## Kids zoo new event at 4P

Local children will be able to mix with horses, calves, pigs, donkeys, sheep and goats at the Powerview School grounds this weekend.

Mr. and Mrs. Bruno of E and K Cateus Farms near Brandon will be bringing a petting zoo to the 4-P Festival.

The zoo began four or five years ago, almost by accident, when a few animals were put together for their daughters nursery school. It proved popular with the children and

has developed to a point where the zoo is taken to festivals all over Manitoba every summer.

In addition to traditional farm animals there will be domesticated animals from other lands, a llama from Peru, a goat from Angora, a jacob four horned sheep and a hair (not wool) sheep from Barbados, exotic chickens and ducks.

## Powerview sewage lagoon \$25,000 over budget

When sealed tenders for the construction of Powerview's new sewage lagoon were opened on August 15, councilors discovered the low bid was nearly \$25,000 more than their engineer's estimate.

After a lengthy debate council decided to proceed with the project. In the words of Powerview Mayor Frank Thibedeau "\$25,000 is not a huge overrun for a project of nearly \$300,000", and council had no choice but to go ahead.

Causes of the overrun were additional requirements by the Clean Environment Commission, not foreseen in the original proposal, and this year's heavy rainfall causing higher moisture conditions in the area to be excavated.

The Clean Environment Commission has asked for an additional one inch of clay lining, and additional metre to the thickness of the dykes, the construction of an all weather access road, the construction of a dumping facility for truck hauled sewage, and a one

metre coarse gravel zone around the inside base of all dykes.

Council has written to the Water Services Board with a request for an increase in the \$123,000 grant for the project and has asked MLA Darren Praznik for his assistance in negotiations with the board.

Powerview Secretary/Treasurer Juanita Smith said council hopes that the Water Services Board will provide enough additional funds to keep any increase in the mill rate to a minimum.

## POLICE REPORT

### Hydroponic equipment seized in Powerview

On August 15 Powerview RCMP conducted a search in a Powerview home resulting in the seizure of marijuana and hydroponic growing equipment. A charge has been laid for the cultivation of marijuana.

Overnight on August 12 to 13 a red and white 14-speed Norco mountain bike was stolen from Clark's Corner and a red 12-speed mountain bike was stolen from the Pine Falls Golf Course.

Overnight on August 14 to 15 a boys' white BMX Bobcat bicycle was stolen.

Between 10:00 p.m. on August 15 and 5:00 a.m. the next morning, there was an incident of vandalism at the Pine Falls Golf Course. The flag and pole was stolen from the first green and the green was gouged with the pole.

This is the second time this has happened in two weeks. Powerview RCMP are asking for public help in solving this.

Between August 17 and 18 a Powerview house was broken into and 17 cassette tapes were stolen.

Between August 7 and 18 a Hillside Beach cabin was broken into and a quantity of beer stolen.

Between August 11 and 18 another Hillside Beach cabin was broken into and liquor was stolen.

At 4:00 a.m. on August 18, Clark's Corner was broken into and cash was stolen, again overnight on August 19 to 20 the store was broken into. A small amount of cash was stolen and a large quantity of cigarettes, snuff and packaged tobacco was stolen. The cash stolen included 70 loonies. Powerview RCMP are asking for the assistance of the public in solving these crimes.

At 7:15 p.m. on August 18, a Winnipeg woman lost control of her car in the Victoria Beach parking lot causing extensive damage to five vehicles. There were no injuries. The incident is still under investigation.

At 8:00 a.m. on August 17 there was a one vehicle roll-over at Traverse Bay resulting in injuries (not serious) to two people. The incident is under investigation.

### Excuses, excuses

Have you ever noticed how some people can never give you a straight answer about anything? They always seem to have excuses for everything. The following quotations were taken from a Toronto newspaper. They are samples of the excuses that individuals wrote down on their claim forms following their auto accidents.

- Coming home, I drove into the wrong house and collided with a tree I don't have.
- I thought my window was down, but found it was up when I put my hand through it.
- I collided with a stationary truck coming the other way.
- A pedestrian hit me and went under my car.
- The guy was all over the road. I had to swerve a number of times before I hit him.
- In an attempt to kill a fly, I drove into a telephone pole.
- An invisible car came out of nowhere, struck my vehicle, and vanished.
- The telephone pole was approaching fast. I was attempting to swerve out of its path when it struck my front end.

Amazing isn't it the stories that people will tell instead of facing up to the truth? **The way we vote: changes needed!**

Exactly five minutes after Premier Gary Filmon pulled the plug and announced the September 11 provincial election, I pulled a sneaky one on-the-air.

It was Tuesday, August 7, 11:05 a.m., and I ran a straw vote with the overly-simplistic rule: One call-in to the radio program, one vote. "We will take only 57 calls," I said, "because that will duplicate the number of seats in the Manitoba Legislature."

The actual standings in the legislature:

- Conservative — 24
- Liberal — 21
- NDP — 12

The results of my call-in straw vote ("If the provincial election was being today, how would you vote?")

- Conservative — 26
- Liberal — 16
- NDP — 12
- Independent — 3

That would mean another minority government...and the other interesting point of the calls was that the three people who voted "independent" said they really meant the Reform Party. We are keeping those figures to see how close

### Migratory game bird season announced

Season dates and bag limits for the upcoming migratory game bird season have been announced by Natural Resources Minister Harry Enns.

With increased precipitation in parts of southern Manitoba this spring, pond numbers were up over the near record low levels of 1989, he said.

The number of breeding ducks increased in response to the improved water conditions but remained below the long-term average. Upland nesting habitat surrounding the ponds continued to deteriorate as a result of the extended drought of the 80s.

Due to the continued low continental numbers of breeding ducks and the expectation that production will not improve over 1989, the Department of Natural Resources has delayed the waterfowl season in zones W3 and W4 by one week. In addition, restrictions in daily bag limits remain for mallards, pintails, canvasback and redhead ducks.

The northernmost zone W1, will open on September 1, while zone W2, which includes The Pas, will open on September 10 for residents and September 17 for non-residents of Canada. The goose season in zones W3 and W4 will open on September

24 for residents while duck season will open October 1. The non-residents of Canada duck and goose season will open October 1.

The daily bag limit for ducks will remain at six birds while the goose bag will be eight.

For more complete information on specific regulations hunters are asked to consult the 1990 Manitoba hunting brochure available at all National Resources offices and licence vendors.

### Apples and crabapples for juice and slices

With all the crabapples and apples now ready, here are three ideas of what to do with all of them.

#### Juice

Add some underripe apples to the batch for more pectin. Wash and cut up apples, discarding stem and blossom ends. Do not peel or core. Barely cover with cold water and bring to a boil over moderate heat and simmer until apples are quite soft - about 30 minutes. Strain hot through a dampened jelly bag. Pour strained juice into hot sterilized jars, leaving 1/2" of headroom, adjust lids. Process in a hot water bath at 190°F (88°C) for 30 minutes for either pints or quarts. Remove jars, complete seals if necessary.

#### Apple slices

Hot pack recommended, with thin syrup or unsweetened apple juice. Select firm, mature apples. Prepare thin syrup (250 ml sugar, 500 ml water to make 650 ml syrup), or heat unsweetened apple juice. Wash, peel and core apples. Remove bruised or decayed parts and cut in slices. To prevent darkening, place fruit in solution of ascorbic acid. Prepare jars, lids and boiling water bath. Drain apples. Heat to boiling in syrup or juice for about 10 minutes and pack hot in jars. Add boiling liquid

to jar leaving 2 cm headspace. Remove air bubbles. Measure and readjust headspace if necessary. Wipe sealing edge of jar and centre lid on rim. Process in boiling water bath for 15 minutes for small (500 ml) jars and 20 minutes for medium (1 L) jars. Remove jars from canner. Cool. Test for seals, label and store.

#### Apple Pie Filling

Hot pack recommended.

9 L sliced, peeled apples  
750 ml sugar  
5 ml salt  
15 ml cinnamon  
25 ml lemon juice

Select firm, sound cooking or pie making apples. Wash, peel and core apples. Remove bruised or decayed parts. To prevent darkening, place fruit in solution of ascorbic acid. Prepare medium (1 L) jars, lids and boiling water bath. Small jars are not used because a litre of filling is needed per apple pie. Drain apples. Combine apples and remaining ingredients in a large kettle. Bring slowly to a boil and simmer until all sugar is dissolved (about 5 minutes), stirring constantly. Pack hot into jars, leaving 5 cm headspace. Remove air bubbles. Measure and readjust headspace if necessary. Wipe sealing edge of jar. Apply and centre lid on rim. Process jars in boiling water bath for 25 minutes or in pressure canner at 35 kPa (5 lb) pressure for 8 minutes. Remove jars from canner, cool, and test for seals, label and store.

## Dramatic decrease in traffic fatalities

### Government files appeal against decision on vehicle impoundment

Alcohol related fatal traffic accidents have been cut by almost half since Manitoba introduced tough new drinking and driving legislation, Justice Minister Jim McCrae says.

"In the eight months (November 1, 1989 to June 30, 1990) since Bill 3 came into force, the number of alcohol related fatal traffic accidents decreased from 23 in the same time period last year to 12," McCrae said. "This is an overall decrease of 47.8 per cent."

Statistics for the same time period also show that:

— Victims of alcohol related traffic accidents decreased from 24 to 17, a decrease of 29.2 per cent.

— Total fatal accidents decreased from 63 to 49, a decrease of 22.2 per cent.

— Fatalities decreased from 73 to 64, a decrease of 12.3 per cent.

"These statistics indicate that the new legislation is having a considerable influence on the driving habits and attitudes of Manitobans," McCrae said.

"For this reason, this government is determined to make every effort to ensure that the legislation remains in force."

"We are very concerned that if the Court of Queen's Bench decision against the vehicle impoundment section is allowed to stand that there is a risk of increased injuries, the public education campaign will lose momentum and the public may be confused about what parts

8 of the Canadian Charter of Rights.

In addition, Manitoba filed a motion asking the Appeal Court to suspend the effect of the Queen's Bench decision until the case is heard and a decision reached so that law enforcement officials can continue to enforce the vehicle impoundment section of Bill 3.

The motion was heard by a single justice of the Court of Appeal in mid-August.

## New Superintendent brings many years' experience

School is almost upon us, and everyone seems to be preparing for it including the board of trustees for the Agassiz School Division No. 13.

Along with wrapping up last minute concerns about the schools the board welcomed the attendance of Waldo Klassen as the new superinten-

dent for the division at their last meeting on August 14 in Beausejour.

"It was more or less what I expected," Klassen said about the meeting. "It was very similar to what I was used to."

Klassen will be replacing Mike Czuboka who retired on June 30, after 21 years as superintendent for Agassiz.

To help him fill the shoes of the former superintendent however, Klassen brings many years of experience from work in the school district of Mystery Lake in Thompson.

At that school district located 720 km north of Winnipeg, Klassen has taught for four years, been a vice-principal for three, a principal for 13 years in two different schools, and an assistant superintendent for three years.

Another aspect of the Mystery Lake School District that will help Klassen perform his tasks as superintendent is the similarity in size which has seven schools and 3,800 students, while Agassiz has 11 schools and 2,800 students.

present system under examination by the Department of Education.

\* Also along the lines of bus safety was a rebate cheque of \$2,929 received from the Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation as a result of a safe bussing year. Only one claim was submitted by the division last year, qualifying them for a 25 per cent rebate from the \$11,000 paid in premiums.

\* A long standing problem with ventilation and excessive heat in some classrooms of the Powerview School was discussed. It was reported that 95 per cent of new duct work was completed and the rest should be ready by September.

\* Three Bears Day Care in St. Georges has requested that an addition be added to the Pine Falls School and the day care moved there.

\* No suitable bilingual candidate has applied for the position of principal for the Powerview School, and the board is looking to appoint someone for the fall term. In this case a unilingual candidate may be considered.



"I quite look forward to the challenges that lie ahead," Klassen said, "and I am quite impressed with the people I have met."

Klassen also said he looks forward to working with the board, as they did during the meeting where they addressed a number of concerns including:

- \* The proper usage of a \$35,000 capital reserve for the possible construction of a cafeteria in the Edward Schreyer School. This fund has been used in the past for the construction of the division office in 1973, and the installation of radios on buses.
- \* The school board once again expressed their concern about school bus safety, and of their opposition to possibility of contracting out school bus services. It is a current alternative option to the

## Farm chemical containers to be shredded

During the next few months, the Association for a Clean Rural Environment (ACRE) will send a mobile shredder and crew on a province-wide road trip. Their mission: to transform mountains of plastic chemical containers into compact recyclable material.

Other partners in the ACRE program are Manitoba Agriculture, Manitoba Environment and Workplace Safety and Health, Keystone Agricultural Producers, the Unions of Rural and Urban Municipalities, the Crop Protection Institute of Canada and private citizens.

The ACRE crew will travel to about 15 municipal sites to drain and shred empty containers submitted by Manitoba farmers, Cullen said. Once shredded, the plastic will be bagged and moved to a storage site to await recycling.

The mass shredding operation is the latest phase of a program promoting safe disposal of farm chemical containers. During the spring spraying season, ACRE launched an advertising campaign urging farmers to bring empty chemical containers to municipal collection sites. The ads also urged farmers to triple rinse all containers while filling up their spray tanks.

Cullen says the response has been extremely encouraging. "A higher percentage of containers have been returned to the collection sites and we're encouraged by the amount of triple rinsing that has occurred," he said. "I think this reflects the concern and regard farmers have for the environment."

Almost all rural Manitoba municipalities are participating in the program, Cullen added. Besides setting up the sites, the RMs segregate the collected material into piles of plastic, metal and cardboard. The

metal cans are drained, crushed and bagged. To help offset their costs, ACRE reimburses the municipalities for each container collected.

ACRE hopes to eventually recycle the collected jugs and cans, but the non-profit group is proceeding cautiously.

"We must determine what residues, if any, are in the plastic to determine what recycling options are safe," Cullen explained. "ACRE wants to make sure that we have an environmentally and publicly acceptable solution."

A washing facility now in the works will help ensure the material is clean and residue-free, he added.

While ACRE's plans are proceeding steadily, the project has run into one small snag. At some collecting sites, piles of plastic jugs have been mysteriously burned.

"We aren't sure who's been doing it or why. It may even be a well-intentioned citizen trying to help clean up," Cullen said. "It's unfortunate because municipalities aren't reimbursed for burned containers. It's also not an environmentally safe solution."

ACRE hopes more farmers will understand these sites are for the collection of chemical containers rather than disposal. While those old jugs and cans may seem like garbage to some, they should not be destroyed.

### Solar power for pasture water

The following information has been supplied by Mursel Kluge, farm water technologist.

One of the major problems cattle producers have been plagued with over the years is finding a way to reliably and inexpensively move water from a source to a trough in remote locations.

In the past, windmills were used to generate power to move water to pasture. Today nearly all farmers use dugouts to provide pasture watering. While the latter method is inexpensive, allowing cattle free access to the dugout leads to problems such as foot rot and mastitis. In addition, the steady tramping of cattle going to and from water causes dugout banks to erode quickly. As a result, some farmers have to clean their dugouts every three to five years. Allowing cattle to run in the dugout also sets the stage for excessive algae growth and subsequent deterioration of water quality. Poor water quality means cattle drink less and, in turn, weight gain and milk production are reduced.

The Water Services Board has been looking for a reliable, simple to operate and cost effective alternative for pasture watering. They've found that solar powered pumping unit could hold the answer.

Solar powered pumping units consist of three components.

The first is a solar panel collection system, usually made up of a number of 45 watt panels. The panels, which are either mounted on a tracking device or are solid-mounted at an angle facing the midday sun, collect and convert sunlight into 12 volt direct current.

The second component is made up of direct or indirect powered pumping units. Direct powered units send power generated by the solar panels directly to the pumps. With indirect powered units, the power generated recharges a set of batteries used to power the pump.

A third component is needed to provide water for a three-day period when there is not enough sunlight to operate the pumps. During extended periods of overcast weather, emergency battery power may be used.

To be effective, more than one unit is needed for dugouts, rivers and wells. Pumping units must also be relatively portable since many farmers utilize various water sources.

Solar pumping units require little maintenance other than periodic checks to ensure the panels are clean and the pumps are operating. The panels themselves must be fenced off to prevent cattle from using them as scratching posts.

At present there are a number of solar powered systems on the market. Costs range from \$800 to \$3000, depending on the type of water source and the number of cattle.

## BOOK NOOK

by Shirley Finkbeiner  
*A Far Cry from Kensington*  
by Muriel Spark.

The book jacket describes it as a funny and stylish book, and it is all that.

This story of Mrs. Hawkins and her neighbors in the rooming house in South Kensington gives us a glimpse of London following the second war. The descriptions of people and places are meticulous, making you feel you have looked through a window and seen these people in their bedsitters with the drab furniture and the gas ring with its steel box for the pennies and shillings.

Mrs. Hawkins works for publishing firms, reading manuscripts and offering such sage advice as "if you want to concentrate deeply, acquire a cat. The cat will settle on your desk under the desk lamp. And the serenity will gradually come

to affect you. The effect of a cat on your concentration is remarkable, very mysterious. I smiled at this because it is exactly what our cat does, and I usually find he is lying on something I need!

Anyway, the story is like many. It meanders its way gently, not in any hurry to get anywhere, and seemingly, not really going anywhere. But it is full of wonderfully drawn characters, all so ordinary; some pathetic, some unlikable, and all in their own way, remarkable.

Mrs. Hawkins watches the world and finds its people fascinating and amusing. She takes a great dislike to one author and his malice follows her for years. And as she says, her final encounter with him was a far cry from Kensington. This is a good book for a lazy, summer day.

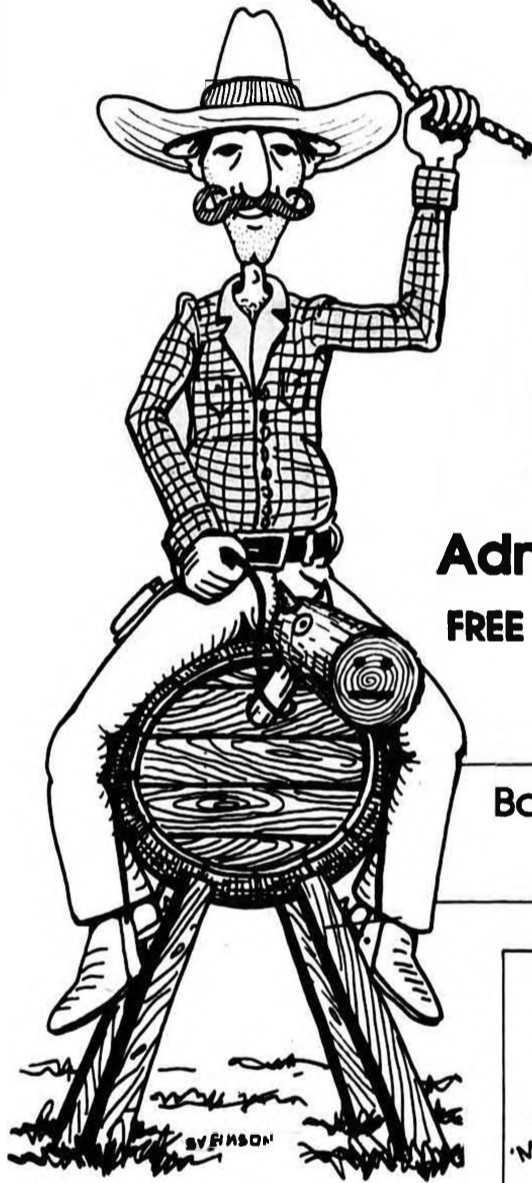
