

LGD council deals with a wide variety of concerns

The LGD of Alexander met Wednesday, July 29 with K. Danwich acting chairman; Councilors M.A. Grewinski, P. Raymond and N. Roman in attendance. Missing were Reeve Lowing and Resident Administrator R. Bouvier (on vacation), with Rose Beaudry acting in his place.

LGD Police Constable D. Cunningham, met with council in camera. Arising from this was the dismissal of Constable Greg Baird. He was to vacate the trailer August 4. Reasons of his dismissal are not available at this time. Mr. and Mrs. F. Gerylo of Ward IV spoke to council concerning their proposal to make a four-lot subdivision.

They were having difficulty getting a clear picture of what portion they must give over for road access, when they had already been given permission to go ahead with the four-lot proposal. It seems there is some confusion between the highways who had requested that the lots, 1 and 2, become one lot, and the LGD and the Winnipeg River Planning District, who approved their request to subdivide the four lots. They were assured that the WRPD would communicate with them to clarify the situation as there did not seem to be a need to add to the existing road.

In the communications read over to council, a few seemed significantly important to comment on.

A dedication ceremony will be held on August 16 at 2:00 p.m. at Pinawa Bay. This will be an occasion for a memorial plaque to be placed in memory of Nell Anderson, wife of C.G. Anderson of Ward IV. Members of council will attend.

A boat ramp was also to be in place for this occasion at the Pinawa Bay site as well, but a delay in acquiring this will mean the ramps will be installed at a later date.

Traffic tickets issued to cottagers in the beach area were brought to council's attention. Those who received tickets did not feel that they were at fault, as there were no signs posted to that effect. K. Danwich was to look into this summer and report back.

POLICE REPORT

Police report a number of impaired drivers, stopped and charged over the long weekend. ALERT testing will be continuing throughout the summer.

Wells in the Raban subdivision are a concern to those in the subdivision in Ward IV. There are supposed to be wells accessible to the people there, and complaints are being received by the residents who are having to carry water from the river, as well they complain of not having a proper public dock. The council felt since this has been brought to their attention before, those in the subdivision have a legitimate complaint, and the wells, wherever they are, will be looked for and marked.

The new amendment that affects charitable and community events requesting permits, will soon be felt as the permits mean the province may recover the costs of the liquor sold. Increasing the entrance fees at socials where liquor is being sold and taxing that same liquor on what is being consumed, is another form of revenue for the government. This is not going to adversely affect the hotel industry, but will for the socials, to some degree, when it comes to the admission costs.

Council discussed the proposal to support the accrual/accounting system as suggested for farm income tax returns. Council felt that this was not a plan that they could join, and would not consider at this time.

A committee member of the St. Georges Community Club requested a liquor permit for a beer garden to coincide with the 4P Festival, for Monday, September 7. Council were all in favor and the committee will be informed.

The by-laws for two appointments in the LGD of Alexander office received third reading: Leah Pitre as clerk-typist and Janice Thevenot as accounting clerk.

In the general business discussed, council had a photograph of a double wide trailer owned and operated by the RCMP, which was to be moved to RCMP owned property in St. Georges, as requested.

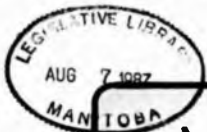
Traverse Bay nuisance grounds again have come up for council's immediate attention. Discussion centered on the many complaints received about the odors, dense smoke and a

Many youngsters take part in 'Youth and the Arts' program

The "Youth in the Arts" programs, through Manitou Rapids Arts Council, have been underway with several young people enthusiastically enrolled and actively participating. They are sponsored by the Manitoba Culture, Heritage and Recreation.

In the past weeks the Review showed and explained about the sketching workshop, and this week we will give you a rundown of the drama, leather and whittling workshops.

The three afternoons of the drama workshops, with instructor Dwayne Dueck, had been quite successful with the kids, having lots of fun playing the games and the drama exercises Dwayne had organized for them.

Some examples were the mime, improvisation, charades,

and juggling which taught them concentration. One of the dramas was improvising the scene of a metro bus filled with pre-schoolers on the way to the zoo, and of bus driver — "Daniel Hanson" — helping an old lady — "Cassandra Watson" — onto the bus. The mini-drama was an enjoyable exercise and provided entertainment which is the general idea.

A leather workshop was held for one day only, at Powerview School, with two sessions: morning and afternoon. Dorothy Hutchison instructed them in making leather articles, using their own imaginations. They were aged 7 years old and up with 19 participating altogether.

The kids looked very busy arranging leathers, leather and beadwork on their article. Some headbands they had created were

very colorfully adorned with feather and beads. Leather necklaces and furry puff animals were made with just the right amount of coaching and help from Dorothy.

Dorothy is from Lac du Bonnet and had a beautiful display of some of her own work to show. She works out of her home making jackets, mukluks, moccasin slippers, mitts, and gauntlets for adults and children.

Some examples of her bead work had been set out ready for application on the moccasin uppers and jacket yokes. It is very intricate work like the black and white beaded pieces featuring huskies which will adorn mitts, slippers or perhaps a jacket. The leather she uses is commercially tanned, or her own home tanned material of moose and deer leathers. The distinctive color of the tan comes from the smoke of the red willow which also leaves a slight aroma. The leather is a creamy-grey color before it is tanned. What caught my eye were the tiny baby moccasins with little beaded fronts which were not only ornamental, but absolutely perfect to warm those tiny feet.

Dorothy also conducts adult classes in the fall through the school in Lac du Bonnet, and will be instructing those classes in the making of mukluks and mitts.

At St. Georges, Michael Cooper of Pine Falls, instructed a group in the art of whittling. He begins by showing the young people how to use and hold the tools. The wood that they used was white poplar and it was obtained locally. The instruction was a one-day program with morning and afternoon classes for five boys, aged 10 and up.

The work in progress was to create a caricature using tiny triangular cuts used to start the basic shapes, and smooth shaving would remove the rough corners; to the smaller sharp cuts to add necessary detail. Mike had the full attention of the boys as he continuously explained while showing by example, the way the knife was held, and how a smooth piece took on a character of its own. Each boy had the same general shape to work on but each had a unique difference.

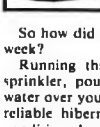

general unhealthy condition of the dump. Ward 1 Councillor K. Danwich said that he had gone to see it for himself and it really is impossible. Several residents affected by this have vowed to form a human chain to prevent further dumping, with the hopes that it will bring attention to their situation. The residents have complained to the Clean Environment people and have not received any help but feel creating a diversion, will bring the media down. The dump has been long over used and needs to be backfilled and a new one found. The residents fear contamination of their wells as well as associated problems with the rats and flies. They feel the RM of Victoria Beach, who also use the dump, should cooperate.

The councillor will continue to look into different ways to ease this problem. He definitely felt that the time has long since passed when posting a few signs would do any good. A new site was the only answer.

Several items were then to be discussed in camera, and the council adjourned shortly after.

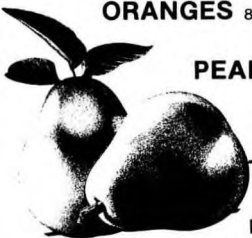

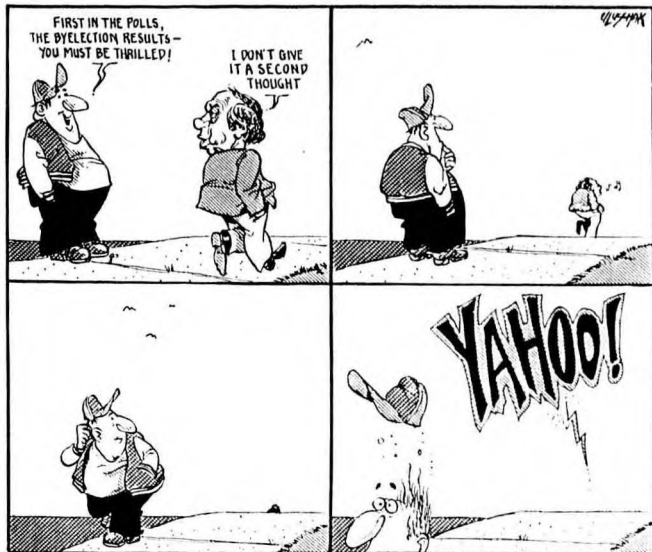

You can keep your colas, give me Gatorade

This is a story which must be told; I've got \$14,72 invested in the research.

The official subject today is fluid replacement. That replacement is for a word I hesitate to use, because Mammy said it was vulgar. In her opinion, women glow, men perspire, but only horses sweat.

Well, describe it as you will, I did a lot of it last Sunday. I was working in the bee-yard and the girls were unhappy. The result was that I had to put on a set of coveralls over my work clothes. Oh yes, before I forget, the temperature that day was 35°C or 95°F. Either way it was hot. By the time I was finished you'd think I hailed from that tiny village south of Boston, Sudden, Mass. I couldn't have been more wet if I'd fallen in the slough.

This was a day on which not even a bucket of well water curbed my thirst. This set me thinking about commercial drinks instead, so next morning at the store I bought two of everything in sight.

Let me begin with a few caveats. After 18 tetotal years I no longer seek solace in a six-pack, so rule that one out. Also, no cola drinks, please; they make me feel burpy.

There's a raft of fruit flavored drinks now on the market in single-serving-sized containers, and I think I tried them all. Old standbys like apple and grapefruit are giving way to mixes like cranapple and

lemon-lime. They're quite palatable, but also quite flat.

Something new for me was Gatorade. Instant results. It made me feel refreshed and my saliva was actively stimulated. To get an interpretation of its contents, I telephoned my favorite nutritionist.

She recommends it for her patients, save for those on salt-free diets. It contains sodium and potassium on a five-to-one basis, which she tells me is just right to replace these elements I lose after working out on a hot day.

While I had her on the line, I pressed for details on cola drinks. She shoots from the hip: "Evil things," is the way she describes them, "You need neither all that sugar nor all that caffeine."

When I told her that I didn't find fruit juices refreshing after hours in the sun, she was not surprised. She tells me they have more food value than most of us realize. The result is that you end up feeling full when what you really want is to be refreshed.

I can't talk to you about beverages without commenting on a shocking experience in this department. When I awoke one recent morning the hydro was off. I was forced to work from seven to ten without my morning pick-me-up. I thought I'd cured myself of most addictions, but there's still one left, morning coffee.

Back to those drinks. There's a new line of them called New York Seltzer. This is a franchise operation which has taken off like a meteor. With virtually no advertising, in a year and a bit these fruit-flavored drinks in their stubby, distinctive glass bottles have become a hot number on several continents. The one I tried was quite tasty, but still not what I want after a day in the sun.

At the moment, Gatorade leads the pack, but this is only a tentative conclusion. The research continues. I'm saving up for the next phase.

Assiniboine community college agricultural course

Agricultural courses are being offered this year (1987/88) by the Assiniboine Community College. Two courses can be held in the Beausejour district if we can sign up enough candidates by September 1, 1987. One is a 16-day farm equipment operator's course for women. The course can be flexible, i.e. 16 x 5 hour days, two days or four days a week, to provide the full 80 hours to complete the course. Tractors, automobiles, trucks, combines, small engines, grain aeration, farm safety, and weed control are some of the topics covered.

A course in applied agriculture is also offered. This is a one year certificate, or a two year diploma course. The first year requires 18 weeks and covers soils, agronomy, farm business management, farm law, farm machinery maintenance, and options in computers, special crops, electrical, and animal science. The second year requires 22 weeks and covers topics related to agri-business.

We require a minimum of ten candidates (maximum of eighteen) to qualify for the course. Last year fourteen local young farm men and women took this course, and found it extremely valuable. The course is scheduled to start November 16, 1987, and finish sometime in March, 1988.

Financial assistance in the form of tuition assistance, part of wages, and mileage may be available for students participating in these courses. For more information and applica-

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Public Utilities Board (the Board) will hear an application from the Consumers Association of Canada (Manitoba), the Manitoba Society of Seniors and seven individual users of power (the Applicants), pursuant to Section 39(4) of the Manitoba Hydro Act to review the price or prices charged for power by Manitoba Hydro effective April 1, 1986 and April 1, 1987 - commencing on Monday, November 30, 1987 at 9:00 a.m. and continuing thereafter as required to complete the review at the Viscount Room of the Viscount Gort Flag Inn, 1670 Portage Avenue, Winnipeg, Manitoba.

By Order No. 78/87, the Board determined that the scope of the public hearing will include a review of Manitoba Hydro's revenue requirements, rate design, cost of service and system performance. The Board also established Minimum Filing Requirements for information to be provided to the Board by Manitoba Hydro. Further particulars of the application, the scope of the public hearing, and the Minimum Filing Requirements may be obtained from Manitoba Hydro, at their offices located at 820 Taylor, Winnipeg, Manitoba, and may be examined at the office of the Board located at 1146-405 Broadway, Winnipeg, Manitoba.

A timetable for the orderly exchange of information and a procedure to be followed at the public hearing was established by the Board following a Pre-Hearing Conference on June 1, 1987 and are available at the Board's office.

All persons, firms or corporations wishing to intervene in this application, to participate in the examination of witnesses, to provide evidence, or to make submissions are requested to make their intentions known by completing an Intervenor Registration Form (available at the Board's office) and returning same as soon as possible and by no later than October 26, 1987. Although October 26, 1987 is the last date to register, it should be noted that the examination process will be well underway and the later the registry the greater may be the impact on the Intervenor's ability to intervene.

For the purposes of this hearing, an Intervenor shall be a person who intends to participate in the full hearing, to cross-examine witnesses and, at their option, introduce testimony and lead evidence. Parties who merely wish to address the Board or present a brief will be known as Presentors and should advise the secretary of the Board of their intention to appear.

Pursuant to Section 39(8) of the Manitoba Hydro Act, the Board may define the status and rights of any intervenor and may confine the public hearing to matters within the scope of the hearing, as established by the Board. Board Order No. 56/85 dated March 20, 1985 provides for, amongst other things, the procedure for intervention and possible award of costs to intervenors and the guidelines for so doing. After conducting the public hearing and receiving evidence and submissions in respect of the application, the Board is required under the Manitoba Hydro Act to make a report to the Minister, which shall include the Board's recommendations as to the prices that should be charged for power supplied by Manitoba Hydro and the reasons for its recommendations.
