



# Controlling the level of lake Winnipeg

You have probably heard and read a great deal about this subject. You are particularly interested because you have property on the lake. You spend the enjoyable summer months here. It's only natural that you should be concerned when the question comes up of opening new channels to control the lake's level.

Because of this interest Your Hydro is publishing a series of messages on the subject in this newspaper. Watch for them. The information they contain will help you to better understand the plan.

Each year the level of Lake Winnipeg undergoes normal seasonal fluctuations—rising in the spring when

the winter's accumulated snow begins to melt, reaching a peak about mid-summer and gradually declining through the remainder of the year. The recorded levels have ranged from about 709 feet to about 717 feet above sea level but there is evidence that the lake has been much higher and probably lower before accurate records were kept. Without some form of control these extreme levels could occur again.

When the controls are in service in 1975 the level of the lake, under all but the most unusual conditions, will be maintained within the range of 711 and 715 feet above sea level. How this will be accomplished and why it is necessary for Manitoba's future will be the subject of subsequent messages.
