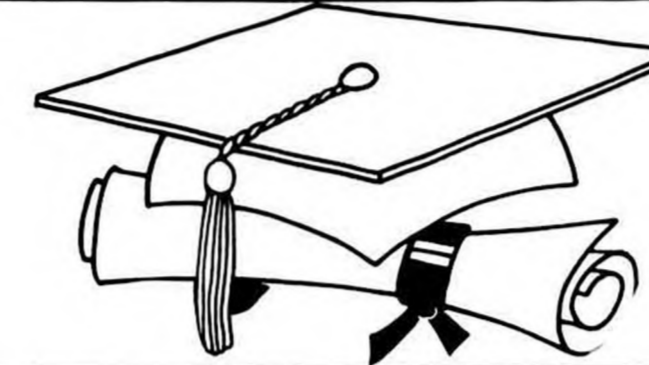
Sylvie Chevretils and David Windsor made the valedictory addresses, again in French and English for the benefit of the family members and other unilingual members of the audience.

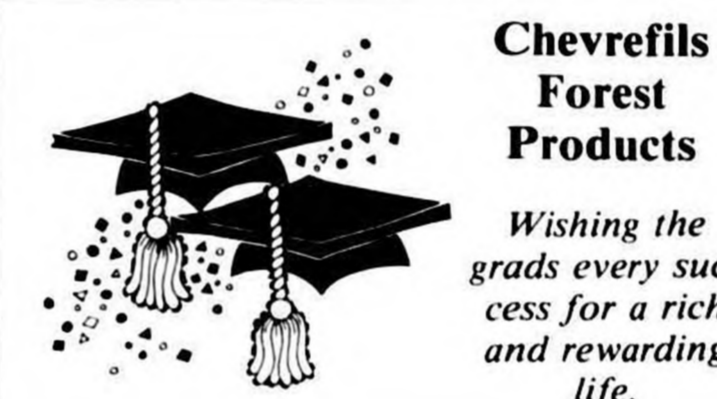
The awards were presented and an ecstatic graduation class threw their caps in the air and left the stage area for the "meet the grads" part of the ceremony.

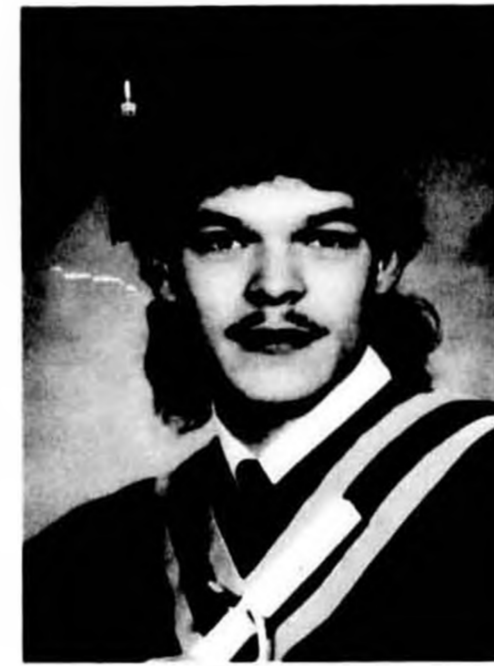

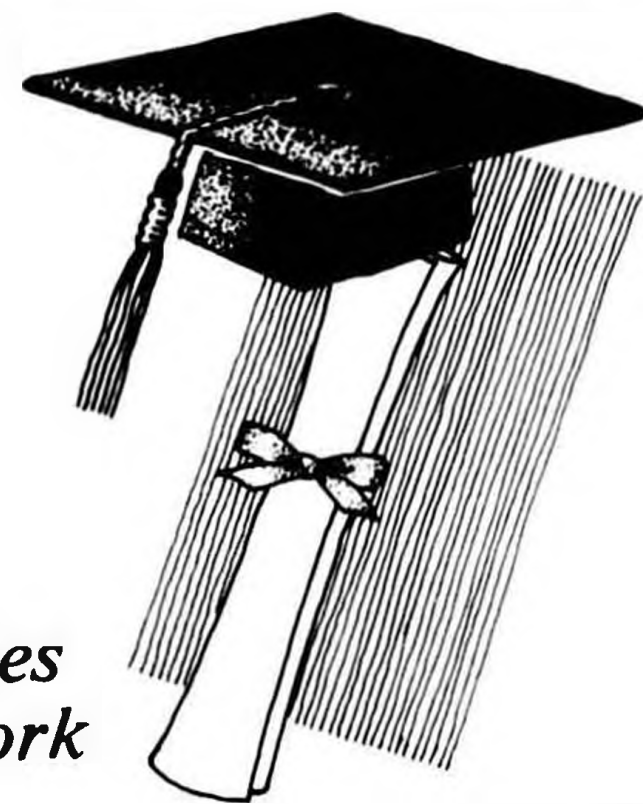

How valuable is education?

How valuable is education and do the students of today take for granted the opportunities available in the field of education?

For a native child growing up in a white society, education is the main road to survival in a country where 75% of native people are unemployed and living on welfare.

Four of the thirteen graduates of the Fort Alexander High School had left their education behind to marry and have children, but returned to successfully receive a high school diploma. The graduation ceremony was a proud moment for these students and their families.

Pamela Guimond, a mother of three, maintained an attendance percentage of 99% and graduated with a 93% average, claiming seven of the eight scholastic awards. To her, education was of utmost importance.

Velma Fontaine, mother of three children, also returned to school after being absent for twelve years and received her graduating diploma. Emotions ran high at the graduating ceremony when Velma's husband Brian took the microphone to announce his pride, as did each of Velma's three children who simply said, "Congratulations, Mom."

More proud moments were witnessed when Lawrence Abraham walked the floor to receive his diploma, a first for the Abraham family.

Chief Jerry Fontaine expounded the importance of education in his message to the grads, "Education is one of the most important aspects of community life. You are our future leaders and you must be prepared to accept the challenge. The bonds are endless with education and I feel confident knowing you will return to the community and help us. Remember who you are and where you come from."

Community Elder Virginia Fontaine echoed the native people's feelings when she said, "Youth alone can do it, you must keep on going."

School board chairman Carl Fontaine's message to the grads also sounded a plea, "Hard work and perseverance put you here and education will unlock a few doors, doors for all our people. You will be an example. You will be our future leaders, and the decisions you make will greatly affect us."

The graduating students had a message of their own and chose to show their appreciation to parents or family members for the support received during educational studies. A personal message was spoken by each grad to the individual they felt most inspired and helped them throughout the school years, and that person was called on stage to receive a specially engraved plaque.

One could not sit through the lengthy Fort Alexander graduating ceremony without feeling the great importance of education to the native people and the high value they place on a Grade 12 diploma.

The next step for these grads will likely be university, if government funding allows it. Chief Fontaine revealed startling statistics on native post secondary education, "In 1960 there were only 13 natives enrolled in universities across Canada. In 1986 there were 13,000 with 60% of those students graduating.

"The federal government has announced a new policy restricting the number of native students who will be funded at university. The government is also reducing the number of years that a native student is allowed to attend. They are also reducing subsidies to certain students, in particular single mothers.

Fontaine feels that the disadvantaged are becoming more disadvantaged as he says with a population of 4,000 at Fort Alexander and 95% of the people unemployed, they cannot afford university for their children.

Is education valuable? To the native people, it is the most valued stage in their future goal towards self government and an end to the welfare situation. It is up to the educated white society to help them.
