Union Nixes
Binding
Arbitration



These East Beaches kids can't wait to get out trick-or-treating. But to all you little ghouls and grem-lins out there, be sure to bundle up. Environment Canada is calling for snow flurries and high winds.

At a regular monthly meeting in the Pine Falls Curling Club Tuesday evening the Union voted to not apply for binding arbitration but to wait for the results of AbitibiBowater negotiations which are scheduled to begin this week.

After two months either the company or the unions are entitled to apply for binding arbitration. If either of them apply then both are bound by the decision of the arbitrator. USW president Cam Sokoloski would not speculate on how much longer the dispute was resolved.

The two unions have been getting a tremendous level of support from other unions in Manitoba. At the recent Manitoba Federation of Labour convention delegates collected nearly \$5,000 in cash donations and \$11,000 in pledges. -At Tuesday's meeting the Manitoba Building and Trades Council presented the locked out workers with a cheque for \$7,500. The Manitoba Government Employees Union has contributed \$5,000, and the Southern Area Council has donated \$800. Other contributions are pending, including a donation from the Steelworkers in

Thompson.

Local unions have been very supportive. Powerview teachers and staff and the local nurses union have been very supportive. Sokoloski said he would like to thank those unions and every one of the local businesses for their ongoing support.

The Union is scheduled to be in court again tomorrow. Tembec is complaining about picketing outside the mill. They complain that picketers are taking too long in providing information to truckers crossing the picket line - sometimes several seconds longer than the two minutes allowed in the previous injunction. Tembec want to keep picketers away from the mill gate and off the highway. They are asking that picketers walk in the ditches.

Sokoloski does not think that the judge will take Tembec's complaints too seriously.

The Echo has learned that the union contract for Tembec's Spruce Falls mill expired a year ago. No one on the local union executive could explain why the company decided to operate a year under the old contract at Spruce Falls, but locked out Pine Falls employees on the day the contract expired.

Get the shot, not the flu!

1 H1N1 Flu Shot

The H1N1 flu shot will be available at no charge to all Manitobans and enough vaccine has been ordered for everyone who needs or wants the shot.

H1N1 flu shot clinics will begin across the province during the next few weeks. Vaccine will arrive in stages and the early clinics will be for Manitobans who should get the shot first.

Who Should Get the First H1N1 Flu Shots?

- Children aged six months to under five years old
- Anyone of Aboriginal ancestry (First Nations, Métis or Inuit)
- Disadvantaged individuals (for example, homeless)
- People living in remote areas
- People under 65 with a chronic medical condition or other risks, including severe obesity, substance abuse or alcoholism
- Anyone with a weakened immune system or those who live with or care for them
- Those who live with or care for infants under six months old
- Single parents or anyone solely responsible for a dependent
- Health care workers and medical first responders
- Pregnant women*

* In November, a shot for pregnant women will be available. If you are pregnant, you can wait until that shot arrives or you can talk to your health care provider now about the possibility of getting an earlier shot.

As more vaccine arrives, the H1N1 shot will be offered at flu shot clinics to other Manitobans who need or want it. Later, it will also be available from family doctors and other health care providers.

2 Seasonal Flu Shot

Seasonal flu shot clinics have already been held for Manitobans who are most at risk for seasonal flu. Once H1N1 flu shot clinics start, seasonal flu shots may also be available at these clinics or from your health care provider.

Manitobans 65 and over should also get a pneumococcal shot at the same time as the seasonal flu shot. Most adults only need one pneumococcal shot in their lifetime.

Solidarity Among Locals

Manitoba Labour law stipulates that, in an industrial dispute, (a strike or a lockout), either side can apply for binding arbitration after a period of two months has passed without an agreement. If either side applies for binding arbitration the provincial government appoints an arbitrator. Both side are bound by his decision.

The union has decided to wait until other mills have negotiated their contracts. AbitibiBowater, the largest producer of newsprint in the world, began negotiations on Monday, October 26. AbitibiBowater is in receivership. The receiver is currently selling newsprint at rock bottom prices and is responsible, to a large extent for the problems plaguing the industry today.

The market for newsprint has been permanently reduced by the impact of the Internet on the reading habits of traditional purchasers of newspapers and in the switching of advertisers to the web. The market has also been reduced by the current recession, but some of this

market will be recovered when the economy improves.

Because of this there are too many newsprint mills chasing too few customers. Some of them have to close to bring some semblance of order back into the market. Because of its low cost of hydro, and high quality newsprint, Pine Falls should not be one of them.

However, it could be in Tembec's interest to sacrifice this mill in order to convince the rest of their 7,000 employees that the company means it when they demand a 35% cut in wages and benefits. If they can persuade these employees to accept a 35% cut they would save roughly \$200 million dollars a year.

But if every other company, and every other union local did the same thing, wages would go down throughout the industry, there would not be one tonne of increased demand as a result of the lower price and AbitibiBowater's receiver would simply cut the price again, everyone would be back where they started except for the employees who would all be getting 65% of their previous incomes.

By not knuckling under, and by not going to binding arbitration the Pine Falls unions are in the vanguard of protecting all forestry employees from what amounts to a union-busting attempt by Tembec, and the other newsprint producers.

There are many that state that, because wages are so high in the industry, they can afford to take substantial cuts. That is not so. Most newsprint mills are in small towns remote from major population centers. Few jobs are available for spouses. Family incomes in forestry towns are no higher, and are often lower than family incomes in the larger centers.

Unions were developed to protect employees from unscrupulous employers setting one employee against another. To make this protection work, solidarity amongst the workers is vital. This also applies on an industry-wide basis. There must be solidarity among locals.

Pine Falls has shown the way. Pine Falls is hurting, but it has taken on the leadership of organized workers in the forestry industry. This is not the time to go back to 19th century labour relations.

Greg Selinger as Premier

The NDP members recently elected their new leader, and of course, the new Premier of Manitoba. You had no say in the matter, and now must be satisfied, even if you did not have a vote! What is particularly odd is that unions had 20% of the vote as to whom would become the leader of the NDP, and hence, the next Premier of Manitoba. The last time I looked, unions do not vote in general elections, yet they had a substantial influence in who would be our next Premier. Corporations, volunteer organizations and Chambers of Commerce do not vote in general elections either, but oddly enough, they did not get a vote in the leadership convention! This highlights the inequities and unfairness in the NDP leadership system. They should take "democratic" out of the "New Democratic Party" - it would better reflect the system that has been endorsed by the NDP!

There are several reasons why Greg Selinger should not have been elected Leader of the Party and Premier of Manitoba, including:

1. As Finance Minister, Greg Selinger knew that the Crocus Investment Fund had problems, at least 4 years before it collapsed. In 2003, he told his cabinet colleagues that "virtually no money will be available for new investments", but he said nothing to the rest of Manitoba, and as a result, more than 30,000 Manitobans lost their hard-earned savings and retirement funds.

2. Mr. Selinger knew about the plan concocted by the NDP to claim phony expenses that their election campaigns never had. Because of these phony expenses, an unlawful rebate of \$70,000 went directly into the bank accounts of the NDP. What did Selinger do? Nothing - he just hoped no one would notice, but he knew it was wrong be-

cause he demanded a letter from the NDP to try to get out of it!

3. Greg Selinger was a City of Winnipeg Councillor before becoming an MLA. While a city councillor, he supported business and property tax increases. In addition to this, he has strongly suggested that he will adopt a new Harmonized Sales Tax, which will take money out of your pocket like never before. The last thing we need right now is more taxes!

4. Greg Selinger has been the Minister responsible for Manitoba Hydro for the last few years. He, more than anyone else, is responsible for the decision relating to building a Hydro Transmission line on the West side of Lake Winnipeg, from a point North of Kenora, then all the way West to Brandon, and then East to Winnipeg, instead of building the Transmission Line by a more direct route on the East side of Lake Winnipeg. His misguided decision will add more than \$640 Million to the cost of the line, a cost which you, as a Hydro user, will need to pay out of your own pocket, one way or the other. In the meantime, this line will cut 50kms more of the Boreal Forest on the West side of the lake than on the East side of the lake. How is that for the environment?

These are only some of the reasons why Greg Selinger was a poor choice for Leader of the NDP, and there are many more!

Taking Aim at the Wasteful Long-Gun Registry

Next week, all Members of Parliament will have the opportunity to right a wrong. An important vote on fellow Manitoba Conservative MP Candice Hoepfner's bill (C-391) to scrap the long-gun registry will take place on November 4, 2009. We expect the vote to be very close. Every vote will matter.

Both Jack Layton and Michael Ignatieff have been unequivocal in their support for the wasteful and ineffective long-gun registry. We hope that individual Liberal and New Democrat MPs will stand up to their political bosses in Ottawa and vote to protect the local way of life for their constituents.

New School For Black River

Twenty-one years after this First Nation began lobbying for a new school, residents are finally able to celebrate the opening of what promises to become a community facility in the truest sense of the word. During the wait Black River had to deal with some huge obstacles, including having to operate out of seven make-shift buildings after a fire destroyed the old school four years ago. The old school had been inadequate almost from the day it opened. It was too small from the start and badly overcrowded in 2006,

when populations had swelled far beyond 1982 levels. There were also severe construction flaws, a common occurrence at the time in many construction projects on First Nations because of carelessness and corner-cutting among both contractors and the department of Indian Affairs.

"Right from Day 1 it was inadequate. There were a lot of construction flaws," says former Chief Frank Abraham, who began lobbying for a new school back in 1988.

The new school is designed to last 50 years. Design features and fire-resistant materials will guard against the eruption and spread of fire as well as smoke, which is the primary threat to lives of people when there is a fire.

Design features include extensive use of natural light, which has been shown to boost the mood and academic performance of students. The floor of the school gymnasium will be the first in Canada to be constructed with a hockey-puck-type material under the floorboards. This provides an extra measure of shock absorption for children and adults who jump while playing sports.

"We are going to be using the gym for community events, school events and

evening events," Councillor Farley Bird (education portfolio), said Oct. 21 following the grand opening ceremony. Architect Art Martin said new schools on First Nations are very widely used as community facilities.

"This new facility will be very beneficial for Black River for many years to come," said Chief Sheldon Kent, who added that Black River contributed \$1.5-million of its own money to the \$15-million project.

The old school served Kindergarten to Grade 8 and high school students were bused to Powerview. This fall students in Grades 9 and 10 have been included and the Grades 11 and 12 will be added in future school years. The school is designed to easily accommodate future construction if student populations soar in the future.

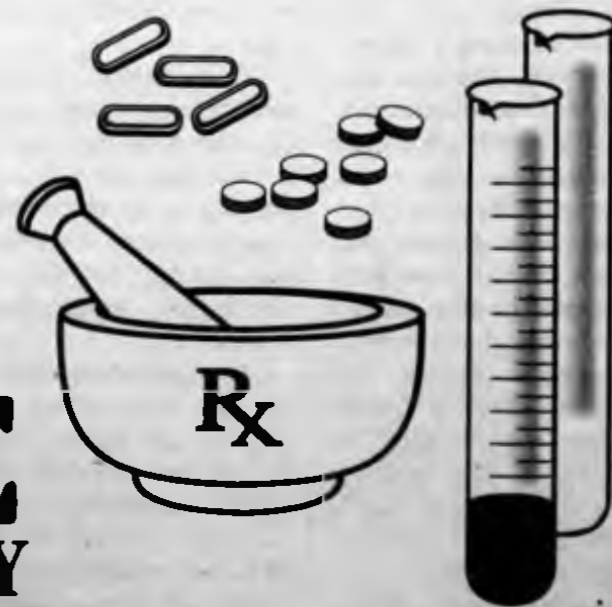
Councillor Rhonda Abraham said there had been many setbacks over the years in lobbying the Department of Indian and Northern Affairs, but the new school had been given final approval prior to the 2006 fire. The fire, which was caused by an electrical fault, was a big setback because important equipment was lost. Setting up a makeshift school was a huge challenge. The plan had been to use the old school building for other community needs.

Spirit Rock Café

Classy but unpretentious are two words that jump quickly from the keypad as an apt description for the new Spirit Rock Café & Inn in Grand Marais. I had already heard from one neighbour that it was a great place to get a mug of hot chocolate and from another that the pastries at the Café were delicious. Someone else said that the rooms are spacious and tastefully decorated. All these rumours proved to be correct. Perhaps even understated.

I glance into the attractive display case and see huge cinnamon rolls and rich desserts – cheesecake, an apple pie and another cake called 'death by chocolate'. I learn these decadent items are supplied fresh from various well known venues. Some are from 'Baked Expectations' in Winnipeg and others from local suppliers such as the 'Upper Crust' bakery in Selkirk (who sell what may be "the best cinnamon buns on the planet"). If you are looking for breakfast at the Spirit Rock Café the fare is strictly European style although the owners expect

in the future to offer more than buns, bagels croissants and desserts.

"I don't know that we would qualify as a Bed & Breakfast" says owner and hostess Julie Hayden with a pleasant voice that doesn't hide her 'down under' accent. "We do have beds, we do serve a continental breakfast but each guestroom has its own bathroom and then of course there is the gift shop. We think of ourselves as owning a small Inn". Julia adds, "There are plans to extend into catering and to offer a more substantial luncheon menu but we are still waiting for the go-ahead from the restaurant inspector."

The Spirit Rock Café & Inn officially opened at the beginning of July 2009 as the culmination of a vision for two ambitious men their equally entrepreneurial wives. The result is an impressive two story structure, fronted by beautiful black stone imported from Canmore, Alberta and graced by a huge inviting veranda shaded by a balcony that runs the full length of the building. The upstairs bedrooms

have a graceful staircase which leads to an entrance at the outside of the building and which subsequently offers visitors both convenience and privacy. I caught Julia seated on a comfortable deck chair reading the morning paper on the sunny morning I visited. The whole picture said "welcome".

Business partners Paula & Richard Ewens were already property owners in Grand Marais when Richard invited his brother-in-law Patrick Petrucka and wife Julie to visit and to take a look at business possibilities. The Ewens had realized very quickly that the East Beaches area on the east side of Lake Winnipeg is one of the most unique destinations on the Canadian Prairies. Fully established cross country ski trails plus wonderful undeveloped sites for downhill skiing along with summer bathing and boating facilities create the unmatched charm of a vacation paradise. These were the qualities that drew the Ewens to area and the Petruckas were easily persuaded to buy into the concept.

"This is one of the grandest places on Earth" says Patrick Petrucka with a bit of a twinkle in his eye after

using Grand Beach in a pun to emphasize his enthusiasm for the area. Regardless of prevailing levity, his choice to make this a place to work was not made impulsively or without foresight. A world traveler with a prosperous import business, Petrucka saw the potential for development of an outlet that would showcase some of his overseas finds as well as provide an establishment that could be self sustaining all year round. Plus, the water had already been tested by his relatives.

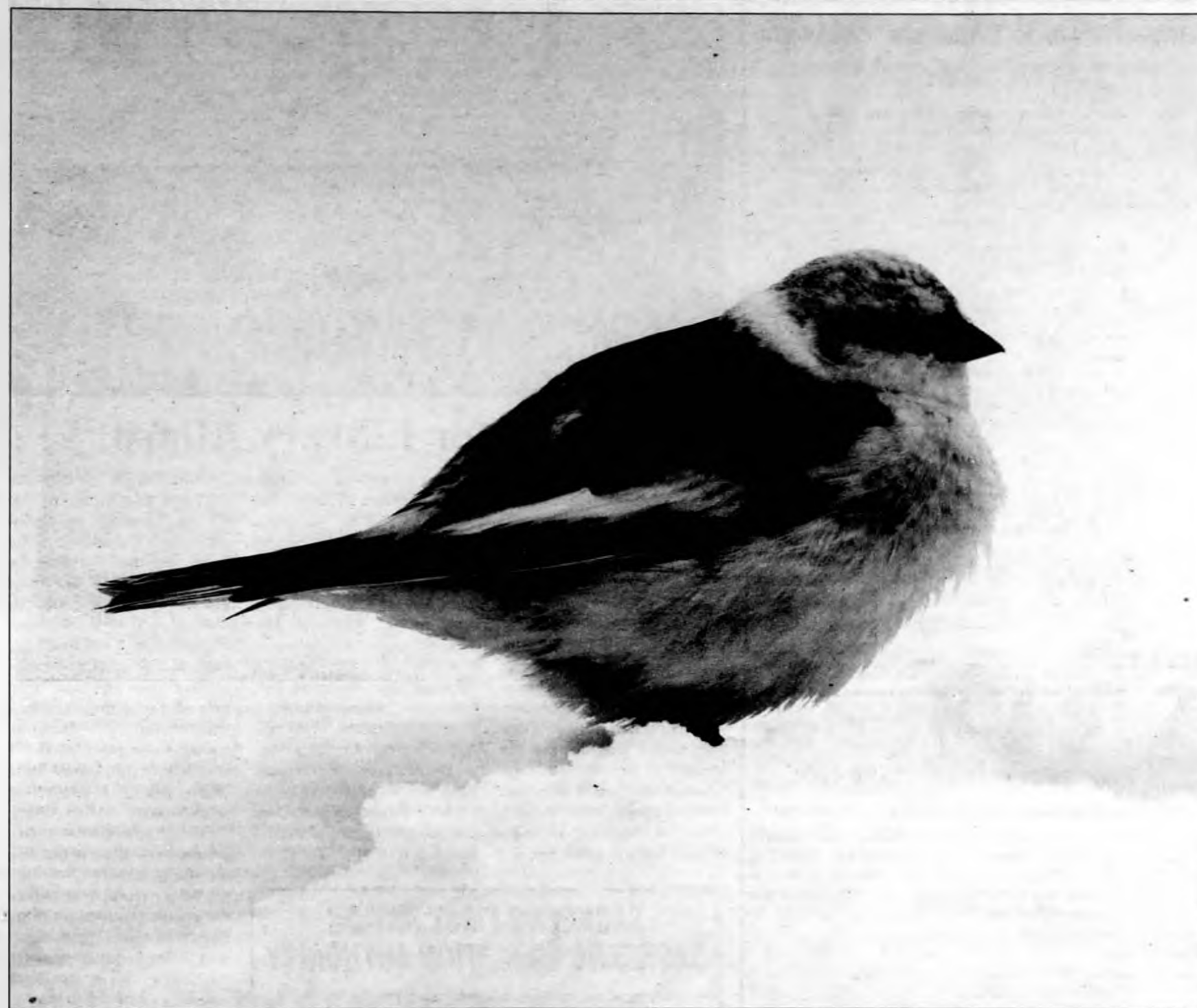
The Ewens had launched the first of several enterprises by selling sarongs along the beach and eventually finding a more permanent kiosk on the famous Grand Beach board walk. Later, Ewen became a partner in a gas bar and an adjoining restaurant that are open year round in this 'cottage' country community. Both couples saw this quaint community and the world class beaches that surround it as a fabulous natural phenomenon where thousands of day trippers are happy to stop for coffee or shop for a few souvenirs before and after a great day in the outdoors.

The business potential in East Beaches spoke for itself,

however the Ewens and Petruckas also discovered that the area is rich with history and yet still contains the added value of a close community. One can conclude from the evidence that Petrucka has an eye for quality both in wares and in his choice of a wife. The selection of products at the Spirit Rock Café & Inn is at once impressive and exotic. The hospitality is completely down to earth. This is one vision that is clear and real and oozing with good spirit.

Snow Bunting

The snow buntings are back. Snow buntings breed in the very far north, from the south shore of Hudson Strait to the islands on the edge of the Arctic Ocean. They migrate south towards the end of October and spend the winter in southern Canada and the northern United States. In Canada their winter range covers all of British Columbia, almost all of Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and the Maritime Provinces except Labrador. In Ontario and Quebec they winter south of James Bay.

About the size of a spar-

row, they are very easily recognized by the flashes of the white patches on their wings as they scatter away from the roadside when an automobile approaches. They are called snowflakes in some locations because of this scintillating effect. The flock disperses in all directions with rapid changes in direction making it impossible to get a good look at them and identify them in any other way other than their behavior as a flock.

Snow bunting males arrive at the northern nesting sites in early April before the spring thaw; females arrive four to six weeks later. The female builds a thick-walled nest of small roots, grasses and down. The thick wall helps keep the eggs and young chicks warm. The

female must stay on the nest for most of the incubation period of about a week. During this time she is fed by the male. Nests are built in crevices or other protected places. Four to six eggs are laid which are white with a ring of reddish brown spots around the larger end. Chicks are ready to fly about two weeks after hatching.

They feed on seeds and insects in breeding areas. In winter they travel in flocks, feeding on seeds of grasses showing above the snow. In extreme cold weather they may burrow under the snow to keep warm.

Snow buntings are now in their non-breeding plumage with a cinnamon cheek and ring around the neck. Upper parts are brown; under parts

are white or a very pale buff. Breeding plumage in summer is a snow-white body with darker, almost black wings when folded. In flight, at both times of the year the sparkling white of wing patches show clearly.

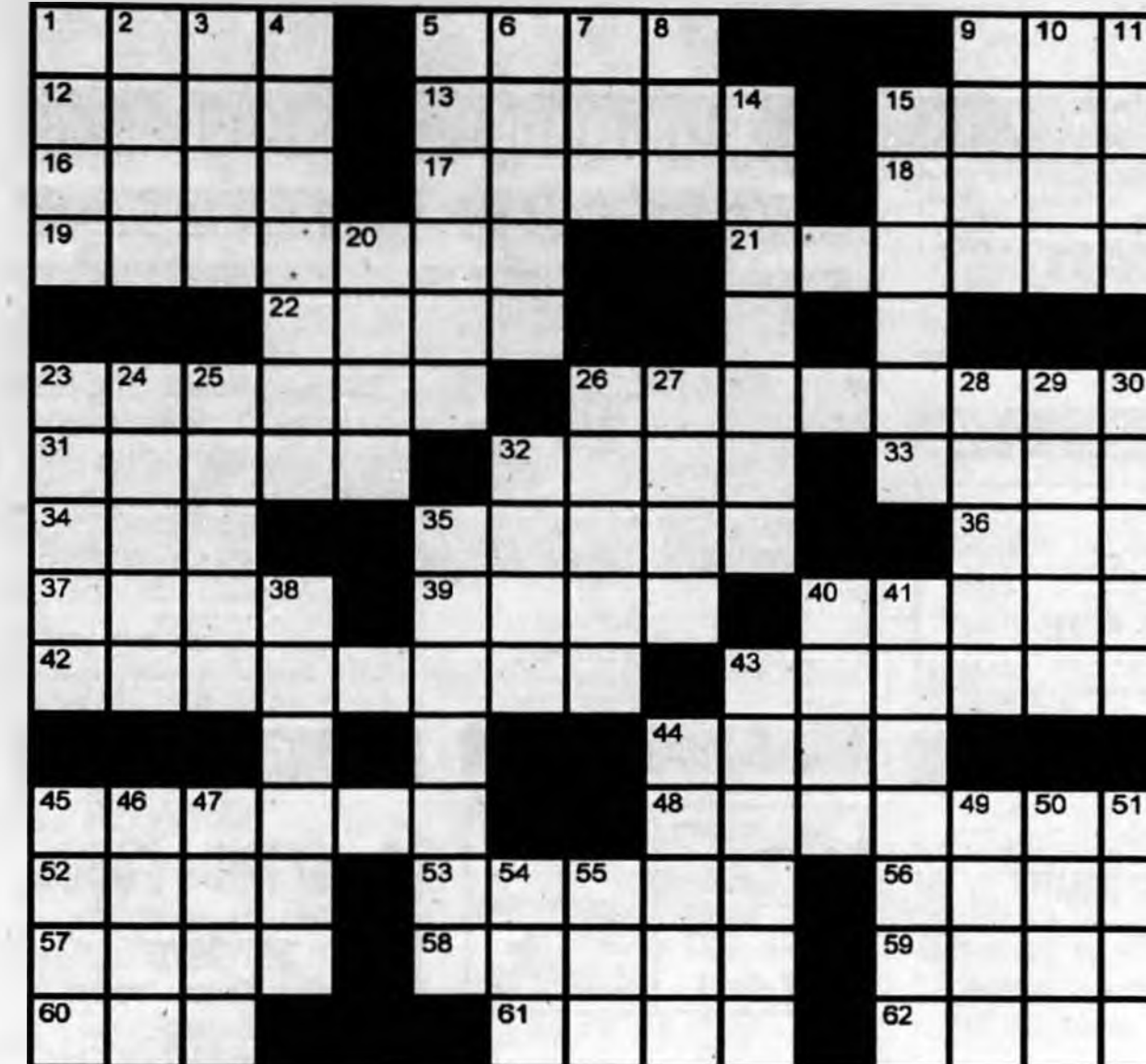

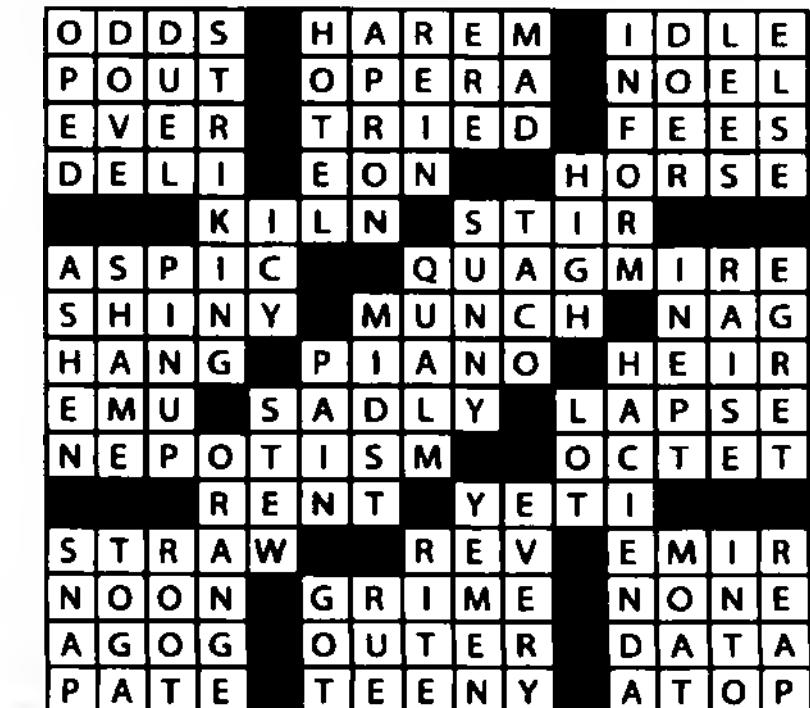
