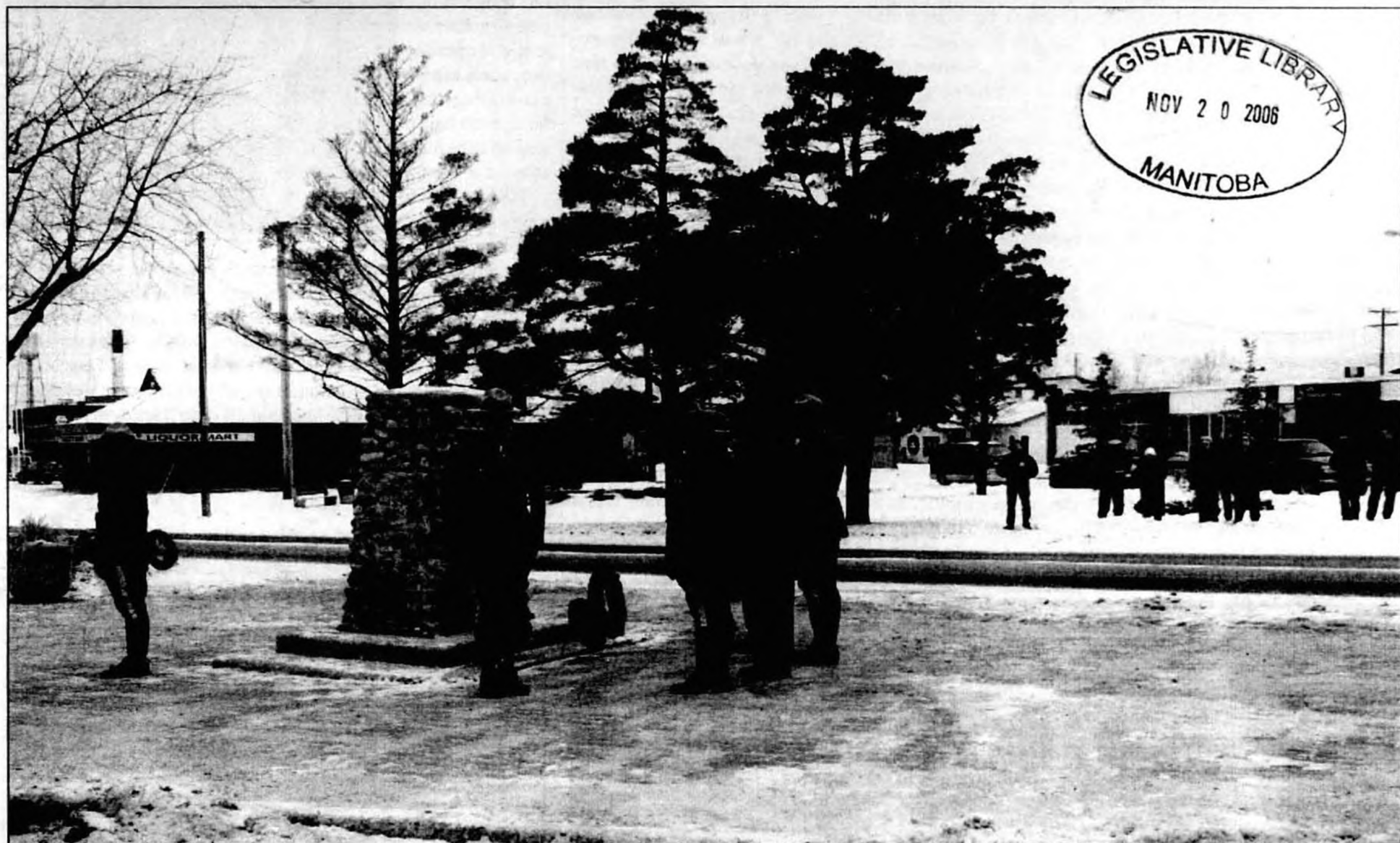


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## Remembrance Day Service in Pine Falls

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**What is happening to our Pine Falls?**

As a long term resident of Pine Falls (55 plus years) and loving it's townsite layout, people friendly and most charming and unique consideration of its populace - case in point - the unique feature of the "Cross Town Paths". I don't believe that there is another town or village in Manitoba with this charming feature. Our aging population was always appreciative of these paths which made their trips to the pharmacy and store from the Village Green and Sunnywood Manor a safe and not too trying a walk. Sadly, we are now being bombarded by new residents and homeowners who have claimed the land under the paths and no longer wish anyone to use them. After over 75 years of use, this is in my opinion, a travesty. I have learned of the possibility that the legal ruling could be in favour of saving the paths - but at a high financial litigation cost. Unfortunately, the legal cost would fall on the shoulders of many of our long time residents who are most affected. I have also learned that

the land claimants were victims of hooligans and vandalism. However, this has been a fact of life throughout the country and as residents our fight is to take defensive maneuvers through better policing and vigilance. By closing access to the paths without consultation, those land claimants are punishing a whole town and I dare say are not exactly endearing themselves to those longtime and understanding residents. In fairness to the path closers, I do not live where the paths are located but I have used them since 1949 when the company saw fit to make the Village Green a place of access and solitude for the community. I, too, am a regular (or was) user of the paths, and was very appreciative of paved access to them directly by paved walkway from the Village Green, giving access for people in wheelchairs and with canes.

Question: To the claimants who now claim this pathway 'real estate' - why did you not

offer the land to be purchased or at least seek approval or consultation of all those severely affected? If you readers are wondering why I started out by asking "what's happening to our town?", it was simply the second incident on the paths that prompted me to write this letter. My first experience was when I was stopped in my tracks at the Kemball fence, the latest was at the crosswalk at Cedar St., across from the path to the drugstore. The resident there had a beautiful clear driveway which was achieved by piling all their snow on the path. To me, it was an extremely selfish and un-Christian act, not to mention the hazardous walking conditions. In closing to this long-winded note, I would suggest that those who would restrict the use of paths should feel a little shame and guilt when they use the free and open ones.

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## 2006-07 Manitoba Trapping Guide

Conservation Minister Stan Struthers today announced the 2006-07 Manitoba Trapping Guide which identifies changes in seasons and licensing for the coming year is now available.

"Manitobans are recognizing the importance of fur-bearer management and the valuable contributions made by trappers," said Struthers. "Trapping has assisted land-owners and livestock producers in reducing their losses."

The wolf trapping season has been extended by one month in the western registered trapping district. The season, which started Oct. 14, now runs to March 31. Wolf populations are healthy and are a growing concern for livestock producers. The revised season has been adjusted to coincide with the close of the licensed wolf hunting season.

Producers can remove problem predators from their own land if a danger is posed

to property and livestock. Producers are encouraged to use licensed trappers to deal with predators. Any fur-bearers including coyotes and big game species like wolves and bears that are removed must be reported to Manitoba Conservation within 10 days of being taken. However, certain species such as antelope, cougars, elk, deer and game birds cannot be destroyed.

Another change for 2006-07 is the opening of muskrat seasons in the Camper Duck A and B registered trapping sections from March 15 to April 30, 2007. The area was closed several years ago because of poor water levels in Lake Winnipegosis. The increased water levels have improved muskrat habitat and populations.

"The opening of muskrat seasons in these areas will be welcome news for trappers in the area as muskrat prices also

increased dramatically this year," said Struthers.

The profession requires more trappers to deal with the growing number of losses from problem beaver and predators. Youth Trapping Permits are provided free of charge to qualified individuals who are 12 to 17 years of age by Oct. 1, the opening day of beaver season throughout the province, or on the day they obtain the permit. This change makes age requirements for youth permits the same as youth hunting licenses.

"Trapping plays an important role in many Manitoba communities," said Struthers. "Introducing youth to trapping will help to strengthen their connection with the land."

- learning through the arts
- running effective meetings

These newly developed skills will then be taken back to their respective schools and shared with the rest of the student body. We believe that this very exciting conference will have a lasting, positive impact on the youth in our communities for years to come.

## Meet the Pastor - Saint Georges Parish

"I know to what I said Yes and to whom I said Yes when I was ordained, but I never imagined that I would ever be named Parochial Administrator (meaning a beginning Pastor in most cases) of Saint-Georges Parish. I only knew that there was a school in Saint-Georges where I considered working as a Teacher's Aid at one point. I don't know anyone there, I thought, at that time..." stated Father Dominic Lafleur.

He is the youngest of a family of nine, and grew up in Saint-Vital, Winnipeg and went to Ecole Lavallee, College Louis-Riel and College Saint-Boniface, respectively. Saint-Eugene is his native parish. His father passed away in 1978 and two of his brothers passed away recently at a young age; one from a massive heart attack, the other from liver cancer. He saw his mother raise nine children as a widow and

learned his Catechism from observing and participating in the demands of a large family in an urban setting. He worked as a volunteer instructor at the Y.M.C.A. on Fermor Avenue for many years. This was an opportunity for him to confirm the calling he felt to the priesthood. He loved nothing more than to speak to young people about Jesus, because they seemed to be spiritual orphans who did not know their God, their own Father. He always felt he should become a priest but never found himself worthy to even consider it...today more than ever. He accepted gradually that God makes able those He chooses for no one is able on their own. It is a Yes to Grace.

He worked in different schools as a Teacher's Aid and in different pools as a Lifeguard, in nursing homes and

daycares, in customer service, and as an Air Cadet Chaplain during some summers. He was advised by Priests to work a few years in the world before considering entering any Seminary, as that was the prerequisite for candidates to the Priesthood. He studied Religious studies and Theology in order to teach in a Catholic School. He studied at the Grand Seminaire of Montreal as a lay student for a Bachelor's in Theology, and in Ottawa and obtained a Master's Degree Pastoral Theology from St-Paul's University in Ottawa. He worked for three years in College Mathieu residential High School in Gravelbourg, Saskatchewan, as Teacher, Guidance Counsellor and Pastoral Animator. He returned to the Seminary in Montreal as a Seminarian for the Diocese of Saint Boniface for one year. He completed almost

three years of internship, first as a Seminarian, then, as a Deacon, in Notre Dame de Lorette Parish in Lorette Manitoba. "My first posting is Saint-Georges and so far my parishioners have not sent me down the river by the grace of God. I hope that God's peace will continue to flow through this quaint yet active community" said Father Lafleur.

Father Lafleur had the opportunity to travel for missionary work in Mexico and in Europe, including participation in the last World Youth Day in Cologne, Germany. He enjoys working with the Missionaries of Charity Sisters at their different locations, including the one in Winnipeg. It is very important to learn that we are not alone in our Faith, in our Hope and in our Charity, not to mention in our way of life. It is a big world outside the four walls of our mind, of our little community. It is a small world as well, be-

cause wherever you go, you meet sinners in search of God's Truth, God's Love, healing and forgiveness. I hope to have the chance to meet you during my little travels in our neighbourhood. Pray for me as I do for you", said Father Lafleur.



DRAFT REGULATION FOR REVIEW

### Water Quality Management

The Manitoba government is proposing a Nutrient Management Regulation under The Water Protection Act. In accordance with section 7 of The Water Protection Act, the proposed regulation is being made available for review and comment for a 60 day period. The purpose of the proposed regulation is to protect water quality by encouraging responsible nutrient planning, regulating the application of materials containing nutrients and restricting the development of certain types of facilities in environmentally sensitive areas.

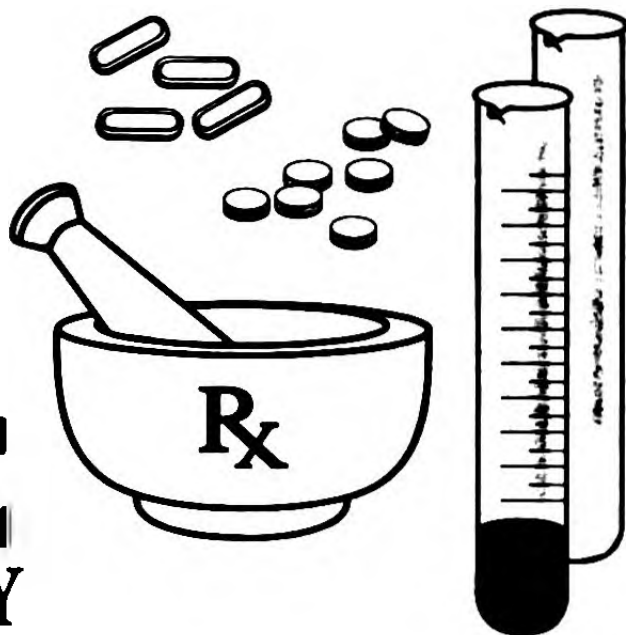
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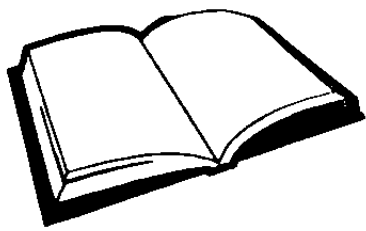


## Library Corner

## WHAT'S IN THE Cupboard



### Ham & Broccoli Bake

#### INGREDIENTS:

10 oz. pkg. (1 1/2 cups) frozen, chopped broccoli  
12 slices white bread, crusts removed  
4 oz. (1 cup) shredded cheddar cheese  
2 cups diced turkey ham  
2 Tbsp. finely chopped onion  
6 eggs, slightly beaten  
3 1/2 cups milk  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. dry mustard

#### METHOD:

Grease 9" x 13" metal pan. Partially cook broccoli; drain well on paper towels. Cut off crusts and cube bread, spread in pan. Layer ham, then broccoli. Sprinkle onion then cheese.

In large bowl, combine beaten eggs, milk, salt and mustard. Pour over bread. Cover, refrigerate 6 hours or overnight.

Heat oven to 325 degrees. Bake uncovered for 1 1/4 hours until inserted knife comes out clean. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Serves 8-12.

### School taxes on property

Now that everyone has paid their property tax bills for this year, take a good look at your tax bill. Depending upon which municipality you live in, your school tax bill can make up 55% to 65% of your entire property tax bill. Our municipalities have generally held the line on tax increases over the last number of years and have managed your tax dollars wisely. I can also say that your School Trustees have been working extremely hard to ensure that the money they collect through your property taxes are well spent, but our School Trustees have had a difficult problem to deal with. That problem was forced on our School Trustees because of

the forced amalgamation of the former Agassiz School Division with the Springfield portion of Transcona-Springfield School Division. Here's the question. How do you communicate with the other drivers with you without using your hands? With your lights. Now that we are entering the winter season your lighting system will be working harder. The average car has approximately 30 to 40 light bulbs that illuminate and inform. I recently purchased a 2006 Toyota Camry. During inclement weather the driver and passenger windows not clearing. It's a major inconvenience to have to wipe the glass when using the car in cold weather.

If I understand your question correctly, you are describing in inside of the glass misting up. If so I don't think you have the heater controls set correctly. Check to see if the recycle switch is on. If so shut it off. Recycle will not allow fresh air into the interior. Your breath is moist and is not venting out of the vehicle. By turning the switch to fresh air your problem should be eliminated.

I would like to ask for some tips on how to eliminate the moisture inside my Pontiac Montana's headlights. I recently replaced the bulbs on both sides and after a few days, water is accumulating inside. I tried to use hairdryer and reinstall it but to no avail. I will appreciate any tips you can share.

Headlights accumulate water because they leak. It's almost impossible to find leaks in these units. So what's the solution? Drill a 1/8" hole in the lens at the bottom where the water is accumulating and a second hole in the top of the housing. This will allow the water to drain and vent the unit. Allow a few days for the unit to fully dry. Works every time.

## A Natural History of the East Beaches and the Belair Forest

### The American White Pelican

by Charles Norman

This is the third article of a series dealing with the wildlife in our area and our relation to it. This week's article features the pelican. We welcome your comments, personal observations and comments - and corrections if your experience differs from what you read here. Every year the series will be published in an annual, full colour, magazine. Your photographs are welcome.

Majestic is the first word that comes to mind when a

small flock of pelicans pass overhead, flying low. Seemingly effortless, with only the occasional wing beat, all in unison, or closely one after the other, they have total command of the air.

It is a privilege to be in the right place, at the right time, as they prepare for the southward migration. Twice I have witnessed it. Once at Hollow Water, where about twenty pelicans, on the lake north of the Hollow Water Community, took off all at once. They milled about, seemingly with nothing special in mind, with no order to their flight pattern, but gradu-

ally, effortlessly, they formed themselves into a circle. After two or three circuits one of them flew south, the others formed up behind it into the classic V, and they were on their way to the southern US or Central America for the winter.

A few days later, more than a hundred of them were seen above the lake at the end of the Belair Road, milling around, again with no evidence of any order or direction. A small circle formed, then another, then the rest of them smoothly formed themselves into a much larger circle.



First the smallest circle found a leader, formed a V behind it and flew south, followed closely by the second circle. Then a single pelican in the third circle took off on a southward tangent, others followed, forming up on the right and left in one huge magnificent V, with only the occasional flap of their great wings to show that the whole process is not as magical as it had seemed.

Another impressive sight is a flock of pelicans, in the water, herding fish into shallower water where they can more easily be caught, sometimes towards another waiting flock. Two years ago, from the west shore of Traverse Bay, My grandson and I watched a flock of pelicans doing this. At first it was impossible to make out, with the naked eye, just exactly what was happening in the distance. It appeared to be an unusual disturbance in the lake, but gradually, as they got closer, it was apparent that the disturbance consisted of upwards of 100 pelicans flapping and splashing their way towards the shore. If one bird got ahead of the shoal of fish it simply took off and joined the hunt from behind. The curious thing was that the pelicans had been joined by another hundred or so cormorants who joined up on either side of the moving front of pelicans.

Pelicans are silent birds, and cannot communicate with each other by sound, so it is difficult to imagine how they can organize themselves into a coordinated herding team. It is even more surprising that a completely different species, knows how to work with them.

Pelicans and double crested cormorants (the local species) often share breeding grounds together and do so in Manitoba, one of the major breeding grounds being the Pipestone Rocks a group of small islands in Grindstone Provincial Park north of Black Island teems with both pelicans and cormorants together with numerous terns and gulls. Pelicans have been known to lay their eggs in cormorant nests but nesting together is quite different from hunting together. It could be that this collective herding was just an isolated incident, or, perhaps, something that only local cormorants have learned to do. It does not appear to be unusual for local pelicans and cormorants to work together. Earlier this summer a flock of several hundred pelicans and cormorants were seen in Pine Falls, flying upstream along the Winnipeg River. (Perhaps an Echo reader can tell us where they were going). Extensive surfing on the net has not revealed any record of this type of behaviour between pelicans and cormorants anywhere else. It would be appreciated if any local commercial fisherman could tell us whether this is unusual, or is a common occurrence.

However, most pelicans feed alone, scooping small fish into their pouch, then throwing their heads back to empty the pouch and swallow the fish.

They eat about three pounds of fish every day, mostly minnows that they can catch close to the surface.

The American white pelican is one of the worlds largest birds. With a wing span of 9 feet it is in the same league as the Andean Condor. Only three others are larger, The Maribou Stork, The Royal Albatross and the Wandering Albatross. The largest officially recorded wing span is for the Wandering Albatross with a span of nearly 12 feet.

There are eight species of pelican, all but one in the Americas. One species in southern Europe is so similar to the American White that it was probably descended from the same stock, and was separated from the American species during the last ice age. Only the American white and its European cousin feed from the surface. All other species of pelican dive for their prey.

The American White pelican was listed as endangered until twenty years ago, but is

recovering well. The increase in local numbers is apparent, even to the casual observer. Manitoba habitat is important to the species - one third of North American pelicans breed in Manitoba - many of them on the Pipestone Rocks in Grindstone provincial Park only 50 miles northwest of here.

Pelicans usually lay two to three eggs, usually two, occa-

sionally one. They are incubated by both sexes and take from 29 to 36 days to hatch. Seldom does more than one chick survive. The second to hatch loses out to the older, (and larger) chick in the competition for food and will often die of starvation. It may then be eaten by its older sibling. Young pelicans are fed a fish soup regurgitated into the front

end of the pouch. The young feed by plunging head and neck into the parents pouch to seek out their meal.
