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# Hollow Water man charged in stabbing death

On November 20<sup>th</sup>, 2006 just before 11:00 p.m. police were called to an incident where a male was discovered deceased near a local church. Investigation determined that the man had been stabbed during an altercation with another man outside a residence. The 33 year old male then walked a short distance and collapsed where he was later found by police.  
RCMP in Powerview and the Serious Crimes Unit of the RCMP continued to investigate and as a result charged 21 year old Rodney Byron WILLIAMS of the Hollow Water First Nation with Manslaughter. WILLIAMS remains in custody at this point in time.  
Officers continue to investigate.

# Fatal accident on Hwy 11

Police received a dispatch to a motor vehicle accident at approximately 3:08 p.m. on Friday November 24<sup>th</sup> on Highway 11 near Jackfish Creek. The head on collision involving two vehicles claimed the life of one man and sent another female to local hospital. Cause of the accident remains under investigation.  
While details of the accident were not available at Press Time, *The Echo* understands that the highway was slippery with wet snow at the time and one of the vehicles went out of control causing the head on collision. Don Burdeny of Belair died at the scene of the accident. The driver of the other vehicle was Barbara McLeod of Victoria Beach who was taken to hospital in Winnipeg with multiple injuries.  
This is the third fatal accident on Hwy. 11 since the road was repaved.

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# December 6 A Day to Remember

On December 6, 1989 a gunman confronted 60 engineering students during class at Montreal's l'Ecole Polytechnique. The men in the classroom were separated from the women, threatened with a .22-calibre rifle, and told to leave the room. Left alone with the women the gunman opened fire. During the shooting the gunman screamed "I hate feminists". One terrified woman pleaded that they were not feminists, just students taking engineering. The deranged gunman continued on his shooting spree covering three floors and several classrooms over a 45 minute period. As he roamed the hallways he screamed "I want women". He shot 27 people, killing 14 women. Thirteen of the mortally wounded were in engineering, one student in nursing. The gunman was a student at l'Ecole Polytechnique who had aspired to study engineering but had not been accepted to the faculty.

December 6 is the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women. In 1991 the Parliament of Canada set Decem-

ber 6 as the day to remember the 14 young women murdered at l'Ecole Polytechnique. These young women died because they were women. December 6 not only commemorates these 14 young women but also provides us with an opportunity to reflect on the violence against women that takes place daily in our communities. Gender based violence, whether it is verbal, sexual or physical, can be eliminated if we work together to deliver the message that equality and respect between men and women is the key to ending violence against women and girls.

Survivor's Hope Crisis Centre asks you to honour this day in your hearts. Imagine a world free of fear and gender violence. We also ask that in your daily lives you not only "talk the talk" but also "walk the walk" to end violence.

## Playing God

Have you ever been tempted to play God? Maybe your not sure you believe in a God, so what's the big deal? Forty years ago a book was written that was called, Games Christians Play. 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## WHAT'S IN THE Cupboard



### CHOCOLATE PINWHEELS

#### Ingredients

- 1/2 c. soft shortening
- 3/4 c. sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 Tbs. milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 1/4 c. sifted flour
- 1/4 tsp. baking powder
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 sq. unsweetend chocolate (1 ounce), melted and cooled

#### Directions

Mix shortening, sugar and egg together. Stir in milk and vanilla. Sift remaining dry ingredients together and stir into mixture.

Divide dough into equal parts. Add chocolate and blend until incorporated uniformly. Chill dough.

Roll out white dough into a 9 by 12 inch rectangle. Roll out the chocolate dough the same size, and lay over the white dough. Roll the double layer of dough gently until 3/16 of an inch thick. Roll up tightly, beginning at the wide end, into a roll 12 inches long and 2 inches in diameter. Chill dough.

Slice 1/8 of an inch thick. Place slices a bit apart on a lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake 10 to 12 minutes in a 350 degree oven

# Cougars Wolves and Wolverines

A Natural History of the East Beaches and the Belair Forest

## Osprey

This is the fourth article of a series dealing with the wild-life in our area and our relation to it. This week's article features the osprey. We welcome your personal observations and comments - and corrections if your experience differs from what you read here. Every year the series will be published in an annual, full colour, magazine. Your photographs are welcome.

The osprey is one of the most widely distributed birds in the world. It is found on lake and ocean shorelines all over the world with the exception of the high arctic, Antarctica and remote oceanic islands. In Canada ospreys breed right across the country, (except the prairies), north to Alaska and the Yukon, the south shore of Hudson's Bay and James Bay. They are not known to breed in the Ungava Peninsula or Labrador.

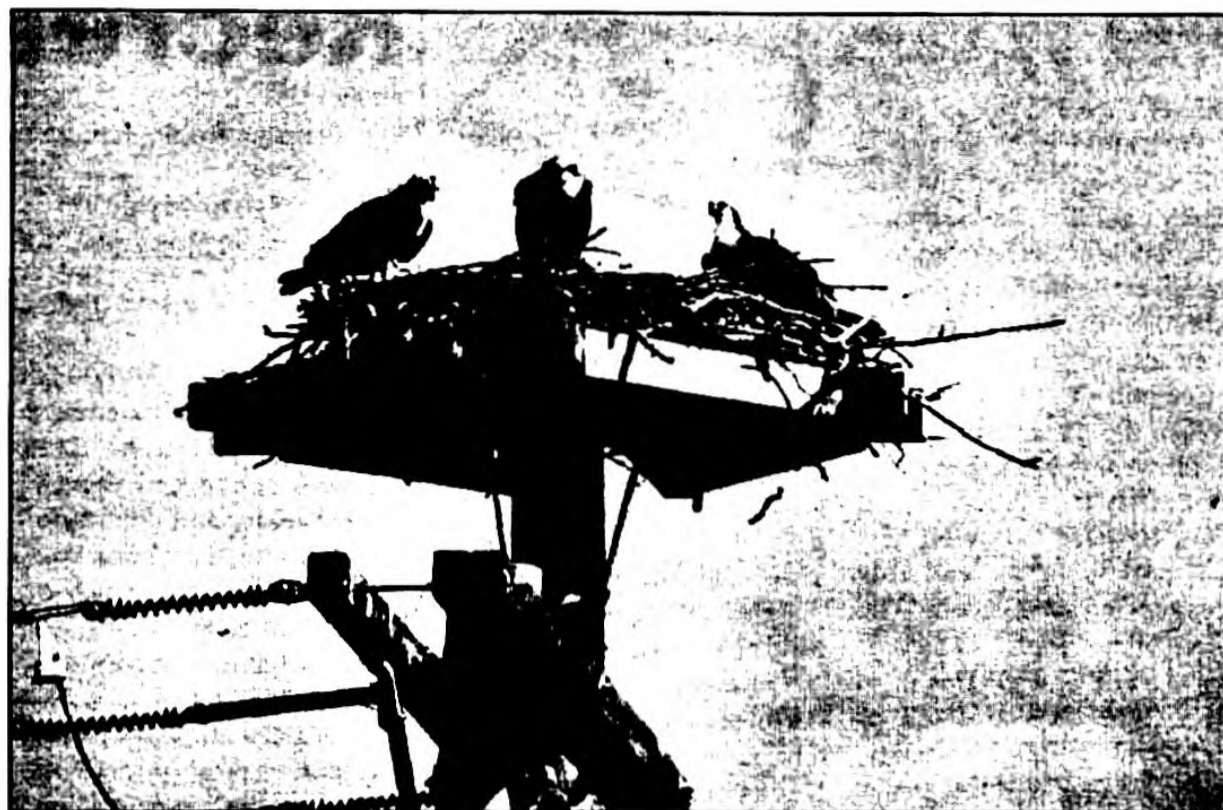
Their nests are not easy to miss. While their preferred nesting site is usually a tall tree with a broken top, here they seem to prefer Hydro poles. There is a nest built on a Hydro substation just outside Grand Beach Provincial Park that has been in use for many years, and another on a pole, (placed by Conservation officers for the purpose) inside the park. There are two on Highway 59, (at Ateah Road and at Hillside Road). Both of these were originally built on hydro poles, but were moved by Manitoba Hydro to another, higher pole close to the original nesting site. The osprey

appeared to have no difficulty in adapting to the new location when they returned the following spring. All nests have one thing in common - they are well removed from any possible ground-based predator. Ospreys are well able to defend their eggs and young from bald eagles, owls or crows.

The nests are large - about three feet across and a foot to eighteen inches deep - built with branches gathered from the ground, or, according to some reports, broken off a tree by the osprey flying at a branch use the impact of their bodies to break it off.

They mate for life and return to the nest year after year, rebuilding or reinforcing it early in the season, and adding to it continuously during the summer. The female lays an average of three buff coloured eggs with dark brown speckles. The female takes care of the four-week incubation period, and stays with the chicks for the following month. During this eight to nine week period, the female and the chicks are fed by the male. By the time the fledglings are able to fly they are demanding up to six fish per day. On average two young ospreys survive to leave the nest. Half of the new brood die in the following year, and another fifteen to twenty percent in the following year. Those that survive live for fifteen to twenty years. One individual is reported to have lived for thirty-five years.

Adults have a dark brown back, with white head and breast. There is a dark streak

from the eye to the back of the head. The breast has brown streaks. Immature osprey are very similar to adults but brown feathers on the back are tipped with white. They acquire adult plumage at about eighteen months

The female is larger than the male, averaging about 3.5 lbs. with a wing-span averaging 64". The male averages about 3 lbs. and has a wing span averaging 62". Other raptors have three toes, the osprey has four, which is unique among raptors. The outer toe is reversible so the osprey can seize its prey with two toes pointing forwards and two backwards. A sharp claw on each toe, and short spikes on each foot enable the osprey

to secure a firm grip on a slippery prey. (Almost always a live fish).

The osprey dives for its prey. They can often be seen patrolling over the lagoon at Hillside Beach, calling to each other with a soft, but penetrating mewing sound. Cruising at thirty to a hundred feet above the lagoon they search for an accessible fish, then dive into the water, with wings half folded and talons outstretched. They disappear under the water and emerge a second or two later with a fish clutched in their claws. They carry the fish head first using both feet. Because their plumage is quite dense they are able to easily shed the water after a dive. Small sucker, pike and pickerel are preferred prey. When threatened the male

will utter a raucous shriek, the female a rapid mew mew

Ospreys breeding here will return to Central America, or the northern states of South America for the winter. The one year olds will remain south for the summer. A third to a half of the two year olds will return here, but do not breed. When sexually mature they will return to their original nesting area to breed. Three year olds will build a new nest. Or occupy a deserted one. Older birds will return to the same nests year after year.

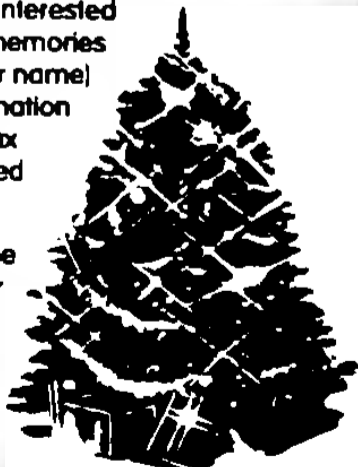

## Cracking down on drug-impaired drivers

Canadians deserve to feel safe when driving on our streets and highways. In recent years, police officers throughout the land have done an excellent job at detecting and arresting drunk-drivers. Through awareness campaigns and unfortunate tragic news stories, Canadians have gained a better understanding of the dangers of driving under the influence of alcohol.

Despite these positive developments, there are still too many innocent lives put at risk everyday by this dangerous behaviour. We need to do more.

We also need to address the serious issue of individuals driving under the influence of drugs. On November 10th 2006, while attending the 19th Annual Project Red Ribbon Campaign, sponsored by Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), Prime Minister Stephen Harper announced that Canada's New Government would soon act to tackle drug-impaired driving. This week I introduced legislation that will do just that.

The proposed reforms to the Criminal Code include:

- Increasing penalties
- \* Drivers will be charged if

found in possession of an illicit drug.

- \* Drivers with blood alcohol levels exceeding .08 will face a life sentence in the case of impaired driving causing death, and a maximum 10-year sentence in the case of causing bodily harm.

- \* Impaired drivers will face higher mandatory minimum penalties. For a first offence, a fine will increase from \$600 to \$1,000. For a second offence, sentencing increases from 14 days to 30 days. For a third offence, sentencing increases from 90 days to 120 days.

Providing more tools for police

- \* Police will be able to require that a person suspected of driving while impaired by alcohol or a drug participate in a roadside sobriety test.

- \* Police will be able to require that a person suspected of driving while impaired by a drug participate in physical tests and offer bodily fluid samples.

Sharply limiting witnesses' evidence

- \* The proposed legislation will aid in the prosecution of driving while impaired by alco-

hol. By restricting the use of "evidence to the contrary" (also known as the "two-beer" defence) in court, these reforms will help limit impaired drivers to scientifically valid defences.

Our Government recognizes the need to target drug-impaired driving. We need to send a strong and effective message that this reprehensible conduct will no longer be tolerated. In fact, we hope to make drug-impaired driving as socially unacceptable as drunk driving has become amongst adults and teens alike.

We salute Mothers Against Drunk Driving for their unwavering efforts to raise awareness and to crack down on impaired drivers. Over the past year we have significantly stepped up our campaign to target both alcohol and drug impairment. Canada's New Government will continue to work with MADD to take meaningful steps to save the lives of innocent Canadians. We are happy to have their continued support for these changes.

## Throne speech

The Throne Speech by the Lieutenant-Governor each year is a chance for the Manitoba Government to explain its vision for the future of the province and the direction that it intends to go to make Manitoba a better place to work, to live and to raise a family. What Manitobans heard in the Throne Speech was disappointing to most Manitobans. The speech made countless re-announcements and neglected to address critical issues, many of which have been outstanding for years. No mention was made of new or competitive tax rates, hallway medicine, or even the Crocus scandal, the issues that should be high on NDP's list of priorities. What concerns me is the absence of a plan to move Manitoba forward. Manitoba's economy is clearly not competitive with its neighbors to the West, yet not a single mention was made of improving Manitoba's economy, encouraging private sector investment or creating quality jobs as a way to help young people in Manitoba. Young Manitobans have the skill and ability to pursue their dreams anywhere in the world. When they make decisions about where to live, they ask themselves where the best opportunities are, and in Manitoba, we are falling farther and

farther behind other provinces, particularly in Western Canada.

My view of the Throne Speech is shared by many others. The Canadian Taxpayers Federation noted that the NDP's efforts to keep young people here are useless if our taxes are still so high. The Federation commented that there was little-to-nothing real in the Throne Speech for taxpayers. The Manitoba Chamber of Commerce was very disappointed and the Chamber commented that the government has not tackled the problem Manitoba has with retaining talent. In addition, there was no mention of help for low income Manitobans and none of the initiatives will lead to create more jobs in Manitoba. The Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce was extremely disappointed and stated that we need to get serious about youth retention, and we can't do that until the government gets serious about tax relief.

**Ask the Neighbourhood Mechanic**

With the coming winter season take time to prep your vehicle. One area that's often overlooked is your car's brakes. Have the braking system inspected and serviced, before ice and snow make driving difficult. If the vehicle is more than four years old have the brake fluid replaced and the system flushed. Brake Fluid is HYGROSCOPIC, (it absorbs water as it ages). We all know that water is heavier than oil. The water migrates to the lowest point on the brake system and that's where all the expensive bits are. Bad things can happen.

I'm a new driver and this is my first winter. Can you ex-

plain if I should buy snow tires? I have a Honda Civic and commute daily.

As we enter the digital age the word-snow tire is no longer used. Tires are specialized and now referred to as winter-tires. Winter-tires are all about grip... (getting traction in adverse conditions) In the winter, driving conditions vary between deep snow to shear ice. Each condition is treated differently. Contact a competent tire installer and ask him the same question. One recommendation I can make, mount your tires on extra rims. This will avoid damage and simplify the installation when the temperature drops.

One more thing, if you drive in heavy snow look into the

advantages of 4 snow tires for fwd applications.

I'm in the market for a used car. The cars in my budget all have high mileage. What kind of service can I expect from a high mileage used car?

It's a myth that cars wear out while running. When in service everything in the running gear is bathed in oil. Metal to metal contact is at a minimum. Engines wear when they start. Grinding over when there is little or no lubrication available. That's why everybody keeps reminding you the make sure you have good clean oil. A high mileage vehicle if maintained may actually be in better shape than an older car with less mileage. As always have the vehicle professionally inspected before you purchase.

## Report from Legislature

### "FOSTER FAMILIES"

The number of children-in-care forced to call hotels "home" is disturbing. According to the government's own statistics, the number of children in hotels across Manitoba is well over 100 on a regular basis, and on August 31<sup>st</sup> of this year, 166 children were placed in hotels. This is a dire situation and one which requires immediate action.

Last week the government announced that it was increasing care rates for foster parents, which came as welcome news. We have been pushing government for increased rates so that more loving parents would be encouraged to become foster parents. The Manitoba Government gave this increase in rates, but failed to tell Manitobans the whole story. The government failed to tell us that it was keeping the Federal Government's \$100 a month National Child

Care Benefit instead of passing it on to foster parents who are in need of this money to provide care to foster children. On the one hand our Child and Family Services Minister was seen to be providing increased funding to foster parents and on the other hand was seen to be clawing back the federal benefits available to foster parents by keeping the federal money for general revenue of the province.

What has the province done with this extra money that should have gone to foster parents? Well since then, the NDP has been spending millions of dollars on election campaign ads. Why would this government spend money to blow its own horn instead of launching an immediate campaign to recruit more foster parents in Manitoba? An election must be coming!

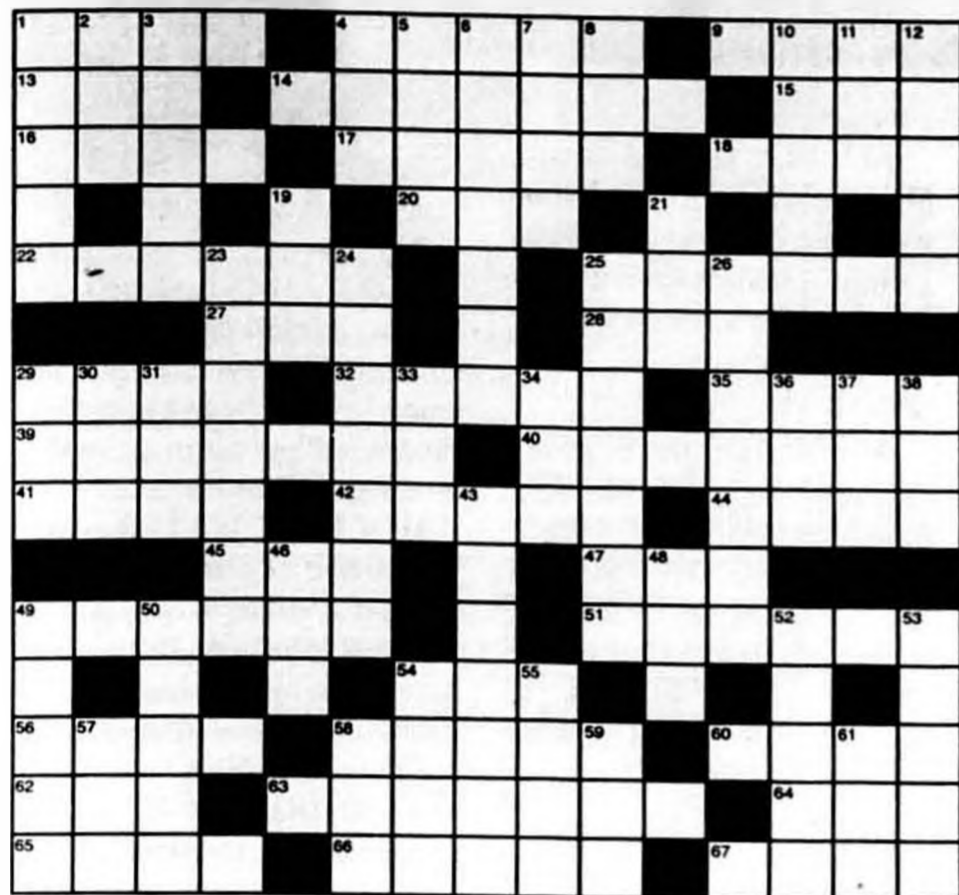

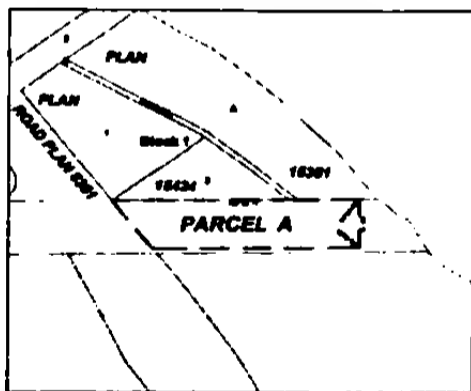
