Starting time has been moved back to 8:00 o'clock due to the advance polls there but things will be ready to roll at 8:00 o'clock sharp.

219 candidates contest 57 seats

R.T. Willis, chief electoral officer, announced recently that nominations have closed and 219 candidates have filed nomination papers with returning officers for the provincial election.

Candidates endorsed by registered political parties are as follows:

- 5 Communist Party of Canada (Manitoba Committee)
- 14 Confederation of Regions Manitoba
- 57 Liberal Party in Manitoba
- 57 Manitoba Progressive Conservative Party
- 13 Manitoba Progressive Party
- 57 New Democratic Party of Manitoba
- 6 Western Canada Concept (Manitoba)

In the 1981 general election, there were 195 candidates. This included 57 NDP, 57 PC, 39 Liberal, 36 Manitoba Progressive, 2 Communist and 4 independent.

The close of nominations for the provincial election was 1:00 p.m. on Nomination Day, February 25, 1986. "Each candidate files a nomination paper with the returning officer in the appropriate electoral division," Mr. Willis said, "and it must include the signatures of at least 100 eligible voters in the electoral division to be valid."

School additions approved for L.d.B. and Powerview

Additions approved

The Agassiz School Division has received approval from the Minister of Education for the additions proposed on the Centennial and Powerview schools.

The confirmation by telephone came last week. Official confirmation by letter stating the actual square footage to be allowed is expected shortly. Once that is received, the division's architect will be contacted to draw up preliminary plans, showing some of the options open to the board.

One hundred percent of the capital costs will be covered by the province and will have no direct impact on local ratepayers.

Powerview School

The addition requested for Powerview School would add 3300 square feet for an industrial arts shop area (which will be used for students from both Powerview and Pine Falls) and a 1500 square foot double classroom area for home economics.

The home economics area may have to be a renovation of existing classrooms but the administration is hopeful that the additional space will be allowed. At present Powerview and Pine Falls students travel to Lac du Bonnet for instruction in these two programs. The additions in Powerview will eliminate the need for time consuming and costly bussing.

The removal of these students from the Lac du Bonnet School will free the facilities for the extension of the home economics - industrial arts option into the senior grades. The popular small engines repair course could possibly be introduced.

Populations stable

Mike Czuboka, superintendent of schools, said that he is very happy with the approval and the flexibility it will bring to the industrial arts program in Lac du Bonnet.

School populations in both areas are expected to be stable over the next five years. The additional space being provided is based on the population figures of children in the system and in the community that will come into the schools.

The only change is the trend toward French Immersion in Powerview. Three quarters of students are entering the French Immersion program so that within a few years the greater

percentage of the population will be in that program. This is not expected to change the requirement for facilities, but rather the way in which the facilities are used.

The process of bringing a proposal from the notice of intent stage through construction to occupancy takes about 18 months. The board is hopeful that all will be ready for the 1987 school term.

Centennial School

The notice of intent for the Centennial School asked for eight additional classrooms and auxiliary space. Dependent on the square footage allowed, the addition will include a library and multi-purpose space.

When asking for the consolidation of Park Avenue and Centennial schools, the division

said that the Park Avenue School is difficult to ventilate and heat when occupied by 200 children and staff. There is no gymnasium in the school and the playground space is limited.

The new facility will bring together the elementary school staff which is presently split and put an end to the need for the principal and specialists to travel between the two schools.

Programs involving both schools will be much more easily coordinated. Bus loading and unloading will be more convenient.

Both the R.M. and Village of Lac du Bonnet have expressed interest in acquiring Park Avenue for housing the library and a museum. The location is excellent and the need for space for offices is growing.

Lac du Bonnet P.C. candidate Darren Praznik toured A.E.C.L.'s Underground Research Lab east of Lac du Bonnet Wednesday, February 26. Praznik descended 800 feet below the surface, the last 150 feet by manway ladder. Praznik stated that he was impressed with the facility and the work that was being carried out there.

"Research and the technology it produces are now the products which others want to buy. It is by expanding research and technology that we will ensure our economy is strong in the decades ahead," said Praznik. Praznik also commented that the delay by the Pawley government in approving the hydrology studies requested by A.E.C.L. could have resulted in the loss of a \$10 million contract for the U.R.L. "This clearly demonstrates that Mr. Pawley's government is more interested in

appealing to its anti-nuclear supporters than ensuring that north-eastern Manitoba develops as a centre for research and technology," stated Praznik.

"In an interview with *The Winnipeg River Review* shortly after his retirement last December, former Natural Resources Minister Sam Uskiw indicated that the application should have been dealt with by his department but was "scooped" off his desk by Premier Pawley who called for a special committee and delayed approval until they heard from the federal government," noted Praznik. Praznik added that he has attempted to obtain a copy of the telex sent by the premier to Energy Minister Pat Carney but was told that it was confidential.

Let's hear it for the enterpriser

Just the sight of an enterpriser at work lifted me from depression to elation.

The depression followed the discovery that on the coldest Saturday this winter I'd lost the heat in the pick-up. No full-service garage was open. No service station would touch the job.

But I kept looking, and here's where the elation comes in. I found a tiny auto-electric shop. It's operated by one of the boat people from Vietnam. An hour later and I've got heat galore, thanks to a keen young man who works six days a week.

When I related this to one of my farm cronies, he was not surprised. He guessed that the Canadian mechanics were probably all in the pub that day, talking about how Canada needs more unions, and fewer immigrants.

What my new Oriental friend was practicing is called enterprise. If you want to know what's doing in this department, just ask me; I've been reading the weeklies.

Enterprise is totally adaptable. It feels at home in small towns, and in farm workshops.

The Humboldt *Journal* tells me that Schulte Industries of Englefeld just sold \$1.5 million worth of rock-pickers to Syria.

In the *Pembina Times* of Morden there are two more small-town success stories.

Twenty years after opening his one-man welding shop, Isaac Loewen has 34 employees, and last year sold \$3 million worth of gravel trailers to the U.S. South of that town is a two-man shop, All Size Perforating, which this past year sold more than 500 grain dryers.

I find it inspirational to read of enterprise solving major per-

sonal problems. In the *Provost News* I spot a picture of Wallace Greenwood at work at his new switchboard. After a rodeo accident confined him to a wheelchair, he went into business as proprietor of a 24-hour answering service.

It was in the *Whitehead Herald* where I spotted a story so good I've filed it away for future use. What it tells me is that enterprise and imagination thrive when given a spot of encouragement.

This is a campus story from the U. of Regina. A professor of engineering challenged his students to, "Design a household or industrial gadget that will have high consumer acceptance and retail for under \$10".

The ideas flowed. Adjustable coat hangers, combination fork-and-chopstick, a mechanical eyeglass washer, an automatic plant feeder, a pasta maker, a fly swatter and catcher, a coffee cup warmer...plus close to 100 others.

Les Solomon and Gene Mailloux soon will open in Prince Albert a clinic which relieves some of the discomfort associated with multiple sclerosis. Solomon has a lot of motivation for this enterprise; he has the disease himself, and felt better and had more energy when he tried this treatment in Ontario.

This business, the Northwestern Hyperbaric Centre, treats MS victims with oxygen in an airtight chamber. This is the second such clinic in Saskatchewan, the other being located in Mistatim.

Don't grumble if the world hasn't offered you a cushy job. Perhaps you should roll up your sleeves and show some enterprise.

FOLKSINGERS HEATHER BISHOP AND TRACY RILEY PERFORM HERE

Folksingers Heather Bishop and Tracy Riley performed at the United Church hall on Thursday, Feb. 27 for approximately 130 adults and children, including all the Girl Guides and Brownies. The concert given under the auspices of the Manitou Arts Council was a delight from start to finish. Heather has a strong clear voice and a commanding guitar technique and Tracy provided excellent back up both vocally and on bass and harmonica.

To "get things warmed up" they sang two songs on their own: *The Purple People Eater* and *Ghost Riders in the Sky*. I

remember when Vaughn Monroe used to sing *Ghost Riders* in the late 40's. Back then the song was about an "old cow poke." Now, in this feminist era, it's an "old cow girl." Whatever, Heather and Tracy harmonized beautifully and made it sound much better than yowling old Vaughn ever did.

From this point on, the children were active participants. Heather has wonderful rapport with children. She has a honest, humorous, no-nonsense approach totally lacking any condescension or fake camaraderie. The children responded enthusiastically by joining in on

such deliciously humorous songs as *The Alligator Waltz*, *If You Love a Hippopotamus* and, of course, *The Belly Button Song*. The atmosphere was not so much that of a concert as of a large, successful birthday party. There was even a dance contest, in which Cassandra Watson won a record for being the best boogie. Heather took a few minutes out to answer the children's questions, such as: "How long have you been performing?" (11 years); "How many places have you performed in?" (everywhere from the Arctic Circle to Los Angeles); and "Where did Tracy get her punk hair cut?" (Winnipeg).

Although, not in any way a proselytizer, Heather left the children with two strong messages. Firstly, anyone can sing. No matter who you are or how old you are, you can sing, and don't let anyone tell you any different. And secondly, that it's alright to be different. It's the difference in people that makes the world go round. It's even alright to love a big blue frog, especially if the frog is 6'3".

Since it was mainly such a young audience, the concert was short, only a little over an hour. I could have listened to her happily until midnight. She is a first class musician by anybody's standards.

Infrared heaters

Prepared by Manitoba Hydro

If you're thinking of installing electric heating in your home, you may want to consider using infrared or radiant heaters.

Infrared heaters transmit heat by radiation to warm any solid object, such as a piece of equipment, furniture, the human body, and the floor of a building.

Because the infrared heaters warm you by radiation, there's no heat loss and wind or drafts will not affect the heating output. Thus the seasonal efficiency of the electric infrared or radiant heaters is 100 percent.

However, with an infrared heating system, you do have to be in a direct line with the unit in order to be warmed. They're not usually suitable for applications where some object comes between you and the heater itself.

When you do approach a heating contractor about infrared heaters, you'll find there are three different types available, but only one of the three is electric. The other two are low intensity infrared, sometimes called radiant tube heaters, and high intensity infrared. Both of these latter units are gas heaters.

Before you install any new heating equipment in your home, it might be a wise idea to con-

sider improving the insulation and air tightness of your home. If possible, insulate your basement walls and upgrade the insulation in your attic to a level of R-40. Properly applied weatherstripping and caulking will help to improve the airtightness of your home.

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PAWLEY ANNOUNCES TREE FOR TREE REFORESTATION GOAL

WINNIPEG — "A re-elected New Democratic Party government's forestry policy will strive for a tree for tree replacement of harvested or destroyed trees," pledged Howard Pawley.

"Our forests are vital in supporting jobs, strengthening the economy and are an invaluable source of beauty and recreation," said the NDP leader.

Over 11,000 Manitobans rely on the province's forestry industry either directly or indirectly for jobs. This industry generates approximately \$450 million in annual sales and contributes over \$25 million in annual taxes.

Manitoba's forestry renewal program will:

— Expand the annual output at

the province's two forest nurseries from four million trees to twenty million trees by 1989;

— Thin forests to improve timber production;

— Plant the increased number of trees produced in the province, embark on a disease and insect control program;

— Apply research in key areas in conjunction with the Canadian Forestry Association.

Manitoba's forest renewal program will create 748 person years of direct employment over the next five years. An additional 1,122 indirect person years will be generated.

"Reforestation has always been a priority of the NDP

government and will continue to be the major focus of our forestry policy," said Mr. Pawley.

"We are already committed to a \$50 million investment in forestry between 1984 and 1989 through such programs as the Canada-Manitoba Forest Resource Development Agreement; Jobs Fund Projects in Forestry and private sector agreements," added Mr. Pawley.

"By working together we will ensure that our forests are a valuable resource today and for future generations of Manitobans," concluded Mr. Pawley.

- Director of the Manitoba Crop Insurance Corporation for eight years.
- Delegate for the Manitoba Pool Elevators for 25 years.
- Chairperson for the Cromwell School Board prior to consolidation.
- Representative of the Eastern Region Manitoba Hospital Organization Advisory Committee.
- Member of committee to explore alternate use for Radar Base.

If elected, these experiences should serve me well.

MANAGING YOUR MONEY

Every year thousands of Canadians unwittingly run afoul of the federal taxation department. They find to their surprise that because their income or job status has changed, they now have to pay their income tax by quarterly instalment payments.

This doesn't affect the great majority of Canadians, of course. Most people have their income tax deducted by their employer on a weekly, semi-monthly or monthly basis.

However, you are required by law to make quarterly payments of tax if you meet the following conditions:

- Your federal income tax for last year or the current year was more than \$400.
- Income tax is not being deducted at source from at least 75 percent of your current year's net income.

If you fall into this category you have to make quarterly tax payments to Ottawa on or before each March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31. But this doesn't absolve you from submitting an annual income tax return, the deadline for which is April 30.

The annual return is required because usually people who make quarterly tax instalments are only estimating as they go along. A final reckoning has to take place, and the return will show whether you overpaid or underpaid your tax for the full taxation year.

The rules are somewhat different for Canadians whose main source of income is from farming or fishing. If you are new to farming or fishing, you should obtain a copy of the "Instalment Guide for Farmers and Fishermen" from your closest District Taxation office.

The people who generally don't realize that they now have to make instalment payments of tax are those who had a recent radical change in their personal situation, such as retirement, widowhood, protracted unemployment or by becoming self-employed.

For example, there are many homemakers who have never fil-

ed an income tax return, leaving that dismal chore to the spouse. When her husband dies she has to undertake the responsibility of meeting her personal income tax obligations, by quarterly instalments. What makes the task a little easier is that she can make the actual payments at any branch of a Canadian chartered bank or certain other financial institutions.

Incidentally, instalment payments are due on any income that is not specifically non-taxable income — such as child tax credits, the Guaranteed Income Supplement, Spouse's Allowance, welfare payments, and veteran disability and dependent pensioner's payments.

Those who have been paying their tax by the instalment system for some time usually don't have much difficulty estimating the amount of each quarterly payment they should make. They usually base the payments on the total tax payable for the previous year, divided by four, to give equal-sized payments.

Another method is to estimate what your tax for the current year will total, and divide that amount by four. However, if you under-estimate, you will have to pay an interest charge to the tax department. If it's the other way around, then you'll be eligible for a tax refund.

Canadians who fall into this special category of taxpayers should get from their District Taxation office a copy of the "Instalment Guide for Individuals".

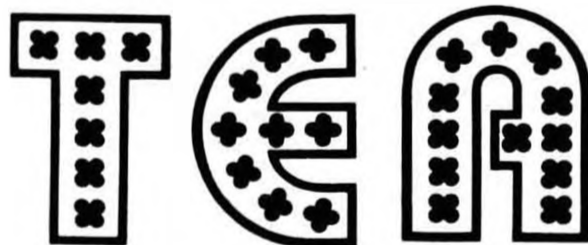
