## Clarence Baker, MIA Lac du Bonnet

Clarence Baker managed to hold onto the Lac du Bonnet constituency for the New Democratic Party but only by a slim majority.

Baker tallied 3891 votes or 46.1% of the popular vote, beating out his closest opponent Progressive Conservative can-

didate Darren Prznik with 3588 votes or 42.5%.

Liberal Jerry Fominave received 952 votes or 11.4%.

In the election of 1981 Sam Utkiv amassed 4,682 votes compared to his P.C. opponent's 2,809.

# Ward II wants own trustee, Powerview trustees upset

The suggestion that Ward II be granted an extra trustee at the expense of Ward III has local trustees Diane Dube and Leone Pommer upset.

The suggestion was made when Carolyn Prohownik of Garson presented a petition signed by 278 ratepayers who feel that Ward II is under-represented on the board.

According to the figures presented to the board Ward II has over double the number of ratepayers that Ward III has.

The group wanting the change claims that too often, political rancor at board level for things to go into the various centres

means that the students are short-changed.

Dube does not agree. She says that if you use student count, the figures would show that the representation is equal. Most of the students in Ward II end up in the Beausjour schools and once there have four trustees to look after their particular concerns.

Leone Pommer points to the fact that the trend has shifted in recent years, and most of the elementary school children in Great Falls now go to Lac du Bonnet. When she goes to a board meeting, she goes to represent the students as a whole, not just the ones from Powerview.

Where the Great Falls children go to school does not determine her interest in their welfare.

Both trustees feel that the ratepayers in Ward II, and in other wards too, have had good representation.

Diane Dube says she does not believe that it is an issue of representation at all. She has been on the board for eight years and attended board meetings for three years before that. The numbers of ratepayers in Ward II have not "suddenly jumped up", she said.

Parents in the Stead area are concerned that their students

who have been attending Beausjour could be forced to attend Powerview should the boundaries be changed to balance the number of ratepayers in each ward. They do not believe the board when members say it won't happen. They are looking for some assures, some protection.

They cite as their concerns the lack of business, social, and cultural ties to the Powerview area, the amount of French taught and spoken in the school, the dislocation of the children whose friends and experiences have come together in the Beausjour schools over the years.

This is not the first time the matter has been brought to the attention of the Agassiz School Division board. Each time it has been brought up, the board vote splits 5-5 and nothing is resolved. The matter was then tabled.

The board asked the Minister of Education to resolve the conflict, but the matter was sent back to the board for resolution at the local level.

That was when the parents decided that they would petition the board. Nothing had been brought forward from the trustees after eight months of

# Manigotagan man sentenced to 15 months for arson

Edward Simard of Manigotagan, Manitoba, was sentenced to 15 months in jail after being found guilty of arson in the May 15, 1984, forest fire near Manigotagan.

The sentence was imposed by Mr. Justice Aubrey Hirschfield on March 12, 1986, after receiving a pre-sentencing report.

The fire, which consumed 3500 acres between 7:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. the next morning, was started during extremely high fire hazard conditions. Natural Resources conservation officers and fire suppression

staff actioned the fire which eventually consumed 4200 acres of timber and cost the province \$333,000 in suppression costs.

At times during the blaze, the community of Manigotagan was considered in danger. Over 100 men, skidders, bulldozers, helicopters and CL-215 water bombers battled the blaze.

Subsequent investigations carried out jointly by Department of Natural Resources conservation officers and Powerview R.C.M. Police led to the apprehension and arrest of 56-year-old Simard.

## MCEC issues ultimatum to Dufour over controversial lagoon

The Manitoba Clean Environment Commission (MCEC) has given Dave Dufour until November 1, 1987, to expand, modify or replace the sewage lagoon which services the 21 sites in the Dave Dufour Trailer Court.

The sewage lagoon has been a concern of the area residents for several years. They complain of the offensive odour, sewage problems and the fact that groundwater and surface water in the area will be contaminated.

The L.G.D. of Alexander has already made their concerns known to the MCEC on behalf of the people in the L.G.D. and the municipality itself.

In a memorandum sent out by L. Strachan, Chief of Environmental Control Programs, it says that the sewage lagoon, a depression or low spot surrounded by a low soil berm, was not constructed in accordance with Branch guidelines. Effluent overflows continually from the facility, and most a number of the trailers on the Dufour property as well as some private residences in the Chevrefils District subdivision.

The operation is considered to be a public health hazard as well as a public nuisance. Departmental concerns include improper size, inadequate dyke construction and vegetation removal, no enclosures and the possibility of excessive seepage into the groundwater.

Environmental Control Services have recommended limits, terms and conditions for the maintenance and operation of the present lagoon and the construction, operation and maintenance of the future lagoon.

With summer students grant applications due soon, anyone with proposals is invited to contact the office and discuss the programs with Peggy.

waiting, and it did not look as if the board intended to do anything about the complaint.

Dube says there really is not a justifiable complaint in her eyes. If there was, she would vote for it.

Some parents concerned that their children would be forced to attend Powerview presently live within Ward III. The board has allowed the parents of children in the fringe areas of Stead and Great Falls to choose where they would like to attend school and there is no reason for her to believe that that should change.

It has worked in reverse, Dube says. Parents have been concerned that their children will have to go to school in Beauséjour.

The Ward II parents do not agree with Dube. They will be working with Charlie Bride, secretary of the board of reference, and following the proper steps to insure that something is done.

Because of the inaction on the part of the board, they will be petitioning the Minister this time to intervene on their behalf. The Minister has several options, some of which are to send the matter back to the board yet again, allow the extra trustee for Ward II, redo the boundaries in the whole division and allocate numbers on the basis of what is found, take a trustee from Ward III and give the space to Ward II, or restructure the whole thing and reduce the size of the board.

Trustee W. Bilytsky of Whitemouth told the delegation at the meeting that populations shift over the years and that the boundaries are where they are because they board put them there. If the board wishes to, it can again shift those boundaries.

The parents said that the board had no right to change boundaries without first checking with the parents.

## Funds for libraries divided equally

The Library Allard, located in the Community Centre in St. Georges, is in its third year of existence.

When, in 1983, the Allard Library, then called the Library of the Local Government District of Alexander, became a branch of the Lac du Bonnet Regional Library, few people envisioned the impact this small library would make on the population of the area.

**A place with books, but also a lot more**  
With relative small quarters, but bright and functional, the Allard Library has made its stamp on the community: as a book-lending institution, a resource centre, study facility and reading room, but also meeting place, handicraft centre and much more.

**Questions in regards to funding**

Public libraries are funded by the provincial government on a matching dollar formula, up to a maximum of \$1.50 per capita. Four municipalities support the Lac du Bonnet Regional Library and its one branch (the Allard Library in St. Georges). They are the Village of Lac du Bonnet, the R.M. of Lac du Bonnet, the L.G.D. of Alexander, and the Village of Powerview.

In 1985 each of these

municipalities contributed \$4.25 per capita.

**Request for 25c per capita increase**  
The Regional Library board has requested a 25c per capita increase for 1986, raising the municipal support to \$4.50 per capita.

All four municipal councils agreed to this increase in principle, although, as befitting governing bodies, certain questions were asked as to how the money was allocated and spent.

**Money was divided fairly**  
"The money raised from the L.G.D. of Alexander and the Village of Powerview stayed in the Allard Library," commented Mrs. Maureen Flemming, head librarian in Lac du Bonnet. The total library budget of 1985 was around \$49,000. This, after the Village of Powerview joined.

The Village of Powerview became a supporter of the library in the summer of 1985, making the library a free service for all its residents. The question was posed at a recent debate in the council chambers of the Village of Powerview as to how many residents of Powerview were using the library. Mrs. Mona Bossi, branch librarian at the Allard Library states, "At present there are 113 Powerview residents regularly using the library. In 1984 there were 49 and in 1983,

20." This means that each year the membership in terms of Powerview residents, has more than doubled.

Before Powerview joined the library, people living in Powerview were paying the rent, as it still applies for the people living in Pine Falls.

**525 members**  
At present this Allard Library counts approximately 525 members from which 50 are non-resident members.

Both Mrs. Flemming and Mrs. Bossi expressed their satisfaction regarding the steady increase in memberships. "We sign an average of six to seven new members each week," says Mrs. Bossi. It costs no money to join the library, if people live in the L.G.D. and Powerview. But still people have to get used to the idea that the library is available to them," she continued.

**Hefty junk for salaries**

Most of the annual budget of the regional library goes towards salaries, says Mrs. Flemming. The workload is shared between the staff at the Allard Library (three people) and the Lac du Bonnet Library (five people). All purchasing and processing of books is done through Lac du Bonnet. "But," says Mrs. Flemming, "a lot of input comes from the Allard Library, before the purchasing list is finalized."

"Having a branch requires a lot of re-thinking and streamlining in our overall approach," continues Mrs. Flemming. "It requires educating people from both ends."

Both Mrs. Flemming and Mrs. Bossi seemed quite content with the way things worked out.

**The L.G.D. wants a breakdown of the budget**

At a recent library board meeting (February 26, 1986) the council of the L.G.D. of Alexander requested a cost breakdown between the regional and the branch library.

This could not be furnished, but the board agreed to work on such a breakdown.

The board, which consists of representatives from each municipality, as well as interested citizens, two for Powerview, and two for the L.G.D. meets monthly.

# Traverse Bay "100" — a tough race

The Traverse Bay "100" First Annual Can Am Cross Country Circuit Snowmobile Race was held on Saturday, March 8, 1986, during the worst snow storm of the season. The starting gate was just east off Highway 59, across from the Birchwood Motor Hotel, which served as race headquarters. A total of 29 machines were registered for entry in as many as eight possible race classifications, with entrants coming from as far distant as Norwich, North Dakota; Estevan, Saskatchewan; and Crane River, Manitoba. Twenty-one sleds completed the race, some qualifying in more than one class. The race was comprised of two laps over a 40 mile course that included travel over lake ice, bush and creek trails. Racers would have had to maintain an average speed of 40 mph to finish the course in approximately two hours.

Although wind speed and temperature were moderate, visibility in the extreme heavy

snow fall was at times no more than 30 yards, at most 100 yards, and even those riders familiar with the course would have found themselves disoriented and relying totally on the directional signs and arrows marking the route. As the race progressed into the second lap, the course became very rough, the going a real test of driver endurance. Because of the weather, few spectators were out, but this reporter, visiting two checkpoints which were accessible, found it an exciting event, drivers showing much competence in handling their machines under the most difficult conditions.

The race was broken down into classifications set up by the Can Am Circuit association as follows: Stock A — any stock sled; Pro Stock — certified 56 hp.; Stock B — 56 hp. and under; Stock C — any non IFS (independent front suspension) sled; Master's — rider over 40 years of age; Trophy — any stock sled; Old Timer's — any 78 and older sled. Racers may enter

one or more classifications for which they and their machines are qualified, paying a fee in each class. Prize money is paid to the first three winners in each of the first five categories, with the Pro Stock winner earning the biggest prize.

Winner of the prestigious Pro Stock class was Lance Lenton of North Dakota on a Polaris Trail Indy. Lance went home with \$525 prize money, a trophy and a Polaris Performance cheque from Polaris Industries (Winnipeg). The fastest time of the day was recorded by Mike Gillies of Winnipeg on a Stock A class Polaris 400 with a time of 1:42:5. B Stock winner was John Langeford of Craven, Saskatchewan on a Polaris. Wayne Jones took the Master's over Henry Saluk of Selkirk, both on Polaris machines.

Of noteworthy mention were two novice drivers, both running Trophy class on Polaris sleds. In first place was Ron Cassels, a weekend resident of Belair; Greg Jonsson of Victoria Beach took second place. Venise Fischer, the

only women to enter the race, competed in Stock B, driving a Polaris Indy 400, and finished fifth in a field of eight.

The race was made possible by the volunteer help of the Victoria Beach Snow Drifters Club and the Northstar Hillclimbers Club of Grand Beach. From among their members 12 flag crews covered positions around the course, others acted as timers, spotters and checkers. The race was also monitored by four mobile telephone stations strategically ranged along the course, and in constant touch with the mobile master station at the start position. After the race volunteers spent many hours helping to bring in sleds which had failed to finish the course because of hazardous conditions. It was much appreciated that Carl Otto of the Pine Falls ambulance service, donated his time and remained at the start position all during the race, in case his services might be needed. Glad to report there were only minor incidents, no serious harm done to any riders or machines.

The race was sponsored by the Birchwood Motor Hotel, Hillside Power Products and Superior Wrought Iron Inc. (Winnipeg). Trophies were donated by: The Birchwood Motor Hotel, Einfeld Bakeries (Powerview), Royal LePage Real Estate (Winnipeg), Ed's Lawn and Leisure (Lockport), Ted's Gulf Service (Grand Beach),

Wimpy's Corner (Grand Marais), Malabar's (Winnipeg), Hillside Power Products (Traverse Bay), Jim Chapel Trucking (Victoria Beach), Traverse Bay Corner (Traverse Bay), Lionel Brisson Sports (Winnipeg), Lakeside Surveillance (Victoria Beach).

The Travers Bay "100" was the largest event of its kind to be held in Manitoba since 1981, and its organizers, Wolf Kraft and Wolfe Fischer, both members of the Can Am Circuit, are hopeful there will be many repeats of the race in years to come.

## MANAGING YOUR MONEY by Harry Mardon

Canadians report their income tax position on the honor system. That means, of course, that some people cheat. But the great majority report honestly.

One problem many Canadians encounter when it comes to filing their annual income tax returns is understanding all the tax rules. Try as they might, the Taxation Department bureaucrats continue to turn out complex and confusing tax-reporting regulations and forms.

What this has led to is development of a mini-industry in Canada: companies and individuals who specialize in helping people compile their income tax returns. Businesses are able to deduct the cost of professional tax advice. Unfortunately, that privilege isn't provided to ordinary taxpayers. They either struggle through filing of their tax returns unaided, or use after-tax dollars to pay for the services of a tax specialist.

However, there is some free advice available — from Revenue Canada itself. In each General Tax Guide is a list of district taxation offices, with addresses and telephone numbers. Long distance calls may be made on a toll-free basis.

The civil servants won't help you to fill out your income tax

return in detail. But they will give you informed advice and explain terms and conditions. In certain communities across Canada the Taxation Department has set up a system of free-of-charge service, using volunteer agencies. The volunteers have received some training and their services are usually available to needy persons and senior citizens.

Revenue Canada doesn't advertise this publicly, but the fact is that if you end up owing a large sum of money to the tax collector, you can make instalment payments. Of course, you'll have to pay interest on any amount you have outstanding after April 30.

The principle behind this system is that Ottawa just wants the money that is owing. In times of economic stress, when many Canadians have lost their jobs, there's a general attitude of understanding tolerance. But it is up to the individual to inform the Tax Department of his or her financial difficulties, and propose a tax settlement regime. An official of the District Taxation office may call you in for an interview, to discuss the issue.

In contrast, tax evaders are treated mercilessly. The Tax Department has all sorts of ways of detecting the tax cheats. Sometimes its through informers such as a disgruntled employee or a jilted lover. But most often

the cheaters are uncovered through random spot checks conducted by the special investigations branch of the department.

Small-time cheats are given the "rough justice" treatment, which means paying a stiff financial penalty as well as making good on the tax shortage. But flagrant cases are prosecuted and end up in the courts.

Incidentally, an earlier column mentioned that you have to make quarterly income tax payments to Ottawa if your income for last year of the current year exceeds \$400. This rule has been eased somewhat. Now you don't have to make such payments unless your annual income exceeds \$1,000.

# LGD council meeting 'rather quiet', varied agenda dealt with

Reports from the union of Manitoba Municipalities seminar held in Brandon were an informative part of the rather quiet day at the L.G.D. of Alexander council meeting on March 11.

The Dept. of Natural Resources and Dept. of Agriculture are asking municipalities to leave undeveloped road allowance in their natural state to provide habitat for wildlife. These habitat areas would also act as natural buffers against soil erosion, a serious problem across the prairies.

These departments are asking municipalities to develop a policy and back it with by-law which would ensure wildlife habitat areas for the future.

The benefits of tourism to an area in terms of creating jobs and generating revenues had been discussed. Although the L.G.D. has a wide variety of natural resources suitable for tourist attractions, the council has never actively promoted tourism.

The economic benefits of having a well developed recreation district had also been discussed. Hosting special events, be they local, regional or provincial, generates revenue and interest in the area.

Those attending the sessions on recreation were told that, con-

trary to popular belief, the presence of a recreation director as much as triples volunteer involvement in a community. With someone to coordinate programs and provide access to resources, volunteers are more willing to take on projects and programs geared to their interests.

The four percent increase anticipated by the Victoria Beach Fire Dept. was included in their 1986 agreement with the L.G.D. The Lac du Bonnet Fire Department, having purchased \$20,000 worth of equipment in the past year, passed on a 14 percent increase in the basic agreement, with actual costs after the first five fires going up 10 percent.

Councillor Bill Eisher noted that the Lac du Bonnet increase far exceeded the four percent guideline for increased service costs.

Rudy and Rose Gretscham appeared before council to plead their case for a variance to build a garage only three feet from their lot line.

A combination of extenuating circumstances led council to agree to the variance. The lots in the Sunset Bay subdivision were resurveyed and the lot lines changed after the original buildings had been constructed. The Gretschams had previously been granted a permit to reconstruct a garage on what is

now the lot line. The pad has already been poured.

The couple wanted to move the garage over three feet to bring the overhang of the garage roof onto their own property. This would remove a possible source of conflict with their neighbour and allow them to use a portion of the cement pad already in place.

Council agreed that rather than tie themselves into an agreement by tendering for fuel for their vehicles, the public works staff would be advised to rotate their gasoline purchases among the businesses in the area. This would be fair to the businesses while allowing the L.G.D. some flexibility in its far-flung municipality.

A committee has been struck by the library board to discuss projects which would take advantage of grants available.

Blank VCR tapes will be purchased and a library of VCR cassettes suitable to the needs of the community will be built up slowly.

There have been some staff changes at the Pine Falls Hospital. Because one evaluation was done after the probationary period was completed, there is possibility of court action. As a result, details of the meeting were not available to council.

BERNIC LAKE — Only ten months after the decision to construct a new plant to process spodumene was made by Tanco, commissioning of the first phase of the \$6.4 million facility has now started.

The new facility, when it is fully commissioned and operating, will enable Tanco to produce the highest purity spodumene concentrates in the world. This quality product is needed to ensure that Tanco continues, in the face of stiff international competition, to be one of the major suppliers of spodumene to world markets. Throughout the winter, whilst the construction was at its height, Tanco has been supplying the major ceramic and specialty glass company in Japan, and will soon start filling a further major order from Corning, in the USA, again for use in the ceramics industry. The product has also been sold in France, Germany, Mexico and Taiwan and a strong marketing effort will hopefully increase sales in these, and other areas.

While the market for tantalum is still soft, that for some of Tanco's other minerals seems to be on the increase and could result in further development by Tanco in the future.

Design for the new plant resulted from the pilot plant work that has been carried out since May 1984, and originally funded, in part, through the Federal Enterprise Development Program. Final engineering was carried out by W.L. Wardrop & Associates of Winnipeg in conjunction with Tanco's own mechanical and electrical crews, enlarged for the period with some fifteen additional employees from the Lac du Bonnet area, did sterling work in installing most of the equipment required.
