Maple Street repair underway

Long-suffering residents on Maple Street in Pine Falls will soon have a properly paved road in front of their property.

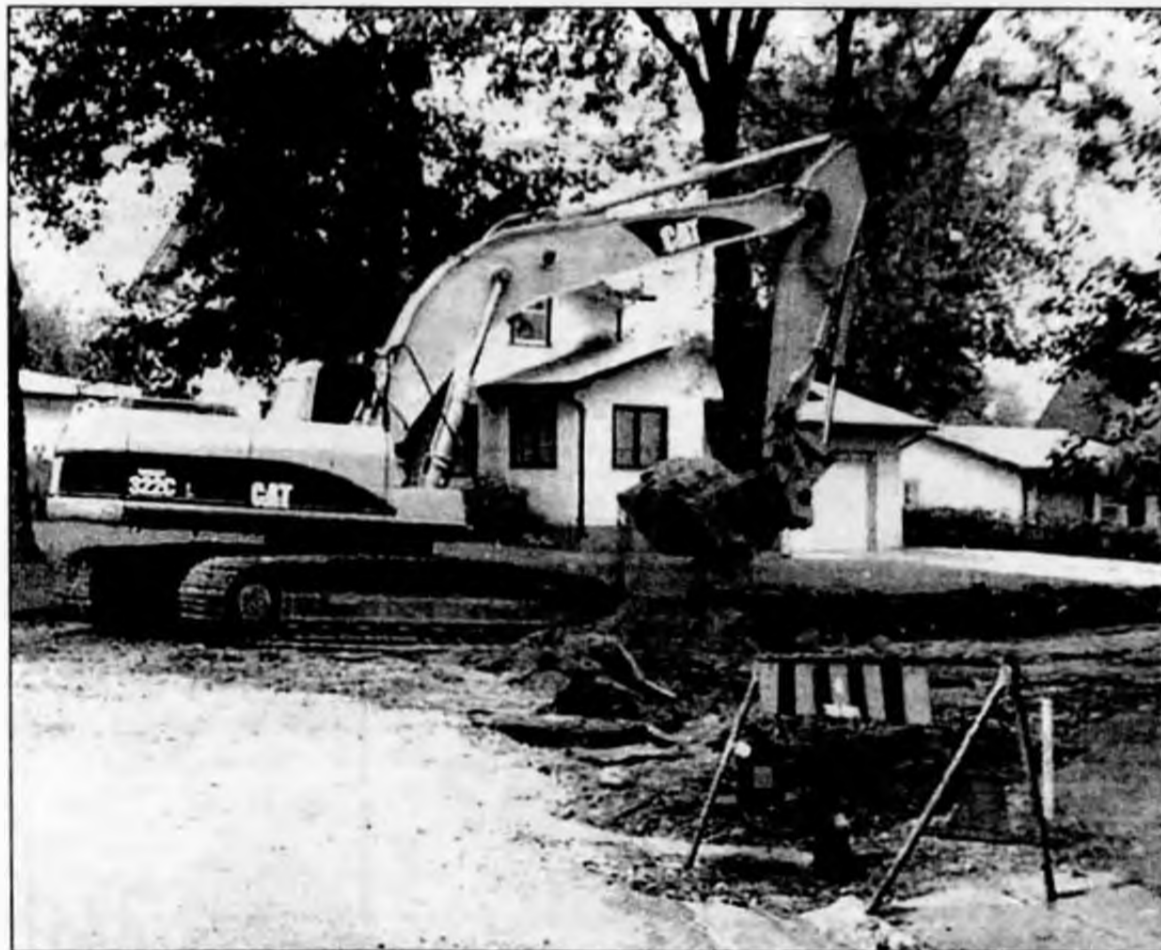
The road was excavated last year to enable storm sewers to be installed. The storm sewer installation eliminated the frequent basement flooding that was a perennial prob-

lem in parts of the town, but, because backfill settling had to be allowed for, the excavated road could not be immediately repaved.

Loose fill is now being excavated and being replaced with material that can easily be compacted to provide a stable base for the new pavement. The excavated fill is being used

on Dupont which is being extended as an all-weather road to intersect with Maple Street south of the hospital.

Powerview/Pine Falls Public Works Superintendent Larry Stinson said the paving contract covers an eight week period but he expects that the work will be completed by mid-October.



Local man hospitalized with West Nile Virus

The Pine Falls Hospital has had its first case of West Nile Virus. There have been a few cases of local people contracting the virus, but, until two weeks ago no one had been ill enough to be admitted to hospital. He has fully recovered.

Flu-like symptoms, accompanied by severe muscle weakness are the most common indications of the disease. It is spread by mosquitoes and so far the species that can spread the virus have not all been identified. One species in particular, which lays its eggs directly into stagnant water, rather than alongside open ditches and the like, seems to be a major culprit. It is most active after the middle of July.

Many people infected may have no symptoms at all and not be aware that they have contacted the disease, others experience only mild symptoms lasting about five days. Perhaps one in fifty of those infected may develop meningitis or encephalitis. (inflammation of the brain).

There is no cure or vaccine. The only effective way to prevent the disease is to avoid being bitten by the mosquito in the first place. You can do this by eliminating all standing water on your property, eaves

troughs bird baths etc. Otherwise you can avoid exposing yourself to the insect by using insect repellent or avoiding being outside after dusk or in shaded areas.

The virus is known to affect more than 100 species of birds and mammals, including humans horses and gorillas.

The virus was first discovered in 1937, in Uganda, where gorillas were relatively common at the time. It first spread to the Mediterranean area. And was discovered in horses in France and Egypt in 1960. Between 1950 and 1999 there were outbreaks in South Africa, Israel, Romania and Russia.

Then birds in Canada and the US began dying, sometimes falling from the sky, and it became apparent that we were facing a particularly virulent form of the virus which can cause paralysis and death.

With proper medical care, the disease is seldom fatal, and deaths are mostly limited to the elderly. Last year there were 151 cases diagnosed in Canada. Two of them were fatal. In the first seven months of this year, i.e. from January to July, there were 20 cases in Canada, all of them in Manitoba, none of them fatal.

Pineview Minor Hockey Association promoting free hockey

The Pineview Minor Hockey Association (PMHA) is offering free hockey for 4, 5, and 6 year old (Initiators) for the 2007-2008 hockey season. This represents a fundamental piece of a strategic plan to grow enrollment in PMHA. It is common knowledge that most rural populations are in a state of decline with the number of children getting fewer and fewer each year. Further, hockey is typically thought to be an expensive sport with high cost fees and travel. Collectively, PMHA decided it was time to ensure that more kids have an opportunity to be exposed to the joys of the game and the whole hockey community. The hope is the parents and kids who benefit from our free hockey program will continue to be involved throughout our system. PMHA is also attempting to get the message out by distributing 750 hockey pamphlets into our four surrounding schools.

In addition, to free hockey at the Initiator level, PMHA has frozen Hockey Fees at 2006 lev-

els. On average this represents a saving of about \$30 dollars a player based on past average increases around the 6% level. This is a not a fortune but in our current local economic climate every little bit helps. Further, the freeze in Hockey Fees ensures that PMHA fees remain among the lowest in the entire province. The fees in PMHA are still on the lower end when one factors in the \$128 dollars plus GST each family must pay to use PRC facilities.

How can PMHA afford such revenue reducing initiatives? The major funding for the fee reductions will come from a "Food Services Agreement" struck with the Town of Powerview-Pine Falls that promises to share significant revenue from the Pine Falls Arena canteen with PMHA. In the past, PMHA received zero revenue from its volunteerism in the canteen and was forced to engage in other fundraising activities. PMHA parents will now be solely responsible for the Pine Falls Arena Can-

teen. The parents shall volunteer 10 hours in the canteen per player. Those who chose to opt out of the canteen work may do so by paying an extra \$150 fee. The Town has partnered with PMHA and invested in kids on a one year trial basis. The hope is it will grow into something that allows both parties to brag that they value children and offer the lowest cost recreation in the entire province. Families moving into rather than out of our community.

The Pineview Recreation Commission (PRC) is also on board with the vision to grow hockey in our community. The PRC has an agreement with PMHA to freeze ice rental fees at 2006-2007 levels for the next 24 months.

The Pine Falls Arena is tentatively slated to open around September 20th, with a potential for a skills camp in the first week and hockey



practices to follow the next week. Due to printing deadlines this article was submitted prior to our annual registration night on September 10th, 2007. Any players who missed registration evening may do so at the PRC office until 4:00pm September

17th, 2007 without penalty. Registrations received after the late registration deadline will be subject to a \$25 dollar administration fee. The PMHA would like to invite everyone out to the rink this year to enjoy the exciting hockey and

great food in the canteen. Please read the Echo for future press releases and game times. Lastly, we ask everyone to take someone skating this season and help us grow hockey in our community. Go Saints! Go Saints!

Mandatory Physical Education for students

Students who are entering grades 9 and 10 this year will be the first required to complete physical education courses through all four years of high school, Education, Citizenship and Youth Minister Peter Bjornson announced today.

"We are moving quickly to implement the recommendations in the Healthy Kids, Healthy Futures Task Force Report, which includes a physical education/health curriculum for grades 11 and 12," Bjornson said.

"Encouraging our students to develop healthy, active minds and bodies is a priority for this government," said Healthy Living Minister Kerri Irvin-Ross. "We are providing opportunities for students both inside and outside the classroom to develop exercise habits they can carry with them throughout their lives."

Under the new policy, among the first-of-its-kind in the country, students entering Grade 10 will complete four credits of physical education by graduation once grades 11 and 12 physical education/health (PE/HE) curricula are implemented in September 2008.

The curricula will focus on developing active, healthy lifestyles through in-class and out-of-class activities. Students will

be encouraged to take greater ownership of their own physical fitness and find activities suited to their interests and abilities.

Students entering Grade 11 this year will have to earn only the Grade 12 PE/HE credit to graduate with a minimum of 29 credits. Students graduating after 2008-09 will require 30 credits. Those entering Grade 11 in the 2008-09 school year will have to earn one PE/HE credit in Grade 11 and one in Grade 12.

In-class instructional time led by teachers may be supplemented with out-of-class options that require teacher and parent or guardian sign-off. Out-of-class physical activities eligible for credit will include a wide variety of possibilities tailored to the student needs, interest and opportunities.

The Manitoba government has introduced several resources to promote physical activity for children and families in response to the all-party Healthy Kids, Healthy Futures Task Force Report released in June 2005. The task force examined issues such as nutrition, physical activity and injury prevention, and identified priorities, initiatives and actions that can be implemented over the short, medium and long term to provide support for healthy environments.

Love And The Cabbie

I was in New York the other day and rode with a friend in a taxi. When we got out, my friend said to the driver, "Thank you for the ride. You did a superb job of driving." The taxi driver was stunned for a second. Then he said, "Are you a wise guy or something?" "No, my dear man, and I'm not putting you on. I admire the way you keep cool in heavy traffic." "Yeah," the driver said and drove off. "What was that all about?" I asked. I am trying to bring love back to New York," he said. "I believe it's the only thing that can save the city." "How can one man save New York?" "It's not one man. I believe I have made that taxi driver's day. Suppose he has 20 fares. He's going to be nice to those 20 fares because someone was nice to him. Those fares in turn will be kinder to their employees or shopkeepers or waiters or even their own families. Eventually the goodwill could spread to at least 1,000 people. Now that isn't bad, is it?" "But you're depending on that taxi driver to pass your

goodwill to others." "I'm not depending on it," my friend said. "I'm aware that the system isn't foolproof so I might deal with ten different people today. If out of ten I can make three happy, then eventually I can indirectly influence the attitudes of 3,000 more." "It sounds good on paper," I admitted, "but I'm not sure it works in practice." "Nothing is lost if it doesn't. It didn't take any of my time to tell that man he was doing a good job. He neither received a larger tip nor a smaller tip. If it fell on deaf ears, so what? Tomorrow there will be another taxi driver I can try to make happy." "You're some kind of a nut," I said. "That shows how cynical you have become. I have made a study of this. The thing that seems to be lacking, besides money of course, for our postal employees, is that no one tells people who work for the post office what a good job they're doing." "But they're not doing a good job." "They're not doing a good job because they feel no one cares if they do or not. Why shouldn't

someone say a kind word to him?" We were walking past a structure in the process of being built and passed five workmen eating their lunch. My friend stopped. "That's a magnificent job you men have done. It must be difficult and dangerous work." The workmen eyed my friend suspiciously. "When will it be finished?" "June, a man grunted. "Ah. That really is impressive. You must all be very proud." We walked away. I said to him, "I haven't seen anyone like you since The Man From LaMancha." "When those men digest my words, they will feel better for it. Somehow the city will benefit from their happiness." "But you can't do this all alone!" I protested. "You're just one man." "The most important thing is not to get discouraged. Making people in the city become kind again is not an easy job, but if I can enlist other people in my campaign..." Manitoba property Rental Guidelines for 2008

Finance Minister Greg Selinger announced the 2008 guideline for rent increases has been set at two per cent effective Jan. 1.

"The guideline is determined annually and takes into account cost increases including utilities, property taxes, maintenance and other expenses in the operation of a residential complex," Selinger said.

The guideline applies to most residential rental properties including apartments, single rooms, houses and duplexes. The guideline does not apply to:

- rental units renting for \$1,070 or more per month as of Dec. 31, 2007;
- personal-care homes;
- non-profit housing with subsidized rent;
- approved rehabilitated rental units; and
- new buildings that are:
 - less than 15 years old, where an occupancy

permit was first issued or a unit first occupied after April 9, 2001, or:

- less than 20 years old, where an occupancy permit was first issued or a unit first occupied after March 7, 2005.

Landlords can apply for an increase above the guideline if they can show the guideline will not cover cost increases they have incurred. Tenants can object to any rent increase, whether it is at, below or above the guideline, by writing to the Residential Tenancies Branch at least 60 days before the date of the rent increase.

Tenants must receive written notice of a rent increase at least three months before the increase takes effect. For example, for a rent increase to take effect Jan. 1, 2008, tenants must receive notice by Sept. 30, 2007. With few exceptions, rent can only be increased once a year.

Selinger noted that, recently, there has been

a significant increase in new rental construction in Winnipeg. In the past five and a half years (2002 to June 2007) there have been 2,545 new starts of various forms of rental housing in Winnipeg. This is more than the number (1,244) of rental starts that occurred in Winnipeg over the entire previous 10 years (1992 to 2001).

The minister also noted that, in recent years, landlords have been making capital improvements and rehabilitations to many rental properties. From 2001 to June 2007, landlords have rehabilitated over 4,000 units and re-invested more than \$160 million into rental stock.

It's great to be on top of the "mountain of life." When everything is going great, you've just been promoted in your job, the doctor's report came back good and there's not a cloud in the sky. But what do you do when you hit rock bottom? You've lost your job and your health and you're spouse is getting ready to walk out on you and your friends have forsaken you. Do you wonder if you can go on?

There are a number of responses that are common in such a situation. You can become deeply depressed, you can turn to alcohol and drugs or you can withdraw from life and hide in a cave. David the great king of Israel hit rock bottom in his life. David's success as a giant killer had brought him great fame and he was destined to be the next king of Israel. Then it hap-

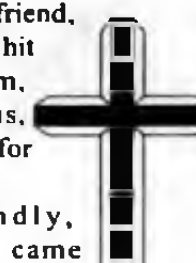

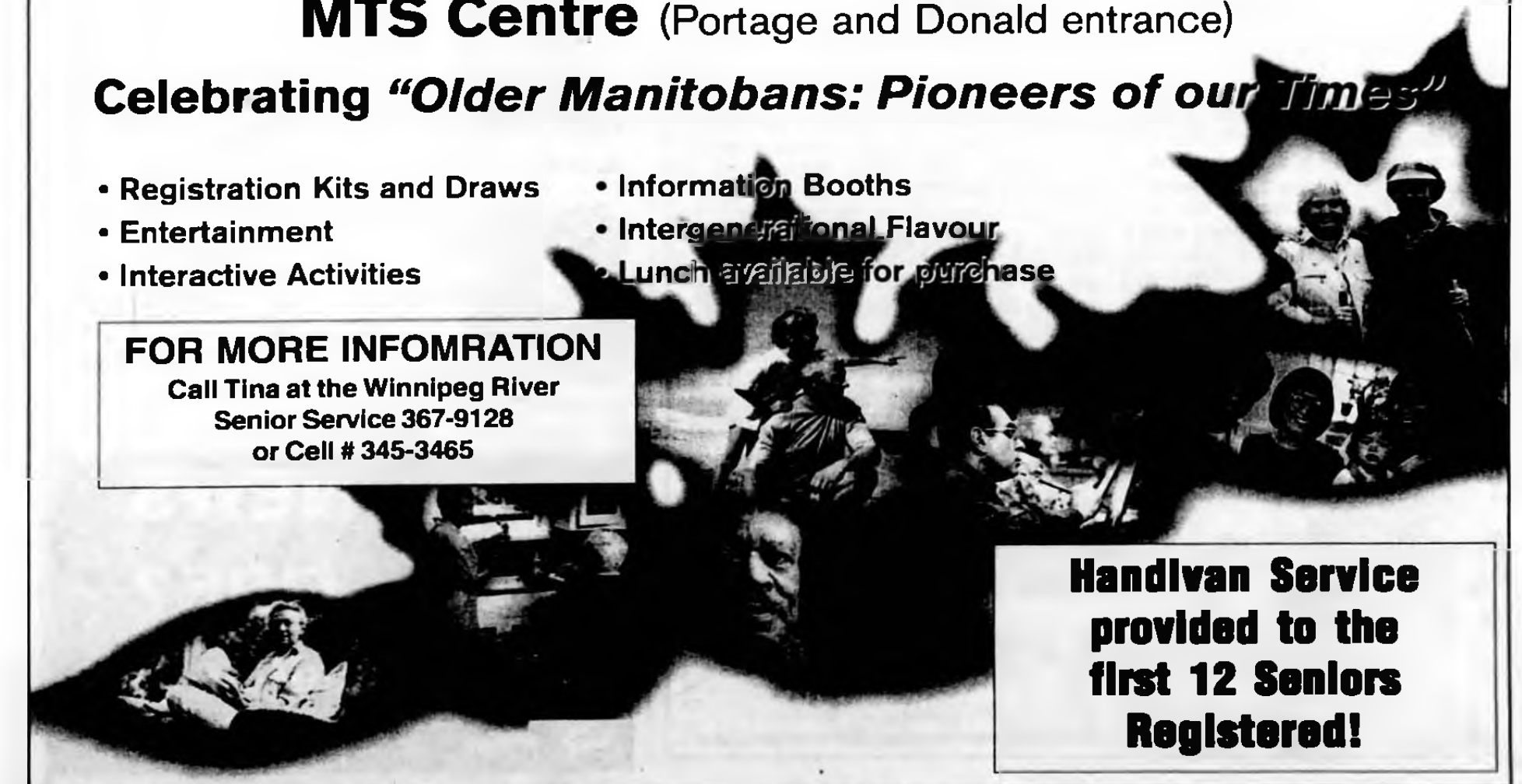

Responding to the Challenges of Mental Illness

Mental illness has become one of the most critical challenges facing Canadians, and one that our national health care system is coming to terms with. It is estimated that one in five Canadians will develop some kind of mental illness in his or her lifetime. Nearly one million are plagued with a severe or persistent disorder, and it's now the fastest-growing category of disability insurance claims in Canada.

We can't take our mental health for granted. Yet, when it comes to the way we as a society treat mental illness, or how the health care system deals with it, it's clear there is room for improvement. Those with mental health disorders are stigmatized far too often, and because we have so much to learn about how the human mind works, these disorders can go untreated or even undi-

agnosed. The consequences can hit close to home for many who see mental illness affect family and friends. And of course, a large segment of Canada's homeless population suffers from mental health issues as well.

But there has been progress made over the years. Today, we know mental illness can be caused by physiological and environmental factors. We also know that it can be controlled and cured.

The Conservative government wants to see that progress continue, delivering positive results for those affected by mental health disorders. To do so, we have announced the creation of the new Mental Health Commission of Canada as the cornerstone of the government's strategy to address mental

health issues in Canada. In Budget 2007, we committed \$55 million over five years to fund this commission as an arm's length, not-for-profit corporation.

A commission like this was a key recommendation of a Standing Senate Committee report on mental health, mental illness and addiction in Canada. The report's authors, Senators Michael Kirby and Wilbert Keon, have been named to the Commission's Board of Directors, made up of 11 non-government directors and six government-appointed directors.

As Prime Minister Stephen Harper said at a recent announcement, "The commission will improve quality of life for Canadians dealing with mental illness and their families. It will seek to ensure Canadians in every part of the country will have access to the best possible prevention, diagnosis and treatment practices. So that someone suffering from depression in St. John's will obtain the same quality of care as someone struggling with

schizophrenia in Victoria."

As the commission leads a national campaign to erase the stigma attached to mental illness, and gathers information on the best medical practices for dealing with it, Canadians will continue to see progress on this major national public health problem.

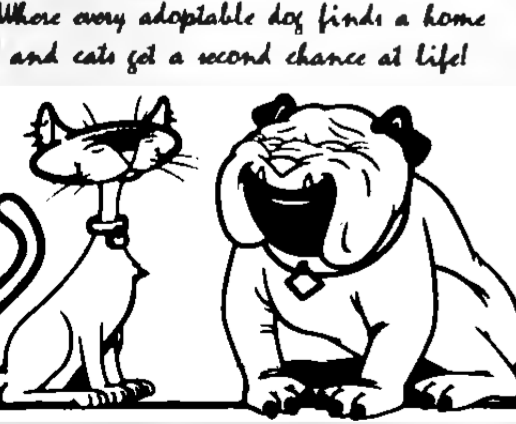

Ask the Neighbourhood Mechanic

I've been behind the bench for almost 5 decades. You think you would learn a thing or two. I hate to admit it but I wish I had said "NO" more often. What I mean is turning down work that is doomed to failure. Every day we get calls from folks who have received some great electronic gizmo as a gift, or have purchased same at the local flea market. Usually the stuff is "crap" and not up to the standards that are required for the reliable operation. Case in point. The remote starter. Most of this stuff doesn't fit the car it was purchased for. The instructions are incomplete and the time required to install the unit is outrageous. Especially at current shop rates. We have found too often when searching the manufacturer's web site (if their still

in business) that the unit you have is no longer available and was redesigned three years ago. Or, that you need "this special part" to make it work; but sorry, we no longer supply this product. It's so bad, that in our shop we just plain refuse this type of work. If you're in the market for electronic add ons such as GPS units, Stereo systems, Remote starters, DVD players etc. ask the supplier if they also install. Ask about their warranty policy. If you can talk to the installer so much the better. Do they solder every joint, will the unit interfere with any other systems in the car? Are parts available? One last thing, get the number of a good towing service. Join me at the Woodbine Centre in Rexdale, Ontario on Sept 22nd for The Transportation Career Expo. We will be broadcasting from the event starting 9:00 am and filming for our television show. I have a 1996 Honda Civic automatic. Whenever it rains hard and I start the car the engine light comes on and the D4 light flashes. If driven like this, it seems as though the tranny is having a problem engaging. Please help and let me know what you think the problem is. This is my first car and I don't know what to do. The transmission is computer controlled. If the harness has an abraded and moisture is shorting out the computer you will experience the conditions that you describe. Have your tech check the area under the intake manifold first for damage. The harness runs along the supporting bracket that helps carry the weight of the manifold. You will have to have this attended to soon. Not shifting correctly will eventually lead to transmission failure.

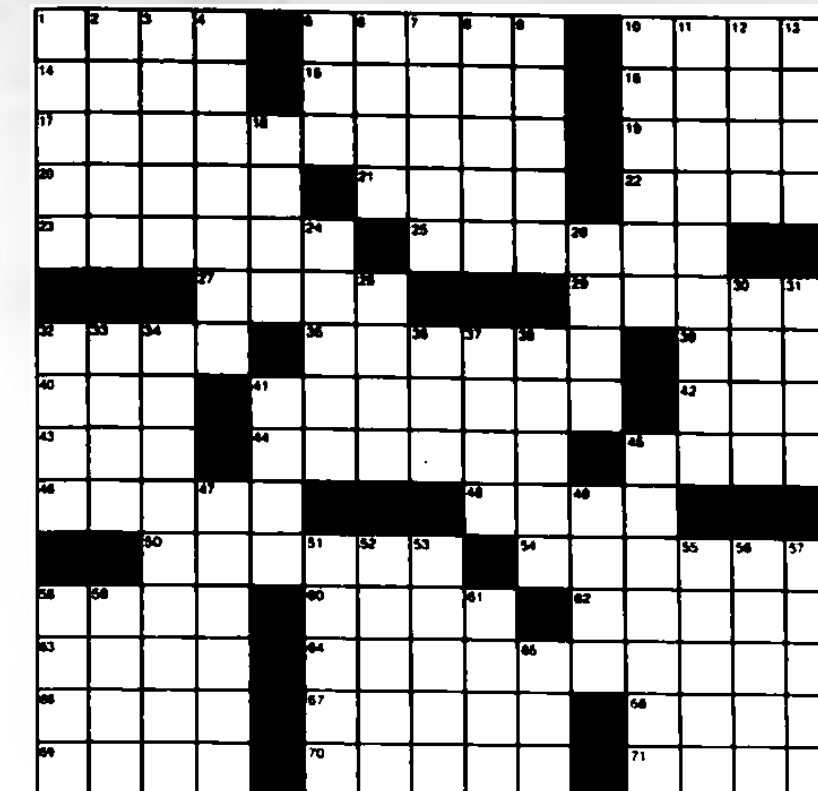

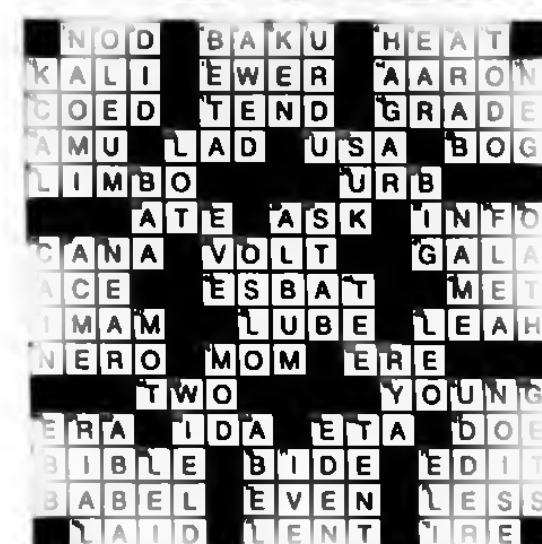
