

# Village of Powerview welcomes new secretary-treasurer

Juanita Smith, employed by the Village of Powerview since February 1, is the first female secretary-treasurer in the Village's 38-year history.

Smith is married with two daughters, Amy (aged 7) and Brandi (aged 5). Both girls are presently in the Powerview School English program and Juanita's husband is a special education teacher for Grades 4-8 at Anicinabe School.

Juanita previously worked for one year in administration for a nursing home in Nova Scotia. She then was employed for six years as claims examiner for an insurance company in Nova Scotia.

The family moved to

Manitoba in 1985 when her husband found employment with the Anicinabe School. Housing shortages in this area prompted them to find a home in Selkirk in August, 1984. Juanita stayed at home for one year while the family settled and in June, 1986 she started working as a legal secretary for the firm of Wawrykow, Kobaykewych and McGarry in Selkirk.

The job opportunity with the Village was ideal for Juanita who wanted to reside in the area where her husband's work is. They presently live in a rented mobile home in St. Georges and

# Powerview residents without water for more than 30 hours

A seven foot frost above the main waterline was the reason Powerview residents were without water for over 30 hours.

A break in the main waterline was discovered at 3:30 a.m. on Thursday, Feb. 11 when Fred Cure noticed a water sprout beside the Powerview Shell. Owner of the Shell Service, Dennis Lagasse was notified and he alerted Powerview Mayor Elie Trudell to the problem.

Roger Lavoie's Backhoe Service was called immediately. He plugged in his equipment and was at the scene by 8:30 a.m. that morning. After several hours it was discovered that his equipment could not penetrate the heavy frost line to get at the

source of the waterline break.

Village Secretary-Treasurer George Harbottle was on the phone by 11:00 a.m. to locate the necessary machinery which could alleviate the problem. Cambrian Excavators of Winnipeg were enlisted and a hydro hammer arrived at the scene by 5:00 p.m. Thursday to begin digging. Because of Workplace Safety and Health regulations, the equipment and men could not operate after dark, but early morning work resumed and water supply was reinstated throughout Powerview by 10:30 a.m. Friday.

"The delay in water supply was one of the longest in Powerview History," recalled public works foreman Louis Fenez. He stated that although smaller lines had been closed before, the main waterline,

which supplies all of Powerview, had never suffered such a major problem.

Area residents were caught off guard as they woke up Thursday morning to no water. Powerview School was closed for two days and many residents had to resort to melting snow for immediate water supply. Other residents contacted family or friends in Pine Falls and St. Georges for their supply and many brought water containers to the Abitibi-Price pumphouse to fill and see them through the inconvenient time.

The Village of Powerview council and Roger's Backhoe Service can be commended for solving the problem as quickly as possible. One doesn't realize the value of running water until one does without!

# Lucien Laroche has 40 years of teaching service

Lucien Laroche is unofficially in his 40th year of teaching and is a walking history book of

the Powerview School, having taught his first year there in 1949.

Lucien was born in St. Pierre and graduated from Grade 12 there. After graduation, he taught one year on permit at the Orlburne School. At that time (1947) the Orlburne School was strictly a boys' school and was partly an orphanage as well as a reform school. Lucien recalls he learned more about teaching there than he did the following year at teachers college. He worked along side the brothers and priests who taught at the school and describes them as being some of the finest teachers he has worked with.

After teachers college, he came to Powerview and taught the Grade 4 class. The nuns had arrived the year before he did and their mission was to help the students learn French, which at that time was illegal in the school system in Manitoba.

Classes ran from 9:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m., and French would be taught from 3:00 - 4:00 p.m. The trustees, who were responsible for making sure no French was taught in the school, would make various checks on each classroom. Most of the trustees would turn a blind eye on the

fact that French was actually being taught and would warn teachers of upcoming inspections so all French books could be hidden.

"As children, we were almost taught to hate the English people. See *Powerview Teacher* / page 7

**Throne speech pledges continued commitment**

On Thursday, February 11, the new legislative session began with the speech from the throne. As M.L.A. for Lac du Bonnet I am privileged to once again represent this area in the provincial government.

As readers will have heard the provincial government remains committed to working in partnership with Manitobans to continue the progress of the past six years. Despite the great damage inflicted on rural Manitoba by depressed agriculture prices the overall Manitoba economy continues to grow and outpace almost all other provinces.

More Manitobans than ever before are working at productive jobs. Here in Lac du Bonnet the tantalum mine will be resuming full production this summer with fifty full-time new jobs being created. This will be a major boost to employment in our area. Similarly, the Milner Ridge Cor-

rections Centre which will open this fall will replace some of the jobs lost when the Beausejour Armed Forces base was shut down.

As the throne speech highlighted, the provincial government will institute a series of measures to preserve and improve health care and social services in Manitoba. While we were disappointed that the recent federal budget contained no provision for restoring the federal share of health and education funding our commitment to these areas remains.

We will continue to resist health care premiums, and other such measures which exist even in some of the richest provinces. Last year despite the continued decline in federal support for these areas, Manitoba increased its health care budget by nearly 10 percent.

This year our provincial government will institute a variety of measures which focus on health prevention and promotion, particularly, on encouraging healthier lifestyles. The province will improve availability of health services in rural and northern Manitoba. The shift from large in-patient institutional programs to more community based services, and alternatives to in-patient hospital services will continue.

It is my belief that the

Manitoba plan for increasing medical research occurring in this province will have major implications for some of the projects occurring at the AECL centre at Pinawa. At the recent cabinet meeting in Pinawa several such projects which could greatly benefit the province were discussed with employees. I fully expect some of these high technology concepts to be up and running in the very near future.

Recognizing the importance of the agriculture sector to the Manitoba economy our provincial government will continue our efforts to improve this vital sector. This year as the throne speech outlined, a stabilization plan for the feedlot sector of Manitoba's beef industry will be established. The special school farm tax assistance program introduced last year will be extended. A rural development institute will be created in co-operation with Brandon University to address the special needs and concerns of rural communities.

As a result of recent consultations with rural communities the provincial government will expand plans to improve rural telephone services, an expensive but priority item. The provincial government will be bringing forward a variety of legislative changes to improve consumer protection in Manitoba.

The series of provincial programs to encourage job creation and job training will continue. In this region the Jobs Fund, CareerStart, Jobs and Training, Youth Business Start, and the Community Assets programs have all proved valuable. From the funding of the renovations at Powerview Arena, curling rinks at Tyndall and Beausejour, community halls, and at other facilities,

## THE GARDEN PLOT

Today I'd like to talk about a correspondence course I am taking through the University of Alberta. It is called the "Home Gardening" course. The entire course is geared for growing conditions on the prairies — right down to listing plant varieties that grow well here.

The gardening fundamentals chapters (horticultural soils, botany, climate, plant nutrition, plant propagation and pest control) contain information that is basic to the understanding and application of gardening principles and practices.

The landscaping section includes chapters on turf, herbaceous and woody ornamentals and landscaping principles. There are three chapters dealing with vegetables, small fruits and tree fruits. Indoor, or climate controlled gardening, is covered in chapters on houseplants, greenhouse gardening and hydroponics.

And when these chapters have been completed there is one on herb gardening that can be taken.

Over the next few months most of my columns will be based on things I have learned from this course. I hope you will enjoy learning along with me.

A marathon club has also got underway with 25 students from Grades 5 and up already taking part. Jeff is training the students to run in the Manitoba Marathon. Although some of the Grade 12 students are considering running the full 25 mile distance, the program is designed for five person relay teams with each member running only five miles. The marathon club meets twice a week after school.

# Verna Eastcott is longest-employed teacher in Pine Falls School

Verna Eastcott began teaching full time in the Pine Falls School in 1965. She remembers the large amount of pupils at that time with double classrooms for almost every Grade. After many years of substitute teaching, Verna was enlisted to replace Harry Craig and teach Grade 7 on a full time basis in 1964.  
After a few years she switched to the Grade 5 class and later went on to teach Grades 2 and 3 and for the last eight years has taught Grade 4.  
Verna feels that it has been a good experience to move from grade to grade and says it has been very interesting to teach the different age levels.  
Verna spent time travelling to Pinawa taking university courses and worked three summers extending her French education at

the St. Boniface College. She has passed her French learning onto her students and for the last two years has had them perform French numbers in the Agassiz Festival of the Arts. She feels the children learn French as a living language by doing and the excitement is building again this year as the Grade 4 class prepares for what has become the traditional Mother's Day French puppet show.  
For the past six summers, Verna has toured the country on many teacher association trips. These have been teacher oriented tours which she describes as fact finding, "being immersed up to our ears in literature."  
Verna likes to keep her students quite busy throughout the day with interesting work and finds being totally organized is

ple because they were depriving us of our language," remembers Lucien, and realizes how easily a child's opinions are formed through actions.

Lucien remembers becoming quite involved with the students extra curricular activities, especially sports. Baseball was one of the sports, and the "Tin Town" ball team of the Grade 6, 7 and 8's always played the Pine Falls high school team every Labour Day weekend. Of course, the Pine Falls team trounced the Tin Town team and after Lucien's first year with the team, he vowed it would never happen again. He coached the team again and held weekly practices to sharpen their skills. The senior baseball team in Powerview had disbanded so Len Rupert and Norman Trudell collected all the uniforms and gave them to the students. Some of the parents cut them down to size and when the boys wore those uniforms "it made the difference," quoted Lucien, as the Tin Town team beat the Pine Falls team that next year.

"My star pitchers were Jacky Dudka and Jacky Gordon," remembers Lucien, "and the star catcher was Jerry Cyr, with Roland Harris on, Fritz Kembal and three Maslow brothers playing an outstanding game for us."

In 1952, Lucien left Powerview and moved to Ste. Anne where he became the principal of the all boys school. He taught 38 boys from Grades 5-8. He also met and married a local girl from Ste. Anne, Lucille Smith.

His stay in Ste. Anne was

short, because as president of the local teachers' association, he was in constant battle with the trustees over the teachers' salary schedule. "There was one teacher, a nun, who had her master's degree and she was only earning \$1300/year. I felt that was unfair because the school had a \$28,000.00 budget and could have afforded to pay more. A lot of teachers were afraid for their jobs, but I didn't care, I had no children at the time, said Lucien.

He was quickly branded in Ste. Anne and he and three other teachers received dismissal slips. The same day, Lucien received the slip, he also got a call from Powerview School asking him to come back, so he did.

In those years, the Powerview "Red School" was located along the river where the RCMP detachment now stands. Lucien recalled clearing snow from the river for skating and also building a slide down the riverbank for those students who didn't skate.

The building of the ice rink was a major undertaking every year, but there was never a problem getting help. The manager of the North American Lumber was a sports enthusiast, so every winter he loaned basement form boards to the school for use as ice rink boards. The school kids would assemble the forms and a hole was made in the ice for pumping water from the river for flooding. "Dave Dufour would come every now and again and do additional flooding," Lucien recalls, "the amount of kids that supported me was tremendous, I

had kids staying till 5:00 p.m. every night helping me.

"Sometimes we'd play a hockey against Fort Alexander. Father Ruest would come with his truck and pick our team up and take us to Fort Alexander for a game. The nuns would feed us afterwards and we'd have hot chocolate, then return to Powerview."

Eventual erosion of the riverbank and the need to expand the school resulted in a land purchase from Joe Vincent to relocate the school where it presently sits. Agassiz also bought part of the land to build a high school beside the Leonard School Division elementary school.

"I like the wisdom of the local trustees, Albert Pelland was the president and the architects of the Leonard School and Agassiz School realized that some day they would have to expand, so they built the schools so that some day they could be joined," stated Lucien, and eventually this did happen.

Lucien became principal of the Leonard School in 1966 and in 1970, when Agassiz and Leonard amalgamated, he became vice-principal of the entire complex. The school board became one at that time also.

Many of the smaller schools in the surrounding area began to close, such as the Fatima School, the Dupont School, the Broadlands School, and the Chevrefils School.

Because of a change in government legislation, the St. Georges

school was declared a French school and for the next four years Lucien accepted most of the administrative responsibilities of the St. Georges School, and travelled extensively between the Powerview and the St. Georges schools.

When the St. Georges school was eventually closed, Lucien began working immediately on a French immersion program for Powerview School. "For over six years, I was on the advisory committee that was a branch of the Department of Education in Manitoba. Our committee would meet three or four times a year to study the results of different French immersion programs being tried in Manitoba. I based the structure of the Powerview French immersion program on the success of other schools in the province," stated Lucien.

Lucien recalls that his best years spent in Powerview were from 1966-72 and credits his "fantastic staff" of Sister Pauline (active in arts and crafts) and Jack Bojaski and Russel Wychreschuk (active in sports) as being the reason, stating they were the type of teachers who were not afraid to give.

Lucien also remembers the time when none of the 300 students returned from one particular recess. When he eventually went outside to see what the problem was, they cheered "happy birthday!" and presented him with a special gift, a handmade picture of a mosaic of horses with each horse crafted from a different piece of wood. He still treasures that gift which adorns

his living room wall above his sofa.

Lucien leads a quieter life now, watching a lot of football and hockey during the winter, and gardening during the summer — "it kills time and brings in vegetables," he jokes. Lucien is also an artist and loves to work with his hands doing crafts. He structured a miniature horse out of paper mache and it was so life-like his youngest son, Denis, claimed it and his second oldest son, Gerald has put in a request for a "Clydesdale" replica, which Lucien is presently working on. His oldest son Hubert and daughter Elaine has also shown a desire to own one.

Lucien hopes to retire in the near future and will more than likely move to Winnipeg where his four children reside. He would also be only a 30 km visit away from his and Lucille's family and likes the thought of partaking in activities the city would offer.

"I have always loved children and I have never regretted one day of my teaching career," says Lucien, but admits he will not miss today's paperwork or rules and regulations.

St. Georges is one of the areas that the planning district has ignored. St. Georges has already lost the school, a grocery store, restaurant and what is next? It could be our church if we don't have more residents. The idea of supplying water to the boundary of Powerview, and the sharing of a lagoon with Powerview seems reasonable...providing there is no annexation. The LGD is not Santa Claus.

There is land for development in the LGD. Five or six years ago the Knights of Columbus were asked by council to tender for sale some eleven acres of land. They bought the land 18 years ago for about \$4500.00 and then put a ridiculous reserve price on it for \$50,000.00, which was

twice too much. The low taxes on the property have enabled the Knights to keep that land for just over \$100.00 per year. The WRPD has been dragging its feet. Had they zoned the area, the taxes would be about \$600.00 a year. This is a large loss to the taxpayers. It is to be hoped the Knights will reconsider, otherwise the LGD should expropriate the land because it has been idle for years and would provide tax revenue if it is developed.

At \$65.00 per meeting per councillor (three from LGD and two from Powerview) per month, plus the expense of Mr. Jackson from Beausejour, this is a lot of wasted taxpayers' money. We have a right to expect more of the planning district.

George Harbottle, the present secretary-treasurer, who has been employed by the village since July, 1983 and is finished July, 1988 has been training Juanita over the last two weeks and jokingly claims "blondes are better." Harbottle is quite pleased with Juanita's quick learning abilities and informed council of the many duties she has already been ably handling.

### Village news

Council agreed to send Juanita Smith to the Annual Municipal Officials Seminar to be held in Brandon.

Discussion ensued over a fire bill of \$969.68 received from the Pine Falls Fire Department. The fire department had attended one particular home in Powerview three times in one day. After examining the fire department's detailed account of the fire, council agreed to collect the money from residents of the home in question.

Council agreed to donate \$100.00 to the Winnipeg River Lions Club Winter Carnival Queen Contest with \$25.00 being awarded to each queen's fundraising efforts.

Further to the Christmas light issue, Mayor Elie Trudell informed council that there are 59 street lights in Powerview. Council agreed to order 30 Christmas light fixtures (15 stars and 15 trees) from Norm's Iron Products, Teulon, at a cost of \$75.00 per fixture. Council will also consider ordering 25 more fixtures the following year.

All council will be attending a joint meeting between the LGD and the Village on Monday, Feb. 22 at 6:00 p.m. at the St. Georges Library. They hope to settle such issues as the joint lagoon, water supply, nuisance grounds, and boundary expansion.

Soil test reports have been received by council, but as yet, no estimates on the cost of paving. The estimates should be received by next meeting at which time council can look at the budget and decide how many streets can be paved in 1988.

A proposal received from Gauthier Enterprise Ltd. to locate a five or six bay carwash on Art St. next to the Powerview Hotel was discussed. The site is presently not zoned for commercial development, so council elected to ask Gauthier Enterprises to find an alternative location where commercial lots are available rather than rezone the existing site.

Council drafted a letter to the federal government requesting a grant of \$70,000.00 for the Powerview Artificial Ice Fund. Although the ice plant is nearly paid for, other expenditures such as plexi-glass, etc. are still needed.

### 1988 budget

Harbottle informed council of certain areas that deserve attention in planning the 1988 budget: an increase in the clerk's salary of \$10,000.00; office equipment purchase of approximately \$10,000.00; higher school levies; nuisance ground could cost an additional \$4,000.00; a new garbage truck may have to be purchased; as well as paved streets and additional snow removal on those streets. Harbottle further added that \$15,000.00 in taxes will be forthcoming from new homes and buildings in the Village.

The 1987 budget showed a surplus of \$7,618.00 (unaudited figure) with the operating budget comprising \$4,500.00 of the surplus.

Budget planning will be done at the next council meeting.

### Accounts

An oil bill of \$2,275.00 was received after it was found that the LGD had inadvertently paid this bill which belonged to the Village.

Eight new chairs were purchased for the office at a cost of \$1206.96.

One hundred dollars was given to the PAA's Skateathon held last month for artificial ice fundraising.

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Juanita Smith started training as the secretary-treasurer of the Village of Powerview on February 1 and was in attendance at her first council meeting sitting beside Mayor Elie Trudell.
