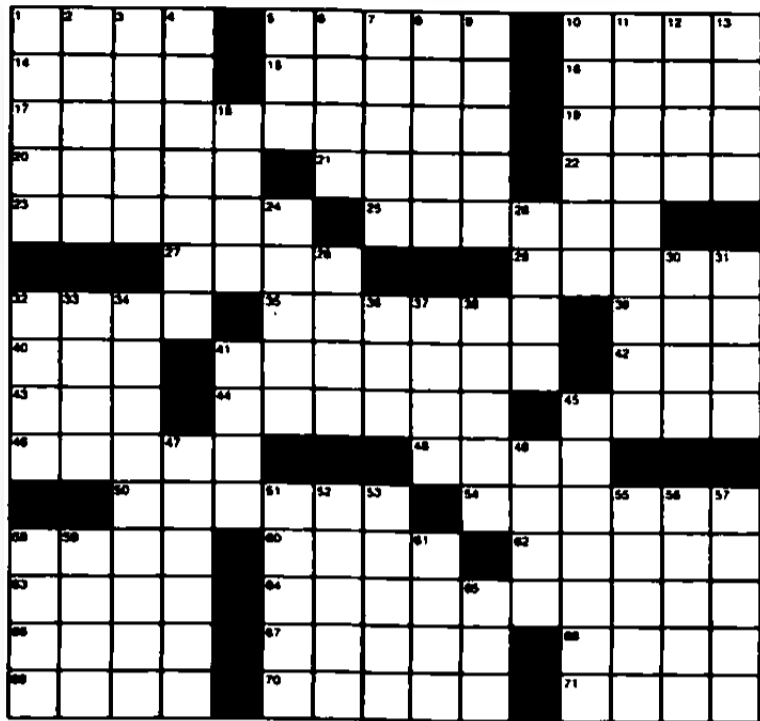

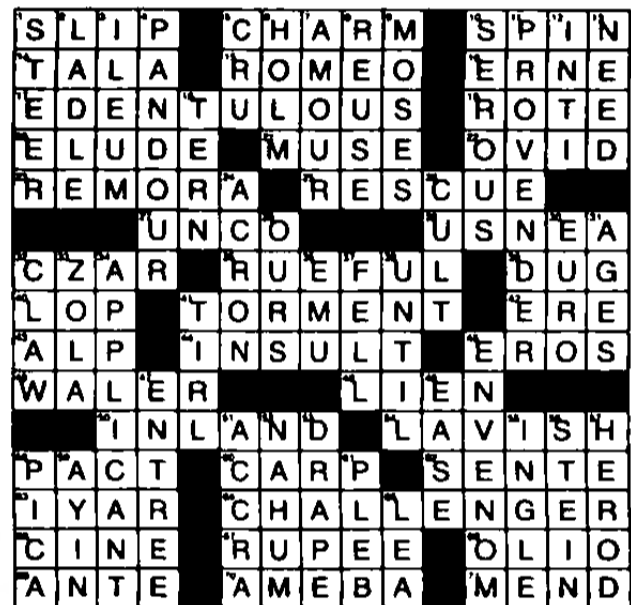

## Conterfit product

"If it's too good to be true, then it probably is." This old saying rang true when a Vancouver teacher found glue guns being sold for \$1 apiece. She thought that she had found a bargain, until a student was badly burned when one of the guns caught fire. Obviously this incident should never have happened. But what is even more troubling is that the glue guns had certification marks. However, as the investigation into this incident discovered, the marks were fake; the products counterfeit.

One of the most common trends in counterfeit goods is that they are often old products that are posing as new, com-

plete with the old certification mark that is used to promote the product as being safe. These products may have been repaired with faulty or incompatible components, packaged to look new, and sold at rock-bottom discount prices. This practice is most common with certain electrical devices, including molded circuit breakers, which are commonly used in public buildings such as

schools and hospitals. Certification organizations have adopted a zero tolerance policy for anyone caught illegally using their mark. Together with regulators and prosecutors, there have already been some successes with the prevention of counterfeit goods. As a consumer, be aware when you spot bargain electrical goods.
