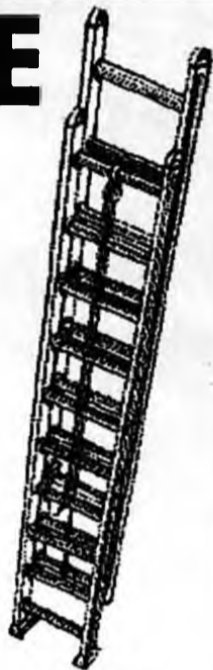

A used book sale held outside St. Michaels Church in Victoria Beach Saturday netted \$652.51 for the Fisher Branch Kalagala High School in Uganda.

The school was founded by Archdeacon Robert Mawejji, Anglican priest at St Clements Church near Selkirk. The school, a secular school, uses Canadian teaching methods as opposed to teaching by rote, which is the most common system in Uganda. Kalagala is on the equator, between Kampala, the Capital of Uganda, and Entebbe, on Lake Victoria. Entebbe is Uganda's major airport.

The proceeds of the sale will be used to purchase textbooks for the school. Only half of the books on sale on Saturday were sold. There will be another opportunity for anyone who missed last Week's sale - the remaining books will be on sale next Saturday afternoon, be-

tween 1:00 pm and 3:00 pm, at the home of Diana Pennington at 1 McCord Drive in Victoria Beach. McCord Drive is off McCawley Road. It is not in the restricted area. Books are \$2:00 for hard cover and \$1:00 for paperbacks.



What is Abuse of Older Adults?

Abuse of older adults refers to actions that harm an older person or jeopardize the person's health or welfare. Abuse of older adults is also known as senior or elder abuse. According to the World Health Organization, abuse and neglect of older adults can be a single or a repeated act. It can occur in any relationship where there is an expectation of trust or where a person is in a position of power or authority. Abuse can be Physical, emotional, verbal, financial, sexual and spiritual. Some types of abuse of older adults involve violation of their rights. Financial abuse is considered the most common form of abuse in older adults. Neglect involves not doing something such as not providing the older person with food, shelter, medication or care. Older adults often experience more than one form of abuse and neglect. For example, they may be emotion-

ally and financially abused, or emotionally and physically abused. Some older may be neglected and have their rights violated.

Who Are the Victims?

Abuse of neglect can happen to any older adult. In fact, contrary to commonly held beliefs, most older adults who experience abuse or neglect are mentally competent, are not dependent on other people & do not require constant care. It can occur in any relationship, including one where there is an expectation of trust or where a person is in a position of power or authority. Abuse or neglect of older adults can take place in the home, in a residential care setting, or in the community.

Who are the Abusers?

Abuse of older adults most often occurs within the family, by a spouse, children, and/or grandchildren. However, abusers can also include friends, neighbors, paid care providers, landlords and staff, or any individual in a position of power, trust, or authority.

How Many Older Adults are Affected by Abuse or Neglect?

Research on abuse of older adults is relatively new and limited in Canada and throughout the world. Abuse and neglect of older adults is often hidden and under-reported. In many cases people may not recognize abuse and neglect of older adults when it is happening. They may not understand what it is.

Canadian research indicates that between 4 and 10% of older adults experience one or more forms of abuse or neglect at some point in their later years from someone they trust or rely on. Under-reporting and inconsistencies in collecting information on abuse suggest that these figures are "the tip of the iceberg."

Some older adults may be likely to experience abuse or neglect, including those who are isolated, and those who have mental or physical impairments.

It is estimated that between 168,000 and 421,000 seniors in Canada are experiencing or have experienced abuse or neglect later in life.

Did you know?

About 80% of abuse or neglect of older adults is hidden or goes undetected. Only one in five cases of abuse come to the attention of community agencies or authorities.

Abuse is not limited to older adults of any particular culture, ethnic group, social

Background, or religion. Spousal abuse can "grow old." It can start earlier in a relationship and continue into later life.

Older women are the victims in about two-thirds of the cases of abuse or neglect that come to the attention of community agencies.

Abuse is a Form of Family Violence

Many forms of abuse and neglect of older adults are types of family violence. A 2004 national

looked at police reports from across Canada found:

Adult children were involved in 38% of family assaults against older adults.

Spouses were involved in 26% of assaults against older adults

Older men were more likely than older women to be victimized by an older adult child. Older women were more likely than older men to experience violence at the hands of their spouse.

The most common type of senior abuse situations that come to the attention of the police involve younger seniors between the ages of 65 and 69.

Common assault was the most frequent type of harm to older adults from family members that was reported to police. Common assault may involve hitting or attacking with minor or no injury.

However, four in 10 older adults who were victims of family violence suffered physical injuries.

The reported pointed out that the consequences of family violence can be very serious in some cases. Abuse situations often become worse over time. Older adults can die from family violence. The rates of family homicide against adult's aged 65 and

over have increased in the last decade.

Why Do Abused Older People Often Keep Silent?

There is no excuse for abuse or neglect. However, there are many reasons why older people might keep silent. Some believe that the abusive situation they are in is a normal part of life. They think that they are in the wrong of have caused the abuse. In many cases the person may be afraid of -

What will happen to them "will the situation get worse?" Will I be forced from my home?"

What will happen to the abuser "will he/she go to jail?"

What will the neighbors, family, or community think, "What will people say?"

Some older adults may feel they have no place to go, or do not want to leave the home they love, and have invested in with both time and money. They may have concerns about leaving family members and beloved pets. These fears and concerns are real. Older adults are becoming aware that they do not have to live with abuse or neglect. Living Above Average

God did not create us to live a mediocre or even just an average life. You and I were uniquely created with tremendous potential for excellence. TV shows like Canadian Idol tell us that everyone wants to be recognized. For example listen to little children tell you, "Watch me! Watch me! Adults do the same thing just less blatantly, with clothing, cars and houses. You soon realize that deep within every human heart there is a desire for recognition.

Jabez was a man who is listed in the Bible as "one who was more honorable than his

brothers." (1 Chronicles 4:9&10) The name Jabez means "in much pain." Yet Jabez dared to pray and ask God, "I want you to bless me and enlarge my territory. Let your hand be with me and keep me from harm so that I will be free from pain." And the Bible tells us that God granted his request.

Jabez demonstrates to us three principles that can help you to live above an average life. First Jabez had a great ambition. Jabez said, "God I want your blessing big time." Jabez wanted to expand his territory and grow his life. Most people drift through life without a great ambition. They settle for being average. When you lose your dream for excellence, you soon stop growing. When you stop dreaming you stop setting goals and settle for living below your

potential. All living things start to die when you stop growing. So allow your dream for life to be so big that you have to live to be 100 to grow into it.

The second principle that Jabez demonstrated was a growing faith. William Carey a great missionary to India once said, "Attempt great things for God, expect great things from God." Jabez dared to ask God to bless him and expand his territory. There is something more than being talented, more important than ability or even education and that is to have great faith. Jabez was not satisfied with being ordinary so he exercised great faith and asked God to increase his territory. This would require that his faith would continue to increase as well.

The third principle that Jabez demonstrated for an

above average life was a growing prayer life. It doesn't take a growing faith to pray; "Now I lay me down to sleep..... kind of prayers. Jabez was specific in his request to God, "Enlarge my territory." The Bible tells us in James 4:2, "You have not because you ask not" also "You ask and do not receive because you ask with wrong motives." God desires to answer our

prayer when we ask largely and ask unselfishly.

Are you bored with living a mediocre or average life? My friend I challenge you to have a great ambition for your life, have a growing faith in God and a prayer life that attempts great things for God.

 Summer time can mean highway travel, boating trips, camping, swimming and fun at the cottage. While all these activities create lasting summer memories, they all share the potential for injury. Be prepared for a safe and fun season.

How can we Keep Safe In and Around Water?
 Have everyone try on their lifejacket to see that it still fits and that all the zippers and buckles are in good working order.

When boating, always wear a lifejacket. Even in nice weather, even close to shore - 200 people drown every year in Canada. Lifejackets really do save lives.

Regardless of the location, ensure children are supervised; whether at home or on vacation. Adult supervision is the best protection for children - even for those who can swim. Ensure your backyard pool

is fully fenced with a self-closing, self-latching gate.

Don't consume alcohol before or during swimming or boating activities.

What are the Appropriate Child Restraints for Vehicles?

Stage One: Rear facing infant seat from birth until your baby is about 1 year old.

Stage Two: Forward facing Child Seat. Use a forward facing Child Seat from 10 kg (22 lb) until 18 kg. (40 lb.), generally from about age 1 to 4 1/2 years.

Stage Three: Booster Seat. Use a booster seat from 18 kg (40 lb) generally from about age 4 to 8 years. **Stage Four:** Seat Belt. Use the vehicle rear seat and seat belt (ideally with a shoulder belt) from the time your child has outgrown the booster seat, about age 8.

What Can We Do To Prevent Common Injuries?

Review fire safety rules with the kids. They shouldn't play with matches, poke the fire, or roughhouse near the flames where they might fall in.

Hot dogs around the campfire are great but can be easily lodged in young children's throats. If you have toddlers, make sure to cut the hotdog lengthwise and then into small pieces.

Be sure children play on age-appropriate playground equipment. Falls are a leading cause of injury for kids.

Keep pool chemicals, pest control substances and cleaners out of the reach of children.

Sagkeeng's Class of 2007 includes three Ojibway speakers

The winds of change are blowing through Sagkeeng. There was a time, not very long ago, when young people from Sagkeeng had little interest in learning Ojibway, so when three of this year's graduating class are fluent in the language it is an indication of a growing attachment to the culture and traditions of the Ojibway people. One of the graduates, Rae Dawn Fontaine, who received four awards including the Governor General's Award for highest academic standing referred to it in her Valedictorian address.

She started out in much the same style as thousands of other Valedictorian addresses across North America. She thanked the teachers for their support and encouragement, and singled out school secretary Rose Gerard for the support she gave the students. She then turned to compliment the other graduates, those from other reserves who studied away from home, and those older students who had the courage to return to school. She congratulated the three graduates who are Ojibway speakers - David Eaglestick, Clifford Coyne and Raymond Beaulieu - "Today it's a big thing to speak Ojibway," she said, "because there are so many who do not speak the language. To have three graduates out of ten who can speak Ojibway is something very special. Now these guys can pass on the Ojibway language to the next generation.

Rae Dawn Fontaine then left behind the standard Valedictorian Address and reflected her generations growing con-

fidence in themselves and in their future when she spoke of a "Seventh Generation Prophecy. According to this the time would come when "man would grow ashamed of the way that he had treated his mother and provider, the Earth." And after seven generations of living in close proximity with Europeans, the First Nations would rise up and demand that their stewardship over the Earth be respected and restored.

"This change is evident today." She said. "Our leadership has launched a precedent setting lawsuit seeking control over three million square kilometers of Sagkeeng's traditional hunting and fishing lands outside the existing treaty boundaries."

"We are all the seventh generation, she said, "and we can carry on the changes that are coming: we have the education and confidence to continue the demand that our rights as First Peoples be respected and restored. It is an exciting time."

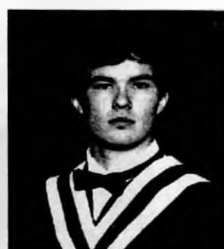

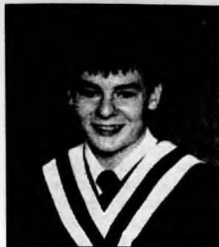

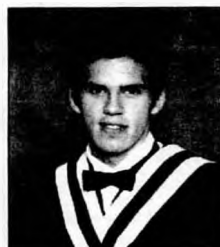

Ask the Neighbourhood Mechanic

Now that the warm weather is finally here let's take a minute to talk about getting your car ready for the long hot summer ahead. A short check list. Have the cooling system inspected. Hoses, clamps and the condition of the radiator itself. If the coolant is more than five years old consider having it replaced. The additives in the coolant get used up and require replenishment. Pay attention to the belts, again over five years in service look for replacement. Test the air condition system. If it doesn't feel as cold as you remember it might need a top up. The chemicals in the unit tend to leak down. The units should be serviced by a pro to insure that the job is done right. If your car is older consider change up to organic refrigerant. Sold under the brand "DURACOOOL" this product will not damage the ozone layer or contribute to greenhouse gasses. Finally let's not forget the wiper blades. I was surprised to learn that manufactures recommend that the blades be changed every 6 months. At the very least have them inspected. One more

thing. Swap-out the blue washer fluid that we used all winter for the red stuff that we will need to get those bugs off the glass. Next week we'll continue with some tire talk.

My car has developed a small crack at the base of the windshield. The shop I deal with is recommending a new glass. Money is tight. Is a windshield replacement required or can I continue to drive with the cracked glass.

Do not pass go. Your shop is giving you excellent advice. The glass in modern cars is actually part of the roof and cow! support structure and adds rigidity to the entire structure. Secondly in the event of an airbag deployment the glass supports the bag and directs it toward the passengers. This task would be compromised by a cracked glass. Best advice is to change the glass ASAP.

I have a 2002 Honda Odyssey with 117,000km on it. Past weekend I noticed that whenever the vehicle reaches 80km/h to 90km/h range, it sputters and shakes as if its struggling. But then as the speed passes 90km/h it is fine. There are no warning indicator lights coming up on the dash. I'm very concerned. What is happening with my vehicle? Does it have anything to do with the

EGR valve?

Hard to answer without actually driving the car. The first question I would have is what is the service history? If the vehicle hasn't had care recently that is where I would focus my energies. Modern cars continually readjust the tune until there is no more adjustment left. Filters tend to fill up and clog. Plugs wear. This might be your issue.

Simplifying the Passport System

Many Canadians know first hand that the demand for Canadian passports has never been greater. Canadians move freely back and forth across the US border with great frequency. However, the US has moved forward with the Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative, which will require travelers to the US to produce passports at border crossings. This requirement is already in place for air travel, and is on the way for land and sea crossing (although the implementation of this element has been delayed).

What this has meant for Canadians applying for pass-

ports is an unprecedented surge in volume over the past seven months, which came on the heels of a general steady increase in applications since September 11, 2001.

Our government has moved to respond to this challenge swiftly, by increasing capacity. We've launched a staffing campaign for hundreds of new full time passport employees, and extended hours in many passport offices. We've moved operations to larger facilities and expanded office space where needed, added evening shifts, modernized technology and streamlined processes.

Specifically for border and rural communities, we've opened 65 additional receiving agents for applications at some Canada Post and Service Canada centres. And this summer, Passport Canada will be holding passport clinics across the country with a special focus on border areas and areas far from large urban centres. Passport officers will be on site in these communities to answer questions, and review and process applications.

And recently, our government announced that as of August 15, 2007, a Simplified Passport Renewal Program will be available. It will mean a shorter application form and less stringent documentation requirements for those who are replacing an existing passport. It will apply to Canadians who:

Are residing in Canada

at the time they apply;

Resided in Canada at the time of their previous application; and

Were 16 years old or over at the time of their previous application.

For the simplified process to apply, the previous passport also must have been valid for five years; must have been issued after January 31, 2002; must have never been damaged or reported as lost or stolen; and must have been issued under the holder's current name.

We will also be implementing a new and simpler guarantor policy as of October 1, 2007, which will allow most Canadian adult passport holders to act as guarantors for first time applicants. I would encourage any constituent with questions or concerns about the upcoming new passport policies to visit www.ppt.gc.ca to read more about how the government is simplifying this important process.

Our government is working

hard to provide quick and high-quality passport services to Canadians. With these new initiatives, we're preparing for the future. We remain committed to ensuring that Canadians will receive the highest standard of service.

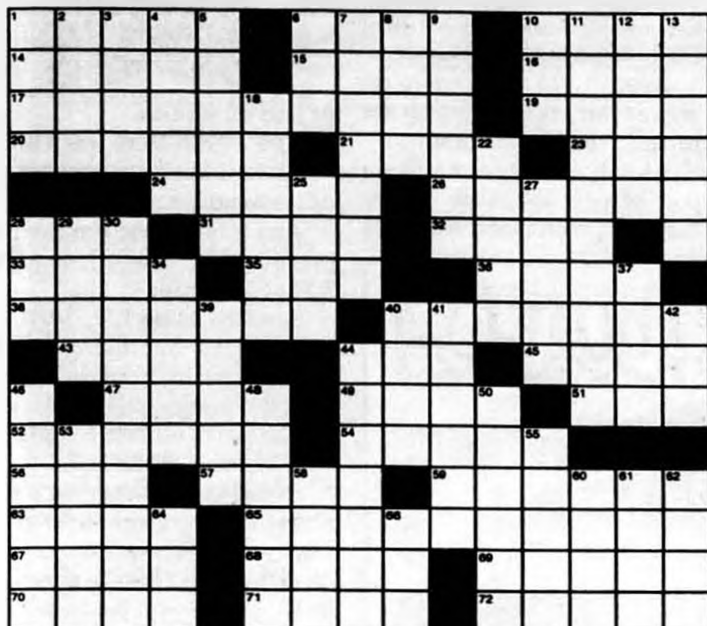


