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Big win for Pine Falls boxing champion

Larry Sharpe now ranks tenth in the world

Pine Falls Phys-ed teacher Larry Sharpe beat Canadian Light Middleweight champion Bryon Mackie in ten rounds in Toronto Wednesday, April 18, to take the Canadian championship. In the process he became Intercontinental Light Middleweight Champion and moved up to tenth in World Boxing Association ranking.

Last fall, Mackie beat Sharpe in a controversial split decision in Toronto, to take Sharpe's Canadian Middleweight title. This fight, at a lighter weight, was quite different. After three, hard fought rounds, Sharpe took control of the fight. Another three rounds and Mackie's face was bleeding and he was obviously on the defensive. His strategy seemed to be to move around the ring trying to avoid Sharpe's

vicious left hook while he got in blows to the body, hoping that Sharpe would tire first.

But Sharpe was getting stronger, rounds five six and seven ended with Mackie on the ropes. Mackie came out fighting in round eight, trading blow for blow, but Sharpe's longer reach gave him the advantage. By the end of the round Mackie was avoiding Sharpe's attack by turning his back.

Sharpe was solidly in control, and in spite of taking three low blows continued on the attack. By the tenth round it was obvious that it would soon be over. Mackie was unable to put up an adequate defence, and the round ended with Mackie taking a series of punishing blows to the head. At the bell

Weather Situation Creating Critical Fire Conditions

The Manitoba Conservation Fire Program reports fire conditions have gone from high to extreme in the eastern part of the province from Bissett south.

Weather forecasts for today are calling for the humidity to be lower than the temperature in several areas of the province. This scenario creates

extreme burning conditions. In addition to potential new fires, those already burning are expected to spread further.

No communities, homes or values are threatened at this time.

The southeast corner of the province is especially dry in the Lac Du Bonnet, Marchand and Piney areas.

The Interlake also remains a concern with a high fire danger level.

Nine fires occurred yesterday, seven in the eastern region, one in the northeast and one in the Interlake.

All fires were human caused. Investigations continue on all the fires. Some of

he walked over to his corner and said, "I'm done". The result was officially recorded as a technical knockout.

Sharpe's wife, Southida was there. "He just dominated from the first bell." She said. "He dominated every single round." She said being there was unbelievable. The fight was very exciting and meeting retired world heavy weight champion Joe Frazier afterwards was surreal. She and Larry talked to Frazier for more than an hour. Sharpe said he was overwhelmed at first but after a few minutes you realized what a people person he is.

The Winnipeg Free Press quoted Sharpe's manager, John Vernaus as saying after the fight, we're on the verge of something big, really big. Larry Sharpe in an interview with *The Echo* said, "Some big opportunities are opening up and his manager has been getting some pretty exciting offers. He said he was not at liberty to discuss them, but the Free Press reported that boxing promoter, Don King was interested, and that Vernaus had heard from promoters in England, Germany and Australia.

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Beaches Anglicans raising money for Uganda High School

A "Loonie-Toonie" book sale is being organized by Beaches Anglicans to raise money to purchase books and tapes for a high school in Uganda. Hard cover books will be Two dollars, paperbacks one dollar. The sale will be held at St Michaels Church Victoria Beach, between 10:00 am and noon on June 30th.

The school opened in 2003, but had its beginnings back in 1992 when an Anglican Priest, Godfrey Mawejje came

as a missionary to Manitoba's Interlake region. His children went to school in Fisher Branch and Mawejje was very impressed by the education his children were getting and the system of education in place. He told The Echo that in Uganda, except in very expensive private schools, children learn by rote. In Fisher Branch his children played a significant part in their own education - by reading, writing and practice.

Mawejje returned to Uganda in 1999 determined to introduce the

Canadian system of education to Uganda. He was not able to convince the authorities so he decided to open his own high school. The result was the "Fisher Branch" Kalagala High School. But it did not happen overnight.

Without money, using unskilled volunteer labour, he persuaded the local community to make the bricks necessary for the project. It took them nearly two years to make 65,000 bricks, starting from scratch. Brick-

sized blocks of clay were piled into beehive shaped hollow structures about 12 feet high. Firewood was laid inside, and set on fire. Grass laid on top of the kiln caught fire when the bricks had reached a high enough temperature. Concrete was mixed by hand, students made their own desks.

The building was built, and has already expanded. It now has 300 students from grade 8 to 13. At age 15 or 16 students write an examination (Ordinary Level) set by Cambridge University and used throughout England and Wales. Two years later they write the Advanced Level examination that gets them into university or college.

Another expansion is planned

The school is a non-denominational school with expenses met by student fees and donations. Since many of the students cannot manage the \$50 per term fees, Mawejje needs all the help he can get. He has had volunteers from Canada teaching there, and money has been raised from private donations and church collections. Solar panels have been donated to provide lighting during power interruptions.

Mawejji returned to Canada in 2001 and is now Archdeacon at St Clements Anglican

Church, south of Selkirk. He has continued to be a driving force in the growth of the school and his enthusiasm, energy and leadership are continuing to make a significant contribution to the school.

The School is located about 20 miles south of Uganda's capital Kampala. It is almost exactly on the equator.

the fires were started from all terrain vehicle (ATV) use in dry grass areas. The public is asked to curtail the use of ATV's until some significant rainfall occurs.

A bulldozer line has been put in around the Seddons Corner fire north or Beausejour. It is hoped the fire will be secured some time today.

Fire lines are not yet firmly established on

three eastern region fires in the Vassar area (sizes of 800 hectares, 500 hectares and 130 hectares).

Two water bombers have already been dispatched to the Vassar area. However, the area is very dry and the lack of water is making it difficult for fire crews and water bombers.

Fire crews from the northwest region have been moved to the south. All eastern and central

crews are on duty.

Rain is in the forecast for tomorrow. However, it is still questionable if it will occur in the southeast corner of the province.

Open fires are prohibited from April 1 to Nov. 15 annually unless a burning permit is obtained or enclosed, approved fire pits are used such as campfire grates in provincial campsites.

Residential School Settlement

Students of residential schools have until August 20 to opt out of settlement.

A settlement has been proposed for former students of residential schools. Those who are not satisfied with the settlement, and do not want to give up the right to sue the government of Canada or any of the churches involved have until August 20, 2007 to opt out.

The settlement provides for \$10,000 for any former student who attended a residential school for one year or part of a year, plus an additional \$3,000 for subsequent years.

The courts have also established a process to allow those former students who suffered sexual or serious physical abuse to get between \$5,000 and \$275,000 each; more if the former student can show a loss of income.

Under the terms of the settlement, \$125 million will go to the Aboriginal Healing Foundation; \$60 million to research, document and preserve the experience of the survivors, and \$20 million for national and community commemorative projects.

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Mushroom & Broccoli Stir-fry

- 2 Tbsps. oil
- 6 oz. small broccoli florets/cooked
- 1/4 lb. canned baby corn cobs
- 1 large leek\cooked, chopped

Instructions

Heat oil in wok or large frying pan. Add broccoli florets and baby corn and stir-fry for 2-3 minutes. Stir in leek, pepper, and mushrooms; stir-fry an additional 2-3 minutes. Stir in soy sauce, honey, ginger, and beans. Cover and cook for 3-4 minutes, or until the beans are thoroughly heated through. Serve immediately.

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Open the Cottage with Safety in Mind

Opening up the cottage on a warm spring weekend is a family tradition for many Manitobans. This spring, keep safety in mind, and you'll be relaxing by the fire in no time.

Prior to beginning any cleanup outside, point out the location of powerlines to your work crew before they begin moving ladders and start other maintenance chores on the property. Ensure that the service entrance line has not come down in a winter ice storm.

Use care if you make your way up onto the roof to inspect shingles or the antenna. While

on the roof, take a few moments to look around from the higher vantage point to see if you can spot any other maintenance that might be necessary. If trees are touching the powerlines, make arrangements to have them trimmed. A tree that comes into contact with a powerline can be energized, creating a hazard for people at ground level.

If you decide to install a television antenna or flagpole, be sure it's positioned far enough away from overhead powerlines so neither you nor the antenna could possibly

touch the line. Be sure the antenna is properly grounded, guyed and secured.

Indoors, it's a good idea to check all of your appliance cords for signs of damage before plugging anything back in - you may have had four-legged visitors chewing on cords over the winter months.

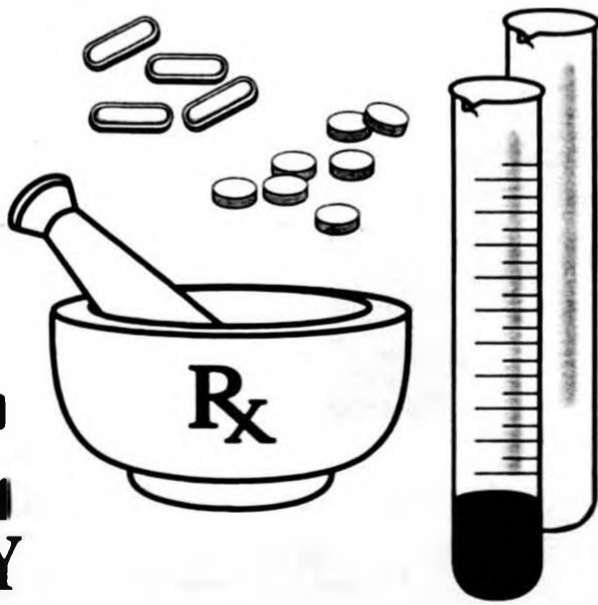

The Selkirk Steelers are ANAVET Cup Champions

Evan Walsh scored at 8:25 of the fourth overtime period to propel the Selkirk Steelers to a 4-3 Game 7 win over the Humboldt Broncos before a rocking crowd of 1,835 at the Selkirk Rec. Complex Sunday night.

"When you get down to that late in the game, it's all about will and it's all about heart," Steelers head coach Keith Cassidy said.

"They emptied the tanks tonight."

Walsh, who was on the Steelers team that lost the 2004 ANAVET Cup to the Kindersley Klippers, was ecstatic after scoring the game-winner.

"It's a little play we do all the time," Walsh described of the goal. "The puck comes down to (Jason) Frykas on the goal line. He looked at me. I looked at him. I went off the guy back door. He put it right on the tape and I shot it off the post and in."

The teams battled through over three periods of overtime, all because Matthew Kirzinger tied the game for Humboldt at 6:23 of the third period.

"I think that was certainly one of the greatest junior 'A'

games ever," Broncos head coach and GM Dean Brockman said. "Words can't describe what kind of game that was, for sure."

After the Steelers got out to a 1-0 lead in the first period, Adam Sergerie gave the Steelers a 2-0 goal cushion with a power play goal. Humboldt would reply though, with goals from Russ Nielsen and Steven Schroeder to tie the game at two. Russ Payne netted a late second-period goal to put the Steelers up 3-2 through 40 minutes.

Cody Didychuk was named the ANAVET Cup MVP after making 44 saves.

Kory Teneycke, Executive Director of the Canadian Renewable Fuels Association, said, "We are proud to support the ecoABC program, as it will help farmers invest directly in biofuels facilities, not just supplying them with grain."

So this program will mean more than just a bigger market for producers. It will mean real diversification and expansion of the rural economy. In short, it's a win-win situation. Canadians will reap environmental benefits, our farmers and rural communities will profit, and by continuing to work towards a viable domestic biofuels industry we will secure Canada's place in the growing bio-economy.

Conservatives remain committed to rural Canada. Conservative MPs represent the vast majority of rural constituencies in the House of Commons, and my colleagues and I will continue to develop policies and programs that help rural Canada thrive and prosper for generations to come.

It will take serial years to payback the cost of the installation. (Martin later informed me that some building managers will not allow propane vehicles into their underground parking facilities.)

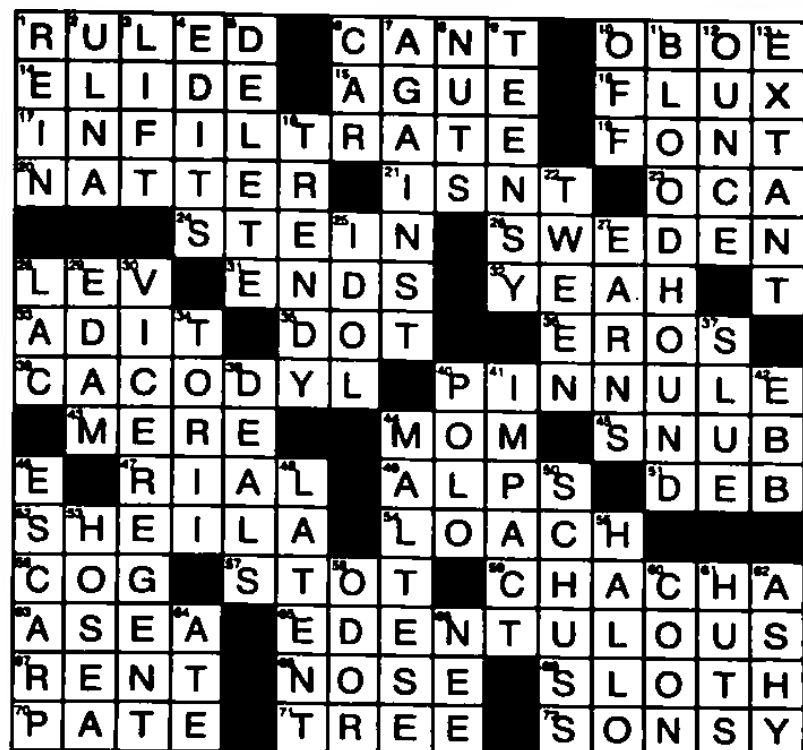

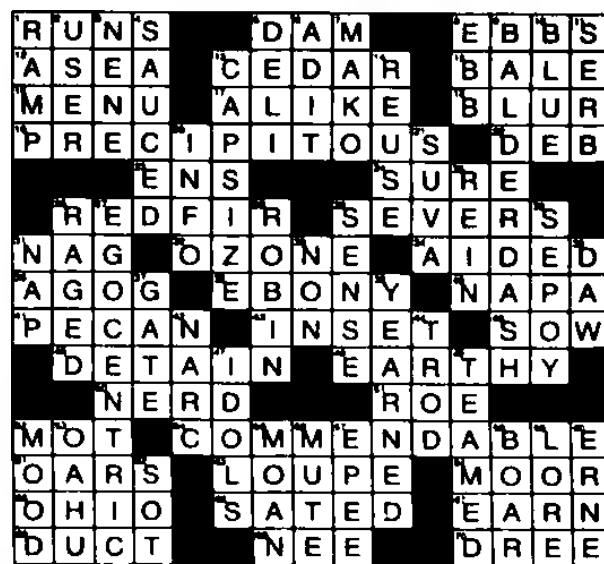
