

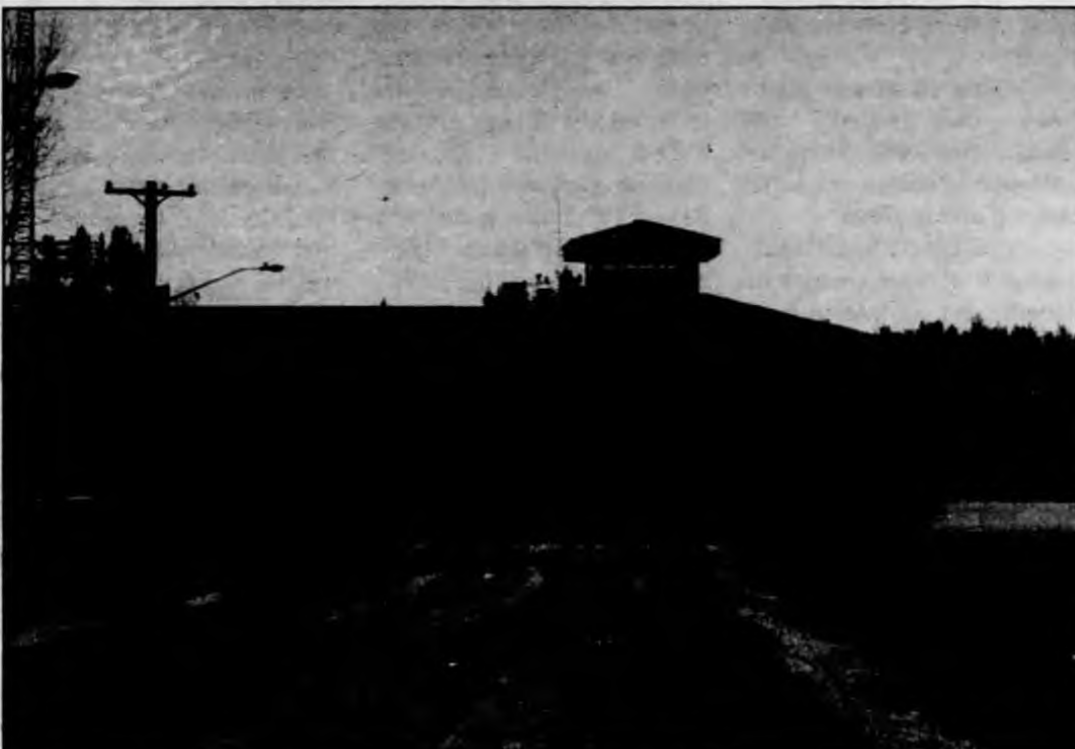

Ambulance for Grand Marais

NEHA CEO Jim Hayes is expected to announce that an ambulance will be stationed at the Grand Marais Fire Hall on Friday. The ambulance, which will be relocated from Pine Falls, will be based in the new fire hall for the summer season.
The occasion is the official Grand Opening of the new East Beaches Fire Hall

on Fey Road near Grand Marais. The Fire Hall has been in operation since August 11 last year. The new fire hall has a hose drying tower and bays for four vehicles. At present the fire department has a pumper, a tanker and a rescue van.
On the second floor there are bedrooms, offices, a kitchen and a training centre. There is also room for an emergency operations centre.

The fire hall is jointly owned by the Rural Municipalities of Alexander and St Clements. It serves the RM of St Clements and the RM of Alexander to Zebron Road. North of Zebron, Fire protection is provided by the RM of Victoria Beach.
Reeve George Harbottle of the RM of Alexander and Mayor Steve Strang of the RM of St. Clements will speak at the Grand opening.

The Municipal Board has rejected the RM of Alexander's proposed by-law to establish a Local Improvement District to supply treated water to the RM's residents between Great Falls and Powerview.
After a public information meeting last month, there were seventeen objections. According to the municipal act if there are 25 objections, then the Municipal Board: may call a formal hearing; may revise

the by-law; or may reject the by-law. The board determined that the seventeen objections received represented 30 people, i.e. in excess of the 25 objections in the municipal act, which requires action from the Board. The board rejected the application because not enough information had been given to those affected by it.
RM Reeve George Harbottle has told The Echo that he will be appealing the decision.

Public Hearing on Borrowing By-laws set for May 29

If the public meeting on the Powerview/Pine Falls budget last week is anything to go by, the public hearing on Thursday, May 29 on the borrowing by-laws for the proposed public works building and for paving Pine Falls Streets is likely to see some controversy.
At last week's public meeting the major issue seemed to be that not enough money for recreation had been budgeted and that the need for that was more important than a new public works building.
Bev Dube told The Echo that it was not an either/or situation. She said \$50,000

was available in the Capital Recreation Fund but the Council had had no proposal for any of the major work that needs to be done. She said the Council's consultant had identified the priorities for the Pine Falls Arena as new Plexiglas, new boards and a new wheelchair-friendly front entrance.
Bev Dube said they have to look at operating costs. She said it has been difficult to determine actual operating costs because of the input by Tembec by the mill, but that they have been working on it and have found that the Pine Falls arena is paying its way. She said work on the arena See "Current..." p. 3

Town of Lac Du Bonnet Places More Value on Recreation

The Town of Lac Du Bonnet spends \$92,971 dollars on recreation representing 22% more than the Town of Powerview-Pine Falls which has 285 more people (2006 Census) and enjoys \$816,815 more in total revenue. To its credit Lac Du Bonnet spends 5.5% of its total budget on recreation and the Town of Powerview-Pine Falls comes in at only 2.89% of its total budget. The sad truth is despite the fact Lac Du Bonnet only collects 67.4% of the total revenue of Powerview-Pine Falls they are doing almost twice as much in the area of recreation when one considers their reduced means. What is more, the Town of Lac Du Bonnet is stating in their 2008 Financial Plan Document that they will raise their recreation budget line to \$100,000 in 2009. In contrast, Powerview-Pine Falls is pledging only to maintain its \$72,500 in recreation spending. The Lac Du Bonnet Arena is slated to get \$7,500 while the two Arenas in Powerview-Pine Falls are set to share \$2000 in 2008. The Town of Lac Du Bonnet appears to have a practice of transferring \$5,000 a year into a capital reserve fund for its Arena. The Town of Powerview-Pine Falls is transferring zero dollars to its Recreation Capital Reserve in 2008 and is forecasting nothing in 2009. The beach in Lac Du Bonnet will get \$5,000 in 2008 compared with \$2,000 for the swimming pool in Powerview-Pine Falls. Which neighbourhood places a higher value on its youth?

2.1 Million Trees to be Planted in Whiteshell Park

Campsites and trails at Whiteshell Provincial Park will be open this spring following a massive cleanup of damage from a summer storm last year. Conservation Minister Stan Struthers announced today. Over the next four years, the province will plant 2.1 million trees, starting with 60,000 white spruce seedlings later this month. In addition to tree planting, forest renewal plans also emphasize natural regeneration whenever possible in order to encourage growth of a natural forest. "The June windstorm that hit Whiteshell Provincial Park affected an area about half the size of the city of Winnipeg, snapping tree tops, flattening stands of mature trees, obstructing trails and roads, and damaging cottages and park infrastructure," said Struthers. "As one of our most popular parks, the Whiteshell is a jewel in our crown of the Manitoba's parks system that attracts tens of thousands of visitors every year and we are moving to restore this provincial treasure so that coming generations can continue to enjoy its natural beauty." Recovery efforts first concentrated on cleanup, which was aimed at reducing the risk of wildfire in the most heavily used areas of the park. The initial cleanup concentrated on reopening roads, campgrounds and trails, while removing hazardous trees near high-use areas. With few exceptions, trails and campsites will remain open while others are closed. Among current conditions: - About 10 sites at White Lake campground will remain open while others are unavailable due to extensive cleanup and restoration. - The Pine Point Rapids hiking trail was cleared of debris and reopened last August. - The Big Whiteshell Mountain bike trail has been cleared of all the debris, however, cleanup activities in the area are impacting the trail and travel is not currently recommended. - The Forrester's Footstep hiking and biking trail remains closed as a result of the extensive storm damage and the area being used for continued cleanup efforts. - Visitors can expect normal trail conditions with the occasional tree across the trail on remaining hiking trails. Tree-planting efforts included the Scouts Canada annual national Scoutree planting program this year. About 180 cubs, scouts and leaders have planted 12,000 additional trees at the Betula Lake ball diamond and along the Pine Point Trail. As well, seedlings will be made available to cottagers. An open house is planned for May 17 in the park to explain how the cleanup is progressing and to provide information on reforestation efforts and fire smart. Bundles of trees will be given to people attending the open house at Pinewood Lodge. Signs explaining the restoration program will be posted at high-use points such as Betula Lake and Pine Point Rapids as well as main gates and offices. A multi-year fire hazard management plan is already in place to reduce the increased forest fire fuel created by the windstorm in areas near cottage developments, highways and campgrounds. The size of the area damaged during the storm required mechanical forest harvest methods to safely and effectively salvage timber and reduce fire risk in the damaged stands of forest. Cleanup efforts will continue into the winter of 2008 and 2009. Park visitors are advised that large commercial trucks will continue hauling timber products out of the park throughout the summer.

Cottage Owners Take Heed Public Education Push to Prevent Cottage Fires Launched by Canadian Association of Fire Chiefs

With new statistics showing that the number of cottage fires jumped 26 per cent from 2005 - 2006* and fire damage ballooned nearly 65 per cent to more than \$11 million in the same period, the Canadian Association of Fire Chiefs (CAFC) and cottage country fire departments are rolling out a major Fire Safety Outreach campaign, just as Canadians prepare to flock to their weekend retreats. "Escaping for some summer fun requires the same amount of fire safety diligence that living in the city does," according to cottage country Fire Officials. "That means working smoke alarms on every cottage level and outside sleeping areas and at least one CO alarm if you have a fireplace, woodstove, gas water heater or any gas or propane appliances." "Fire safety may be the furthest thing from your mind when surrounded by water, but there is always a risk of fire on boats too. A fire extinguisher is required for marine use. Which type of extinguisher you need depends on the size of your watercraft and provincial regulations in your area. You should not store your fire extinguisher on your watercraft over the winter.  could be provided for in the 2009 budget, or could possibly be carried out later this year. Jack Shwaluk repeated what he had said at the budget meeting. - The two public works buildings the new municipality inherited from Pine Falls and Powerview are far too small, and the building currently being rented is too small to store equipment and expensive to heat. He said a building with space to store valuable leased equipment was needed because of the lease provision for buying the equipment at the end of the lease, and it was important to keep the equipment in good condition. On the proposed location he said that the only other alternative to the Dupont location was behind the fire hall. He said that this land had been surveyed but has not yet been transferred to the municipality by Tembec. Since the budget meeting he said he has re-examined this site. extreme importance of having instant access to the address, township and fire emergency number. "Calls to emergency are often untraceable by fire departments because they are frequently made on cell phones or internet phones. This makes it critical to give full address information to 911 so they know which fire station to summons." When internet (voip) phones are used they typically have the subscriber's phone address associated with the number, not the cottage address! Kidde Canada, the country's leading smoke alarm manufacturer, continues to support grassroots fire safety public education. Senior company executives will join cottage country fire officials at public events to help show the dangers of life-threatening behaviors such as smoke alarm tampering. Another key issue being stressed is that smoke and CO alarms do not last forever. Carol Heller, a fire safety expert with Kidde Canada said, "It is easy for cottagers to forget about fire safety since they are not in their cottage everyday. But smoke alarms wear out after 10 years, and CO alarms after seven years. So it is essential that all fire safety equipment be brought up to date, and that batteries are fresh, because in a fire time is precious and so is your family."

This World Needs to Drop a Few

Two doctors, writing in one of the world's top medical journals, *The Lancet*, claim that fat people are contributing to global warming by simply being fat. They found that obese people consumed 400 more calories per day than those within the normal weight range. To get the 400 calories they have to metabolize more food – and while they do they breathe out more carbon dioxide thus contributing more to global warming.

In the early 90's, before the employees bought the mill, environmentalists were giving the mill a hard time. Not only was Abitibi cutting down trees, they were also a multi-national corporation. On both counts a good reason to shut the mill down. They did their best.

One of them, an Architect, was convinced that Manitoba had too many people. He said that a population of 600,000 people was all that the province could reasonably support.

When asked what he would do with the other 400,000, he backed off, perhaps because it was suggested that he be one of the first to go and that he should dispose of himself.

We now know which 40% have to go – the fat people. It is not a solution that appeals to me personally, but I have to admit the justice of the case. In fact, the case is stronger that the two doctors made out. Fat people at rest may consume an additional 400 calories a day, but fat people working, because they are carrying around extra weight, use more calories than thin people.

Obviously only thin people should be allowed to work, but we would still have the problem of the extra 400 calories. Fat people must go.

The 40% of the world that is fat consumes half the world's food and produces half the human produced greenhouse gasses. By getting rid of fat people half the agricultural land would be freed up for bio fuel production so skinny people would still be able to drive cars.

As is so often the case, the solution is simple. It is the implementation that is difficult. How do you get rid of 2.5 billion people who don't necessarily want to go? Some, no doubt, could be persuaded to quietly do away with themselves for the general good, but the numbers of

those that do is likely to be disappointingly small. Deep down inside people are selfish. When you get right down to it the thin people are going to have to get rid of the fat – without the fat people being aware of it. Secrecy is not a problem. The media can be relied on to slavishly follow the politically correct path. The real problem is how to do it. Gas chambers are out – they emit greenhouse gasses by the ton. Mass graves would not work – decomposing bodies produce methane – another greenhouse gas.

Again the solution is simple – recycle them. 2.5 billion people contain an awful lot of protein and fat. The skinny people could probably eat the fat people in about a year. The soil of the world could lie fallow while they are doing it, thus ensuring higher productivity in the future. Actually 40% of the earth's agricultural land could lie fallow for a considerable period of time.

When, as will most certainly happen, the skinny people discover that the sum is responsible for global warming they may be a little embarrassed when they think about it, but they won't talk about it much.

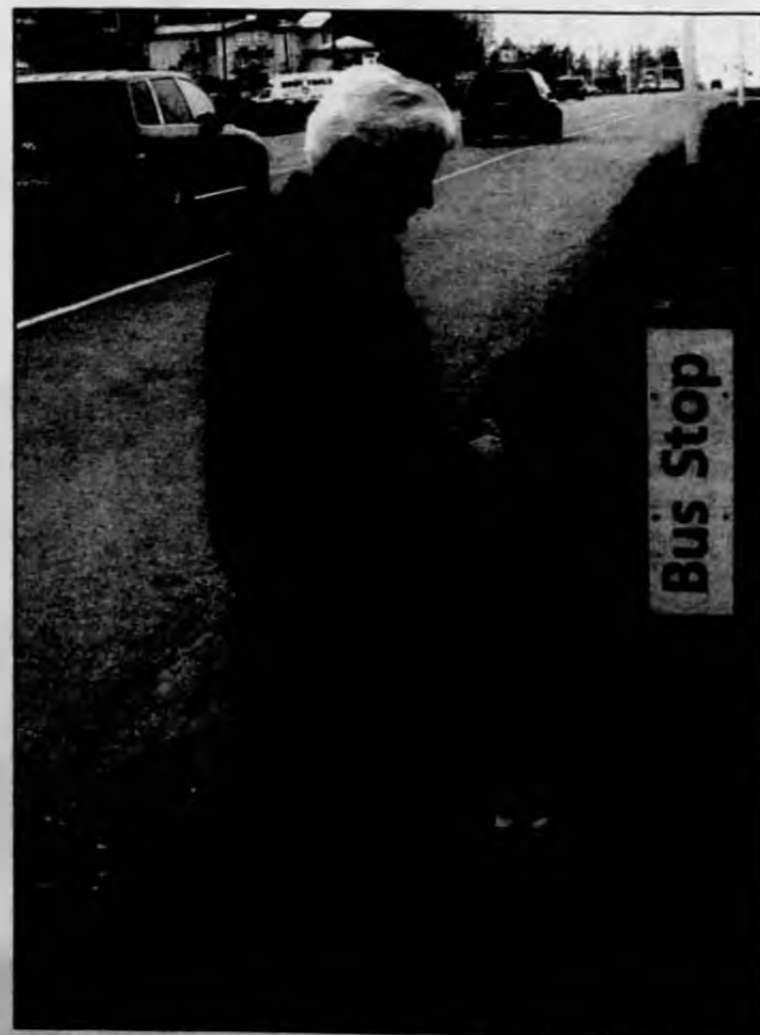

Looking Out for Canadian Consumers

Especially in rural areas like much of southeastern Manitoba, there is little option for transportation except to drive. Public transit is a worthy and necessary alternative in larger centres like Winnipeg, but for many in this riding, to get to work, visit friends or family, or to go to church, the only option is to drive.

So high gas prices can hit rural areas especially hard. With prices hovering over \$1.20 per litre across the country, it becomes increasingly difficult to manage a

household budget for many families who have to fill their tanks frequently. And to add to that frustration, we learned this past week that according to data collected by Measurement Canada, between January 1999 and August 2007, about 3 per cent of Canadian gas pumps failed inspections by dispensing less fuel than they should have.

The Conservative government takes this very seriously. The Minister of Industry, Jim Prentice, met with the President of Measurement Canada and his senior offi-

cial to get to the bottom of it. Our government has made it clear that if any consumer is receiving less gas than what they have paid for, this will not be tolerated.

When there is sufficient evidence that the owners of gas pumps are intentionally negligent or if fraudulent measurement practices are occurring, our government expects that the owners will be charged. As Minister Prentice said in the House of Commons, "I've instructed that there be beefed-up inspection and beefed-up verification, that pumps are honest and accurate. All consumers in this country need to know that when they go to gas up their vehicles that the pumps are accurate and they are getting what they paid for."

Minister Prentice also indicated that fines for violations will be increased from a maximum of \$1,000 up to \$10,000 with the option of even stiffer penalties in certain cases, and that the new rules would shift the onus onto retailers to ensure their pumps give fair measure.

We represent more rural Canadians than any other party in Parliament, and we know how directly fuel costs can affect rural families' budgets. The opposition parties, on the other hand, have been taking a different view. Stephane Dion's Liberal Party has been floating an idea for a new carbon tax, which would increase prices at gas pumps and make things even more difficult for people working hard to make ends meet – and this is on top of his musings to raise the GST back up to 7% to pay for his various pet projects. Meanwhile, Jack Layton's NDP have been strong supporters of legislation in the House of Commons to meet the unrealistic Kyoto greenhouse gas emissions targets, which would have the

inevitable impact of raising gas prices too.

The price of gasoline is something we all struggle with, and its effects reach into the price we pay for all kinds of other goods and services. As a government, we've committed to keeping taxes low and that oil companies give the consumers what they paid for at the pump. That is exactly what we are doing.

Liberals Introduce Bill to Implement Jordan's Principle

Needs of the child always come first: Dr. Gerrard

Manitoba Liberal Leader Dr. Jon Gerrard introduced a bill last week that would implement Jordan's Principle and put the needs of the child first.

"This government claims to have a policy of putting the safety and interest of kids first. Implementing Jordan's Principle is a perfect way to live up to their claim," Dr. Gerrard said. "Right now in Norway House, Jordan's home community, three years after Jordan's death there are over 30 children in the same situation and this is unacceptable."

Jordan was born in Norway House, Manitoba on October 22, 1999 with severe medical complications leading to hospitalization for the first two years of his life. After Jordan was well enough to go home a dispute between the provincial and federal governments arose over who was responsible for paying his home care bills including items as small as a shower head. As a result,

Jordan was never able to go home to his community.

Trudy Lavallee initially raised the story of Jordan in the *Journal of Paediatrics and Child Health* in November 2005 in an article titled "Honouring Jordan: Putting First Nations children first and funding fights second."

Lavallee's article described Jordan's situation and called on governments to adopt Jordan's Principle:

"In Jordan's memory, we ask that the federal and provincial governments immediately adopt a 'child first' policy – call it 'Jordan's Principle', in his honour."

Dr. Gerrard immediately took up the cause of implementing Jordan's Principle beginning in December 2005 when he tabled a copy of Jordan's story in the Legislature and called on the provincial government to put the child first and adopt Jordan's Principle.

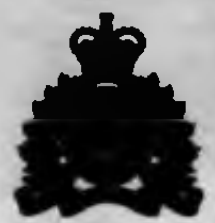
"Sadly, the NDP have failed to implement Jordan's Principle and children continue to be caught between

governments which results in children not being considered first," Dr. Gerrard said. "It is now time that Jordan's Principle be implemented because every child in Manitoba has the right to the best health care and the best social services on a timely basis."

Liberal Bill 233 – The Jordan's Principle Implementation act operates on the notion that the child comes first and establishes the right of children to have timely access to quality health care and social services, regardless of jurisdictional disputes. This Act will come into force six months after the day it receives royal assent.

Grand Chief Ron Evans from the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs applauded the legislation.

"We are extremely pleased to see that Jordan's suffering was not in vain," Grand Chief Ron Evans said. "We're pleased to see tabling of this legislation and hope to see it implemented."

Pedestrian Safety

The 2008 Safe Kids Canada Theme is pedestrian safety. What does that mean for people living in rural areas?

Child & Pedestrian Safety

Children are particularly vulnerable to pedestrian injuries for many reasons. Children may be exposed to traffic threats that exceed their cognitive, physical, sensory, and auditory development. For examples, preschool & school-aged children believe if they can see a car, then the driver can see them. Have you ever had to double-check for a child in a parking lot or wondered

where your child is while driving a larger farm vehicle? Up until age 6, children are much less able to detect the direction of traffic. Before age 11, children have a difficult time judging vehicle speed.

Children are more likely to get hit by cars in areas where there is high traffic volume, higher number of parked cars on the street, higher posted speed limits, and few alternative play areas such as parks. Do your children cross roads alone? Do your children play in/near ditches or beside a road?

Seven out of 10 drivers admit to exceeding the speed limit, at least occasionally, for an average (over the speed limit) of 12 km on highways, 10 km on 2 lane

highways and 7 km on residential streets. Even in the presence of children, many drivers do not reduce their speed. Increase in speed, however, increases the risk of injury. It is estimated that a pedestrian struck by a car traveling at 50 km/hr is 8 times more likely to be killed than someone hit at 30 km/h.

What can I do to reduce pedestrian injuries?

Reduce traffic speeds. At speeds greater than 40 km/h, both drivers and pedestrians may be more likely to make mistakes in judging the time required to stop or cross the street safely. Even small reductions in vehicle speed can lead to significant reductions in injury risk. It is estimated that for each 1.6 km

reduction in average speed, collision frequency is reduced by 5%.

Walk more, drive less. Lower traffic volume can also lead to reduced injuries. Studies have shown that the more people who are walking, the less likely pedestrian injuries will occur. It appears that motorists adjust their behaviour to respond to the increase number of pedestrians. And of course, walking is the healthy, 'green' alternative.

Adults can walk with children and repeat the safety information every single time. Most parents report teaching their children pedestrian safety, but they do not always practice what they know. Safe Kids Canada recommends pedestrian safety education be repeated every time adults and children are walking together and to continue into adolescence. Children need to practice safe traffic behavior

in a variety of road situations before they are able to travel the streets on their own.

Check the Safe Kids Canada website for information on rural community walkabouts and scoring. Then use the Safe Kids Canada Pedestrian Safety Guide to make your community more pedestrian friendly.

Advocate for speeding reminders. Seventy-two percent of Canadian drivers supported the idea of roadside warning signs to tell the driver when they are speeding.

Although there might not be a lot of traffic in your rural area, the roads may have higher speed limits. This, coupled with drivers traveling above posted speed limits, increases the threat to pedestrians in rural areas.

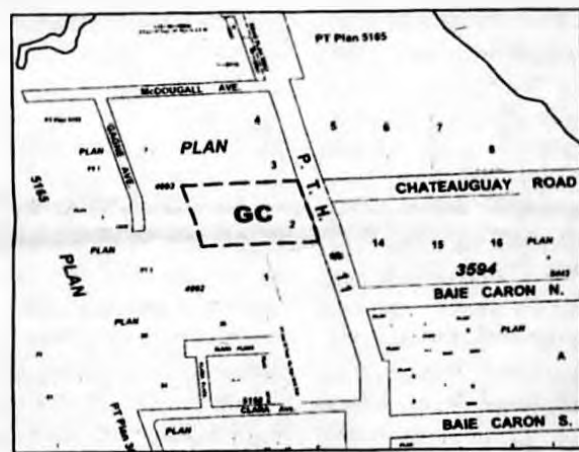

There will be some interesting wines.

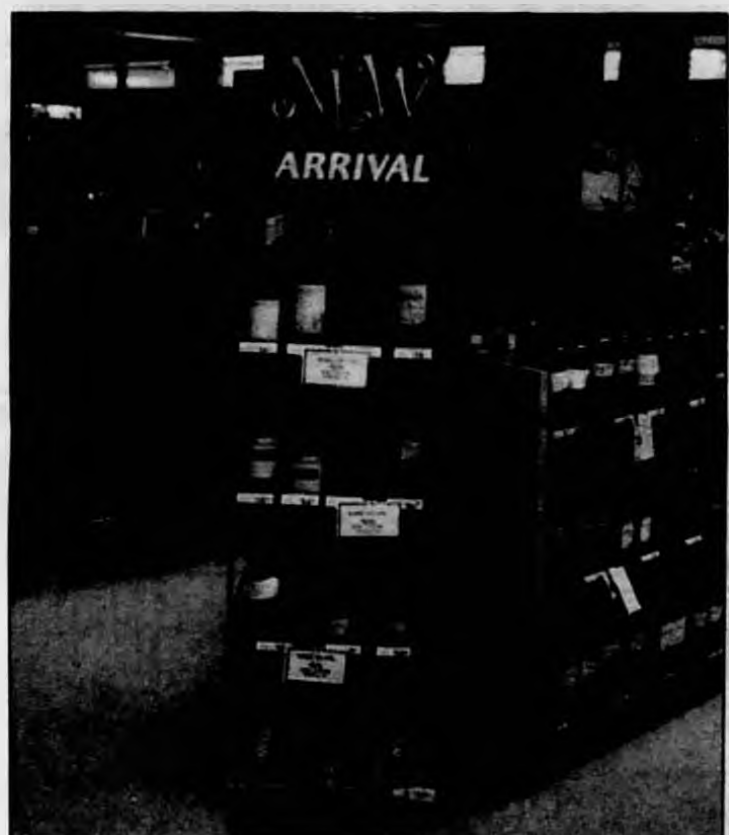

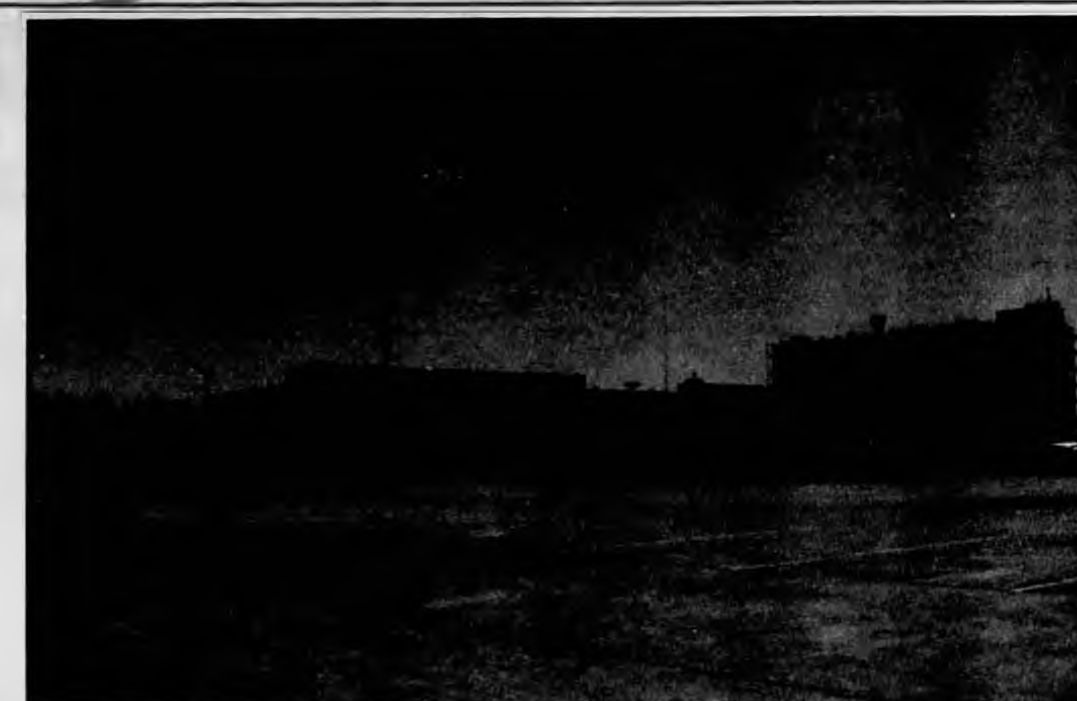

The casino will also

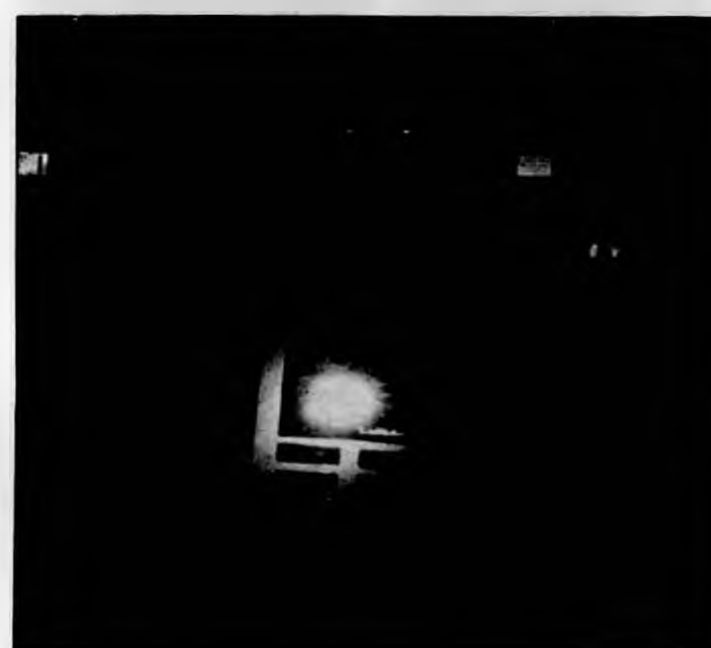
become a smoke-free facility as of tomorrow, so as to create a more pleasant gaming environment and help protect the health of clients and staff.

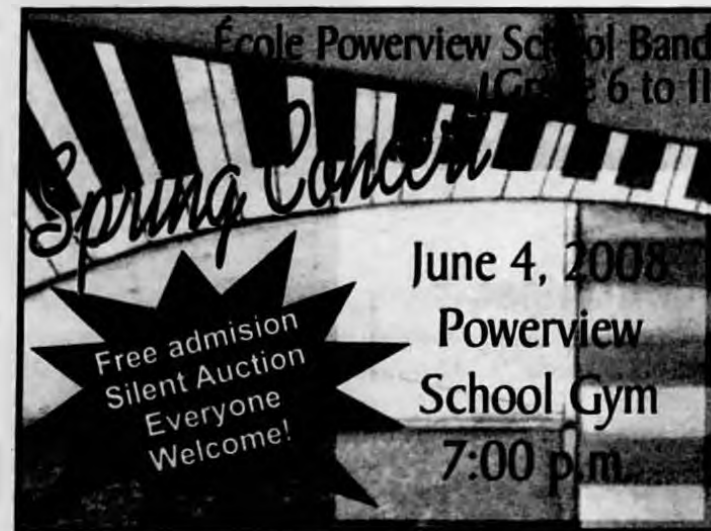

How Are You Building?



When you build a house you can't just build it any old way. You need a good set of blueprints drawn up by an experienced builder/architect. You also need to adhere to a specific and approved building code and of course you want to get the best building material you can afford. Houses may last 100 years or so and then they're torn down and replaced with new ones.

If we do all this for a house that lasts a mere 100 years, how much more should we apply this to our lives which last forever? Do we follow a blueprint in building our lives? Do we adhere to the approved building code given to us by our Creator? He is the master architect of life but He has given us the tremendous freedom and responsibility to build our lives as we choose. Someday we will answer to Him on how we built it - according to His blueprint or another one.

Jesus who learned the carpenters trade (Mark 6:3) said this about building our lives:

"Anyone who listens to my teachings and follows it is wise, like a person who builds his house on a solid rock. Though the rain comes in torrents and the floodwaters rise and the wind beats

The Golden Eagle

In contrast to Canada's only other eagle, the bald eagle, (which occurs only in North America, and prefers forested areas along lake and sea shores), the golden eagle is found throughout most of the northern hemisphere and prefers open country.

They are large birds. The female is larger than the male and can weigh up to twelve pounds and have a wingspan that can exceed seven feet. They are also fast. When diving they can achieve speeds of up to 200 mph. (320 kmph).

They are not common in Manitoba, and even less so in this area, preferring open prairie or tundra north of the tree line, but they have been seen feeding on road kill on Highway 11 and Highway 304.

They are dark brown, not gold, but the name is not entirely a misnomer, they are dark brown, but the plumage is not dull. Feathers on the back of the neck have a gold tone. Close-up they are easily distinguishable from any other bird in that their legs are feathered all the way to their feet.

The golden eagle hunts from a high perch, by cruising fairly close to the ground, or by soaring - its preferred method. It will spiral upwards on thermals. They have incredible eyesight and prefer to attack their prey from upwind because it gives them better control and more maneuverability.

They normally prey on mammals, the jackrabbit being a major food source. Populations of golden eagles vary with fluctuating populations of jackrabbits. They also prey on ground squirrels, snowshoe hares, ducks and smaller birds. They can take geese and cranes in flight.

When nesting, the golden eagle usually returns to the same territory year after year,

defending an area of about 10 square miles. But they do not always return to the same nest every year. Within an established territory a pair of golden eagles can have up to a dozen nests, sometime as much as half a mile apart. Nests can be as much as ten feet across and four feet deep. They are made of twigs and roots and are lined with fur,

moos, bark or any soft material. Eggs are laid between February and June, depending on the latitude. Usually two eggs are laid. The incubation period is long- 72 to 84 days. Often, as with the pelican and bald eagle the first hatched may kill the

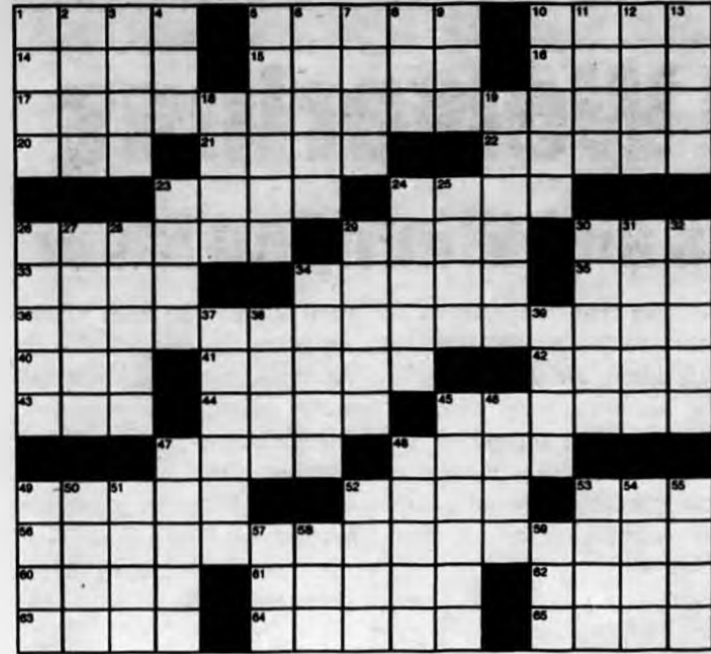
younger bird. They fledge in about twelve weeks and are dependent on their parents for another three months. They do not reproduce in years when prey is scarce and typically raise only one per year and fifteen in their lifetime.

There are

between 25,000 and 50,000 breeding pairs in North America, breeding from the arctic tundra to Mexico. The golden eagle is the national emblem of Mexico. In Canada it is most common in Quebec where there are thought to be about 100 breeding pairs.

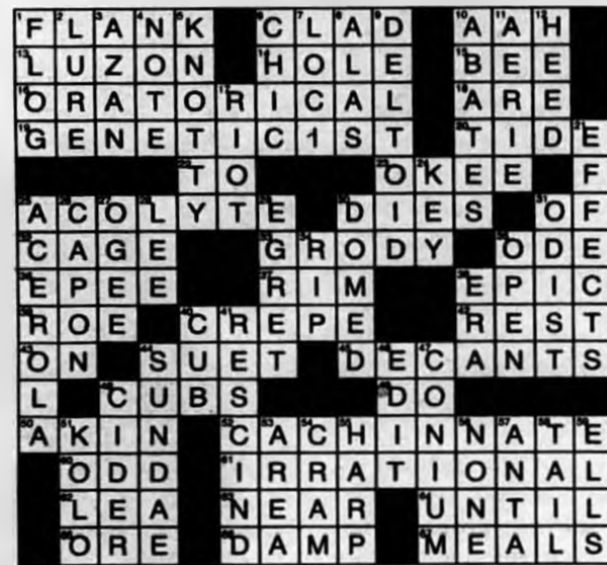
