'Suspicious' Death North of Lac du Bonnet

Lac du Bonnet RCMP responding to a call just before 8:00 pm on the evening of Tuesday, May 5th, found a woman's body at a home 8 km north of Lac du Bonnet

The death is regarded as suspicious by the RCMP. Officers from Lac du Bonnet, the Major Crime Unit and the Serious Crime unit are involved in the investigation.

Sergeant Lynne Karpish, RCMP communications officer, said the victim's name was known to the police but

had not yet been released to the public. She said the Privacy Act states that everyone has a right to privacy up to 20 years after their death and the RCMP are bound by the act.

Just about everyone in Lac du Bonnet knows the name of the victim and her obituary has appeared in the Winnipeg Free Press. The Echo is respecting her, and her family's right to privacy and will not be publishing her name. Further details will be reported when released by the RCMP.



Working Together for the Future

The councils of the RM of Alexander and the Town of Powerview-Pine Falls met on May 1 and 2 and with the assistance of HMC Management, completed the first phase of their joint economic development strategic plan.

"We are really pleased with not only the initial results of what we have accomplished to date, said Mayor Ted Pichor of the Town of Powerview-Pine Falls, "but also with the sense of unity in the room and how we all agreed that we need to work together in order to move our municipalities forward from a business development and retention perspective."

The two day strategic

planning session focused on the development of a joint economic development vision, mission, and values for a yet to be created lead economic development agency, along with a general session in which various economic development issues and solutions and next steps in the process were discussed.

"We see the future growth and development of our region, which we have jointly defined as the outer boundaries of the rural municipality, as being the key to our long term economic success and I am very delighted that our two Council's have taken this very critical first step to not only taking control of our

destiny, but to recognize that together we are so much stronger," said Rural Municipality of Alexander Reeve George Harbottle.

Once the results of Phase One are reviewed and approved by both Council's, next steps would include refining the joint economic development vision into more manageable action plans and developing a budget around that in order to move forward and attain the joint economic development vision. It is anticipated that the next steps will take some time throughout the next few months to complete since future decisions and actions will be based on this joint economic development strategic plan.

\$531,000 Towards World Heritage Site

The provincial government is donating \$531,000 to further the development of a United Nations World Heritage Site in the Boreal Forest on the East side of Lake Winnipeg.

Conservation Minister Stan Struthers said the money will go to pay staff to prepare land use studies and do community consultations in the area. He said the money would help the Pimachiowin Aki Corporation to prepare the nomination document and to prepare a video.

Pimachiowin Aki is a partnership of First nations, and

the governments of Manitoba and Ontario. The First Nations included in the Partnership are Poplar River, Little Grand Rapids, Pauingassi and Pikangikum.

Spokesperson for the partnership, Sophia Rabliauskas, a member of the Poplar River First Nation said; "Our UNESCO nomination has to be very detailed, starting with a vision from each of the First Nations Partners on how they see the land being used and cared for. Our land use plan for Poplar River is complete and the focus is now on getting the plans for Little Grand Rapids

Don't Blink McFadyen

According to public opinion polls rural Manitoba is 60% pro Tory, but most of the votes are in Winnipeg where the NDP are in the lead. That could change. 60,000 citizens of Winnipeg have been fined for photo-radar infractions and have not paid. The total amount outstanding is \$43,994,765.64. (or was on May 6. It will be above \$44 million now.) These 60,000 people are not going to pay. They are outraged at the injustice of using the Highway Traffic Act as a source of revenue for the province and the city. Speed limits have been set with a view to maximizing revenue, not maximizing safety. Safety is actually being jeopardized by the system because drivers are taking attention from the road in

front of them and the traffic around them, to be constantly on the alert for changing speed limits and are constantly having to check speedometers to ensure that they are below the posted limit - not the safe limit, which comes automatically after a few years of driving, but the lower limit posted by the city to maximize the cash grab. The courts have found that a great many of these tickets are unjust and have rejected them. The citizens of Winnipeg did not need judges or lawyers to tell them what is just and what is not. They have voted with their wallets. However, those that have paid will not get their money refunded. McFadyen has said that his party is looking into repaying all these unjust fines. He can do no other. NDP Justice Minister

Chomiak will organize a large group of sycophants who will campaign vigorously to maintain photo radar. Don't listen to them. Pay attention to the 60,000 who have voted with their wallets, and to the many others who paid, and who, on Chomiak's orders, will not be repaid. Those people who have been ripped off by Justice Minister Chomiak are all voters - so are their relatives and friends. There are enough of them to make a decisive difference in the next provincial election. Chomiak will not back down - it's not in his nature - He will either be replaced by the Premier or he will cause his party to lose the next election. Running for a Worthy Cause

I was very proud to take part in the 3rd Annual Andrew Dunn Memorial Run earlier this week in Bird's Hill Park, Manitoba. Andrew Dunn was a young man full of promise. Outwardly, he seemed to have everything going for him. However, his carefree smile was masking a painful battle with depression. Andrew lost his battle with depression to suicide in 2006, at the age of 23. The goal of the annual run is to bring awareness to this tragedy that takes so many people. It's very important that we continue to raise awareness to combat mental illness and its devastating effects. I commend Andrew's mother, Judy, and all of his friends and family, for having the strength and courage to ensure Andrew's tragedy helps others. Mental illness can affect anyone from any walk of life - regardless of age, education, income level or ethnicity. Every year, twenty percent of Canadians will personally experience a mental illness, and all Canadians will be indirectly affected at some time through a family member, friend or colleague. Approximately 8% of adults will experience major depression at some time in their lives. Suicide accounts for 24% of all deaths among 15-24 year olds and 16% among 25-44 year olds. Suicide is one of the leading causes of death in both men and women from adolescence to middle age. And unfortunately, stigma or discrimination attached to

mental illnesses still creates a serious barrier, not only to diagnosis and treatment but also to acceptance in the community. It is for this reason, that raising awareness and providing resources is so important. In our 2007 Budget, our Federal Government committed \$10 million over two years and \$15 million per year (starting in 2009-10) to support the establishment of the Mental Health Commission of Canada - an arm's length, not-for-profit corporation. The creation of the Commission was endorsed by the provinces and territories, as well as mental health stakeholder communities - and it was incorporated as a non-profit corporation in March 2007. I am pleased to say that the commission has been doing excellent work but there is still a lot to be done.

Although the weather was not cooperative - snowing in May, (and despite the fact that my age keeps slowing down my time for the 10 kilometre run) I was honoured to run with so many others who participated in the 3rd annual run in memory of Andrew. Caisse Merger On the Table Province-Wide Amalgamation Proposed

The Caisse la Prairie, which has a branch in St. Georges, will be merging with the Federation des Caisses Populaires du Manitoba and four other Manitoba Caisses if the membership approves the merger. The date of the membership vote has not been determined but it will probably be in the fall. The Federation des Caisses Populaires du Manitoba provides corporate and financial services and administrative support including information technologies and provincial government relations to five Caisses in Manitoba. The five Manitoba Caisses are,

La Prairie, Pembina, Saint Boniface, Elie, and Laurier. Between them they have a total of 28 branches in the southern part of the province. The Caisses Populaires are credit unions providing cooperative banking services to their members. The movement began in Quebec in 1900 with the Caisse Populaire Desjardins.

The difference between a caisse or credit union on the one hand, and a chartered bank on the other is best demonstrated by the difference between lending and borrowing rates. St Georges offers a five-year mortgage rate of 4.1% and a five year guaranteed income certificate interest rate of 3.2%, a

difference of only 0.9%. The spread with banks is usually in the range of 2%. Representatives of the five Caisses have already approved the merger, but the final say is up to the members of all five of them. Mr. Norman Collet, Chairman of Caisses Merger proposal working group, said that the idea of a formal merger came to be seen as the most promising option to reach the objectives of the Plan Mouvement, in the works since 2007. "The means chosen to put in place the Movements strategic plan must be cost-effective and efficient if we are to maintain out movements continuing health." He said.

and Paingassi completed. Leader of the opposition, Hugh McFadyen, said the opposition supports the establishment of a world heritage site, but wants plans to include the provision of a hydro transmission line from the proposed Conawapa dam on the Nelson River. He said the inclusion of a transmission line would not harm the application, and would result in a less expensive route bringing power from the north to southern markets. He said it would give the region an economic shot in the arm. "What we've been argu-



ing is that there is room for a limited development and a UNESCO designation for a win-win for east side communities who need the economic development as well as for all Manitobans." McFadyen said. Struthers said the UNESCO designation would be threatened by the inclusion of power lines in the application.

Grand Marais Site Chosen for EBWC

By **Laura Tuttle** favour of the "Destination Grand Marais" site where, within a year, the R.M. of St. Clements will erect a new

heritage building. This building which is the first of several phases of the complex, will double as a welcome centre for visitors to the Grand Beach Provincial Park. The Grand Marais location located just beyond the gates of the Park, will have an infrastructure with elements available to the Wellness Centre that are integral to the "health" and timeliness of the project.

In many ways, it was a

"head versus heart" decision for the members who are spread throughout East Beaches from Victoria Beach to Patricia Beach and Stead.

While the Traverse Bay location for the EBWC had captured many hearts, that site but could not have evolved because there was no promise of funding or sponsorship from the R.M. of Victoria Beach or the R.M. of Alexander. Coalition members had dogmatically worked toward building on this site without the realistic

amount of money needed to reach stage one let alone any viable figure which would realize long term sustainability.

What was encouraging to the Coalition during this painful process, was the number of members who took part in the final location vote. Of the 212 eligible members, 80% took the time to cast a ballot. 40 percent voted in favour of the Traverse Bay location while 60 percent voted for the Grand Marais location.

Wayside Community Church Spring Tea

This is the first year that the Wayside Community Church has hosted their annual "Spring Tea" at the Grand Marais Recreation Centre. It won't be the last. Organizer Dora Cross says that "Over the past ten years our little 'tea' has grown from a gather-

ing of 59 women to a current guest list of about 200 women who reply to the 400 printed 'invitations' that are distributed throughout the East Beaches and Selkirk." She qualifies the number of invited guests by saying that an invitation is not really necessary to attend the free

event, which is also advertised by posters in the area, however an RSVP from interested parties helps the organizers to plan correctly for their honoured guests.

Each year there is a theme. One year, when the group was still small, they had an expert demonstrate the intricacies of de-boning and preparing a turkey. Those were the days when the guest list was small and the event was held in the Wayside church hall. By 2009 things have changed considerably and the church, even though it is in the process of expanding to a larger facility just can't hold the crowds who clamour to enjoy the annual Church event. This year the theme was, "Hats Off to Mom".

Therefore, on Saturday, May 9th, honoured guests enjoyed a pleasant afternoon of entertainment and schmoozing. Twenty-eight tables were beautifully laid out for the event. Each table had a hostess and male waiters to serve tea and dainties to the ladies honoured at the event. Featured at each table was a centrepiece that looked like a beautiful "Sunday bon-

Welcome Back Cottagers

Two weeks ago we began a spotlight on some of the garden related businesses in the Beaches area. We thought our special "Welcome Back Cottagers" issue would be a good place to carry on this feature. This week, we are featuring Pine Greenhouses and Cottage Country Nurseries.

Pine Greenhouses

Cheryl Parisian, guardian of the Pine Greenhouses in Victoria Beach was into recycling and keeping the planet green, long before "Go Green" became the buzzword of the 21st century. This gardener is both diligent and passionate about recycling items of value. She spends as much of her time cleaning and preparing

reusable pots and materials, as she does in the actual planting and maintaining of the flowers and vegetables. More of this kind of commitment and we would not have the landfill problems of today.

Parisian, a.k.a. Cheryl "Henderson" (her maiden name) says she owes her desire to keep the planet both healthy and pretty in part to her genetics. Her family has always been conscious of recycling. As an example, Cheryl's maternal grandparents built their first family

cottage, from material reclaimed from an old church. Coincidentally, a minister and his wife bought the original property of her grandparents several years ago. Today the greenhouse is stacked high with "like new" containers ready for a second or third time around.

The Pine greenhouses are located alongside the Victoria Beach Post Office on Ateah Road. The land and buildings belong to Cheryl's dad although she confesses he does not have the patience for gardening that his daugh-

ters possess. Still, her father remains integral to the operation as do the rest of Cheryl's family. However it is the spirit of her mother who gives inspiration to this daughter. Cheryl refers constantly to her mother's influence when she talks about her own love of the greenhouse business. Her mother, now deceased, was a trained florist who opened her own shop in Pine Falls. She moved her little family to the

East Beaches when Cheryl was nine years old and launched the gardens when Cheryl was about sixteen years old. As we talked, Cheryl realized with amazement that starting plants each spring is something she has been doing for over thirty years.

In late December before the rest of us have cooked the Christmas turkey, Cheryl is already busy in the greenhouse planting the many

seeds and spores that are the bulk of her inventory. Did you know that a begonia grows slowly from a tiny spore smaller than an infant's nose hair? Actually one "hair" could grow a multiple of plants. Some of the Pine Greenhouse roses and other more difficult species come from specialty growers but for the most part, Cheryl creates the nursery stock herself.

Parisian says her greatest challenge "is keeping the wood electric fire going at all times and with just the right amount of heat to keep the plants healthy". This time of year she bunks down in a little suite located at the back of one of the greenhouses in order to keep the temperature correct. Although it was very cold outside and in fact, snow had fallen this late April day, it was my privi-

lege to witness an already mature and abundant greenhouse. I must admit, I had not expected to see such an abundance of "summer" plants this early in the season.

Cheryl says, "The joy of growing something wonderful from something so tiny is a miracle" and the best part of her job. To the big box stores and large city greenhouses, "plants are just

plants," whereas this gardener regards the seeds she grows as "her babies". Parisian says, "Except for the pleasure I get out of meeting and talking with people, I could do very well without the 'selling' season", which lasts from about Mothers Day until the end of July.

This talented gardener claims she is very fortunate to have the help of family and friends during the busy months of June and July. That's when the cottagers begin to arrive for their summer retreat and the joys of her greenhouse. Her favourite flowers are daisies and yellow roses but the begonias are her biggest seller. They still cost less at Pine Greenhouse than those in the big box stores and Cheryl feels committed to keep her prices low. "I want everybody to be able to afford a garden. Our season is so short and I don't want to pre-

vent anyone from having the opportunity to enjoy flowers as much as I do.

As a gardener, Jonsson sees this initiative as her way to make a contribution to the community plus pay due respect on behalf of her neighbours in Victoria Beach.

Joanne has had pre-season phone calls from Texas, Atlanta, Ottawa and British Columbia asking if she would collect their planting pots from their cottage in order to create a pleasing display which will be ready prior to their arrival at the end of June. Hers is a faithful following who know they can count on Joanne for their gardening needs.

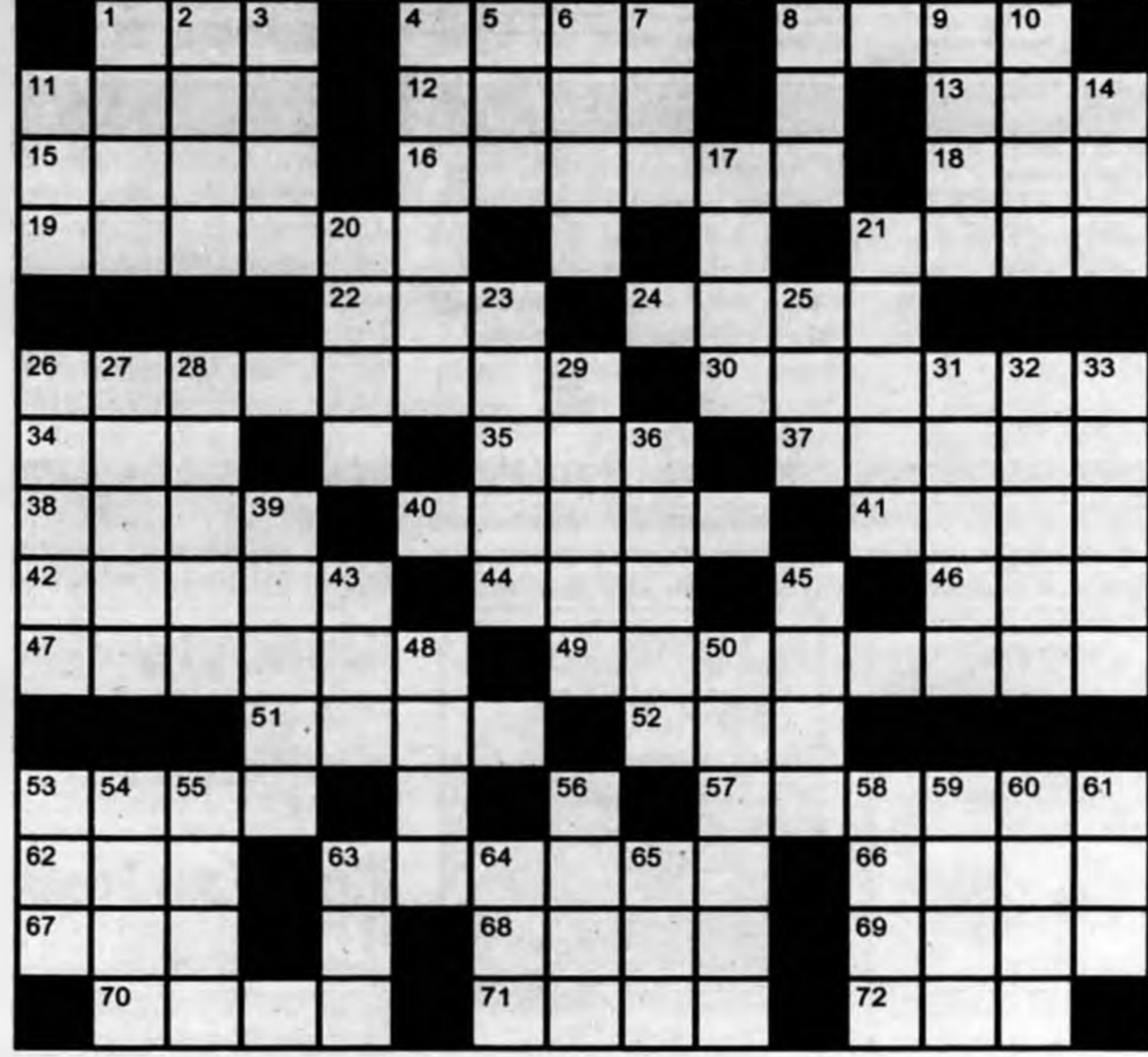
