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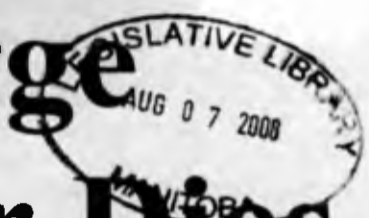

RM Looking Into Starting Medical Clinic

The RM of Alexander is looking into the feasibility of building a medical clinic as a means of attracting doctors to the community - and keeping them here.

Last Thursday, July 31, Reeve Harbottle and councillors Diane Dube and Ed

Forsythe, together with CEA Marge Bonekamp visited a doctor's clinic built by the town of Altona to provide office space and examining rooms for four physicians. Clinic operating staff and record keeping is handled by the clinic. All records are computerized. Each of the four doctors has an office and

two examining rooms. There are two apartments built into the facility and provision has been made for expansion to allow for another two physicians.

Doctors are charged a rental of \$1,500 per month for the facility which is all-inclusive, i.e. office space. Continued on page 6

With the passing of George Lalor last week, Pine Falls lost a direct contact with its past.

In a series of books and short stories George Lalor recorded the history of the community from its very beginning. He arrived in Pine Falls by train in 1927 shortly before his seventh birthday. Even then he had a gift for observation which he kept throughout his life. This, coupled with a prodigious memory and a talent for the use of exactly the right word, made him a natural raconteur. It is as a story teller that most people remember him. But he was more than that. Laird Crawford, who took a creative writing course from him remembers how interesting and informative the course was and he remembers the encouragement he got to continue with a writing career. While Crawford did not continue with creative writing, he says the course helped him with his numerous letters to the Free Press on the environment and other issues. "Overall", he said, "George was a very nice man."

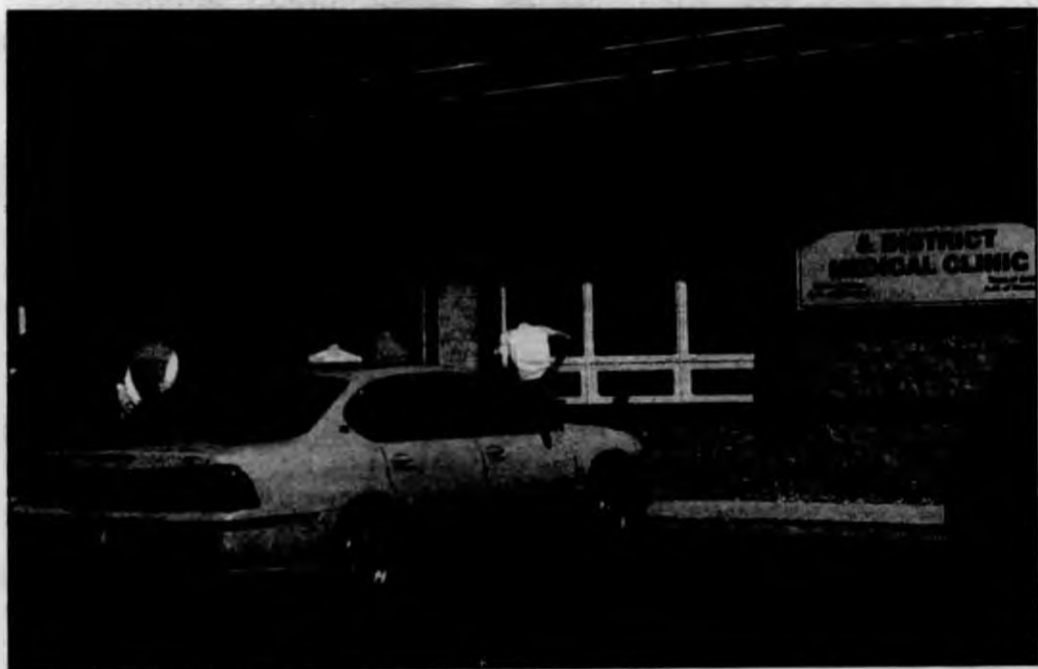
That opinion is reflected by just about everyone who met him. It is certainly the opinion of Echo Layout Artist, Lori Pachkowsky.

About five years ago he was in the process of writing a novel set about 150 years ago in what is now Pine Falls. An English Lord came here, married an Ojibway girl, had a son, and died. The story is of the son going to England to claim his title and inheritance. Every few weeks George would drop into the office and read her the chapters he had just completed. Lori Pachkowsky said it was a fascinating, and very moving story.

George Lalor was also an historian and he used his gift for words and story telling ability to animate his subject. He wrote the history of this area, from the time that the glaciers melted, as a series of anecdotes which gave it life and vitality - and is how history actually happens. He had five books published; two of them dealt with this Continued on page 6

WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS?

- A severe case of West Nile virus (WNV) can be life-threatening and may result in long-term disability.
- Some people develop an illness with symptoms such as fever, headache, fatigue, body aches and rash.
- Most people infected with WNV have no symptoms and do not become ill.

WHO IS AT RISK?

- In southern Manitoba, anyone can be exposed to an infected *Culex tarsalis* mosquito during the summer months.
- Severe illness most often occurs among older adults or people with chronic health conditions or weakened immune systems. However, severe illness has occurred in all age groups.

WHEN IS THE RISK HIGHEST?

- The risk of WNV infection is highest during late June, July, August and early September.
- The risk varies from year to year based on temperature, precipitation, mosquito population and other factors.

HOW DO I PROTECT AGAINST WNV?

- Reduce the time you spend outside between dusk and dawn.
- Apply an appropriate mosquito repellent.
- Wear light-coloured, loose-fitting, long-sleeved clothing.
- Get rid of standing water around your home.
- Make sure your door and window screens fit tightly and are free of holes.

area - Sagkeeng, and The Foot of the River in these two books, with 70 short stories he told the history of the region and made it come alive. His research was

meticulous, into aboriginal culture, church records in St Boniface, and hundreds of interviews with anyone who had anything to contribute to his knowledge of the subject. His research included the

extensive records of the Hudson Bay Company both in Winnipeg and London, England.

He was born in Welwyn Saskatchewan on March 17, 1920. He joined the RCAF in

the summer of 1940 and served as an air gunner in the Mediteranean. He was wounded in 1943 and returned to Canada. In 1949 he joined the Forest Biology Department at the University

of Manitoba in 1949. After fifteen years he joined the Health of Animals Branch of Canada, retiring in 1972, when he began to pursue a writing career in a serious way. He received numerous writing awards including; the Lady Eaton Award, the Manitoba Historical Society Gold Medal, the Kathleen Strange Memorial Award and the Margaret McWilliams Award for his contributions to the history of Manitoba.

There will be a memorial service at 10:00 am on Thursday, August 14 at Mary Mother of the Church, 85, Kirkbridge in Winnipeg.

examining rooms, equipment and administrative staff and record keeping are all covered by the \$1,500.

The clinic is located across the road from the hospital where lab facilities, X rays etcetera, are available. It is administered by a board appointed by the Altona Council. The Board, made up by representation from The Town of Gretna, The RM of Rhineland, and a small portion of the RM of Montcalm, is responsible for recruiting doctors and for determining incentives. (Significant signing bonuses and scholarships

are available). This helps to ensure the retention of physicians on a long-term basis.

The RM and Powerview/Pine Falls have been attempting to get a Primary Care Centre built in Pine Falls next to the hospital. The Centre was to have included all medical services normally provided outside of hospital, i.e., doctors, laboratory work, EKGs and X rays in addition to certain social services. An aboriginal traditional healing component was to have been included.

NEHA CEO Jim Hayes has told the two municipalities and his own board that

the government is 100% on side. He said, in the spring of last year, that the project had been submitted to the treasury board for approval. (He had told the Annual General Meeting of the Beaches Wellness Centre that the project was going ahead two years ago)

When Provincial Minister of Finance and Treasury Board Chairman Greg Selinger visited St George last fall he was asked what the status of the project was. He said he had never heard of it.

More recently Hayes has told his board that the depart-

ment of health is on side and that the project will very soon be going to Treasury Board.

Many elected officials are saying that they have heard this before and don't believe it anymore.

The Blue Jay

The surprising thing about the blue jay is that it is not, strictly speaking, blue at all, nor, for that matter, are blue birds blue. Blue pigmentation is unknown in birds. What gives the blue jay its blue appearance is due

to refraction of light by the inner structure of its feathers. If a blue feather is crushed the blue colouring disappears.

Another surprising thing is the fact that the familiar harsh cry, or shriek it makes when alarmed, or sometimes

just for the fun of it, is not the only sound it makes. It has a variety of calls, but one in particular is remarkable because it is so different from the shriek. During courtship it uses a softly mellow musical whistle, described as a continuous sweet warbling. Like other members of the crow family it can sometimes mimic human speech and the

sounds of other woodland creatures.

The crow family, or Corvidae includes ravens, rooks, jackdaws, magpies, and the grey jay. (Also called the Canada jay or whiskey jack). All of them exhibit a superior learning ability compared with most other birds.

The blue jay is about a

foot long, (30 cm) from the tip of its beak to the end of its tail. It has a blue crest and blue wings, back, and tail, with a white face and breast with some black markings, particularly around the neck. If a blue jay is startled or threatened its crest, is often fully erect and pointing forwards or it may it bristle outwards. When calm, as when feeding with other jays the crest is laid flat on top of the head.

The blue jay occupies a wide territory in North America, from Florida to mid-Canada. (Here, in Manitoba, it is close to its year-round range although it breeds in forested areas, especially hardwood or mixed forests further north then migrates south, but stays within its normal year-round range). It is not normally found in the interior plains. A sub-species, the Steller's jay is found on the west coast.

Blue jays go through a complete change of plumage between June and August. During this period there appears to be some skin irritation and blue jays will apply ants to the underside of their wings. It is thought that the ant, or a material from the ant has a soothing effect. Tame birds have used fruit juices or hair tonic in place of ants.

Both sexes build the nest which is built of twigs, moss and grass. It is about 8 inches in diameter with an inside cup of about four inches diameter lined with mud, fine roots and feathers.

Four or five green or blue tinted eggs with brown spots are laid. Incubation takes from 16 to 18 days. During this time the male feeds the female.

When the eggs hatch the young birds are completely naked and helpless, but within three weeks they are able to leave the nest, but the parents continue to feed them. After another three weeks they begin to forage for themselves, but continue to follow their parents who may feed them for another two months.

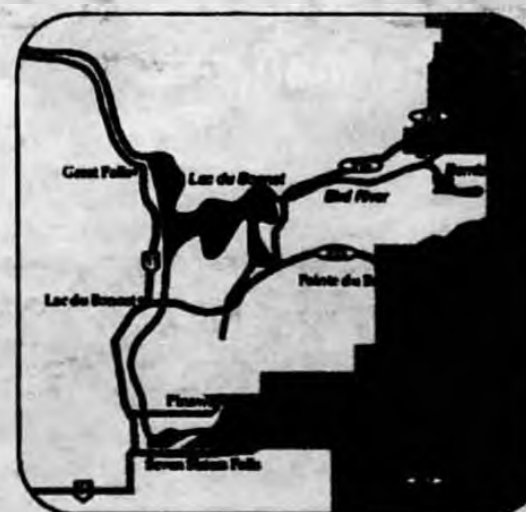

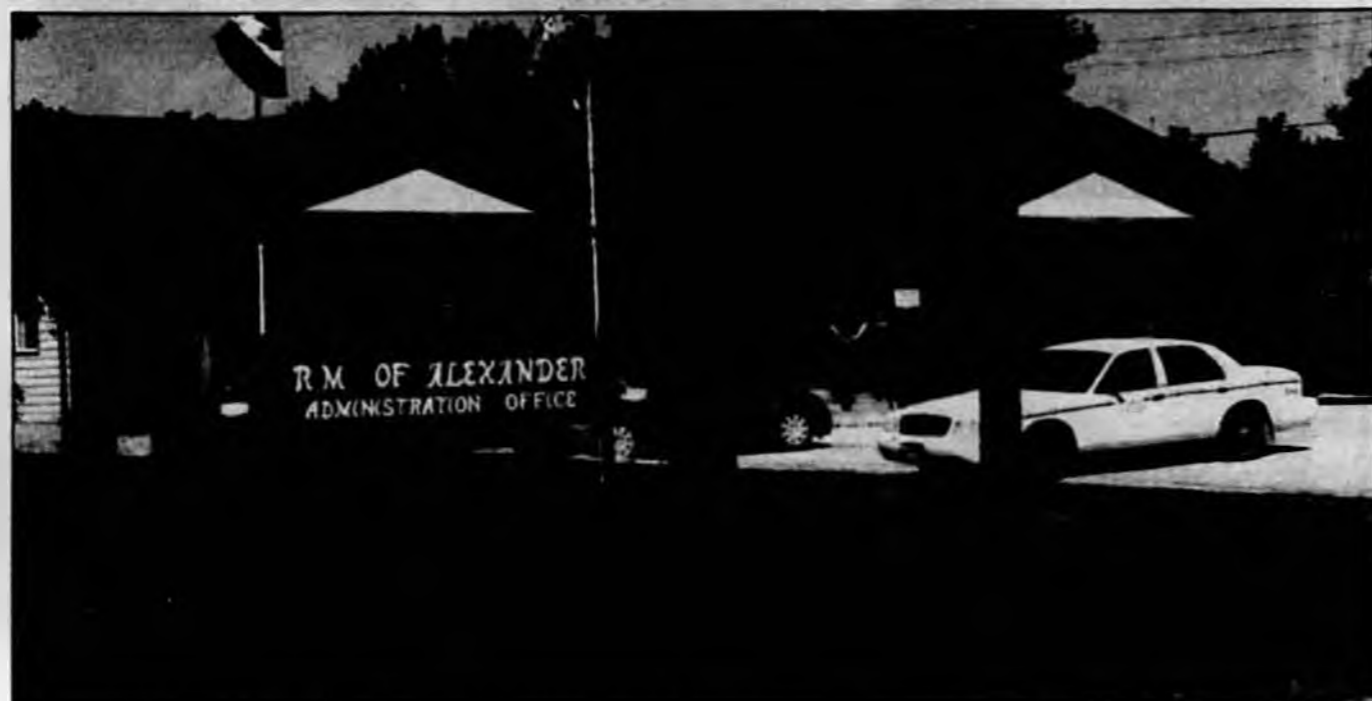
Postmaster Needed in Stead

Stead's postmaster will be retiring in January of 2009, and a decision was made at Council's July 22nd meeting to attempt to staff the position. Representatives from Canada Post attended the meeting to make council aware of the impending vacancy. They presented several options available for postal service in Stead following the current post-master's retirement.

The first option discussed was the hope of filling the position, followed by the less well-received alternatives of creating a community mailbox (which would be located in Stead) or amalgamating with an existing community. The third option would mean travelling to an outside community, such as Beausejour. Stead Mayor Alvin Yosyk expressed an aversion to the idea of a community made up largely of senior citizens having to travel such a distance for postage. He also indicated that several citizens had already come forward expressing interest in the job. It was therefore concluded by Council and the post-office reps that they would attempt to hire a new postmaster before resorting to a community mailbox, or the third and least likely option of amalgamation.

The position of the post-

master is a 250 day a year commitment, and the successful candidate will need to complete an application/testing process before being hired. The postmaster will also need to provide a post-office venue, and may be lease, buy or rent the current facility from the retiring postmaster. It is also possible for the postmaster to use his or her own residence, once certain requirements are met. The post-office will be advertising for the position in the upcoming weeks.



ORV By-Law Ammended: Questions Still Remain

Council ammended the incompatible ORV by-law at Tuesday's meeting so that it now complies with Provincial legislation. The incompatibility arose because the RM's holding period for penalized Off-Road Vehicle's was longer than the province's (30 days versus 5). The holding period has been accordingly reduced at the recommendation of Manitoba Justice.

The new by-law also removed mention of the term "peace-officer" to refer to those who enforce the by-laws, as the specific term requires the RM to ensure that their enforcers undergo

specific "peace-officer training". Since the RM simply wants by-law enforcement, the PBLE officers who handle such enforcement have merely undergone a name change.

These ammendments however, do not resolve the underlying issue. Namely, where does the RM stand in regards to other statutes? Because the issue of whether or not the Municipal Act gives the RM the right to exceed Provincial regulations has not been made clear, the RM is still currently in the dark. Therefore, other by-laws may or may not be affected if they are found to be inconsistent.

The RM still intends to lobby the Minister of Highways and Justice for an increased holding period, meaning we have likely not heard the final word on penalties for Off-Road

Vehicles.

New Zoning By-Law Prohibits Cabanas in Seasonal Campgrounds

A new by-law which prohibits new cabanas from being built, and existing ones from being expanded in seasonal campgrounds in the RM of Alexander, has just passed first reading. The by-law addresses the growing concern that the cabanas present in some of the RV parks are not being properly maintained, which contributes to an overall decline in the aesthetic of the area. In other words, they become eyesores.

Councillor Diane Dube raised concern about the by-

law eliminating the possibility of cabanas, since they have enhanced the aesthetic of RV parks in Pinawa and St.Malo, resulting in rejuvenation and growth within those areas. RV parks attract a certain kind of resident, ones who may not have the means or desire to purchase a full-scale residence in the area, but whose presence furthers the economic growth of the communities they inhabit.

However, if a new developer wishes to develop such an area, the by-law can be usurped. But the developer must include as an accessory in the development agreement the intention or possibility of raising cabanas. This means that the potential to one day create such an attraction as exists in other communities is still there, if there is the will to do so.

When I Get My Ducks in a Row

David the shepherd boy who became king of Israel found that the busier he got, the more complicated life became. David made the tragic mistake that many people make, he neglected to "keep his ducks in a row." He began to let the important priorities of his personal rela-


tionship with God, gradually slip till he was in big trouble. He committed adultery with Bathsheba and from that time on "his ducks" never were in a straight row again. If David were to speak to us today, he would say to us: Are you committing enough time to your spouse and family? Are you holding yourself accountable to wise counselors, so that they can correct you when needed? Are you keeping God first in your life so that His Word can direct all your decisions? When you have these "three ducks in a row" the rest will follow in right order.

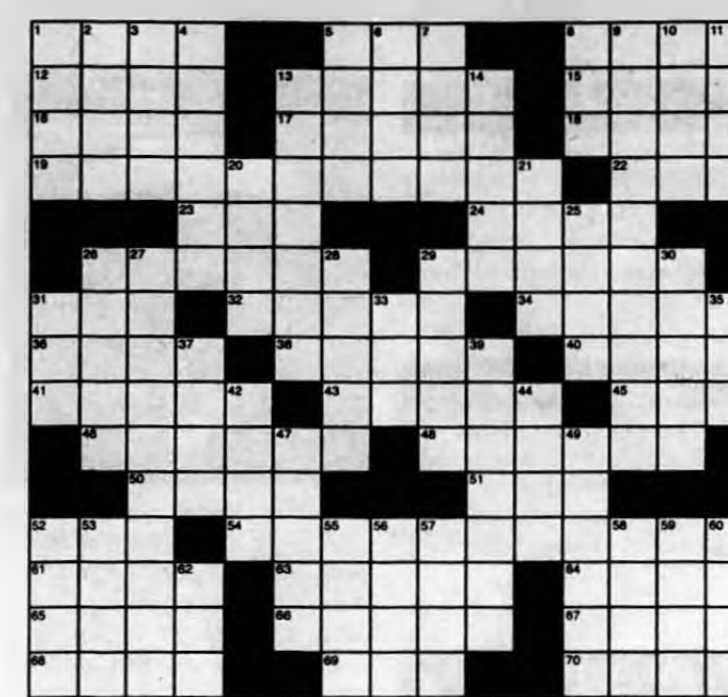
