## UI info meeting deals with changes

 Bill C-21, encompassing changes to the Unemployment Insurance Act, came into effect on November 18, 1990. In order to help the public better understand these changes, the federal government has initiated a series of meetings throughout Canada during the weeks after November 18.

One such meeting was held in Powerview at the Kawiyak Friendship Centre on December 1990. Laura Kitchen and Barbara Meikel from Selkirk Canada Employment Centre provided a great deal of information in a short period of time using overheads, handouts, and chalkboard drawings. They answered the questions which came at them fast and furious. Some specific answers they were unable to supply at that time, but they were quite willing to take names and phone numbers and get back to the questioners within a few days.

Kitchen explained to the approximately fifteen people present that Bill C-21 was passed at one of their busiest times of year. They were already handling about six hundred claims per week locally. The Canada Employment Centre in Selkirk covers approximately 50,000 square miles.

The goal of the new legislation is to provide continuity of jobs rather than seasonal layoffs. The Canada Employment Centre will be helping people get new jobs. Presently the area which covers Pine Falls, Powerview and St. Georges has 24.3% unemployment. Manitoba is presently divided into three regions, the north, the south and Winnipeg. These regions determine how many weeks a person is eligible for unemployment insurance.

# UI claimants rights and obligations

Barbara Merkel trains Canada Employment Centre workers in Selkirk about unemployment insurance. This teaching expertise showed as she explained quickly but thoroughly some of the rights and obligations of the unemployment insurance claimant and what changes had occurred as a result of the new legislation.

The following information was gleaned from Merkel's teaching and from a single sheet handout put out by Employment and Immigration Canada. It is available free of charge from any Canada Employment Centre.

## Claimants rights and obligations Your rights are:

- **The right to file a claim for benefits.** You have the right under the Unemployment Insurance Act to file a claim for Unemployment Insurance benefits. You also have the right to reapply under the new legislation if you didn't qualify before.
- **The right to assistance and information.** You have the right to have your claim for benefits processed as quickly and objectively as possible. You have the right to prompt and accurate information concerning the status of your claim and the right to expect assistance from your Canada Employment Centre in connection with your claim. You may phone, write or ask in person.
- **The right to employment service.** You have the right to expect assistance in finding employment and in helping you re-enter the labour force as quickly as possible.
- **The right to receive benefits.** If you have the necessary number of insured weeks and meet (and continue to meet) the requirements of the UI Act, you have the right to establish a claim and receive Unemployment Insurance benefits. After your claim is established, and after you become eligible for benefits, you must serve a two-week waiting period for which you will not be paid. If you voluntarily left your last employment, or lost your employment by reason of misconduct, you may be disqualified from receiving benefits for an additional period of up to six weeks. Under the new legislation, this penalty is now up to 12 weeks.
- **The right to special benefits.** You may qualify for "special

benefits" in cases of illness, injury, quarantine, maternity. You have the right to receive available information concerning these "special benefits" as appropriate. Adoption and retirement no longer apply under this section but will be covered under a separate section.

- **The right to appeal.** You have the right to appeal any decision on your claim which you consider to be unjust. Such an appeal must be submitted in writing within 30 days of the date on which you are notified of the decision.

## Your obligations are:

- **To be available for work.** You must be available for work at all times, capable and ready to accept employment immediately. You must report on your bi-weekly claimant report form whether or not you were available for work. If you were not available, you must give the reason.
- **To actively look for work.** You must genuinely search for work at all times while claiming benefits, including during the two-week waiting period, and must not place undue restrictions that reduce your chances of finding employment. **You must keep a record of employers that you have contacted for work and the dates of contact,** and be prepared to supply this information as required. If you refuse or do not apply for a suitable job offer, you may lose up to 12 weeks of benefits. The penalty has again increased to 12 weeks.
- **To follow instructions from employment or insurance service.** If you should receive a notice or instruction from the commission to attend an interview at a definite place and time, you must keep the appointment in order to protect your rights under the appropriate legislation. If, for any reason, you are unable to report, you must advise the person to whom you are to report and explain why you cannot attend.
- **To report any earnings.** You must declare as accurately as possible the gross amount of all money received or to be received from employment or your bi-weekly claimant report forms, in the week in which you worked. This includes group sickness/maternity insurance benefits. If you did not receive your wages, you must still report them during the time you earned them. You must phone in and explain what happened.
- **To maintain active registra-**

tion. You must contact your Canada Employment Centre regularly to look for work.

**NOTE:** Claimants who are or become pregnant while on claim must report their pregnancy to the commission at least eight weeks before the week in which the birth is expected.

**CAUTION:** It is important that you always complete and return your claimant forms on time. Otherwise, you risk losing or delaying your benefits. It is most important that claimants do not make incorrect or misleading statements to the commission for the purpose of receiving benefits. The act provides severe penalties for knowingly making false statements. Penalties for an employee can be up to 300% of a claim, for an employer up to 900% of a claim.

## Unemployment Insurance changes

In order to simplify matters in this section, all information provided applies exclusively to the northern region. For information on other regions, contact your nearest Canada Employment Centre. Each region's rates are based on the level of unemployment in that region and will change according to the newest unemployment figures. The assumption here is that if there is 25% unemployment it is more difficult to obtain a job than if there is 5% unemployment because more people will be looking for fewer jobs.

The old act still applies to claims that started before November 18, 1990. The new act applies to claims that start November 18, 1990 or after. There are a few exceptions such as parental benefits.

Under the new act, the minimum period of work you need to qualify, changes from 14 weeks to 10 weeks in this region. Within one twelve month period. You can work for several employers as long as it was all work covered by UIC.

The maximum number of weeks of UI benefits you can get in this region based on the number of weeks of work is as follows.

You cannot get more than 50 weeks of benefits. Those weeks of work have to be within the last twelve months

with a few exceptions which take you back one more year. You cannot use the same weeks of work to claim for two separate UIC claims. If you worked 10 weeks, were laid off, you could collect and then, if you worked 10 more weeks you could claim again all within one 12 month period.

### Penalties

Quitting your job with "just cause" provides no penalties and you can qualify for the benefits. However, quitting without "just cause", for example if you don't like it, there is a 7 to 12 week penalty and benefits will be reduced from 60% to 50% of insurable earnings for the entire claim.

Currently unemployed workers who knowingly give false information about their claim face a penalty of up to three times their weekly benefits. Employers of workers who knowingly give false information can be prosecuted instead of penalized. The fine for offenses has been raised \$500 to \$2,000, or six months in prison, or both.

From now on workers affected by strikes will be able to collect illness, maternity, parental and training benefits when leave was arranged or anticipated before the strike. On the other hand, claimants will be disentitled at the end of the leave if the strike is still continuing.

### Maternity/Parental Benefits

Maternity benefits are much the same. There are fifteen weeks of maternity benefits for the mother during the period surrounding the birth of the child. A new provision is for ten weeks of

parental benefits for natural or adoptive parents, claimed either by the mother or father, or split between them in whatever manner they choose. This can also be tacked on at the end of the fifteen weeks maternity leave. Additional benefits may result from more flexible combinations of regular, sickness, maternity and parental benefits. In addition parental benefits may be extended to fifteen weeks in cases where the child is six months of age or older when the child arrives at the claimant's home and the child suffers from a physical, psychological or emotional condition. These benefits can also be shared. The cumulative number of weeks of special benefits cannot exceed thirty.

Merkel and Kitchen were quick to point out that even though UIC offers parental and maternity benefits, not all companies do. A husband may not be allowed time off by his company for parental benefits if it's not in his contract. Provincial legislation is being passed to comply with these federal changes.

### Working beyond age 65

Prior to November 18, 1990 working people over the age of 65 could not pay into UIC or collect it. A lump sum pay out was made at age 65. However, consequent to a supreme court ruling against this age discrimination, the Tetreault-Gadoury case, an amendment was passed retroactive to September 23, 1988, the date of the decision. Now Unemployment Insurance has been extended to cover those who work beyond age 65. Premiums are collected and benefits allowed in the normal manner.

## Manitoba Murder: The facts of life

Our forefathers would never have believed it...and, perhaps if you are able to receive the Detroit-TV news via satellite or cable, you will probably believe I'm talking about an organization in Michigan.

But, no! Right here in River City, a group called Family Survivors of Homicide (118 Queenston St., Winnipeg; 1.489.7323) is, unfortunately, alive and well and doing tremendous work.

This is a self-help group for family members and friends of murder victims. They meet regularly. Most of them have gone through phases — anger, guilt, fear.

You have probably seen the headlines about Manitoba's murder rate being the highest in the country; nothing like Detroit or Miami or New York, but — for Canada — ridiculously out of proportion.

As we have seen in the city over the past year, many of these killings are a direct result of domestic violence. Wife-battering is now recognized as one of our most severe social problems.

The politicians have been slow to move, but finally police have the right to lay immediate charges (without the consent of the victimized spouse).

The statistics stagger the mind. A 1987 report showed that more than 17.4 per cent of all married men admitted having hit a spouse more than once. That report did

not cover common-law companions, relationships we are now told in which violence is far more common than in legally-sanctioned marriages.

In several interviews I have conducted over the past year with the family and friends of murder victims in Manitoba, it became increasingly apparent that no amount of mental healing will ever erase what happened. In so many cases, it was so senseless.

You would also be surprised at the number of Manitoba killings in which booze and/or drugs were involved. We will be getting those statistics after a new study is completed in July of this year.

Our figures are not so gruesome as those in the United States, where now more than one-half of all households own guns, most of which are handguns. But they are still way too high.

Psychologists and psychiatrists have tried to pin-point why this province has such a high homicide rate.

Some put it down to our weather; others cite the number of killings which happen on remote reserves or in other isolated communities.

Some social workers believe that our confrontational method of settling marriage break-ups in a head-to-head legal battle contributes to pent-up anger...and that's why some of those statistics involve former spouses.

And the stories are never told about the people who are left to pick up the pieces after their lives have been touched by murder, particularly the children. They never recover.

Family Survivors of Homicide (Manitoba) Inc. is an organization we should not need. But we do need them...and they deserve our full support.

### Money not the only issue during strike

Dear sir:

As the provincial nurses' strike enters into its second week, public support and understanding have increased. Donations have been much appreciated and whether people walk with us or just honk their horn as they go by, it boosts our spirits. At press time, no negotiations are taking place. The bargaining agent on behalf of the governments (MHO) refuses to budge on many issues, in addition to the monetary items. Although the monetary demands have caught the public attention, other outstanding issues that address working conditions, pensions and professional input into patient care are also at a standstill. In fact, MHO wants to erode our current collective agreement. In that agreement, part-time and full-time nurses work a fifty-fifty split of days and evenings or day and nights unless "mutually agreeable". MHO proposes that the "mutually agreeable" phrase be deleted. Therefore the nurse could be required to work more evenings or nights than days. The MNU negotiators refuse to have our present agreement eroded.

At present, MHO manages our pension fund; we are requesting that the union on behalf of its members have an equal say with respect to any pension/benefit provisions. Our bargaining committee was also attempting to improve our pension benefits as well as institute earlier paid retirement. MHO refuses to discuss this issue.

Another important issue is nursing input into decisions that affect patient care. A proposal to form a committee to address patient care concerns with access to the hospital board has also stalled at the table. Nurses hold the responsibility for patient care but hold no authority to affect change. This committee could help the health care system become more fiscally responsible. You may be asked to contact your MIA to request not more funding to the health care system, but more accountable and responsible funding.

Outlined below are the wage increases tabled by both sides. You will note a discrepancy in the MHO proposal. They are including pay equity into our negotiated wage increases. Pay equity is not a negotiated pay increase. It was legislated by the previous government to increase a woman's wage to equal that of man's wage doing work of equal value. It has

been incorrectly instituted and has created a two-tiered wage scale. Pay equity discriminates against those nurses who work in a small facility as the nurses in the larger facilities received it before negotiations even started! As you can see, there are many outstanding issues at stake. Nurses are not a greedy lot, in fact those of us working essential services are donating our wages back to the strike fund. We hope for your continued support and understanding.

Salaries:

Jan. 1, 1991 — increase rates for nurses employed in non-pay equity facilities to equal those paid at pay equity facilities; RN and RPN - 5.5% general wage increase; LPN and ORT - 0%; remove Nurse I classification.

July 1, 1991 — add one increment to all RN and RPN scales.

Oct. 1, 1991 — increase rates for nurses employed in non-pay equity facilities to equal those paid at pay equity facilities.

Jan. 1, 1992 — all classifications - 4% general wage increase.

Jan. 1, 1993 — all classifications - 5% general wage increase.

The Manitoba Nurses' Union last position:

Jan. 1, 1991 — increase rates in non-pay equity facilities to equal those paid at pay equity facilities; delete Nurse I occupational classification; amend all rates by adding 12%.

April 1, 1991 — amend all rates by adding 6%.

Oct. 1, 1991 — increase rates in non-pay equity facilities to equal those paid at pay equity facilities.

Jan. 1, 1992 — amend all rates by 9%.

## Heat pumps greatest thing since indoor plumbing

I told Mrs. Lamontagne she should put a beeper on her husband. When she wants to find him she doesn't know if he's farming, inventing, manufacturing, merchandising, or in attendance at a municipal council meeting.

Dennis Lamontagne operates a farm with a difference; there's a factory in the back yard. Wawota Energy Products now has a staff of six, and eventually may require as many as 30. Their product is heat pumps, and this may be the greatest friend a farm family has had since indoor plumbing.

Heat pumps will keep your home warm in winter, and cool in summer, all with energy extracted from beneath the surface of the earth. With one type of system, the energy of heat is extracted from well water which is pumped out of one well and discharged into another. In another system, piping buried in the backyard collects subsurface heat, which is collected in a heat exchanger and distributed through the house.

How efficiently do they work? Well, Denis Lamontagne, and his brother Vic, have supplied the equipment for more than 200 heat pump installations in Saskatchewan in recent years, and their research is extensive. Here's a case history: Richard Wright of Wawota has run a close check on his installation and his total bill for two years of heating and air conditioning was \$721.

While heat pumps look like an ordinary furnace, they are much more involved. The heat is collected by means of refrigerant to which more energy is added by evaporation and pressure. When Canada's conservation minister was announcing his Green Plan he should have mentioned heat pumps, because nothing is more friendly to the environment. They burn no fossil fuel.

The heat collected is left over from that day, a few jillion years ago, when the earth was spun off from the sun as a molten mass.

Once Denis Lamontagne concluded that heat pumps were here to stay, he launched Wawota Energy Products. His crew assembles heat-pump units in a variety of sizes. Their major market today is Ontario, where they now have dealers in every major city. That province is on a conservation kick and offers grants to hydro customers using alternate sources of energy.

Investing in a heat pump can have a quick pay-back. Denis cited a case from his files; a client who had forced-air ducting in his home and two wells paid close to \$5,000 for the conversion. This gives him heat and air conditioning for approximately a dollar a day. For heat alone he previously had an annual oil bill of \$3,200.

Denis is appreciative of the help he has received as he developed his dream into a reality. The rural municipalities of Wawken, Walpole, Maryfield, Moosomin, and Moose Mountain assisted him with loans from their per-capita investment funds. This helped him through his expensive research period.

Denis Lamontagne has a commendable philosophy; he wants prairie towns to keep their young people at home. He explained to the *Carlyle Observer*, "To do this there have to be jobs available." This is a large part of the motivation behind Wawota Energy.

## Old Pinawa Dam Jam festival concept gaining momentum

The effort to create a major entertainment festival in the Eastman region at the Old Pinawa Heritage Park is gaining momentum. A series of fund raising events are being planned for the new year. In late January or early February a Coffee House with entertainment yet to be determined will be held in the Lac du Bonnet Senior Centre. A Big Band Valentines Day Concert and a Sadie Hawkins Jazz Night are planned for Pinawa on February 14 and 28 respectively. quired. General site development, such as, clearing more land on the park site to improve the camping area, and more fencing around the site, is required. ## Your Q's and A's concerning Citizens' Forum on Canada's future

Last November, Prime Minister Brian Mulroney announced the creation of a Citizen's Forum on Canada's Future, which will launch a dialogue with and among people across the country and encourage the creation of a new consensus about Canada.

Several constituents have written to me last month on this new initiative and I would like to take this occasion early in this new year to respond to some of the questions raised.

**QUESTION:**  
— What does the government expect out of this consultation process?

**REPLY:**  
— I hope the result of this dialogue will be a better understanding among Canadians about each other, and about the problems and challenges we have to face

— As a government, I hope the Findings will provide us with an insight into how the institutions of government can better respond to Canadians' needs and aspirations.

**QUESTION:**  
— Are you trying to pre-empt the provincial processes/won't the national dialogue duplicate the provincial processes?

**REPLY:**  
— No; in fact, the processes should be complementary in various ways. The provincial processes will give Canadians insights into the concerns and priorities, particularly on constitutional questions, of the various provinces.

— The Citizen's Forum takes a broader approach, which in my view is essential to establishing the context for constitutional issues. Only national consultations will give Canadians from all provinces and the two territories the means to comment on national questions, and to talk directly with each other on their vision of Canada.

**QUESTION:**  
— Canada is in the middle of recession, why are we talking about the constitution again?

**REPLY:**  
— This government has, and will continue to have, a very strong economic agenda. We will not ignore economic issues as we start this process of consultations with Canadians. Deficit reduction, international trade, the environment and many other issues will continue to receive the attention of the government in the coming months.

— We recognize that the public is tired of seemingly endless constitutional discussions, and that is why we have taken a new approach and are trying to spark a dialogue without limiting it to narrow legal questions of constitutional reform.

Thanks again for your letters on this and other subjects of particular interest to you. Please keep them coming. Remember — when writing your MP, letters require no postage.

I am not really a reader of fantasy fiction, but having said that I have to follow up with the exception to that rule — a book by Guy Gavriel Kay.

Several years ago I was urged to read his Fionavar Tapestry, a trilogy that made me willing to have a look at this type of fiction. Now I have just finished his new book, *Tigana*.

To read fantasy fiction you must first be willing to let your mind leave your sensible world and go off to the worlds of wizards, magic, strange and very different countries. Once there, the tale becomes plausible and for a brief time you are caught up in it all.

*Tigana* was a country of incredible beauty, and peopled with citizens with a terrible pride in their accomplishments and in their homeland. It was overtaken by the Tyrant Brandin, who destroyed it and caused its name to disappear.

A small band of people are determined to overthrow the two Tyrants, Brandin and

## Farm accounting

Farm account books are available for sale to farmers through this office. There are two basic types of books available.

**Farm Records I** gives a page by page breakdown for expenditures and receipt items. For example, expenses for cattle, swine or crops are listed by page and you can get a quick view of expenditures by enterprise. This is handy for operations with more than one enterprise. Cost of *Farm Records I* is \$11.50 per book.

**Farm Records II** has all expenses and incomes laid out in a one-glance format, giving you an option to select personalized headings. This is the more popular record book. Furthermore, the 1991 edition, which is expected soon, has a revised section for G.S.T. record keeping. Cost of *Farm Records II* is \$12.50.

Both books contain sections for inventory, accounts receivable, etc. *Farm Records II* has a detailed labor records section.

### G.S.T. record keeping

Commencing in 1991, farmers will have to keep track of G.S.T. paid out, in order to get reimbursed on farm purchases. This means that some revisions will be needed in your record keeping system this year.

If you already have an account book, it is advisable to add a column under expenditures entitled **Farm G.S.T. Paid**. Be sure to enter the amount of G.S.T. paid on all farm expenditures in this column. For example, if you paid \$1,000 for equipment parts and the \$70 for the G.S.T., then separate and record each expenditure in each column (i.e. parts and G.S.T. paid). You may also want a column for G.S.T. paid for personal expenditures, even though they are not refundable.

When you file for your rebate, all you have to do is add up the amount of farm G.S.T. paid and submit your claim. Hold the receipts in case an audit is required later. You can file monthly (which is best), quarter or annually.

Farmers may have to collect G.S.T. on goods sold, i.e. canary seed sales, custom work, flax straw sold for processing.
