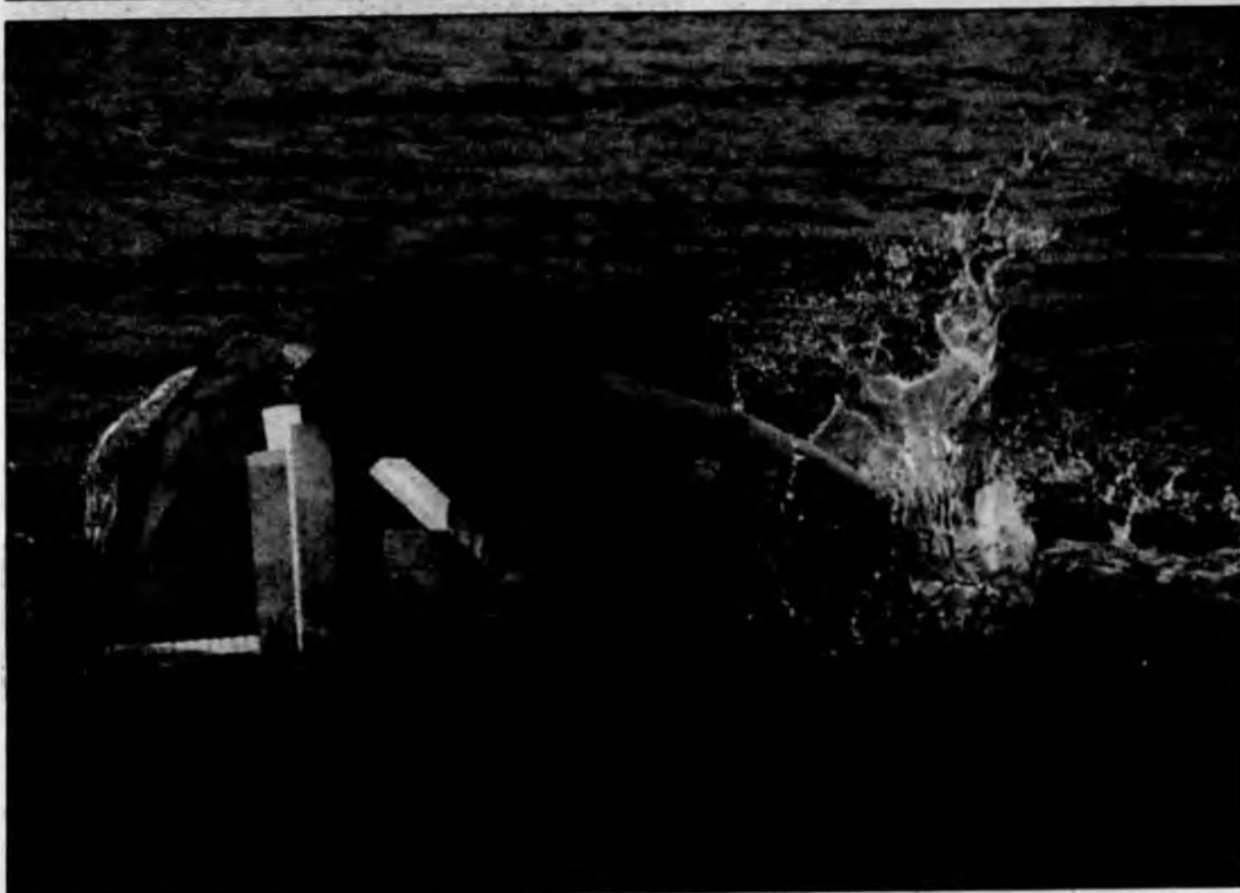

Emergency Notification

On June 19, 2008 a meeting was held in Powerview-Pine Falls in hopes that residents of the town and the R.M. of Alexander would attend to offer up their concerns as to the preparedness of the local Emergency Team. It was also an attempt to recruit much needed volunteers to the team. The meeting, I am sorry to say, was poorly attended with only 14 people in attendance, 5 of which were councillors, 4 were members of the Emergency Team and 5 were concerned citizens. The meeting was allowed to lapse into a frank, orderly, invigorating discussion on how to invite and promote interest within the local communities about a subject which no one likes to dwell on, but is so very necessary if we are to face a disaster of any proportion. As one person so aptly put it, "It is not a matter of 'if' but more so as 'when' we would be hit with a disaster."

One of the questions which hit home the hardest, as it is through my negligence that caused it to be asked, "Should disaster strike, who do I call and where do I go for information as to what I should do?" The answer to this most logical and pointed question will require some explanation as to just what is an emergency and what is a disaster.

A disaster is an abnormal situation which, to limit damage to persons, property or the environment, requires prompt action beyond normal procedures. An emergency is an actual or impending situation caused by nature, an accident or intentional act that constitutes a danger of major proportions to life and property. A disaster is any real or anticipated occurrence which endangers the lives, safety, welfare and well being of some or all of the people and which cannot be brought under control by the use of all the regular

municipal government services and resources. A natural disaster would be, eg. seasonal or flash floods, storms, tornadoes, blizzards, heavy rain or hail, forest fires, epidemics, earthquakes, just to name a few which we may be subjected to. There are different classifications of disasters also, however I see no reason to confuse the issue in this article as a disaster is what it is.

Now, to answer the question as to who do you call:

In an EMERGENCY you call 911.

In a DISASTER you call 367-6170.

Your 911 call will get you an immediate response from your local RCMP, Fire and Medical (Ambulance) service who will deal with your immediate problem.

Your call to 367-6170 will get you the R.M. of Alexander information line where your problem will be dealt with or you will be forwarded on to someone who

can deal with it. The R.M. of Alexander Administration building which is situated in the Village of St. Georges has been delegated as the Emergency Operation Centre (EOC). Should our emergency services, ie. RCMP, Fire, Medical, become involved in a situation which appears that it may escalate above that which they can handle with local resources, they will call and inform the Emergency Coordinator who in turn will activate the Emergency Operation Centre. The EOC is set up to respond and assist with a number of situations, ie. evacuation, registration of survivors, providing temporary housing, emergency supplies and equipment, etc.

A number of additional queries were made and responded to. The most obvious conclusion derived from the meeting was that I, as the co-ordinator, must reach the general public as to what should be done in an emergency. To alleviate this

fact, it is my intention to run periodic information bulletins in the local paper which will answer as many questions as possible.

It would also be a good time for me to mention that a survey is being mailed out to all residents of the R.M. of Alexander and Powerview-Pine Falls. Please read and fill in as the information gathered will enable your emergency responders to do their jobs more efficiently.

In closing, we must remember it is a community's responsibility to provide for themselves for at least 72 hours (3 days) in an emergency. Please be prepared as your life may depend upon it. Should you have any questions as to what you require or need, do not hesitate to call your local co-ordinator at 340-6192. Your call will always be answered.

I'm Not Making This Up

Scientists in Wales have discovered that feeding garlic to cattle reduces flatulence. This is a very important discovery. Flatulence in cattle is mostly methane which is 23 times worse than carbon dioxide as a greenhouse gas. Cows, which produce 500 litres of methane a day are responsible for 3% of Britain's greenhouse gases.

The English could quit eating beef and drink their tea without milk, but they are not about to do either. There are limits to what the English will do to save the planet, and giving up roast beef is outside those limits. They could also collect 500 litres of methane each cow produces, mostly by burping, but partly by, well, farting, and use it to reduce their consumption of natural gas from the North Sea but it seems they haven't thought of that - or maybe they have thought of it and reasoned that the process of collecting it might irritate the cows sufficiently to reduce their milk output.

Hence the importance of the Welsh discovery. They can feed their cattle garlic and reduce the production of methane by up to 50%, reduce Britain's greenhouse gas emissions by 1.5% and help the country meet its Kyoto commitment. (The UK has already met its Kyoto target by converting its coal fired generating stations from coal to natural gas from the North Sea but when it comes to university funding it is better not to talk about that)

Two Welsh universities have been given \$110 million, that's right, a hundred and ten million dollars, to measure the methane output, and to find out if the beef and milk taste of garlic. To measure the output, they plan to put the cattle in movable plastic tents and collect their waste gases. They have to be movable of course, so that the cows can move around the field while grazing. When they return to the barn for their twice a day milking the 250 litres will presumably be removed from the

tent. Contented cows are supposed to produce more milk. A side effect of the research will be to determine whether or not living in a portable plastic tent increases or decreases cow contentment. (Actually I did make up that last bit)

The professor in charge of

the \$110 million project, Jamie Newbold joked that beef tasting of garlic "might be good for the French market." (The British use very little garlic in cooking and commonly deride the French for over-using it.) Milk, butter and ice cream tasting of garlic would take a lot of getting used to, and would likely present some marketing problems.

One problem that we hope has been taken care of is the fact that methane and air can create an explosive mixture if the concentration of methane is high enough.

The two universities should not miss the opportunity to make a documentary out of the project. Or maybe a farce would be more appropriate. *Carry on Farming* might be a good title.

Liberal Carbon Tax Plan Rapidly Falling Apart

In recent weeks, Liberal leader Stéphane Dion has been trying to convince Canadians that his new carbon tax plan is good for them and good for the country, having wrapped it up in environmental packaging. I've made the case before that this new tax would be a significant hardship especially for rural residents, pointing out that it would increase the cost of goods and services across the board - from gasoline and diesel to groceries and building supplies, and beyond.

Prime Minister Stephen Harper spoke about this very point last week. "It will stop the economic progress of the Canadian middle class dead in its tracks and it will make the cost of living unbearable for fixed income seniors and low-income seniors," he said.

But apart from the hardship it would impose, another important aspect of this new Liberal tax plan is the

inequity it would create from region to region. Because of the nature of this tax, energy-producing areas in the west would be forced to pay a disproportionate share of the bill - a bill that Dion estimates will run to a whopping \$15 billion.

The Liberals, interestingly enough, are not even making a secret of the regional inequity they are planning and the economic damage the West would be forced to endure. Liberal MP Garth Turner dismissed the legitimate concerns of Albertans in particular, directly comparing them to Quebec separatists. "(Dion) stood up once to the self-aggrandizing, hostile, me-first, greedy, macho, selfish and balkanizing separatist losers in Quebec. I guess he can do it again in Alberta," he wrote on his website.

Dion has claimed that his new tax would be "revenue neutral", saying that all those new billions in tax dollars he

collects from you would be returned. But that's a dubious claim. The money is already earmarked to pay for a mishmash of new Liberal social spending. In fact, Liberal MP Ken Boshcoff openly bragged on another website that the new tax was not about the environment at all. He said it would "transfer wealth from rich to poor, from the oilpatch to the rest of the country, and from the coffers of big business to the pockets of low-income Canadians."

Dion's new tax could be accepted as an environmental policy if it included even a suggestion of the amount it would cut greenhouse gas emissions, but it doesn't. Leading Liberal MP Martha Hall Findlay said recently

that the party isn't even sure that the carbon tax will help the environment at all, saying, "because energy prices have gone up so much, we don't know how the shift will affect consumption."

As the Prime Minister put it, "Dion's carbon tax is not an environmental policy. It is just a wealth redistribution program disguised as an environmental policy." Judging by the comments of Liberals themselves, it is poorly thought out and reckless. And it signals just how out of touch with ordinary Canadians the Liberal Party remains.

Our Conservative government will continue to act on achievable and responsible environmental plans that will not only result in real reduc-

tions in greenhouse gas emissions, but will also keep our economy running strong and taxes low. And we will continue to work on the international stage to bring the world's largest emitters, like China, India and the United States, into a position where they too must take action. That's real environmental leadership.

- Severe illness most often occurs among older adults or people with chronic health conditions or weakened immune systems. However, severe illness has occurred in all age groups.

WHEN IS THE RISK HIGHEST?

The risk of WNV infection is highest during late June, July, August and early September. The risk varies from year to year based on temperature, precipitation, mosquito population and other factors.

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Powerview RCMP Press Report

News July 14th to July 20th, 2008

WHAT'S NEW: Construction has commenced on the RCMP building. 2 construction trailers will be the temporary accommodation for staff tentatively scheduled to be in place August 20, 2008. We ask the public to bear with us during this time and remind all communities that there will be no disruption in service.

A very busy week for Powerview RCMP members. Members dealt with 109 files and answered numerous inquiries.

2008/07/14
POWERTVIEW - police responded to a call of assault cause bodily harm. A male and female were involved in a heated argument inside a vehicle when the man assaulted his spouse. The woman fled to a residence and called police. The man evaded police for several days before being located and charged accordingly. Investigation continues.

2008/07/15
FORT ALEXANDER - a male and female were transported by police to a nearby residence after causing a disturbance at a house party.
 - a break in to the Roman

Catholic Church resulted in a cash and items being taken. Investigation continues.
POWERTVIEW - 2 Honda ATV's were stolen from residential property in early morning hours. 1 ATV was recovered a second 2002 ATV Green 4 x4 has not been recovered to date. Investigation continues.

2008/07/16
FORT ALEXANDER - a complaint of a intoxicated male with an injury resulted in police transporting the man to local hospital. The man was treated for a laceration to his arm but further investigation by police found he was in breach of conditions. The man was charged and later released to appear in Powerview court at a later date.

POWERTVIEW - after a verbal dispute with a male at a local business police ensured a female relative arrived to drive the intoxicated man home. No further problems arose from the incident.

- a complaint of assault on a youth remains under investigation.
 - police continue to investigate an incident of mischief where a window was smashed out in a dispute. A male was taken to local hospital for his injuries.
RM ALEXANDER - police continue to investigate a complaint of sexual assault.

SUMMARY: Police also followed up on 4 false alarms actioned 6 requests for assistance to other police services/service of legal documents, issued 2 tickets under the highway traffic/liquor acts, charged 1 person for impaired driving/refusal of breath test, lodged 11 persons under the intoxicated persons detention act, attended 5 noise complaints, processed 7 traffic accident reports and transported 1 person under the mental health act to the appropriate facilities.

Join the Free Outdoor Gym

We're lucky in North Eastern Manitoba to have so much outdoor space full of natural resources. With the availability of provincial parks like Bird's Hill, Whiteshell, and Nopiming, and the many local parks in towns and villages, why not translate that expanse into a free gym? According to Health Canada's Physical Activity Guide, Canadians should accumulate 30 to 60 minutes of moderate physical activity most days. Local parks, trails, hills, forests and bodies of water are perfect places to get the physical activity that will keep you healthy. Here are some easy ways to use nature as your own personal gym.

1. Try Tai Chi, yoga, or stretching in a local park. This is a good way to get some activity on very hot days when you might not otherwise want to be doing anything outdoors. The slow, deliberate movements of Tai Chi and yoga are relaxing, but they also build muscle tone and can help you improve your breathing - a great stress buster.

2. Have a scavenger hunt with the kids or try Geocaching, either with family or friends. Geocaching is an outdoor activity which involves using a hand-held satellite device - global positioning system (GPS) - to search for a hidden treasure such as a small toy or message called a cache. This can get you walking around your town or local park, or on a provincial hiking trail.

3. Why not resurrect your garden or help your friends in their gardens? Planting, weeding and caring for a garden is a great reason to get outside and do some activity. Plus, you can grow tasty and healthy herbs or vegetables. Check out the Heart & Stroke monthly column by gardening expert Mark Cullen on planting vegetables. Some people find sharing a community garden with friends and neighbors is a great way to

socialize and grow at the same time.

4. Instead of using a motorboat at the cottage, try a canoe or kayak for picking up small amounts of supplies or for having some fun on the lake or river. Make sure you wear a lifejacket.

5. When was the last time you visited your local park or walked around the block or up the local hill in your neighborhood? When walking for exercise, use a focused pace, but one that

won't make you short of breath, so you could carry on a conversation. Using a pedometer makes counting the number of steps you take easy and fun. Many of our local North Eastman libraries have walking kits with a pedometer that you can borrow. Work up to 5,000 to 10,000 steps per day, stopping when you need to. Try increasing the amount of walking by 5 minutes every week. All the activity you do throughout the day can really

add up.

6. Why not brush the cobwebs off your bicycle so you can ride to your local park or local store. Remember wearing a helmet while riding protects your noggin.

Stay safe in the heat! It's easy to stay cool in the summer when you've got a lake or pool to jump into. When that's not a possibility, bring along lots of water to drink. You can lose a lot of water through perspiration during physically activity, especially in hot weather. Without sufficient water,

your body can't keep you cool and this can cause heat exhaustion. Symptoms include dizziness, headache, increased heart rate and fatigue. Resting in a cool or shady area and drinking water can help get your body cool down. As long as you take these precautions, and talk to your doctor if you have any pre-existing health conditions, then you are set to get active - indoors or out! Submitted By: Caroline McIntosh. 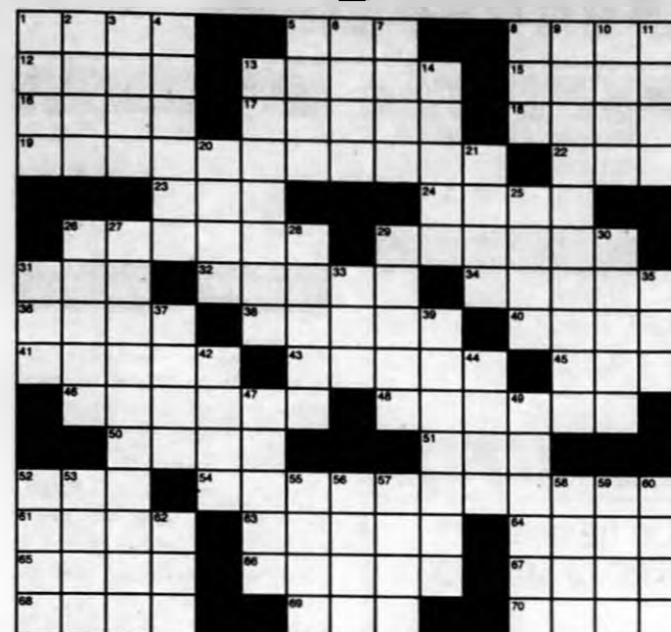

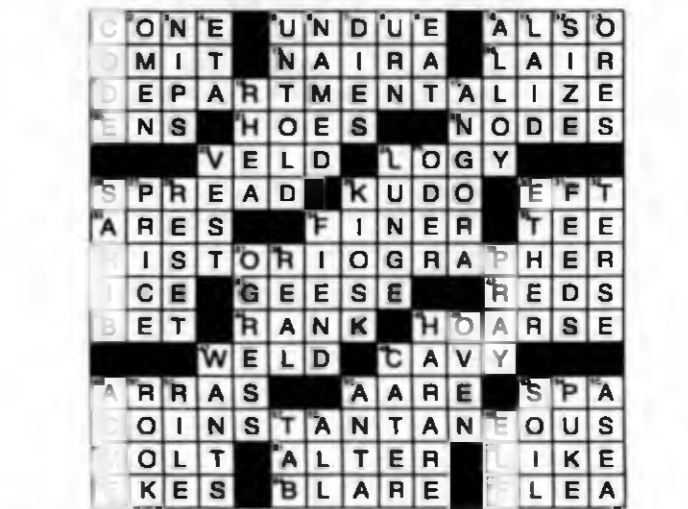
