**T**he Manitoba Model Forest (MBMF) has been selected as one of 11 sites in Canada to be funded under a new initiative of the Government of Canada called the Forest Communities Program. The Government of Canada, through Natural Resources Canada, will contribute \$1.475 million to the MBMF over the next five years to enhance the long-term viability of forest resource-dependent communities in Manitoba and to enhance the management of natural resources.

The Government of Canada's funding was announced last Friday by the Honourable Vic Toews, President of the Treasury Board and Member for Provencher, on behalf of the Honourable Gary Lunn, Minister of Natural Resources.

"Our Government is committed to assisting forest-based communities who are facing unprecedented challenges," said Minister Toews on behalf of Minister Lunn. "Through the Forest Communities Program, the Government of Canada and the Manitoba Model Forest are working together to develop new strategies and pursue new opportunities in

this changing forest sector."

Over the past 15 years, the MBMF has built a strong reputation for creating diverse partnerships in eastern Manitoba among local and First Nation communities, natural resource industries, governments, universities, environmental groups and other organizations with a vested interest in the well-being of the boreal forest. "The rewards have been tremendous for our region and our province", states Dr. Brian Kotak, General Manager of the Manitoba Model Forest. "We have built strong alliances among our partners, with the long-term view of maintaining the environmental sustainability of our forests and the social and economic well-being of our communities and industries".

Currently, the forest industry, and by extension, the communities which heavily rely on them, are facing significant challenges as a result of globalization, international currency exchange rates and the ever increasing requirements to accommodate the values that society places on the forest. As a member of the Forest Communities Program, the Manitoba Model Forest will

## Province Moves Forward On Treaty Land Entitlement Commitments

### Land Transferred to Canada For Eight First Nations

Manitoba has completed the transfer to Canada of over 453,056 acres of land under the treaty land entitlement process, Aboriginal and Northern Affairs Minister Oscar Lathlin and Conservation Minister Stan Struthers announced today. "Manitoba, in co-operation with the Government of Canada, continues to work to meet our obligations to the people of the First Nations of our province," said Lathlin. "We are pleased to be able to

move forward with these land transfers in fulfilment of our commitment to First Nations in Manitoba," said Struthers. "The treaty land entitlement process ensures the fair and orderly transfer of lands by governments to First Nations." A total of 25,129 acres of provincial land has recently been transferred to Canada for the War Lake, Gods Lake and Rolling River First Nations; the Bunibonibee, Norway House, Sapotaweyak and Wuskwi

Sipihk Cree Nations; and Brokenhead Ojibway Nation. Approximately 480 acres of land known as Landing River and Rock Quarry have been transferred to Canada for War Lake First Nation (Treaty 5). Manitoba's commitment was to set aside 7,156 acres for War Lake First Nation. This is the first transfer of land to Canada.

Approximately 1,051 acres of land known as the Gods Lake (southeast of community) selection have been transferred to Canada for Gods Lake First Nation (Treaty 5). Manitoba was to set aside 42,600 acres for Gods Lake First Nation and, to date, 15,515 acres have now been transferred.

Approximately 3,439 acres of Crown interests within private lands acquired by Rolling River First Nation have been transferred to Canada. To date, 3,597 acres have now been transferred. Rolling River First Nation must purchase a minimum of 5,152 acres of private land to be set apart as reserve land.

Rolling River First Nation is a signatory to Treaty 4.

Approximately 6,974 acres of land known as Windy Lake have been transferred to Bunibonibee Cree Nation (Treaty 5). To date, 25,026 acres of a total commitment of 35,434 have been transferred to Bunibonibee Cree Nation.

Approximately 5,404 acres of land known as Painted Stone Portage A & C have been transferred to Norway House Cree Nation (Treaty 5). To date, 45,641 acres of a total commitment of 104,784 acres have now been transferred to Norway House Cree Nation.

Approximately 5,388 acres of land known as Overflowing

River and Dawson Bay have been transferred to Canada for Sapotaweyak Cree Nation (Treaty 4). This brings the total to 96,200 acres to date of the 108,134 acres to be set aside for Sapotaweyak Cree Nation.

Approximately 1,721 acres of land known as various Crown/Crown lease agri-

cultural lands have been transferred to Wuskwi Sipihk Cree Nation (Treaty 4). To date, 25,189 acres of a total commitment of 44,168 acres have now been transferred to Wuskwi Sipihk Cree Nation.

Approximately 672 acres of land known as Ironwood Point have been transferred to the Brokenhead Ojibway Nation (Treaty 1). Manitoba's commitment was to set aside 4,344 acres for Brokenhead Ojibway Nation. This is the first transfer of land to Canada for Brokenhead.

Lathlin announced last month the provincial government is on track to complete work on the long-standing Treaty Land Entitlement Framework Agreement including completing within the next three years the transfer to Canada of 1.2 million acres of land.

The land transfers fall under treaty land entitlement agreements that require Manitoba to transfer unoccupied lands to Canada so they can fulfil the treaty land entitlement obligations.

# Highway 11 Rebuilding Scheduled for Next Year

Manitoba Highways Director of Regional Operations, Brett Wareham, told The Echo last week that a consultant has been retained to design the road between Sagkeeng and Highway 304. He said funding is in place and all necessary approvals have been obtained. The department is scheduling the reconstruction for next year.

Temporary patching of potholes has been completed and a temporary fix has been carried out in the slumping area referred to by Manitoba Highways as Powerview Creek.

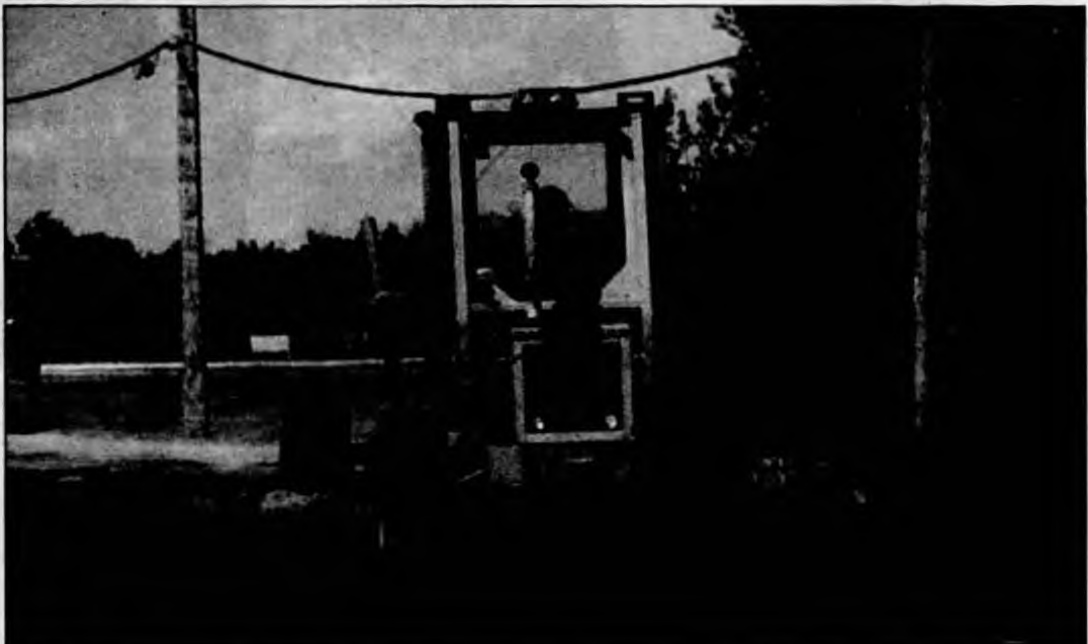
Wareham said the culvert under the road, which was replaced in 1992, has been damaged by the movement of the soil. It has been repaired so that the flow of the creek under the road will not cause the roadbed to erode.

Wareham stressed that the culvert and the slippage of the soil towards the river are two separate issues. He said a geo-tech expert has been consulted and has recommended building a berm on the river side of the road. Slippage along the Winnipeg River usually moves in a rotating motion sometimes

resulting in a low island being formed in the river close to the collapsed bank. (This happened on the south shore on Tembec's property). Building up the road would simply add weight and help the rotation, making the problem worse. Adding weight, (eg., a berm) away from the slippage provides a counterbalance to the system and stops the movement. It has worked quite well at low places on Highway 11 in Sagkeeng.

Highways had hoped to take care of this problem this year, but the berm will be on privately owned land and acquiring property takes time. Wareham is optimistic that this can be completed in time to finish the entire project next year.

While funding and approvals are in place, Highway's engineers may not be available to supervise the project. Highways Minister Ron Lemieux told Powerview/Pine Falls councillors recently that the province is having difficulty in retaining engineering staff in competition with the private sector that is paying higher salaries. Lack of supervisory personnel may thus cause an unavoidable delay in the project.

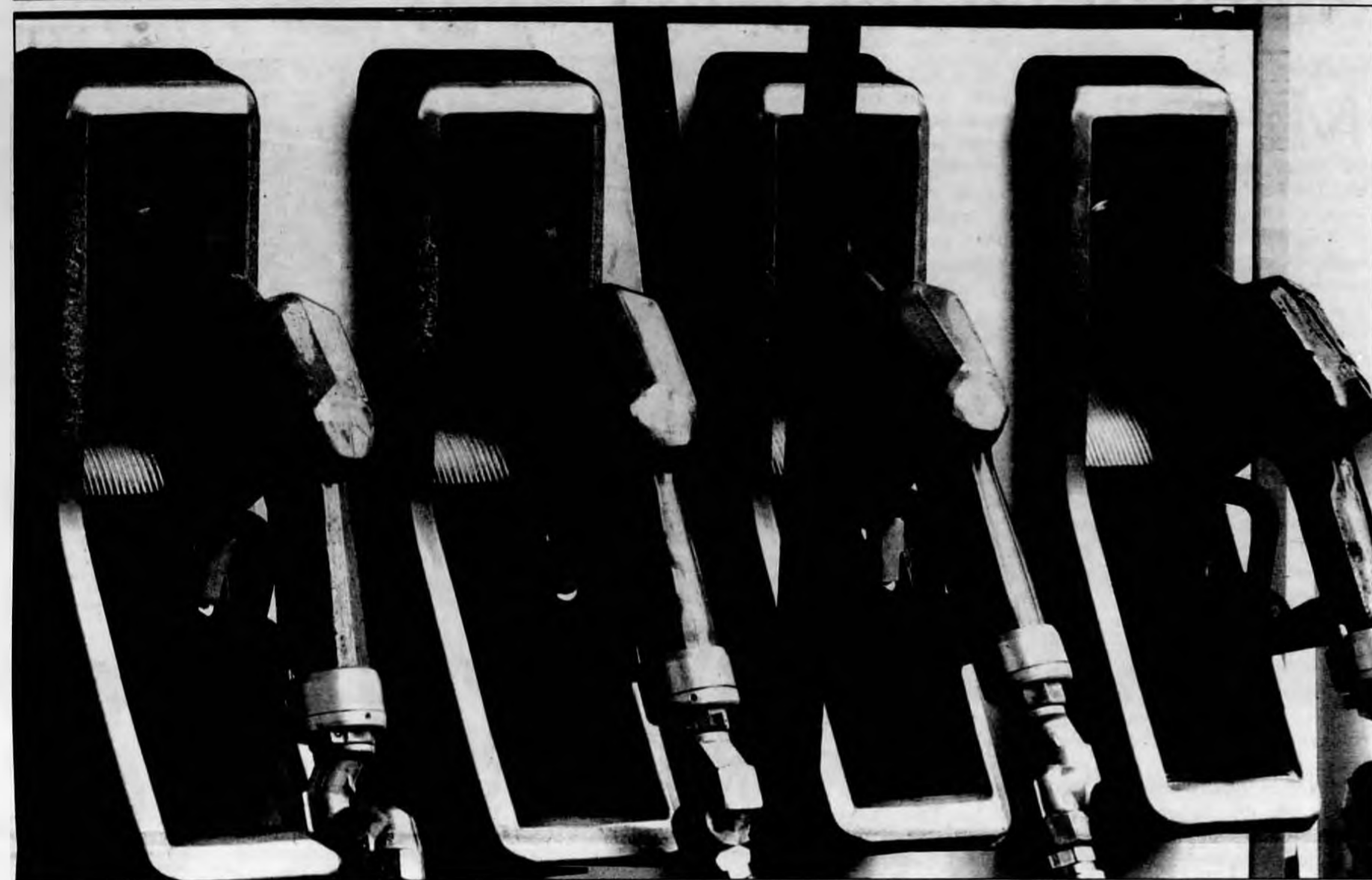

## Green Shift like the Red Book

Stephan Dion's election manifesto, The Green Shift, is a lot like the Red book of Jean Chrétien. Both contain promises that are impossible to keep.

The Red Book, in which Jean Chrétien promised to get rid of the GST, helped him to an overwhelming victory in the 1993 election. The GST is still with us. Chrétien found it impossible to keep his promise - or perhaps he never intended to keep it. Election promises are not made to be kept, they are made to win elections. We, the voters, do our bit by electing those that are the best liars - which explains why the Liberal Party has governed Canada for most of Canada's history.

Stephan Dion's Green Shift is another election manifesto, full of promises to cut taxes, with detailed tables of how much you will save from these tax cuts. The Green Shift actually uses the

word save, conveniently ignoring the fact that you will be paying the same amount, hopefully no more, in heating your home, thus there will be no real saving at all.

But the Green Shift is written as if we will all benefit from these tax savings and the money to pay for the cuts will come from a tax on carbon which only the rotten people will pay.

The Green Shift may do for Dion what Chrétien's Red Book did for Chrétien and get him elected. If it does win the next election we can only hope that he will do what his predecessor did and forget all about his promises after they have got him elected. If he does not, the resulting shift in the Canadian economy will be an unmitigated disaster, not only for Canada, but also for the Liberal Party who, after the subsequent election, will be relegated to the scrap heap for at least two generations, and maybe forever.

Let us assume, for a moment, global warming is not a huge scam - that human beings can control the weather, and that the weather really is getting warmer because of all the fossil fuel we use. Let us also assume, for a moment, that Canada can do something about it. Let us just look at the sheer unworkability of the plan.

There will be a tax on home heating oil and natural gas. People who live on the prairies will obviously pay more of the tax than those living in Vancouver. Will there be separate tax rates for people who live on the west coast and for people who live on the prairies, and the southern Ontario, and the Maritimes?

Apartment rents will go up to cover the cost of heating apartment buildings. The owners will simply pass on the cost - they will have no reason to spend money on energy saving schemes.

They say that gasoline

will not be taxed - at least not any more than it is already, but diesel fuel will carry the carbon tax. Thus everything that moves from supplier to consumer will cost more, everything! Prices of everything will go up.

The cost of the tax cuts is 15 billion dollars. It will be matched by the revenue from the carbon tax. The problem is that no one can possibly calculate the impact this will have in a million different ways to thirty million people. Fifteen billion dollars is a huge taxation shift - it has to be if it is going to force a reduction in fossil fuel use - Not even the global warming computers can calculate the myriad of effects that this will have.

Stephan Dion already has one problem - he has to force an election very, very quickly. The latest period of global warming is already over. We were told that the Arctic would be free of ice by next Tuesday afternoon or some-

time very soon. This year the arctic ice is thicker that it was last year, and next year it will be thicker still. We know the radiation cycles of the sun, and we are now entering a cooling period. Dion had better hurry or he will look very silly trying to cool down a planet that is already cooling.

Also the media might begin to do their job and get out the word that the whole global warming thing is a gigantic scam designed to get funding for universities and political activists masquerading under the environmentalist label.

Then there is the fact that Canadians may very well become aware of the fact that Canada can have hardly any effect on carbon dioxide emissions. It will then be difficult for Stephan Dion to convince Canadian to accept a lower standard of living to save the planet when nothing they can do can make any difference.

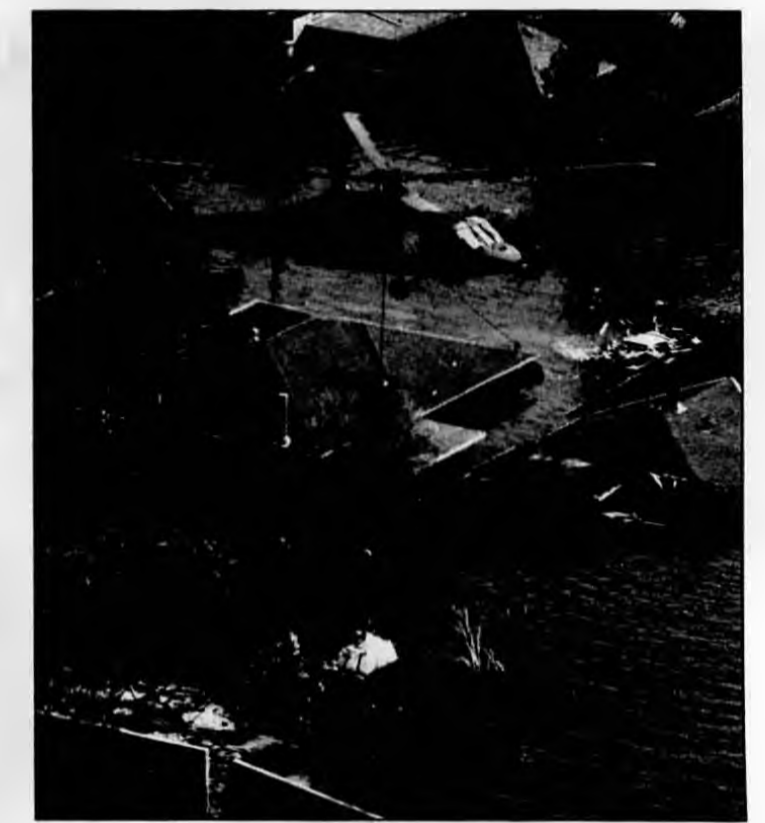

Despite the challenges faced by industries and communities alike, Kotak sees a bright future. "The MBMF

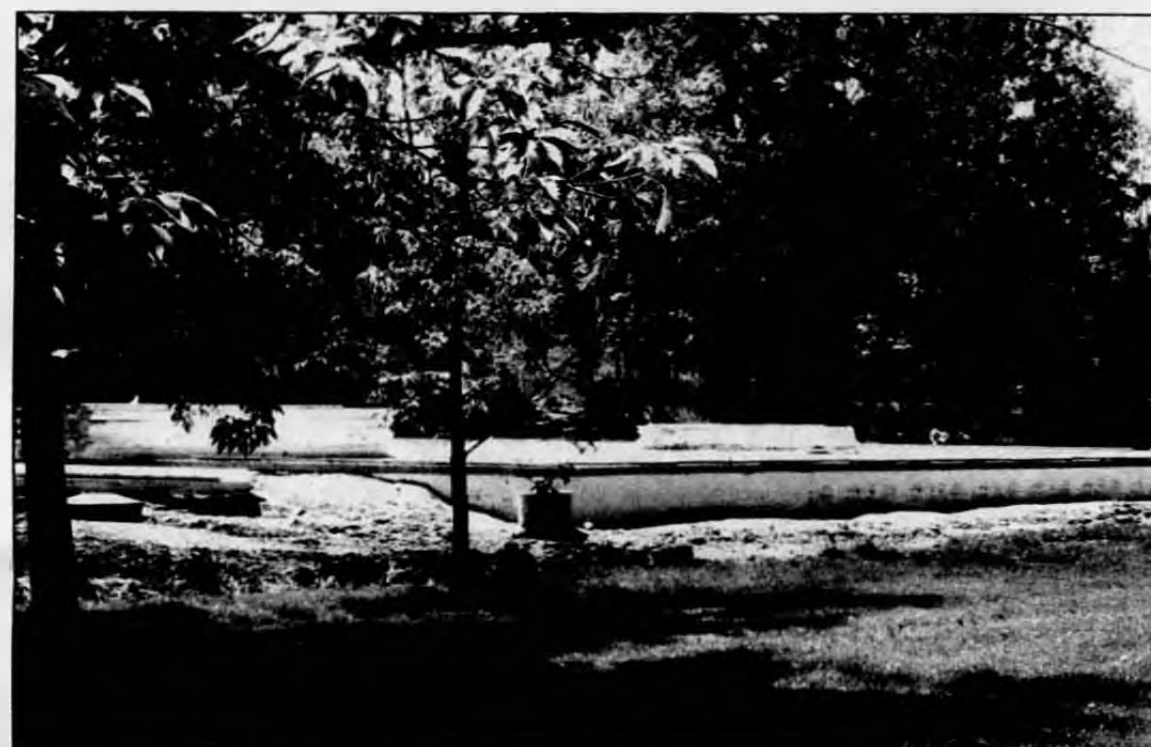

## TyTashEm Grief Centre

On March 15th, 1995 while in the midst of university exams my precious and only son Tyler passed away suddenly at the tender age of 13 years old. Nothing real or imagined could have prepared me for the myriad of emotions and the profound grief that ate away at the very core of my being. In my heart and mind it felt like I was sentenced to a life sentence of suffering. Persistent pain in the beginning grew stronger and was not elevated by endless tears. Tears and going through the pain slowly moved me in the direction of some semblance of a life.

In 1998 at 5 months gestation I lost my precious baby daughter Emily on December 28th. I plunged back into the depths of despair and I held on tight to my only surviving child. Surely the fates could not be so cruel as to take her away from me. But life is unfair especially to the very young whose life has been cut short just as they are reaching their potential. My precious and beautiful daughter Natasha age 25 years suffered a massive stroke, was diagnosed while in a coma with Glioblastoma Multiforme or 4th grade brain cancer and passed away 9 days later on May 27th, 2005. She left behind her much beloved son

Dylon who lost his mommy, his whole world at the age of 5 years. Dylon at the age of 5 was in need of a mother. And I was in need of a son. Our hearts, minds, and souls were bruised and battered. The loss of three precious children within a ten-year span became overwhelming. We were in need of nature's healing balm. We found a house in Traverse Bay. Uncertain if this was the right move or not we took a leap of faith and moved into our new home in the summer of 2005. Each day we took little steps on our grief journey and little steps in our new surroundings. Insomnia persisted.

Each morning it truly was darkest before the dawn. The savage waves on a stormy day, the silent breeze on a clear night the ebb and flow of nature's perfect balance reflected and expressed when I could not the raging storm inside of me. The beauty and beast of nature's perfect balance slowly began to heal our broken souls. To the community that embraced us and accepted us without condition it is my sincerest wish to thank you from the bottom of our hearts for your compassion and understanding.

I have founded The TyTashEm Grief and Resource Centre which is located at 19 Ateah Drive formally Grandma's Craft Cabin, next to Pine Greenhouses. TyTashEm is a combination of the names of my three precious children. Tyler Boonstra May 12th, 1981 - March 15th, 1995. Natasha Boonstra October 20th, 1979- May 27th, 2005. Emily Bowcott December 28th, 1998. ## Cougars, Wolves and Wolverines

### A natural history of the East Beaches and Winnipeg River

#### The Moose

**B**ig, brown and tasty, we are all very familiar with the giant of the northern forest; but how much do we really know about them?

The moose is the largest member of the deer family, which in North America also includes the elk, 3 species of deer and 3 types of caribou.

They are also the most aquatic, spending considerable time in or around water. Found all across the forested regions of North America, their range extends to the northern tundra.

Moose now occupy areas where they formerly did not exist, and it is estimated that there may be as high as one million animals within Canada.

In the early 1900's a few animals were transported to Newfoundland. They thrived in the excellent habitat and today the island province has one of the highest population densities anywhere. For Newfoundlanders moose hunting has become an important activity, with over 25,000 licenses issued yearly and a harvest success of nearly 70%, or 18,000 animals (2004 NF hunting guide)

Moose are large, long legged, powerful animals. Bulls may often exceed 1,200 pounds, and the largest sub-species in Alaska and the Yukon can approach a ton. They are the size of a large horse, with the chest and shoulders appearing much heavier than the hind quarters.

The color can range from near black through reddish or grey-brown, with the characteristic grey leg stockings. In spring as the winter coat starts to shed, the hair color bleaches out and the moose often appear to be grey to



whitish. There have been rare instances of albino animals occurring.

The head is massive and the nose long, giving them a rather mournful appearance. Only the bulls carry antlers. Starting to grow in spring, the velvet covered bony antlers develop rapidly. In late August or early September the bull begins to polish his fully developed headgear in time for the rut. Occasionally the spread of the heavy palmate antlers of a mature bull can approach 6 feet in the Alaskan sub-species. Locally more often the rack will extend between 3 and 5 feet. A juvenile or immature bull's first antlers are little more than spikes or forks, with the large palmate antlers not developing until the animal's third or fourth year. At the end of the breeding season the antlers are shed any time from early December to mid March and the cycle repeats.

Breeding season occurs in late September through early October. Cow moose entice their potential suitors with a nasal toned bawling call. The bull responds with a deep throated grunting.

Males, especially once they have been accepted by a cow, are possessive and will openly challenge any and all competition from other bulls. The duel between two of these giants, clashing antlers, pushing, shoving and attempting to become the winner in the mating game is truly a spectacle of brute power.

The young are born in May or early June and twins are common. Newborn weigh only 15 to 30 pounds and are helpless at birth. The calves are kept in seclusion for their first few days but soon are able to follow their mothers easily.

They are among the fastest growing of all young, and may gain as much as 3 to 4 pounds per day in midsummer. Calves generally remain with their mother until the following spring, when she is ready to give birth again. She then chases the yearling away.

In summer the moose's diet includes leaves, twigs and some plants but aquatic vegetation is high on the menu. Water lily and other plants are gleaned from the

waterways, where moose are quite adept at diving up to 20 feet to reach their chosen meal.

In winter they switch exclusively to browsing on the twigs and young growth of trees and shrubs with particular favorites being red willow, balsam, poplar, birch and other willow types. The young regenerating forest that occurs after a fire or recent cutover provides an abundance of suitable browse to satisfy the moose's need for 30 to 50 pounds of vegetation per day.

Many factors affect the success of the moose population in an area. They are well adapted to withstand severe winter weather in all but the deepest or heavily crusted snow. Wolves and bears are the major predators. A high bear population can have a significant effect on the calf survival. In some areas it is estimated that bears may take up to half of newborn or young calves, however they do not prey heavily on larger animals. Wolves, on the other hand, prey mainly on mature animals all year round. A pack of 15 wolves, a large number for the local region,

may kill as many as two moose in a week.

A parasite, the meningeal worm, better known as brain worm, is carried by whitetail deer, which has adapted to it. Unfortunately the parasite is picked up by the moose is fatal. In areas where the moose and deer populations overlap, especially in Eastern Manitoba, the moose gradually disappear. This appears to be the case in the Whiteshell area where white-tails are abundant.

Moose are one of the most popular big game animals, and several are harvested locally each year by hunters. Through careful management and education the moose populations in Eastern Manitoba remain adequate.

Logging, coupled with the fires that occur naturally, provide the young forest habitat required by moose. Harvesting of bears and wolves by trappers and hunters helps to keep the predator population in check.

Wisely utilizing all species helps to maintain a balance of predator and prey so that the wildlife remains a vibrant part of our local area.

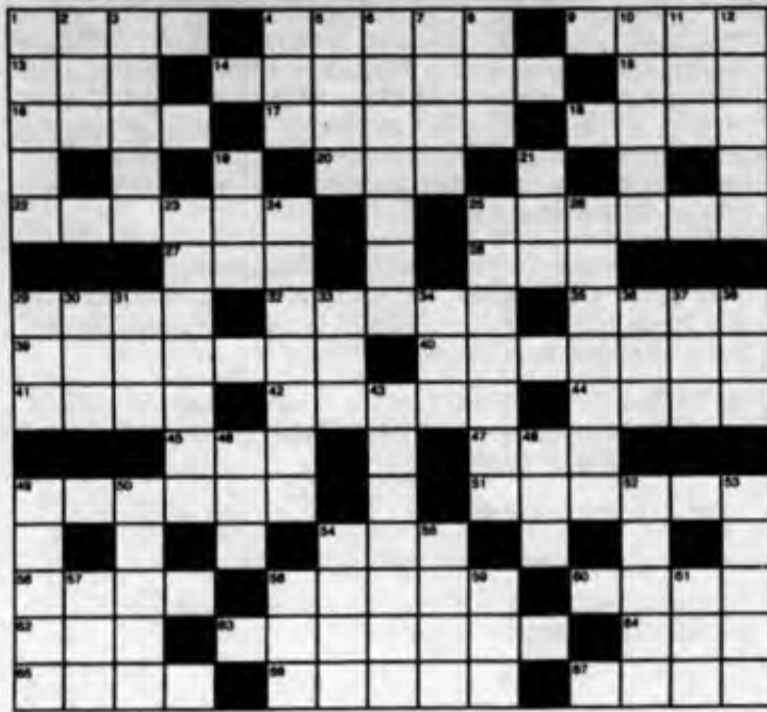

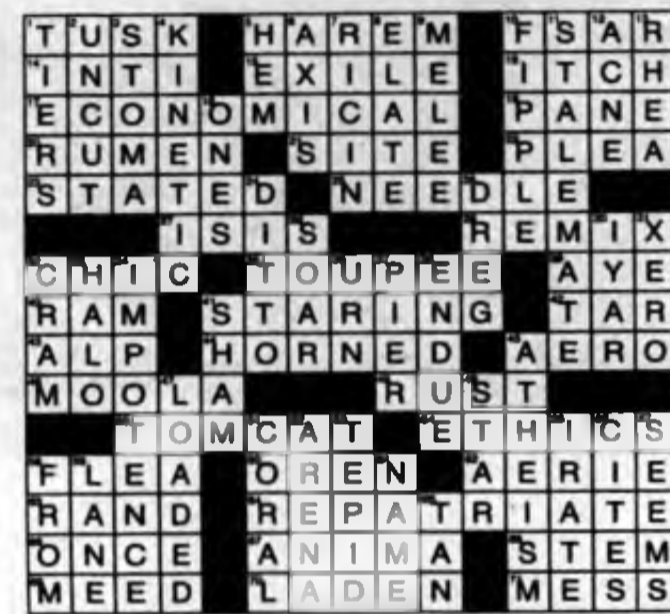
