## At Powerview School CO<sup>2</sup> levels 9 times normal

Kathy Dugard is taking her daughter Simone out of Powerview School. Simone has been getting headaches and vomiting at school, but is fine as soon as she gets home.

Two weeks ago Mrs. Dugard found out why. On January 16, results of testing for carbon dioxide in December were posted on the school bulletin board, showing concentrations nine times the normal level (2600 parts per million).

In a letter to Glen Hirst, supervisor of maintenance for Agassiz School Division, Keith Thomas, risk manager for the Manitoba Association of School Trustees, reported results of tests he had taken in mid-December.

Dear Mr. Hirst: re: air quality tests — Powerview School

The air quality tests taken at Powerview School are the highest CO<sub>2</sub> readings that I have found in testing schools throughout Manitoba. Readings above 2000 p.p.m. CO<sub>2</sub> are unusual in schools but would certainly verify the

concerns expressed by employees. Such high levels would certainly lead to drowsiness, headaches and sore throats.

The highest level of 2600 was found in the classroom on the corridor adjacent to the science room and the next highest was 2200 in the science room. Five tests were also done in the library and adjacent rooms and all values range between 1400 and 1800 p.p.m. CO<sub>2</sub>.

The air is extremely sluggish and the situation would certainly be worse on colder days when more heating is required.

I would recommend a thorough retesting of the heating-ventilation system with a move towards upgrading the air movement system.

The letter took four weeks to get from Mr. Hirst's office to the school. The testing was in response to complaints about the ventilation system dating back more than two years.

## Quiet meeting for LGD

At the January 23 meeting of the LGD of Alexander it was announced that an environmental review of the proposed Hydro Bi-Pole III will be held at the Manitou Lodge on February 19.

It was agreed to contribute \$100.00 to the Winnipeg River Lions Club for the Winter Carnival.

The LGD renewed its membership in the Eastman Regional Development Corporation for a cost of \$973.35.

Council members were authorized to attend a tour of the Atomic Energy of

Canada's facilities at Pinawa, with travel and expenses to be covered by the LGD.

The February 27 meeting of council was cancelled to allow councillors to attend a Union of Manitoba Municipalities seminar in Brandon on February 26, 27 and 28. Travel and expenses to be covered by the LGD.

Ed Carlson was appointed building inspector to give him the authority to enforce zoning regulations.

Council approved ambulance grants of \$553.00 to Lac du Bonnet, and \$3,701 to Pine Falls. The same ratio,

Gerry Dupont has agreed to a cost of \$45.00 per week to pick up garbage in Great Falls providing garbage is in sealed bags or boxes, and on the curb by 10:00 a.m.

A resolution was sent direct to Minister of Natural Resources, Harry Enns, asking for improvements to No. 1 Main Drain West of Stead. Nick Roman said banks were washing out, causing a hazard to traffic.

The council authorized the lease-to-purchase of a Xerox 1025, at a cost of \$320.00 per month.

## Ski trails to close temporarily

The Manitoba Telephone System is bringing a fibre optics system to Pine Falls. The route chosen will make it necessary to close the Duck Lake Ski Club's trails for about two weeks in February, while construction is in progress.

Vince Keenan, director of the ski club, said the trails will be closed around February 15, but the date has not been finalized. "We will publicize it when we have a firm date," he said.

Keenan said there will be two lines to Pine Falls, one through Grand Beach, and the other through Lac du Bonnet. Both lines will carry all long distance calls at the same time. Thus if one is broken for any reason, calls will continue without interruption.

He said each line will be capable of handling 10,000 long distance calls at the same time. Keenan, who works in the Abitibi-Price Woods Division, said the new cable will make it possible for Abitibi to get electronic data transmitted directly from the Department of Natural Resources in Winnipeg. "At present there is too much interference to be able to do this effectively," he said.

The two lines will be installed along the CNR track to the southern edge of the Fort Alexander reserve, then east and north along the boundary of the reserve, arriving in Pine Falls close to the hospital.

Keenan said each line will require a 12-metre wide swath

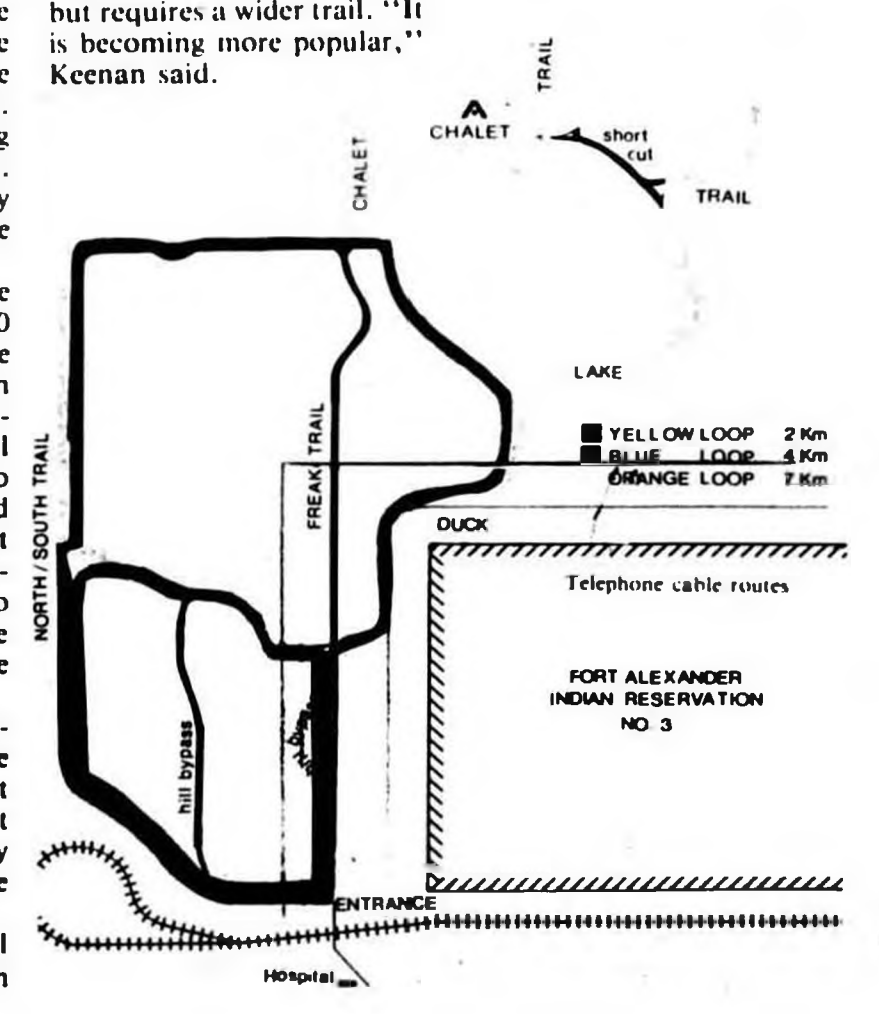
to be cleared through the bush. The two lines will be 100 metres apart. He said MTS will make the cuts as narrow as possible where there is interference with ski trails.

Keenan said the club has no complaints with MTS whatsoever. "They have been extremely reasonable," he said.

He sees the development as being an advantage to the club. "We will end up with about one and a half miles of ski skating trails," he said. Ski skating is much faster than the classic form of country skiing, but requires a wider trail. "It is becoming more popular," Keenan said.

The club has an agreement with MTS to cut off tree stumps at, or below, ground level, and to restore the existing trails and the new cable routes to the satisfaction of the club.

The ski club has made arrangements with the golf club for about one and a half miles of trails to be available on the golf course during the construction period.

Darren Praznik, Lac du Bonnet MLA made a whirlwind visit to St. Georges and Powerview last Friday afternoon to present awards to Pine Falls, Powerview, the LGD, and the St. Georges Community Club.

Accompanying Praznik was Hal Roebuck, manager Municipal Resources for the Manitoba Government Emergency Measures Organization. Plaques were awarded "in recognition of the development of a municipal emergency plan" to the Village of Pine Falls, the Village of Powerview, and the LGD of Alexander.

Praznik said, "We really appreciate having this service available in this part of the province." Hal Roebuck added that his agency's goal is for every municipality to have an emergency plan. "We hope you never have to use it," he said, "but it is better to be prepared to handle problems like forest fires." He said those areas with emergency plans were found to be better able to handle the problems caused by last summer's forest fires.

Praznik presented a cheque to Ginette McMullen towards the St. Georges Community Club's fort and swimming areas. He said it was a progress payment towards a total contribution of \$26,000. Praz-

nik pointed out that this is all "lottery money", and he had been able to secure \$750,000 in lottery money for community projects in his constituency in the last two years.

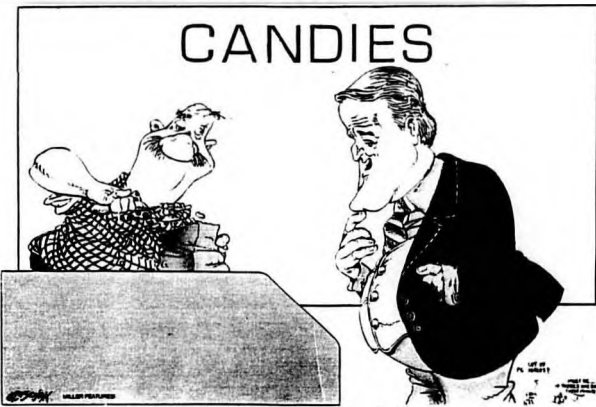

The LGD of Alexander, Povungivuk, and Pine Falls completed a disaster plan with Emergency Measures Organization in 1989. There is still a need for a committee to be struck to represent the Canadian Red Cross. They serve a very necessary component in emergencies and disasters. Some of the tasks they fulfill are feeding, lodging, and clothing of the persons who have been affected by these emergencies. If a disaster occurs here, workers doing cleanup and extrication will have to be fed and if it covers a period of time, a schedule of working time needs to be arranged.  
Another vital function is registry and inquiry. If persons are moved to another location due to the nature of the disaster the Red Cross keeps track. If your relatives would hear of a disaster, they can find out where you are, should you be involved.  
Last year many people were evacuated from their homes due to the forest fires. EMO (Emergency Measures Organization) and Natural Resources have already predicted that this spring may bring a similar situation. People of this area must be prepared for that likelihood. The Red Cross is prepared to provide a class for those who would be interested in helping the community in this

## The farmers' corner Focus On: First annual agricultural conference

### Screening in cattle rations

The main concern when using screenings for feed is the variability in their composition. The best grades of grain screenings consist mainly of broken and shrunken kernels of small grain and have a feeding value slightly less than oats. They contain 12-14% crude protein and 65-70% TDN.

Screenings from the cleaning of canola and flax crops may have an even higher feeding value because of their increased oil content. Because of this, canola and flax screenings may be similar to barley in terms of both protein and energy content. The high oil content, however, restricts the level at which these screenings can be incorporated into a diet without causing digestive upsets. It is recommended that whole flaxseed and canola seed do not exceed 10% of the grain mix. Screenings from these crops can be gradually incorporated into finishing cattle rations at up to 20-30% of the ration without normally encountering any problems with palatability or performance. The feeding value of these screenings, for beef cows being fed restricted amounts, will be very nearly equal to the value of barley.

Light, chaffy screenings are much higher in fiber and are consequently lower in energy and feed value. These screenings have a feed value similar to that of straw or poor quality hay. The bushel weight of the screenings is often a good indicator of its quality. When used in rations for cattle, screenings should be treated as any other grain or concentrate. High quality screenings, consisting chiefly of broken and shrunken kernels of grain, can be used to replace most or all of the grain in beef cattle rations. Because screenings are lower in energy than grain, 10-20% more of these screenings by weight should be fed when replacing grain.

Screenings should be introduced into the ration gradually. Because of their variable composition, palatability may initially be a problem. Producers should also be aware that screenings containing immature flax may contain prussic acid at unacceptable levels. Screenings from grain crops may also contain unacceptable levels of ergot.

When determining if screenings are an economical buy, they should be compared to other grains such as barley on the basis of cost per unit of energy or TDN and not on the basis of cost per tonne. To accurately assess the feeding value of a source of screenings, producers should have representative sample analyzed for essential nutrients. This service is available at the Provincial Feed Testing Laboratory.

**Low quality grain**  
Feeding low quality or low bushel weight grain is a good way of getting rid of this type of product because usually price will be discounted considerably.

There is no evidence to show grain 2-3 pounds per bushel below standard is worth less than normal grain if paid on a weight basis. However, grain lower than this should be discounted 1% for each pound below the standard. For example, 38 pound barley should be discounted 10% over price of standard barley.

## Your Canada, Your Parliament, Your Business

### Difficult, unpopular — but with results

Last week's article noted that this federal government is serious about its deficit reduction.

The latest initiatives announced to manage government programs more effectively were made known last month by Treasury Board President, Robert de Cotret when he noted a \$1.4 billion reduction cut to Ottawa directly!

Mr. de Cotret stressed that those actions were the latest step in constant efforts since 1984 to manage frugally. They followed the hard decisions announced last spring in the federal budget and further reductions to be announced in the new year.

The detailed cuts to the Ottawa region have been covered by the media, and I won't repeat them again. Let me suggest, however, that the very real success we have had in bringing government spending under control is sometimes overlooked.

Since 1984, we have taken a number of steps, often difficult and sometimes unpopular, to eliminate wasteful practices and spending by introducing a more businesslike approach to the operations of government. These have included expenditure and program reviews, reductions in payments to and privatization of Crown corporations, reduction in the size of the public service and cost-recovery measures.

As a result of these measures: • we have kept annual growth in program expenditures to

3.6%, well below the inflation rate. Compare that to the annual 14.1% growth which occurred during the last five years of the liberal administration; • we have met our objective of reducing the size of the public service. It is now the size it was 17 years ago, and that in spite of a heavier workload;

• we have improved cash management. This alone has saved taxpayers nearly \$1 billion since 1985; and • we have reduced program spending to the point where we expect budgetary revenues to exceed program spending by about \$9 billion this year. A very significant improvement over the \$12 billion deficit in program spending which we found when we came to power.

This government has done more to control spending and to improve programs and services than any other government in recent history. We know that Canadians have not found it easy to accept many of the restraint measures that were necessary to manage the economy and ensure our future.

I want Provencher constituents to know that the government has been tightening its belt and will continue to do so. But that is what leadership is all about.

## Sunnywood Manor update

The lights are often burning late at Sunnywood Manor, as the contractor and the various sub-trades work toward building completion in March.

Walls and ceilings have been painted and the doors, windows, and trim are being worked on. The large automatic door at the entrance finally arrived from Texas and has been installed. Millwork and cabinets arrived this week. The break-through into the existing kitchen was done over the past couple of weeks and that work continues. Some light fixtures and baseboard heaters have been installed, and the flooring in the south wing has been laid. Everything seems to be shaping

### Big struggle shaping up over 'Crow' rates

One of the hotter topics of the new decade is rarely mentioned in the dailies or the weeklies. Only the farm press wants to talk about the "Crow" rates.

What is shaping up is a titanic struggle, one capable of cleaving the farm community in two. Because of a lack of information, any non-farmers don't know they have a stake in the outcome of this debate. This story has its roots in the building of the CPR branch line to B.C. through the Crow's Nest Pass.

Grossly over-simplified, Ottawa gave the CPR a cash subsidy to build this line, in return for which CPR agreed to lower freight rates on grain, flour, and settlers' effects. These rates remained unchanged over 80 years, resulting in massive losses. Ottawa finally agreed to pay the rail companies \$740 million annually to subsidize the movement of grain and unprocessed grain products.

The Mulroney government is flirting with the prospect of changing the method of payment. One option is to divide that annual payment among the grain producers, an average of roughly \$4,000.00 per farm. From this point on, producers would pay for the transportation of their own grain. If the subsidy is cancelled in this fashion, farmers would pay the going freight rates for grain they sent to market via rail.

Because they are a canny lot, I suspect a great number of them will not spend that money on freight. How can they keep it? Easy. Feed their grain to flocks and herds. Make their own deliveries. Co-operate with their neighbors in the

development of processing plants. With no more subsidies on grain deliveries, it should be possible to manufacture shredded wheat in Biggar, Brooks, or Brunkild, instead of Ontario. Who are the participants in the Debate of the Decade?

In this corner we have Alberta Pool and United Grain Growers. They want the money to go to the producers.

In this other corner we have Saskatchewan Pool and, most likely, Manitoba Pool, who have a vested interest in protecting their investments in elevators and terminals. Also opposed is NFU, which doesn't want farmers to make any decisions on their own. Of particular interest in this camp, the associations of Quebec farmers are vehement in their objections to this subsidy money going to prairie producers.

In between we have 125,000 individual producers, each of whom must study this subject from many different angles: location, distance to market, ideology, farming intentions, and the need to diversify as they attempt to survive in rapidly changing world.

Paying this subsidy to farmers would mean extra annual disposable income of roughly \$100 million in Manitoba \$200 million in Alberta, and \$400 million in Saskatchewan, townsfolk please note.

I'm prepared to wager that paying this money to producers will mean less grain will be shipped off the Prairies. I say that if more of it were fed or processed closer to home, the regional economy would be in better shape.

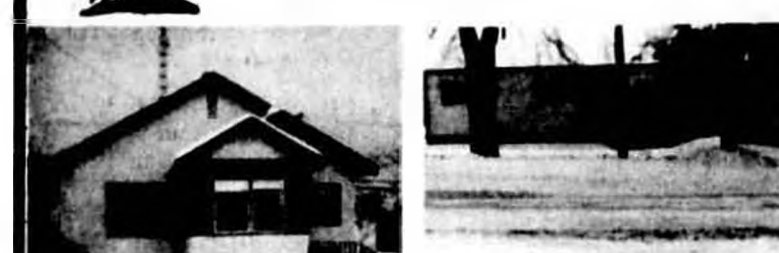

## Powerview parents want full-time resource teacher

"A patchwork or band-aid will not work"

A delegation from Powerview representing the parents of Powerview School who have children in the French Immersion Program voiced their concern for lack of a French speaking resource teacher in the school. Margaret Chevrefils, the president of Canadian Parents For French Powerview, briefed the Agassiz School board at its meeting in Lac du Bonnet on Tuesday, January 23. Chevrefils said that in Powerview, "we have a uni-lingual English resource teacher whose services are utilized to capacity, dealing with needs of English students. We are requesting the board to hire a full time French resource teacher as a new permanent position."

"We have no one in Powerview to assess the needs of students in the French Immersion Program, in relation to resource," said Chevrefils. To utilize the services of the English resource teacher often a translator is used. The total communication is important in certain areas of resource. Chevrefils identified the need of a French resource teacher by saying, "it would meet the needs of French immersion teachers, and most importantly, meet the needs of our children." She said that resource programs deal with "high incidence" type problems but will also be an asset to language development.

The parent group told the chairman and members of the board "it is absolutely imperative that a resource person, qualified to work directly with the French Immersion Program, be hired." She concluded by saying "we cannot continue to use a "patchwork" or "band-aid" solution to meet our French resource needs — we need a French resource teacher."

Agassiz board chairman Barry Bence asked the principal Steve Meszaros and the vice principal Marcelle Lizotte to speak on the need of a French resource teacher in Powerview School.

Meszaros supported the demand of the parents of the children in the French Immersion Program. He said that it is a very independent group, and looking at the increasing numbers (about 317) of the French Immersion children it is necessary to have a French resource teacher. Lizotte told the board that they only have a part time uni-lingual French resource assistant. They used to be able to get the only

special education teacher from the Department of Education Winnipeg, to assess the kids but lately she is not working. He felt it is essential to have a French resource teacher in the school. The delegation was told by

the chairman that the board does realize the need of a French resource teacher. "I want to assure the group we are having our staffing meeting on February 28, we will give it consideration and let you know."
